

St Marys Mainstreet Makeover

I apologise for not having provided any further public information regarding the Makeover since the community meeting in October. My fault. Now that visible works are underway, I hope this report will bring everyone up-to-date, answer any questions and indicate what is to happen next.

There are 4 programmes of works happening in St Marys at present, at the Recreation Ground, between Frank and Cameron Street, along Main Street, and in Memorial Park. These are variously funded through Council's Capital Works Budget, Works Department maintenance budget, and a Mainstreet Makeover Grant of \$150,000 from the State Government.

The shower and toilet facilities at the recreation ground should be completed within a week or two, and is funded from the Capital Works budget at a cost of about \$145,000. It provides 11 toilets and 3 showers, with disabled facilities, and is intended primarily as a tourist attraction! Together with camping facilities, power access and black water disposal it is intended as a facility to attract mobile home and campervan tourists to use St Marys as a short term stay base, for exploring the surrounding area.

The works currently under way between Frank and Cameron Street on the north side of Main Street are a mixture of capital works budget items and the Mainstreet Makeover Project. The capital works budget item is \$54,000 for a new footpath between Frank and Cameron Street and the development of a car park in the Memorial Hall grounds. The footpath will be a red concrete path 160m long and 1.8m wide, with the same stencil paving pattern as used on the other paths in Main Street, outside the pub and fire station for example. It will create a wide and continuous boulevard for locals and visitors to stroll along the main street under a canopy of trees, viewing the sesquicentenary bricks and the cenotaph, and generally watching the world go by, replacing the narrow hotch potch of gravel, bitumen, and pavers which is the current path. Weather allowing, this should be finished by the time the next Voice comes out. The footpath ends with

by the time the next Voice comes out. The footpath ends with an outstand at each end, providing an improved swept path for vehicles into and out of Frank and Cameron Streets, an improved line of sight of traffic along Main Street, and safer pedestrian crossing at the corners.

The footpath works ties in with the development of the car park and part of the Mainstreet makeover. Providing for car parking is an essential part of planning for the long term development of St Marys. So, as a first step, a car park is being developed beside the Memorial Hall, allowing for daily parking for owners and employees of the surrounding businesses and for overflow parking if the parking in Main Street is fully used at any time. There will be more than 20 spaces provided -if the average time parked by casual users and shoppers was (say) 30 mins, this will provide additional parking for 320 cars over an 8 hour day.

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Jane of Falmouth"

Can you imagine today, floating a 35 ton wooden schooner across Henderson's Lagoon at Falmouth and out through the barway into the open sea? Impossible you say? Well, William Steel did it in 1834. Little did he know, however, it would be the beginning of the end for the enterprising East Coast pioneer.

In 1829 John Henderson and William Steel were given land grants at Falmouth, or as it was known then, St Patricks Head District. William Steel took up residence in a small villa built by Dr Alexander Thompson of "Logie" ("Harefield") in the Break O'Day Plains, who had used the villa as a holiday residence.

By 1834, William had built himself a schooner on the banks of Devil's Creek, not far from his villa. After being rigged by Charles Manly, it was eased into the waters of the creek, loaded with corn and potatoes from William's farm and floated out to sea.

William was rapt with his "Jane of Falmouth" and immediately headed off to Hobart to deliver his produce and pick up his first load of cargo and passengers, which he hoped, would be the beginning of a lucrative coastal trading business.

Parts for a corn mill for William were loaded, together with a millwright, Mr Dunn, who was going to assemble it. There were also goods for William Talbot of "Malahide", Frederick von Stieglitz of Killymoon and Magnus McLeod of Georges Bay, as well as a Mr Rankin. Dr Alexander Thompson, the man who had built William's villa, was also there with a load of building necessities and some advice for the ship's Captain to take care.

Along with the cargo, William, Captain Bill Green, three crewmen, the millwright and a Captain Margrave, late of the East Indian Service, who was going to the Georges River area to collect plants and seeds for the Botanic Gardens in Calcutta, the "Jane" set off from Hobart on her maiden commercial voyage.

It appears, however, that the further north they sailed the rougher the sea became and by the time the vessel reached Falmouth the Captain deemed it too dangerous to anchor and unload the cargo into small boats to be taken ashore. But William was anxious to get his cargo to its destinations and ordered the Captain to continue up the coast and negotiate the barway into Georges Bay.

