Len Miles, President of the St Marys Lions Club accepted the award and spoke of the many people that contributed to the success of this event.



THE BIRTH OF A COMPANY

With the completion of the Conara-St Marys railway due to be completed in June 1886, a group of Launceston business men led by William Gurr saw the potential in the coal reserves found in the Mt Nicholas Range.

Whilst Frederick Ransom of "Killymoon", along with his sons-in-law George Crisp and Edward Gaunt, had marked out some 1820 acres of coal leases on the Mt Nicholas Range, they were graziers, not miners, and weren't prepared to put up the capital needed for serious mining. They did, however, drive several exploratory tunnels into the coal seams, providing enough evidence that ample coal reserves existed.

Preliminary meetings of the Launceston business men were held, and on the 13th April 1886 the first board of directors was elected with Charles Smith appointed Chairman, Edward Gaunt the representative of the Ransom family, John Shaw, mine manager, with Thomas Astles his assistant.

At the next meeting of the board on the 14th May 1886, arrangements were made to build a managers house near the proposed mine site at Cornwall at a cost not exceeding 50 pounds. As well, a self acting tramway at £1318, a railway at £1768, 50 trucks @ £6 each (£300) and 10 tons of rails @ £10 a ton (£100) were all approved to be purchased without delay.

The first years of the company were not without its problems with construction costs blowing out over a £1000, over inflated freight costs, and Tasmanian Railways continuing to use Newcastle coal. To add to their woes, Mt Nicholas Coal Company started up and competed in the limited coal market. Finally the board was forced to seek help from the National Bank

On the 5th January 1887, 10 persons were authorised to act as guarantors to the Nation Bank for £2500. In return each was given 100 shares in the Company. All outstanding debts were then paid out and a telephone line was erected from the mine site at Cornwall to St Marys. The telephone number was: St Marys 1.

This appeared to be the turning point for the Company. By April 1887, the Railways began to purchase Tasmanian coal at a fixed price of 7 shillings per ton. In 1888 a major strike by coalminers in Newcastle saw the Victorian Government seek coal from Tasmania and although the strike was settle in November 1888, Victoria continued to take Tasmanian coal until the end of 1890, making up around half of Cornwall's production during that time.

In March 1890 the Company made its first profit of £365 from the production of around 22,000 tons per year. By the end of that year profit increased to £1210. But it wasn't until 7th September 1891, after five years of operations, that a dividend of sixpence per share was paid to the shareholders.

From that time on, given a period during the Great Depression of the 1930s, the ten weeks strike in 1940 and times of heavy capital expenditure, Cornwall Coal continued to pay a dividend to shareholders on a regular basis.

Cornwall Coal Co. from its humble beginnings of the 1880s is now a multi-million dollar company with a multi-million dollar turnover. It was taken over by Goliath Cement Holding in the late 1970s, but is now a wholly owned subsidiary of Cement Australia, with its directors now chiefly based in Sydney. It has a current work force of some 70 employees all of whom contribute to the production of almost half a million tonnes of coal per year.

The coal is presently mined from four locations: Duncan Colliery at Fingal, Blackwood Colliery near Cornwall, Cullenswood open-cut near St Marys and Kimbolton open-cut near Hamilton.

All coal is taken to the Preparation Plant at Fingal and then transported to Tasmanian Industries by either rail or road.


Cornwall supplies 90% of the coal burnt in Tasmania, all of which is used in the production of cement, paper, beer, chocolate and supplying energy for agriculture and metal industries.



Carers for Wildlife Tasmania Inc. is a volunteer group of Wildlife carers in the Break O Day region.

We are based in St Marys and we respond to calls from the public for wildlife rescue.

If anyone comes across an injured or orphaned animal, please call us on 0417017105 or 6372 2973 24 hours.

If you are unfortunate to hit an animal on the road, check the animal for injuries. Please call the above numbers and we will respond immediately.

If we are not available, approach the animal with caution and wrap it in a blanket and place it in a box and keep it in a quiet dark place until help arrives.

If it is dead, check the pouch for a joey and take the carcass off the road.

If you cannot rescue the joey, tie a white rag on a tree near the joey so we can quickly locate the joey after you have phoned us and given us the exact location.

I had a look round the Mangana Bridge before Xmas and I was very impressed with the work that was done. It is the first time any Council in Tasmania has constructed such a bridge. The arches are now in place and the project is one that the crew can be proud of.

There is a bit of buzz about the new ramp and railing in front of the IGA. I have been approached by a few concerned residents. The story is this: - the railing and ramp are only temporary until the Streetscape is completed. The reason that it was erected was an elderly resident feel over and suffered some nasty injuries. Her husband raised this matter with a letter to the Mayor and copies to Dick Adams and Heather Butler, as well as a visit to me. The Mayor sent this matter to the Works Depot and I followed up with a phone call and arranged an on site inspection.

A report was raised at the next Council meeting and was passed unanimously. This is a safety issue and must be dealt with to protect all users of this part of the walkway. It must be mentioned that the ramp is welcomed by some sections of the community. Also bearing in mind that users include international tourists and visitors from other parts of Australia as well.

The Council is in the process of looking at the State Govt's proposal of taking over the water and sewerage. At this point in time there is little information available to form an opinion. We have written to express our concerns, as a Council, to the State Govt and expect an answer soon.

