A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "A Friendly People"

Research into the Indigenous people of Van Diemens Land is an interesting subject to say the least. Historians tell us that at the time of European occupation in 1803, nine tribes of Aborigines existed in Van Diemens Land, all with their own language. At that time, the population was estimated at around 4,000.

For some 30,000 years they wandered in small bands through the length and breadth of the island, searching the grassy plains, valleys and coastline for food, materials to make trinkets and red ochre to colour their bodies. With the aid of fire they kept their trails accessible as well as providing fresh pickings for the kangaroo, emu and possum that provided them with food, clothing and warm blankets.

Although it is said their ancestors were descendents from the big island further north who had wandered down when the Furneaux group of islands were still attached to the mainland, they were in many ways quite different from their Northern cousins.

In 1642 when Abel Tasman landed at Blackmans Bay in the South in search of fresh water, his men observed burnt markings in a tree and heard what they thought were human sounds. Tasman also recorded seeing a number of fires burning inland.

The first recorded European contact with the Van Diemens Land Aborigine, however, did not occur until Captain Nicholas Marion du Fresne arrived near Bruny Island with his ships *Mascarin* and *Marquis Castries* in 1772.

A landing party du Fresne sent ashore come across a group of Aborigines who appeared quite friendly. However, when a second long boat arrived the Aborigines became agitated. They threw spears and stones at the landing party, who returned fire with their muskets, killing one native and wounding several others.

du Fresne immediately left for New Zealand where he and some of his men fared even worse. They were captured by Maoris and eaten.

In 1777 Captain Cook, on his third voyage of discovery, anchored his ships *Resolution* and *Discovery* in Adventure Bay on Bruny Island. He spent six days there with his landing parties encountering Aborigines on several occasions. He recorded that they were approachable and remained friendly throughout.

In 1792 Rear-Admiral Bruni D'Entrecasreaux, in search of his missing countryman Jean-Francois Le Perouse, visited the shores of Van Diemens Land and came in contact with the Aborigines at Recherche Bay. D'Entrecasreaux recorded where he was invited into a group of forty or so native people – ten men, fourteen women and twenty four children. Seven fires were burning, around each was assembled a little family. At noon the women began diving for shellfish and in no time all in company were feasting on abalone, mussels, oysters, crabs and boiled seaweed.

During D'Entrecasreaux's six week stay in Van Diemens Land he discovered Cook's Adventure Bay was indeed on an Island. What amazed him was the small unstable watercraft that the Aborigines used to travel from the island to the mainland. They were made of bark and dried grass, tied together in the form of a raft and pointed at either end. It seems these "canoes" were unique to this part of the Island.

In 1802 another Frenchman, Nicholas Baudin, called into several locations around Southern and Eastern Van Diemens Land where he had several meetings with the Aborigines. Like D'Entrecasreaux, his depiction was the natives were a friendly, happy people with a willingness to share what they had with their visitors.

English explorer Captain John Henry Cox in 1789 also found them friendly and happy. He noted how one group had mimicked his actions exactly and laughed heartily at the Europeans. He went on to say they appeared a timorous, harmless group of people and afforded a fine picture of human nature in its most primitive and uncultivated state.

Whilst the English and French explorers recorded a number of contacts with the original owners of Van Diemens land, the French appears to have taken the most interest in getting to know them and learn their culture. One can only wonder, today, that if the French had settled the Island in 1803, the human tragedy that followed a few short years later may never had happened.

Mr Clement versus Mrs Peryman. Round 2.

Mr Clement,

Your harmless thunderbolt has not upset me. We must agree to differ.

Before white settlement, this valley was covered from end to end with native forest.

My only concern with eucalypt plantations is bushfire, and you have previously stated that this is not a major concern.

All native species of flora have evolved to rely on natural rainfall. Man's activities have out-paced this ongoing evolutionary process in many cases.

"Eucalyptus nitens" may be the preferred species for local tree plantations as it would suit the soil and climatic conditions, but can it tap into the depths of the town water supply bore? If this is true we should alert the mining industry! I believe this bore may be some 43 mtrs down. (in excess of 120 feet)

Underground streams are formed originally from rainfall, some of this being direct runoff, and some finds its way into fissures in the rocks in the hills, or where there may be rock protrusions. These fissures can be quite deep. Through capillary action in the rocks, it may find its way to other levels.

