Coming Up Trumps with Spades

When push comes to shovel there's no better place to be in early March than the Fingal World Coal Shovelling Championships.

The cream of Australia's shovellers gathered last weekend for the 28th Championships to be held in the valley, with competitors coming from Queensland and New South Wales to join local shovelers.

Wollongong concreter Stuart Turner came with high hopes of defending his crown, aware that 5 times world champion Jim Sullivan wanted one more chance to regain the title before hanging up his shovel. 63 year old Parsons, a former miner from Queensland, has been a regular visitor to the festival for over 20 years and had been putting in extra practice for his final shot at the world title.

Using traditional miner's "banjo" shovels, competitors must shovel half a ton of coal (508 kilograms) into a hopper. Great care is taken to manicure and pat down the coal stacks into perfect shape so that the coal falls on to the shovel as contestants work their way up the pile – precious split seconds can be lost if the coal doesn't act exactly as the competitors

want. Shovellers work their way up the stack so that there isn't so far to throw the coal as they tire. Top shovellers can shovel the half ton in a little over 30 seconds – that's a 12 kilogram shovel full about every one and a half seconds.

With competitions held throughout Australia there's great camaraderie amongst the competitors, but make no mistake, these ultra-fit sportsmen take their sport seriously. "I just love it. They are a special bunch of people and the sport helps keep me fit," says Stuart Turner, who practices at home each evening after a full day's concreting. "It's not the money. It's the prestige. To be able to tell people you are a world champion is fantastic," he says. Stuart believes that the sport is enjoying a resurgence in popularity but the heady days when competitors could win as much as \$3000.00 at a single championship have gone, with most events these days posting about \$1500.00 for the winner.

Three local and three interstate competitors made this year's final six, with the two fastest qualifiers, Parsons and Turner, competing last, and needing to beat the 38.13 seconds set by Malcolm Woods. Little more than a second split the final two shovelling gladiators with Turner victorious in a time of 31.67 seconds, beating Parsons by a little over a second. "I knew Jim

wanted this title badly and has been putting in extra practice but I'm amazed by just how close it was in the end," said Turner.

This year's championship was filmed by an international television crew with footage being sent to over 150 countries around the world by satellite.

Fingal has, once again, established itself as the coal shovelling capital of the world and this unique club of men with big hearts have taken their spades to come up trumps with a splendid day's entertainment.

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "The Large Family"

Nine Mile Beach runs along the western shores of Great Oyster Bay from Swansea to Swanwick and is, as the name suggests, around nine miles long. The area itself, with its long golden beaches, sparkling blue, boundless waters and rugged granite mountains rising from the sea as a back drop, is arguably one of the World's most beautiful places.

There are many days, practically in winter; if you walk along this beach you can be given the illusion that you are the only person on the planet. Then if you fossick among the millions of tiny shells that continually wash up from the depths of the bay there is a chance you may find a piece of broken blue and white willow patterned porcelain from an old plate or cup and saucer. There is also a good chance that this broken remnant was part of the belongings of the Large family who lost everything off Waterloo Point in November 1850. (Waterloo Point is the original name for Swansea and is where the golf course is today)

On the 5th November 1850 Thomas and Mary Large along with their six children and all their possessions left Hobart on board the cutter "Resolution" to start a life in Swansea by setting up a brewery at Schouten House. As the cutter rounded Maria Island and headed up into Oyster Bay a storm blew up from the Southern Ocean and turned the bay into a mass of raging, white water. The small cutter had already capsized in a storm on the Tamar River six years earlier and one passenger was drowned, so as they made their way up the Bay Captain Joseph Stanley worried that this might happen again.

By 11 pm they had made it to just off Waterloo Point, and the Captain decided to throw anchor and sit it out until daylight hoping the storm would blow out, or at least in the morning they would be able to see to make a landing.

But the storm developed into one of the worst Southerly's Oyster Bay had ever experienced. It blew hard, strong and constant, pounding the ship with waves that continually covered the deck with white, foaming, rushing water.

Sometime towards morning Thomas Large heard the rudder drag on the sand and moments later the bottom of the ship was thumped onto the sea floor. Almost immediately water began to fill the cabin where he and his family were huddled together. Helped by his wife and servant John Drinkwater, they wrapped the children in blankets and carried them up on deck.

But the ship was listing perilously to one side and with the waves continually dumping water onto the deck, trying to hold on as well as hold the children was getting almost impossible. The "Resolution" had become like a tiny insignificant cork tossed about on top of masses of white horses.

As morning began to break and Thomas Large looked around in the half light of dawn he became aware that the four crewmen had left the cutter, leaving himself, Mary, and Captain Stanley with one child each to hang onto, while John Drinkwater had two of the older ones. But where was William his second son? He was nowhere to be seen. Maybe he was taken ashore by one of the crew.