At that time very little was known about the Georges Bay barway. No one really knew how much water covered the sand at low tide, or where the sand bars actually were. There had only been one recording of a ship entering Georges Bay prior to the "Jane's" attempt. That was the "Tamar", captained by William Moriarty, which had entered Georges Bay earlier in 1834 to pick up Lieutenant -Governor George Arthur and his party led by John Helder Wedge, but they had recorded very little about the barway itself.

Everything was wrong, on the 5th September 1834, when the schooner began its entry into Georges Bay. The tide was low and boring out of the bay, made even worse by a strong westerly wind, which in no time blew the ship onto the sand bar.

The "Jane" was stuck fast and in the height of the moment all but one crewman climbed into a dinghy and headed for shore. But the little boat was no match for the waves breaking on the bar and it was soon swamped, throwing all on board into the raging sea.

Captain Green and his two crewmen headed directly back to the "Jane", but William, Captain Margrave and Mr Dunn made the grave mistake of trying to make it to shore. They had no hope; in no time the strong, ebb tide swept them out to sea to a watery grave that would consume them forever.

Captain Green and his crew worked tirelessly for two days to free the vessel, but finally they realised it was hopeless. They built a raft from timbers on board and made it to shore.

Despite efforts on calmer days, very little was salvaged from the hapless vessel, and after persistent pounding by the force of the waves, the "Jane of Falmouth" eventually joined her Master at the bottom of the sea.

William Steel only spent a few short years in Van Diemens Land, but his impact on pioneering the East Coast was significant and should never be forgotten.

Letters to the Editor

I have decided to enlarge on my letter in the Valley Voice of two issues ago to further inform readers of their rights over the land that they own. It would appear that these landowners are being subjected to 'bully boy" tactics by people who either don't know the laws of the land, or, are so full of their own importance that they think that they can ride roughshod over the people that they are supposed to serve and who also pay their wages.

Lets take a look at the structure of councils, their duties and their responsibilities as servants of the people.

Councils were formed in 1842 through "letters patent" as a "Perpetual Succession Of Authority" to administer the use of land in accordance with the rules of "FEE SIMPLE" or to give it its full title "FEE SIMPLE ABSOLUTE", the definition of which given in 1893 by Quick & Garran in the law dictionary and quoted in the High Court of Australia in a decision in the case of The Commonwealth v New South Wales, Justice Issacs stated:

"In the language of the English law, the word fee signifies an estate of inheritance as distinguished from a lesser fee" He goes on to say, "It is the most extensive in quantum, the most absolute in respect of the rights which it confers of all of the estates known to the law. It confers, and since the beginning of legal history, it always has conferred the lawful right to exercise over, upon and in respect to the land every act of ownership, which can enter the imagination, and for all practical purposes of ownership, it differs from the absolute dominion of a chattel in nothing except the physical indestructibility of its subject. Besides these rights of ownership, a fee simple, at the present day confers an ABSOLUTE RIGHT over all of its contacts, these being SOIL, AIR, WA-TER and VEGETATION.

With none of the parts being able to work in isolation, should water, for example, be removed, and water, being a co-existing composite without which fee simple cannot operate, then fee simple will have ceased to exist as well as the right of councils to collect rates and therefore councils will cease to exist also! Always keep in mind that Councils are part of the Crown, unlike State and Federal governments and therefore **DUTY BOUND** to uphold the rights of the people. To separate water from the group would be a gross violation, tantamount to **TREA-SON!**

If anybody should dare to enter your property to make mischief or to destroy anything, you have the right to KEEP THEM OUT!!! Should they have a warrant, it must have your name, your property description, (not just a postal address) and clear evidence of what they are actually looking for.

If there is authority in exercising the warrant to destroy property, it can only be signed by a judge. If signed by a JP or a magistrate, then you can ask them to leave, as the warrant is defective. Another way of preventing anyone from entering your property is to put up a sign which states your property description and says: To Individuals or entities entering this property without permission of the landholder for any reason without my express permission will result in immediate prosecution of the individual under common law and the invasion of the Privacy Act of 1971. This prosecution will occur whether or not you have been issued with a search warrant granting implied consent to enter this property.

Take note you have no authority to enter this property without my prior expressed permission and I rely on the Australian High Court common law authorities George v Locket, Plenty v Dillon, and Halliday v Nevill as case law. Print a copy and sign it in front of a JP and have a JP sign it.

