## A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas.

### “Cornwall Collectables”

From my research it appears Harriet Fogwill opened the first business at Cornwall in 1887. Using a brick outdoor oven, Harriet baked and sold bread to the hungry miners. From there businesses such as general stores, butcher shops, bakeries and blacksmith shops developed as the township of Cornwall grew.

Sadly all these businesses are long gone from Cornwall now and, perhaps, never to return. But one man, who has faith in Cornwall, is about to embark in a venture with unique qualities that will not only be a first for Cornwall, but add quality to the town and the Fingal Valley.

Marty Hornibrook, who has been a collector of all things old for the best part of his life, plans to open his business called Cornwall Collectables, on the 1<sup>st</sup> December 2007 to coincide with the St Marys Lions Reunion weekend.

Marty, an ex-navy man, came to Cornwall in 1997 and brought the old Albert Jones residence. A few years later he was able to obtain the block next door, which was the site of an old stable that had been turned into a house by the Thornbury family and burnt down in the mid 1990s.

In April 2006 Marty purchased an American style barn and with the help of local handymen, Razz Mc Donald and Wayne Squires, a cement slab was laid and the barn quickly erected. Since then Marty has been flat out fitting the barn out and stacking it with thousands of goodies that include records, phones, books, bakelite radios and a vast array of old wares, many of which have a history as long as your arm.

To compliment the barn Marty has put together a wonderful display of photos and relics relating to the history of Cornwall, with the main theme being coalmining, the industry that Cornwall was built on.

Visitors to the barn will not only be given a stunning view of the Fingal Valley but will be able to admire Marty's soda siphon collection which now numbers some 403, making it the largest in Tasmania, and Marty believes it may even be the largest in Australia.

As you can imagine siphons are everywhere, but whilst everything else in the barn is for sale; the soda siphons are only for show.

The Cornwall Community congratulates Marty and partner Teresa in their innovative venture. It will not only enhance our Coalminers' Heritage Wall, but the whole town and indeed give another reason for people to visit the Fingal Valley.

The blue barn on the hill overlooking the valley will soon become a place to visit, admire, learn and step back in time. You may even find that rare item from your childhood days that you have spent years searching for.

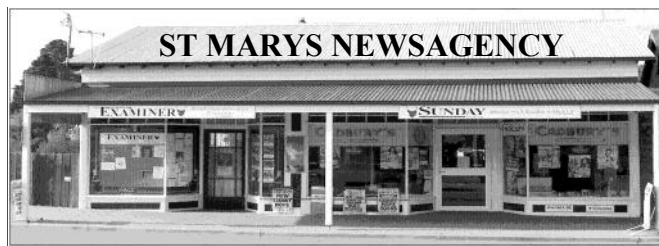

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## Concrete building blocks make a statement.

More than 50 years ago, during the decade spanning the 1950s, St Marys was the centre of a building movement that has left a significant built heritage in the town, mainly individual houses, and associated garages, sheds and garden walls, but also commercial premises, culminating in the St Marys Community Hall in 1961 – buildings constructed with hand made concrete blocks, made on site using cement and local sand and formed in individual moulds.

The majority of the houses were built on the town, but the houses on Bryar Wah and Top Marshes are also of the same period and construction. All are still standing, with the exception of the one built by Lloyd Rowbottom, an engine driver, on the first corner of Germantown Rd, which was burned several years back, and a butchers shop built by Jack Bullock next to the Criterion Hotel and Victoria Hall in Main Road, all now demolished. Lloyd's house was built in about 1959, possibly the last of the St Marys concrete block houses. It was built as a family effort, with John Rowbottom remembering making bricks after school with his father and brother Wayne, helped out by Lloyd's cray fishing mates, Charlie Phillips, Tag Mason and Sid Stone.

While building the Hall was a community effort, it seems that the other concrete block buildings were mainly built by the individual owner builders, although there may have been an exchange of experience between some of them, and Clesby Neil, a builder, was involved in the building of at least two of them. Certainly there was some passing on or sale of moulds once a building was completed, although Donny Smith still has his two moulds, one for the straight blocks, the other for corners.

Many, although not all, of the houses were built by miners, or men who worked at the mines, and they may have originally got the idea from some of the buildings of this type of construction at Cornwall Coal, built by Trevor 'Fogarty' Lehner. The impetus for the cement block construction came from the shortage of timber and other materials in the years immediately following the end of the Second World War in 1945. However, cement was readily available, and mixed with local sand made for strong and cheap building blocks that could be made easily by the owner builder. According to Jeff Morris, most of the cement used didn't cost the builders anything – it came from bags which had burst in transit to local stores and to the mine, which had been left in the rail trucks and had to be disposed of before the trucks were reloaded.