By now a group of townspeople, including a number of ticket-of-leave convicts, were on the shore watching the trauma unfold. The convicts were offered a free pardon to swim out to the ship and help with the rescue. Only one went forward, however, and he was soon driven back by the strength of the waves.

Next a whale boat was dragged across the beach and four convicts tried desperately to battle it through the ever rising surf. Finally, after four or five attempts they reached the sinking wreck, but the only one left on board, clinging to a section of the bow, was Mary Large. One by one, six children had been snatched from the arms of those who desperately tried to hold on, but the power of nature was too great. Five young bodies would eventually wash up on Nine Mile Beach, one would disappear forever.

An unconscious Thomas Large was found washed ashore and taken, with his wife, to George Meredith's house where he later recovered. His first words were: "My poor children....." But the solemn faces and the silence of those around him told him what no father would ever want to hear.

The tragedy of the "Resolution" where six young lives were taken from their parents, just fifty metres off shore on that fateful November morning in 1850, can be remembered today if we stand at their graves which overlook the glistering waters off Waterloo Point, and then read the inscription on the headstone:

"Weep not for us but be content. We was not yours but only lent.
Wipe off those tears and weep no more. We are not lost but gone before.
We was not yours but Christ's alone. He loved us best and called us home."

Whilst we were talking about the radio idea, another councillor came along, and the conversation eventually got to this subject. I asked how he saw it and he suggested that a community forum on all sorts of such matters, where all we ratepayers could have a real say on these things. If given the chance, I'd strongly suggest a review of tip hours be considered, even if only by extending the hours that the tip site is available to us all. This simple act might just lessen that 13th or 14th day of 'smelly over-spill' of garbage on many a nature strip in the municipality.

So the Morinna Power Station grinds to a halt after 100 years of electricity generation in the great North East. No more the rattle in the penstock and the hum in the great German alternators that were hauled into the Frome River by man and beast in 1908. It was the first Hydro Electric power station in all of Australia. While the rest of the world started a downhill race to see who could extract all the carbon from below the earth's crust and smoke stack it into our paper thin atmosphere the Morinna Hydro kept plugging away for 100 years. Carbon footprint? ZERO.

You would think such an achievement would be cut and polished like a brilliant sapphire from the nearby Weld River, then displayed for all the world to see and learn from. Not on your Nelly. It would seem that it was starved to death by the bean counters in the Hydro who were unable to pay enough for the power produced to enable the maintenance and replacement of both the pipe and power lines.

When you turn on the jug now, the energy will more likely be coming down Basslink from the great coal fired mainland carbon machines. That is until the Gas Fired unit is running at Bell Bay. Then when your jug grumbles we will have a home grown carbon producing power station. Privately owned mind you, so the jug will need to grumble a bit extra for the executive salaries, the stockbrokers commissions and the dividends for the shareholders who will all be making a profit when you throw the switch.

There are two places in Tasmania that seem to share the highest rainfall. One is Mount Read (which must be a real bog hole) and the other is Lake Margaret. I have been to Lake Margaret, and nestled in the valley below the lake is a power station just like Morinna. Same rattle, same hum but a mere pup having been commissioned in 1914. Just like Morinna it is now stone cold and silent for want of a new pipeline. While the Highland Lakes are receding and the trout fishermen have long hikes up to the boat ramps there is one lake in Tasmania that must be busting. Be a great place to have a Hydro Electric Power Station you would think.

Morinna Power Station used to draw its water from Lake Frome. A real heartbreaker of a lake with the forest of giant white gums reflected in the crystal clear water. It is odds on that some 'wet behind the ears' engineer will deem the 100 year old wall unsafe and it will be destroyed just like the Mount Paris Dam across the valley. More crystal clear sweet water running wild to Bass Strait.


We have already had a 17% power price rise (you haven't got the bill just yet) and you can bet that there will be 5 or 10% a year for the foreseeable future. We consumers don't have a choice. We either pay up or switch off. As more and more of our hard earned goes into the meter box, Hydro needs to be asked some hard questions. Just what is going on?

The only dissension has come from a handful of residents whose costs of a private box would rise if the above service were provided.

9 politicians have been invited, as well as the Mayor, Robert Legge.

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)

In May 2008 and in future years, all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 across Australia will participate in national tests that will assess their performance in literacy and numeracy.

Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 students in Tasmania have been participating in literacy and numeracy tests for a number of years, so they will be familiar with the test formats and the type of questions they have to answer.

The main difference is that all students across Australia will be doing the same tests on the same days.

Students will be tested in numeracy, reading, writing and language conventions which include spelling, punctuation and grammar. The national tests will provide information on how students are progressing against national benchmarks (minimum standards) and support improvements in teaching and learning. You will receive an individual report that shows your child's results in relation to the national average and the national benchmarks. The report will also give a comparison of your child's performance against all other Australian students in their year level.

The best way you can assist your child is by making them feel comfortable about the nature and purpose of the tests and assure them that the tests will give them an opportunity to show what they have learned in class.