This water may end up as an underground stream, or weep out at some surface level, as a hanging swamp. (e.g. at the end of Gardiners Creek Road –which is forest site) It may remain trapped, depending on rock types or geological events.

If a soil is saturated, the pore spaces are full of water, and there is no room for air as the soil drains excess water (called 'gravitational water') moves downwards, leaving a film of water around each soil particle. The soil is now at "Field capacity", that is, it is holding as much water as it can against gravity.

Sandy soils have a very low "field capacity". Clay soils may have a "field capacity" ten times as great.

Too much water is also harmful in saturated soil, root respiration slows down due to lack of air.

Soil bacteria and other soil organisms also need air to function, so organic decay is restricted in wet soil.

Another harmful aspect of wet soil is a decrease in soil temperature. A warm soil increases root respiration and plants grow faster.

As far as climate, soil and water observations go, I think farmers of this valley know a lot more than I do.

I will not assume that I have the right to tell them how to use their land, or who to sell to.

The humblest of us, even a mere woman, has the right to preserve our own opinions without being subservient to the views of those who have the right to argue to the fullest extent of their own perceived authority.

David Clement answers Jeanette Perryman re Hydrology in St Marys area. And once again addresses his pet hate being plantation trees.

Well David I think it is about time you applied a bit of common sense regarding this matter. If it is a proven fact that Margisons Creek will dry up simply because of a small plantation on the Curran property as it is commonly known, why when this land was covered with a thick population of trees and understory growth did this stream in question be shown on survey charts as a running stream, and you might like to know that the main source of supply for Margisons Creek starts on land beyond the plantation area.

I will accept that things get written by so called experts but one cannot believe a lot of this jargon, as one can write something and if you keep on reading it, after time you will end up believing it.

The simple truth of the matter is that we are in a drought, which they refer to today as Global Warming, and think that it will rain if you stop burning coal, using electric power, etc, and the story goes on and on.

Once again the simple fact is when nature is right and ready it will rain again as it has after every other drought that the country has experienced.

And if you keep on thinking that the removal or stopping of plantations is going to fix things I would say you are wrong.

Surely a land owner has a right to grow a plantation for a better financial outcome. What is the difference with the land covered with trees now and covered with trees when Europeans settled here, the creeks ran then, and will continue to run if it rains, and it takes a hand mightier than David Clements to control that.

I had the privilege of being taught to read the life story of a tree simply by reading the annual growth rings of a tree when it is felled. My father, his father and his father all of whom worked in the timber industry back as far as 1884, taught us to read them, it will show the good years and the bad, even if there has been severe fires, and the direction that they came from, one I recall reading 378 years old near Four Mile Creek had quite an interesting history. That was in 1978.

A little bit of practical experience can make a lot of difference, something a lot of people seem to miss out on.

MAIN STREET MAKEOVER.

I would like to take this opportunity to publicly express my comments through this forum of the Valley Voice, as I was unable to attend the Public Meeting of 8th October, 2008 regarding the Main Street makeover project.

It must be conceded that the best intentions do not automatically bring the desired results. Long term address of the traffic needs of St. Marys is a complex issue on which the committee has done much study, investigation and a great deal of talking in this regards, as the movements of traffic increases due to additional logging truck movements and hopefully increased tourism, may I ask which/whose child will be killed on the Main Road because of the decision being taken to continue with angle parking?

Have you ever taken the time to observe children endeavouring to cross the Main Street? Ever sat in your car ready to reverse out only to find that a child is behind the car waiting to cross the Street or in a blind spot due to a 4 wheel drive parked alongside you or even a delivery truck discharging goodies, God Forbid that you do not see that child.

Forward planning and logic would suggest the removal of all Main Street parking from the CBD of St. Marys, there being no aesthetic value nor safety value in the decision taken at the Public Meeting to retain angle parking.

The removal of angle parking would increase the vision along both sides of the Main Street, making it safer for both young and old and also the disabled which would also remove the possibility of breaking the law by crossing over the middle line whilst backing out. A median strip in the centre of the roadway would also increase the safety aspect as to cross the road would only necessitate two short movements allowing for less time in the danger zone of traffic.

May I ask what substance can there be in a decision where children and others are put a risk, at what age does a child's peripheral vision develop? I believe that there are four stages to this development and that that vision is not fully developed until the age of 16 or thereabouts as each child develops differently, and I do notice many, many children using the roads alone long before the age of 16 years.