In the book by Quick & Garran reference was made to the Australian Constitution concerning our constitutional rights and the details of the meetings held between1886 and 1900 when the constitution was being developed. It clearly states: "If the Australian Constitution does not give the Australian Government the right to make laws, and the State Government to make laws, then it remains dormant and invested in us".

That means we have the right to carry on that activity however we want to. In the case of Plenty v Dillon (1991) 171 CLR 635 F.C. 91/004.it was quoted that "By the laws of England, every invasion of **private property**, be it ever so minute, is a **trespass** No man can set foot upon my ground without my licence, but he is liable to an action, though the damage be nothing".

Another quote in the case of Plenty v Dillon was when Lord Denning M R said in Southam v Smout (1964) "*The* poorest man may in his cottage bid defiance to all the forces of the Crown. It may be frail, the storm may enter, the rain may enter, but the King of England dare not enter, all his force dares not cross the threshold of the ruined tenement so be it, unless he has justification by law".

I would hate to think another constitute, by asking a question, could be subjected to this degradation which is still disturbing me.

There has been considerable interest in this proposal, so it looks like it will go ahead. It will take some time to collate all the information, so if you would like to be included please let me know as soon as possible.

St Marys Main Street Makeover continued...

The entrances to the car park are being levelled to eliminate the "bottoming" of a car that happens at the moment -this is being achieved by raising the road level . This ties in with the replacement of the degraded kerbing along the road, between Frank and Cameron Streets. In turn this allows for the construction (already done) of a refuge path behind the kerbing . This path allows cars to park closer to the kerb, because passenger doors can open fully without hitting the grassed bank, and passengers can step out onto a path. The parking area will be designated by a red street print surface.

As cars will be able to park closer to the kerb on the north side of Main Street, the centre line of the road will be moved north across the road towards the hall, so providing a wider corridor for angle parked cars to reverse out on the south side.

Works currently underway in the Memorial Park, the cenotaph precinct, are not part of the current programme of Mainstreet Makeover projects, but are a Council responsibility working in conjunction with the RSL. The Mainstreet Makeover Committee did recently make a recommendation regarding the paving blocks to be considered for laying as the surround for the cenotaph. The work currently being carried out addresses disability access requirements and RSL requirements for war memorials, and will be completed for this year's ANZAC Day Service.

The Makeover projects will be (1) an enlarged footpath opposite the Library, (2) an outstand on the pub corner and an outstand on the Tardis corner opposite, (3) improvements to the footpath outside the supermarket, and (4) the introduction of three thresholds or gateways to the town near the Flat, at the intersection of Groom and Storey Streets, and between the railway station and Clive Street. The theme of the thresholds will be "Share Our Town" to welcome traffic, encourage through traffic to slow down, and to encourage visitors to stop and share our town.

The first full Makeover project on the schedule is the widening of the path opposite the Library, to provide a safer and easier crossing for pedestrians, especially mothers with strollers, younger children, and older people. This is a high use area of town, the "Paris" end of town, adjacent to the library, the park, the bridge, toilets, the library car park, the bakery and deli, and a wider expanded path will narrow the road crossing and provide a higher pedestrian visibility to motorists. I will provide details of the other projects in due course. DIER will be carrying out a programme of new street line markings along Main Street and Storey Street.

The members of the St Marys MainStreet Makeover Committee met between February and October of last year to develop a Ten Year Reference Plan for the development of the central main streets of St Marys. The above works and projects represent the first steps to implement that plan, which is what it says, "A Reference Plan', capable of review, modification, amendment and expansion at a future date. At the moment, the first works are underway, there is a programme for the next months, and it is happening- "I'll believe it when I see it," is not a valid comment.



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Clean Up Australia Day and Container Refunds



The Minister for the Environment, Parks, Heritage and the Arts, Michelle O'Byrne, today applauded the efforts of those involved with Clean up Australia Day.

She said that the activities were sure to uncover many hundreds of beverage and other containers.

Ms O'Byrne

"All of us would like to see less litter and better recovery of valuable recyclable materials," Ms O'Byrne said.

"To this end, the Tasmanian Government has employed an environmental consulting firm to study the feasibility of introducing a container deposit system in Tasmania.

"The consultancy will examine container deposit systems in Australia and overseas, and assess options for a Tasmanian system," Ms O'Byrne said.

"South Australia has successfully operated a drink container deposit system for many years, and we want to gather the best possible information to help us understand what kind of system might be best for Tasmania."

"This study will also allow the State to more fully contribute to a national study into container recovery options which is currently underway.