Dating the construction of the different buildings is rather hazy, but it is hoped that this article may bring out some more specific information. Stan Birrell is mentioned as being among the earliest builders, making blocks and introducing the moulds and the construction method to the town from the mine at Cornwall. However, while he built a garage and garden walls in lower Cameron St, he built his house at Scamander, using red ash from a fire at the mine as the building material.

11 Gray Road was built by Halley Edgar Freeman, a miner, in 1951, so seems to have been among the first. Don Smith, also a miner, albeit at the Jubilee, built his house at 5 Hugh Street in 1953-54 at the time of his marriage to Eileen.

He rented a truck from Artie McGiveron, and dug 6 truckloads of sand during the day from the riverbank at the bridge on the South Esk at Malahide. He made his bricks on his father-in-law's place, Arthur Roberts, next to the Hospital. From memory he reckoned he made about 1700 blocks, and built the house over 12 months.

It seems that not all the owner builders actually made all their own bricks, and Jack Bullock remembers buying blocks from Rex Bradbury. Rex was a miner, and had built himself a garage in Rosegarland Road. Other people started asking him to make blocks for them, and for a while he became a part-time backyard brick maker, although he never built more than the garage out of blocks for himself. Similarly, Duggie Barnes did not build a house, but was part of many of them, as he carted a lot of the sand used in building the blocks. One of the local sources of sand, the rabbit sand, was apparently up Gray Rd, just past the cemetery.

According to Don Smith, John Rowbottom and Derwin Thomas, you mixed the sand and cement by hand into a semi-dry mix, filled the mould, hit the top of the filled mould with the back of the shovel to compress the mix, slipped a pallet of wood over the mould to hold the mix while you turned the mould over and then lifted the mould off the formed block, leaving it sitting on the pallet for several days while it dried. During this time you lightly sprinkled the cast block with water and let it cure.

To obtain a pattern on the face of the block you placed the appropriate pattern plate in the bottom of the mould before filling it. From time to time you would clean the inside of the mould, either by hosing it, or with a piece of waste rag soaked in kerosene. Some people made their total requirements of blocks as quickly as possible, some did a few every night when they came home from work and at weekends.

Clesby Niel was listed in the 1948 Electoral Roll as a builder, then living in Groom Street. He later built the house now owned by Geoff and Patti O'Donnell on the corner of Frederick St and Gardiners Creek Rd, known then as Rosegarland Road. [the 'Rosegarland' property was probably named in the early 1850s by the new owner Henry Archdall, but was previously known as 'Break O'Day Lodge' (1848 Census) owned by John Badcock Gardiner – hence Gardiners Creek] Cles may also have built the house in Cameron St for the McHargs, and also the hit and miss wall fronting Main Road on the way out of town towards Fingal.

George Neil was in the 1948 Electoral Roll as a carpenter, living at Frank Street, and it was at the corner of Frank St and Reservoir Rd that he built his concrete block house, on the same block as the old barn featured in many photographs.

[ the late Jack Smith told me that his stepmother was a Neil, that the Neils were originally Nagle, one of the early German families in the District ]

Out of town a little way, Gordon Salter gradually rebuilt and extended the house on 'Top Marshes'. It didn't start out to be a concrete block house, but apparently it ended up as one !

Ervan Bullock next door must have been impressed by Gordon's efforts, because when 'Bryar Wah' burned down in 1955, he got George Neil to rebuilt it in concrete blocks with the help of Jack Bullock and Berkley Pallett.

Lionel "Toby" Spilsbury was a clipper in 1948 and for many years after, although later generations remember him as our St Marys butcher. However, while Toby built his concrete block house and a number of outbuildings for himself and Bette on the hill on The Flat, overlooking the Criterion Hotel, the butchers shop of concrete blocks that he operated in later years on the corner of Aulichs Lane was built by his predecessor Lew(is) Maney.

14 Cameron Street apparently was not an owner built house, but was built for Orm (James Ormond) McHarg by Clesby Neil. Orm was a farmer who lived and farmed opposite Cullenswood Church, living in 'Beckers Cottage', and it was his mother and sister who lived in the Cameron Street house.

A cluster of 3 concrete block houses were built in Gray Rd, one by Halley Freeman in 1951, No 11, at the entrance of the (then) new St Marys Area School, and two next door to each other a little further up the road on the opposite side, built by Gavin Singline and Derwin Thomas. Gavin built his in 1953, a bit before Derwin, while living on the block in a caravan under a large tree. He married Marjorie ( May) Morris, and theirs was the first house on the west side of Gray Rd. He worked at the mine at the time, but during the war had served on corvettes and minesweepers. His brother-in-law Jeff Morris tells how the interior structure of the house is actually based on the layout of the companion ways and sleeping quarters of a corvette! Jack Royle shovelled and carted beach sand from a pit at Diana's Basin for the blocks, mixing it with coarser gravel river sand to give the required consistency.