The choice of angle parking in the short term may very well be a bold move for the profits of the shop keepers but in the long term could very well be detrimental for these very same persons as fewer and fewer people will stop to shop in St. Marys because of the congestion and the dangers arising from angle parking in the Main Street.

Is this all it amounts to, six months committee meetings to arrive at a status quo and may I be so bold to ask, is this the best use we can make of Public Money and does it fit into the guidelines as set out in the very first meeting?

I would have thought that complacency in decision making is not or should not be a consideration.

Mr Veldums' thoughts on committees, which are simply groups of residents working towards a common goal within a structured framework, demean every group which has contributed to the development of this town.

His ignorance of the past streetscape development of St Marys is understandable. However, his ill-informed statement "I gather St Marys has its own plans of a similar project undertaken 10 or so years ago that ended up going nowhere", denigrates the contribution to the town of the members of the St Marys Townscape Committee that met monthly for 5 years until 2002 to develop recommendations of the 1995 St Marys Townscape Project Report, a report which is still relevant today.

Rather than "going nowhere', completed projects arising from this report included the footpath from the Library bridge to the Flat, works on Wombat Walk, under grounding of a power pole, the floodlighting of the bridge, development of the BBQ, lighting and seats in the park at the Library, improvements to the public toilets, building of the TARDIS, the footpath from Todds Hall to the Purple Possum, the verandah at the Possum, the approach railings to Gray Rd bridge, planting trees from the woodyard in the west through the town to Irishtown Road in the east, raising the street level in front of the Coachhouse, forming the footpath from the Catholic Church to Irishtown Road, improvements to the front of the cenotaph precinct, and a number of other smaller improvements.

The townscape of St Marys is a better place for the work of the committee, building on the vision of Annette Wines for a comprehensive plan to guide the future development of St Marys.

The momentum of continuous improvements in the town based on this report was stopped in its tracks in 2002 by the decision of Break O'Day Councillors (Cllrs McGiveron and Legge dissenting) to abolish the four townscape committees in St Marys, Fingal, Scamander and St Helens which had provided local residents with an avenue to have a regular say in the maintenance and development of their own towns. It was a bad decision.

Despite his ingenuous disclaimer that he is not criticising anybody, it is unfortunate that Mr Veldums chose to use the beauty of flowers, and the efforts of one group of residents, to disparage and denigrate by innuendo the contributions of others, past and present, committees or otherwise, to the steady development of our town and its sense of place.

I doubt if ever the staff here will see the massive trauma on the show but to the hundreds of sufferers they do treat, they are a godsend for sure.

It similarly makes me appreciate the sheer determination that was required to get the machines, infrastructure and personnel organised to facilitate this wonderful service, not just for us but for indeed the whole state. Clients come from all over to use it.

Don't forget this when fundraising is occasionally sought to further improve the service. One day it might be you who needs that expert care.

While on expert care perhaps it is time to ask the question again about a Medea Park type facility right here in the Valley.

This community is ageing daily. As we are aware gradually the younger ones are moving out to find better work opportunities and older people looking for a quiet, well serviced and affordable area to retire to are likely discovering us. Most of us know these people and are happy they are joining us.

Eventually though we get old and need additional care. It might not be such a problem now, but what about in the next 10 to 20 years. Perhaps our health officials need to case study areas such as ours and begin planning for the future.

Many have said it but is there any reason why the Fingal Valley can't support at least a low care facility initially with provision for high care needs if required.

Would it be possible to operate in conjunction with Medea Park which does a marvelous job. This is a far sighted question but a major consideration in the planning of our community, I believe. It's our community and it is our right to ask these questions.

ST MARYS ASSOCIATION FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT INC.

Extract of General Meeting minutes held on 31st October 2008.

PRESIDENTS REPORT:

Eo reported on a town called North Cliff in Western Australia, which was of similar size to St Marys, and had lost major industries such as mining and forestry. This town was compensating by building sculpture trails in bushland around the town, all of which were proving to be a major tourist attraction. This type of project, she felt, was well worth thinking about for St Marys.

MANAGERS REPORT:

Greg reported on the TCO managers meeting he had attended at Deloraine on Tuesday the 28th October 2008. Tasmanian Communities Online, Tasmanian Libraries and Adult Education, all of which now come under the umbrella of the Tasmanian Education Department, would have a new name called: Community Knowledge Network. The future vision is to enrich the lives of all Tasmanians by creatively linking them to information, knowledge and each other.