"Tasmanians want а clean and healthy environment. The State Government will continue to explore ways to address the problems of littering in our streets and roadways, and increasing the resource recovery rates for packaging materials and beverage containers.'

Following an open tender process, Hyder Consulting Pty. Ltd. was selected to conduct the study. The findings are expected to be released in the middle of 2009, subject to any commercial-in-confidence issues.





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Training the Key for Employers



The State Government's commitment to addressing skills shortages has been reinforced by a national report which has found employers are recognising the importance of training for their workers.

Parliamentary Secretary to Heather Premier Butler said employers were focusing on training

to improve the quality of their workforces according to the report on the demand for training.

Ms Butler said the National Centre for Vocational Education and Research's report released recently, examined the demand for training around Australia concentrating on factors that affected individual and employer demand.

"The State Government is firmly committed to addressing skills shortages and providing training in areas of demand," Ms Butler said.

"Through Skills Tasmania the Government is already testing innovative ways to build workforce capability now and into the future.

"The engagement of industry is critical to addressing skills shortages and the Skills Tasmania Board is ensuring there is strong industry involvement in decision making and planning for the future.

"The Tasmanian Skills Strategy guides \$100 million of investment annually in skills and helps us plan and respond to the training needs of industry.

"It shows that employers are seeking training for their employees because it leads to higher skill levels and therefore greater productivity," Ms Butler said.

"The paper found that while the cost of an apprenticeship to employers is substantial, they recognise the need to acquire skilled labour," Ms Butler said.



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Changes Planned To Rules For 'Going Fishing'



Tasmanians love going fishing in the sea and are having a big say in changes to the management of the scalefish fishery planned to come into effect later this year.

University of Tasmania surveys reveal that one in three Tasmanians wets a line in marine waters each year, making it one of the State's most popular activities.

A major review of Tasmania's Scalefish Fishery Management Plan has been underway since August last year. The Plan covers both recreational and commercial scalefish fishing.

David Llewellyn Primary Industries and Water Minister, David Llewellyn, said that more than 400 submissions have been received and considered by his department, together with advice from the Recreational Fisheries Advisory Committee and the Scalefish Fishery Advisory Committee.

"DPIW is now finalising draft changes to the management plan. These will be presented at a series of Statewide meetings commencing in mid-March and the public now has a new opportunity to comment on the specific changes being recommended," Mr Llewellyn said.

These include:

• Further restricting commercial scalefishing at the popular holiday areas of Port Sorell and Ansons Bay to favour recreational fishing opportunities;

• Banning or introducing a licence for set lines (i.e. longlines and droplines where the fisher sets the line and leaves it unattended);

• Restricting the soak times of gill nets to reduce bycatch;

Changing size and bag limits for calamari, inshore crab, blueeye trevalla, bastard trumpeter, snapper and yellowtail king fish; and,

A significant suite of measures to manage striped trumpeter.

The Department of Primary Industries and Water has significant concerns about striped trumpeter stocks.

"The last detected major spawning event for striped trumpeter was more than a decade ago. The risk is that this fishery is riding on the back of a recruitment peak," Mr Llewellyn said.

The changes recommended to address concern with striped trumpeter include halving the recreational personal possession limit to 4 fish, increasing the minimum size limit from 450mm to 500mm, introducing a recreation boat limit of 15 fish, cutting the commercial trip limit from 250kg to 200kg and maintaining a seasonal closure around September and October to protect the optimum spawning period of that species.

Some of the proposals canvassed as potential issues during the first round of public consultation will be progressed through education rather than rule change.

"Matters like wildlife interaction, additional no-netting areas, new shark refuge areas and resource sharing between recreational and commercial fishers need a strategic focus," Mr Llewellyn said.

"That will require further investigation and consultation. I am heartened by the high level of interest and support received during the first consultation period for maintaining the fishery in good shape and for rules which ensure that this happens."

Empowering local communities and increasing access to services

Premier David Bartlett recently took a major step towards ensuring all Tasmanians have equal access to vital services, training and employment opportunities.

In his State of the State address, the Premier said addressing transport needs was the key to Tasmania becoming more socially inclusive. "With that goal firmly in mind I am proud to announce the establishment of the Tasmanian Community Transport Trust.

"Through this trust, every Tasmanian community will be able to apply for a vehicle by establishing their ongoing capacity to support its management and use in the community. The Trust will improve transport services for remote communities, including a trial of the use of wheelchair accessible taxis in remote areas.