Next year, in 1954, the building continued up Gray Road, with Derwin Thomas building his concrete block house next door to Gavin and May, in time for his wedding to Mary Ryan in 1955. Derwin was a motor mechanic at John Gee's garage (now Faulkners), and he had help in building from his cousin, Murray Hodgman, who was a builder in Launceston. The bricks were laid "by a young chap from Scamander". His father, Harold Thomas, cut the timber for the lining studs from his block further up on the opposite side of Gray Road.

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Derwin particularly remembered that the foundations were pretty massive to take the weight of the blocks. His recollection was that they needed about 1800 blocks, and that the sand came from the Fingal area.

Yet another miner, Bill Stone, built the house at 17 Newman Street, but apparently didn't finish it, and didn't actually use any mortar in the top courses.

Other concrete buildings visible to the public gaze include the front wall of the shop before the Flat bridge, built by Kay Nailer's Dad, Tony Davis, and the addition to the bakery. There was some learned discussion among those who know such things, and it was universally concluded that neither of the town's concrete block garages were made of locally produced blocks or built by owner operators, and that the pedigree of the existing Caltex garage in fact predates (1946) the relevant period.

There may be other smaller buildings, garages, sheds and other outbuildings still standing from this period, and various walls, unseen from public streets. Certainly Jack Bullock in Main Road and Toby Spilsbury on the Flat built some nice outbuildings which still grace their properties, while Selby Targett in Newman Street built his chimney from concrete blocks.

The culmination of this stage in the development of the urban landscape of St Marys was the building of the St Marys Town Hall in 1961, or the Memorial and Community Hall as it was originally called. This was a community effort, under the drive and direction of Verdun Royle and Keith Bullock. Leo Lynch was the block maker. Almost 50 years later the building still stands, as do the concrete block houses of the town, a tribute to those who built them, and a notable part of the built heritage of St Marys.

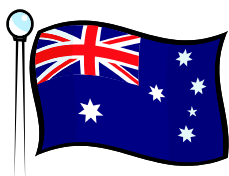

## Regener8 Exhibition & Book recognises resilience of Break O'Day

St. Marys will be hosting a wonderful community initiative commencing Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> December that will be a showcase of people's experiences of the bushfires in 2006 and a record of the survival and rebuilding over the last 12 months.

The ReGener8 Committee formed in March 2007, after Jan Sparkes approached the Healthy Community Project with the idea of holding an exhibition. "The idea was to allow people the opportunity to express their feelings, thoughts and ideas to promote a positive recovery process. We wanted to recognise the resilience of the Break O'Day communities. Everyone was so tired following the fires and then we seemed to get on with the job of rebuilding. We did not have the opportunity to recognise the amazing people in our communities and the way we pull together in a crisis" Jan Sparkes said.

The exhibition received strong community support from individuals, organisations and services and the committee has been successful in gaining funding from Tas Regional Arts, the Affected Area Recovery Committee, Break O'Day Council and the Tasmanian State Government.

"The Healthy Community Project embraced the idea of the exhibition as it was a brilliant community driven initiative that would assist in the recovery process. It also provided the opportunity to promote art as a valuable tool that can be utilised to benefit all aspects of daily life. We are so pleased to be involved in the exhibition as it has given the opportunity for whole community participation in the recovery process and allows us to celebrate community survival, resilience and renewal." said Fiona Watts Health Promotion Coordinator.

As well feeling the need for an exhibition as a means for the community to express their thoughts and feelings, Jan Sparkes had a strong sense in the importance of collecting local stories and experiences, to bring together local knowledge, history and experience. Rosa McManamey from the University Department of Rural Health joined Jan in this endeavour to include some interviews with volunteer bushfire fighters and also edit the collection as a book. Together with Chris Hughes, Community Development Officer, Break O'Day Council the three put together contributions and interviews as a collection of community stories, images and poems – regener8.

Rosa McManamey said 'We met so many wonderful people in bringing the stories together. We have been so privileged to be given these very personal gifts of honest and open insights. What emerges from the book is its reflection of something truly special. Where it was intended to be part of the process of healing as well as helping others from the stories and showing community resilience, it is much more. It is a book about the spirit and generosity of communities suffering great hardship, coming together; it's about the most remarkable actions of heroism from people who consider themselves 'everyday' people; and finally, when you look at all the services and voluntary bodies and personal giving that (galvanised) sprang into action in the face of disaster, you have cause to be very proud to be Tasmanian.