Part of the goals and strategic priorities is to lead the capture and preservation of Tasmania's culture and documentary heritage. As well, promote the engagement by individuals and their communities with their heritage, plus provide easy and integrated access to contemporary and historical information.

In a nut shell, the main goal is to enrich lives by learning and putting information in the hands of all Tasmanians, when and where they want it.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

A letter written by Neil on behalf of SMACD, was sent to Peter Garrett, Federal Minister for Environment and Culture, showing concerns with the amount of farmland being planted into trees in the St Marys area. Mr Garrett was asked to lobby his Government to council tax write-offs which are available to tree plantation owners.

Val reported that 181 bookings had been made at the Centre in September and 171 during October. This was on top of those engaged in training programs.

Neil reported that the Government was forming a walking-cycle track committee to look at the development of tracks around Tasmanian. It was resolved that a letter be sent to Break O'Day Council asking why the tracks and trails committee, for which they asked the community for expressions of interest some six months ago, was not yet formed. SMACD felt this committee could feed valuable information to the State committee.

Val reported that her recipe book was now ready to print and was looking at several options to see which was the best and cheapest way to have it bound and printed.

Moved Neil seconded Val that the St Patricks Head & Esk Valley Historical Society Inc. be given the current treasurer's office for their research room. (Carried)

Moved Fe seconded Val that a small garden shed be purchased and erected to store all old records and equipment etc. Also another wall to be fitted to block off the kitchen and create another office and meeting room. (Carried)

Resolved Council be asked to supply a sign on Main Street pointing out the Online Access Centre.

The South Esk River, or Mangana Lienta as the Aborigines called it, has always been an integral part of the Fingal Community. In the 1800s when sites for towns were chosen by our early settlers, plenty of fresh water close by was an important consideration. In Fingal's case it was the junction of the South Esk and Break O'Day Rivers.

In the photo above we can see a group of happy folk in the early 1900s enjoying a casual ride in a row boat on the South Esk River at Fingal.


To the left we can see the old Council Chambers and to the right is the Anglican Church. Today the town sewage ponds would be almost directly behind the folk in the boat.

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

THE SHOW

Tasmanians who have never ventured off the beaten track are invited to become "armchair bushwalkers", as the Launceston Walking Club's 43rd "Do You Know Tasmania" multimedia presentation takes its audience into the rugged and remote wilderness areas of Tasmania. "We are inviting people to enjoy a "virtual" experience of Tasmania's wilderness "said DYKT committee chairman lan Ross. "Many Tasmanians aren't fully aware of the variety of scenic delights and wild places in the state, and we are hoping to surprise many with the broad range of subjects in our show."

The Club's popular wilderness slide and film shows have delighted many hundreds of Tasmanian and mainland audiences since the first public show in Launceston in 1955. Superb colour photography taken by club members on their forays into the wilder parts of Tasmania have shown our flora, fauna, and dramatic landscape at their best. The shows have justly achieved a reputation for photography at the highest standard, produced with professional commentary and Hi-Fi quality stereo sound.

THE PRODUCTION STORY

It has been five years since the club's 42nd "DO YOU KNOW TASMANIA" show, and it was starting to look like the last, as slide photography was gradually supplanted by "1 hour" colour prints, then rapidly overtaken by digital technology in the last few years. However a submission to the Tasmanian Community Fund in 2004 for the digitising of our film archives and wilderness slide shows was successful, and we now have the technology to continue our shows in a digital format.

This TCF special grant round in 2004 was for the "preservation of Tasmania's cultural heritage" and our submission was presented in two parts: Firstly the preservation of the clubs movie archives by transferring them to digital format, and secondly, facilitating the transition of our "Do You Know Tasmania" shows from slides to digital. The continuation of our DYKT shows was in the balance unless we could start utilising the digital photos that most club members were now taking on club trips. The film digitisation was completed and we are currently digitising the audio tape soundtracks for digitally editing the video and audio to produce DVD versions of each movie. These can then be used in future shows, and also be made available for research in the State Library collection and film archives in DVD format. The second part was completed with the successful presentation of this current 43rd show in Launceston in November 2006. The future of our DYKT shows is now assured, with the ultimate purpose of all our "amateur" efforts being to communicate to the Australian public our passion for this beautiful state of Tasmania.