"Reliable and available community transport will support mums and dads who can't get to the shops, elderly people stuck in their homes, and remote students who need transport to reach the educational opportunities available in our larger centres."

Mr Bartlett said the Tasmanian Community Transport Trust was only one component of his vision to ensure that all Tasmanians can connect to Government services, where they need them, in their communities.

"We need to imbed Government services as a part of community life. This Government will ensure services are where they are needed most."

Already the Government has committed \$14.9 million to build five Learning Information Network Centres (LINC's) around Tasmania and \$90 million to build up to 30 Child and Family Centres.

"I can now announce Sorell and Georgetown as the locations for the remaining two LINC's centres. These are in addition to the centres already planned for Scottsdale, Bridgewater and Queenstown," Mr Bartlett said.

LINC's bring together a number of government and community organisations under one-roof, with a particular focus on continuing education.

"The educational opportunities provided by the LINC centres will be complemented by the services to be provided at our Child and Family Centres, the first eight of which will be built this year.

"I am pleased to announce that the first seven centres will be located at Clarendon Vale, Ravenswood, Chigwell, George Town, East Devonport, Beaconsfield, and Queenstown.

"The Tasmanian Aboriginal Community has asked repeatedly for a dedicated centre at Risdon Cove to support the needs of Aboriginal children, and I can now announce that the 8th Child and Family Centre will be built at Risdon Cove to provide that support.

"I anticipate being able to make a further announcement with the Deputy Prime Minister in the very near future about two further locations for Federally funded Child and Family Centres."

The Premier also had good news for community organisations who provide a helping hand to the most disadvantaged.

"The Government will commit \$1 million to the Emergency Relief Fund in 2009/10, to make sure that service organisations have the resources they need to support all Tasmanians, through the challenging times ahead."

Approximately 750 community organisations, operating 1300 outlets receive funding, including Anglicare, the Salvation Army, the Hobart City Mission, St Vincent de Paul, and Colony 47.

"I want to make sure that the Tasmanian Government is doing everything it can to support existing networks in helping Tasmanians through the Global Financial Crisis," Mr Bartlett said.



Rail Investment Helping the Economy

The Minister for Infrastructure, Graeme Sturges, recently said millions of dollars being invested by the State Government to upgrade Tasmania's rail infrastructure was also helping the local economy.

Mr Sturges said the State Government had spent \$6.26 million on rail maintenance activities to date.

"These works are underpinning employment in regional Tasmania during a time of global economic uncertainty.

Graeme Sturges "This investment is ensuring that contractors' order books stay full and they can provide valuable employment to Tasmanians."

Mr Sturges said in addition to the State Government's ongoing investment, \$20.77 million of Australian Government funds has been spent on capital works projects.

"The capital works program will be undertaken over a seven-year period. This will restore the track to its previous standard when it reliably carried greater volumes of traffic.

"The initial focus of the capital works program is the safety and reliability of the track infrastructure.

"A \$30 million project, which started in January, involves the replacement of 20 kilometres of rail and 140,000 sleepers.

"This contract has seen the employment of 67 people in the north of the State by local firm Van Ek Construction. "It demonstrates how the investment in rail projects is not only improving the State's rail network, but providing

employment and helping the economy." Mr Sturges said bridge works had been completed on the Leven River Bridge (\$300,000) and Emu River Bridge (\$120,000).

He said the replacement of the Jordan River Bridge (\$1.5 million) is nearing completion, with the main civil works now concluded.

"A project to upgrade 67 level crossings across the Tasmanian rail network will begin this month at a total cost of \$4.4 million.

"The combined effect of this work will be to improve the efficiency of the Tasmanian rail network so that rail is better able to provide an attractive alternative to road for freight transport.

"We are already seeing significant improvements in the performance of the rail network.

"The capital works projects are having a positive impact on the condition of the rail network, and the State Government is committed to rail and will keep investing in this significant asset," Mr Sturges said.

"Whether it's having a neighbourhood BBQ, or a sports day or a potato throwing competition – I want every town and community, every street and every family to have the opportunity to engage in a relaxing day of community connection."

Mr Bartlett said he also wanted to make sure we can encourage the next generation of volunteers to get involved in their local communities and give for the greater good.

"That is why I can also announce we will provide recurrent funding of \$260,000 in the 2009/10 budget to Volunteering Tasmania to coordinate and reinvigorate volunteering across the State."