The book 'regener8 - Stories and Impressions of the Tasmanian East Coast Bushfire 2006' is dedicated to Thomas Orr who lost his life as a result of the fires and to everyone affected by the fires. It will be available for purchase for \$15.00 with profits from the sale of the publication going to local fire services and Wildlife Rescue.

The ReGener8 Bushfire Recovery Exhibition and the regener8 Book will be launched on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> December at the St. Marys Railway Station. The Exhibition will be at St. Marys at e-ScApe Café, Gone Rustic and St. Marys District High School. The exhibition will be open to the public free of charge from 1<sup>st</sup> – 14<sup>th</sup> December and will host a wide variety of media. 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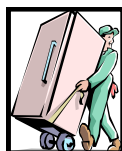

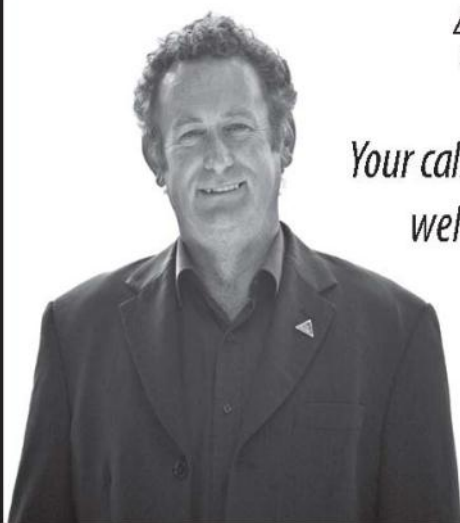
The new sub-branch will be known as St Helens-St Marys RSL Sub-Branch and the benefits to the St Marys veteran community will be substantial.

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## As I remember Christmas.

As I am now 93, I have a lot of Christmases to remember. My earliest memories would be from when I was 3 years old. I grew up on a farm in Pyengana, with 3 sisters and 3 brothers.

Christmas started early, with the first thought of planting a big garden bed of peas, always planted to ensure they would be ready for Christmas. As a child, I remember thinking that if the pea pods were starting to fill out, Christmas must be close.

The next big thing was making the pudding, well before Christmas, and hung up to dry. Making the pudding involved a lot of preparation before hand. It was a great day for we children. Two big loads of wood would be brought in, the copper would be polished with vinegar and salt, filled with water and brought to the boil. The suet was finely grated, loads of fruit prepared, and a dozen eggs.

We all had a stir, and watched to see how many silver coins were put in. Of course for the children, the best part of all was licking the bowl after it was finished. I am sure mother left more in the bowl for all of us. The pudding was always very large, with a smaller one called a 'tester'.

Dad would be called in to tie the pudding in its calico cloth—still bearing the stains of last year's pudding. The pudding would always be tied with a big loop of string so that it could safely be lifted from the copper of boiling water. It always took 6 hours of cooking. Once the pudding was hanging for all to see, it sure did make Christmas feel a little closer.

The next exciting day for the children was the killing of the poultry. Because there were no freezers or fridges, the poultry had to be prepared the day before Christmas. I remember we used to keep it in the cool dairy.

We all had a try of plucking the feathers. The chickens were easy, but not the goose. The giblets, consisting of hearts, livers, gizzards, necks and feet, would all be carefully scalded and cleaned. These would then go in a big boiler with carrots and onions, and simmer for a couple of hours. This would make a beautiful soup. The giblets would then be shared out for us to eat. I have never forgotten that soup.

At last it was Christmas Day! We always received a stocking each, with lollies in the bottom and all the rest trashy things, but they gave us a lot of pleasure. We did not have soft toys or battery toys. Ours would all be wind-up. I also remember we always received a good book.

With all the poultry cooked it was time for Christmas dinner. The pudding would be given a final 3 hours boiling. Dad sat at the head of the table, doing all the carving of the goose and chickens. We were always allowed to ask for our favourite cut of meat. Along with the poultry, we had the green peas, carrots and new potatoes that we had grown, then to top it off, the pudding, and always my Dad's favourite, Cherry Pie.

It is now time to put away Santa Claus, undo the tree, put away the decorations and Christmas wrapping paper, and wait for another Christmas.

As I write this, I don't know if any club members had any luck at the Malahide Tournament. As there was no golf here, hopefully a few enjoyed a game at Malahide.

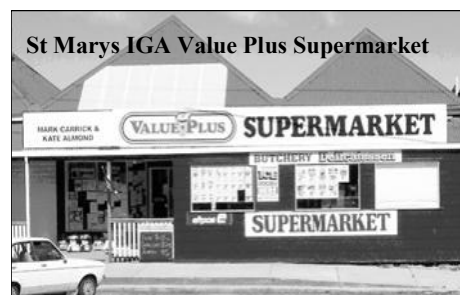
Tree planting around the course is about to commence, so if you can help Col somehow, please try to do so.