The St Marys Streetscape committee was formed on the 8th January 2008; the committee will meet on the first Monday of the month at 7:30pm in the Supper Room of the St Marys Town Hall. Please come along and put forward your ideas, *as it is your Main Street*. If you are unable to attend a meeting, but would like to raise an issue or idea please contact myself or Clr Clement.

I was able to have these items placed on the budget deliberations.

- A sunscreen over the picnic table in the Old Post Office park
- Baby change tables in some toilets
- Improving the drainage in some parts of Talbot Street Fingal.

I put forward the motion to waiver development applications fees for community groups on Council owned or managed lands. This was passed unanimously and should be an enormous help to community groups.

I floated an idea to have a delayed radio broadcast on STARFM of our Council meeting. I felt that as Council meetings are conducted during the day this would allow the general public to hear their Councillors in action. At the time of writing my idea has not gained any great support.

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HISTORIC ABORIGINAL STONE TOOL ARTIFACTS DISPLAY UNVEILED AT ST HELENS

Last Thursday, Senator Guy Barnett officially opened the display of *luyni mapali** – a display of Aboriginal stone tool artifacts housed at the St Helens History and Visitor Information Centre.

The Denys Walter display case is a wonderful collection of Aboriginal stone artifacts from the East Coast region of Tasmania, collected and recorded by retired teacher and historian Denys Walter, over the period 1965-1971.

"The collection is an invaluable record of Aboriginal life in the East Coast region before European settlement," Senator Barnett said.

"The tool artifacts were used for many purposes including the gathering of abalone, the preparation of other major food sources and the working of materials and grinding of ochre for cultural and ceremonial use," he said.

The display has been mounted in consultation with East Coast community representatives, and is a welcome addition to the St Helens History & Visitor Information Centre.

"Denys and his wife Joy were keen explorers of the East Coast and compiled the collection from sand dunes along the East Coast after moving to St Helens in 1988," Senator Barnett said.

"His persistence and passion for history and archaeology has made this collection possible, and for that he has made a profound contribution to the understanding of the original indigenous inhabitants of Tasmania and their customs and commercial endeavours," Senator Barnett said.

"I pay great tribute to Denys and his wife Joy today, because theirs is a priceless contribution as much for what it does for the reconciliation process as for what it does for Tasmanian history," he said.

"Mr Walter was my maths teacher at school and he has always had an interest in our local history. "I also pay tribute to the board and volunteers of the information centre and its chairman Break O'Day Mayor Robert Legge for their incorporation and promotion of this invaluable glimpse of Tasmania's beginnings," he said.

Senator Barnett said he had for a long time favoured saying "sorry" to Australia's indigenous community for past injustices.

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WATER & SEWERAGE MODEL BREAKTHROUGH Government Adopts Greens' Preferred Option

The Tasmanian Greens has welcomed the Lennon government's announcement that it would adopt a Water and Sewerage Reform model that mirrors the Greens' position in relation to Water and Sewerage reform, which the Party released in May last year, which will see regional water authorities become responsible for all reticulation and treatment of water and sewerage throughout Tasmania, instead of one State-owned entity.

Greens Shadow Water spokesperson Tim Morris MP, said that now that the Local Government Council's preferred model of regional local government-owned entities has been agreed upon, it is now urgent for a regulatory regime is established to ensure that work can commence on improving the water and sewerage infrastructure to the standard expected by the community.

In May last year Mr Morris released the Tasmanian Greens' Discussion paper; Water and Sewerage Infrastructure and Services: Proposed Three Joint Water Authorities, which outlined the proposal to adopt a regional model, where the councils in each region would own the joint authorities.

"The Tasmanian Greens welcome the announcement by the government to adopt a Water and Sewerage model that basically is the same as the Greens' previously announced preference for three regional authorities owned by the constituent councils, as the best way to provide the critical mass needed to fund and manage these critical services at an appropriate standard on behalf of the community," Mr Morris said.

"The Greens are not yet convinced that it is necessary to establish new companies when there already are the three existing regional bulk water authorities, Esk Water, Cradle Coast Water and Hobart Water, all of which could be transformed to provide more transparent and accountable businesses, and to incorporate all the relevant staff that currently are working for councils."

"The key priority is to get a proper asset management plan in place driven by a set of policies and standards that will ensure that investment in improving in water quality, where it is currently substandard, is attended to quickly, along with getting the two part pricing universally adopted to ensure that incentives are in place to provide for both water conservation and the funding of the infrastructure upgrades that are so desperately needed."

"The Greens have always said that it was essential that any reforms will protect the jobs of the approximate 500 workers who look after the existing infrastructure, and provide significant opportunities for career advancement for those who wish to further develop their skills, and it is pleasing to see that the agreement between the government and councils recognise that the transitional arrangements must not disadvantage employees, however we will continue to scrutinise this aspect in the final arrangements."

"The agreement to adopt the regional entities model will best protect the councils' revenue sources, but there will still be quite a lot of adjustment for some councils that cross subsidise their general revenue base from the sewerage and water rates, for now they will get a share of the profits, which are not expected to be very great initially because of the need to fund as much of the infrastructure improvements from revenue rather than borrowings."

"The Greens look forward to seeing the detail in the government's legislation expected to be debated during Parliament's autumn sitting and I call on the Treasurer, Michael Aird, to release a consultation draft as soon as possible, as due to the extensive changes these reforms will bring in, it is reasonable for the councils and the community to expect to be consulted on the detail of the proposed changes," Mr Morris said.

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

Just a reminder to all who need to play club matches to please try to get these done soon, so that renovation work on the green can commence on time.


