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A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas Mary Harvey

In the 1850s the township of Bicheno consisted of two inns - the Steam Packet and the Native Youth - a small general store, a wine and spirit merchant, a police station and very little else.

The permanent population of the town was small, but it was a popular stopover for the many whaling and sealing boats which were working the east coast of Van Diemens Land in those days. The men who worked these boats were from all parts of the globe, and with colourful reputations that would frighten the biggest and bravest of policeman.

It was about that time that a young policeman by the name of Constable Harvey arrived in town with his lovely young wife, Mary. But it seems it was Mary, not her husband, who went on to make the biggest impact on the town with her acts of bravery, all of which led to earning her the title of "The Grace Darling of the District".

It all started one evening when Mary and Constable Harvey were walking home from visiting friends and they came across a man acting suspiciously in a potato patch beside the road. When the man was challenged he ran off with the policeman in hot pursuit.

Mary hastened to go to her husband's assistance, but by the time she caught up with the pair the Constable was lying on the ground with the man sitting on his chest beating him with a stone. Mary showed no fear and raced to her husband's assistance, belting the man around the head and neck with a whip she was carrying.

The attacker was finally discouraged and struggled to his feet, then disappeared into the night. But by this time Constable Harvey was in a bad way and only semi-conscious. All by herself, with a super human effort, Mary carried and half dragged him to their home where she nursed him for over a month until he was able to resume duty again.

A few years later Mary almost lost her life when she was at the forefront fighting a fierce bushfire that threatened the town.

On another occasion Mary was home alone when the son of a neighbour bashed on her door yelling that a storm had swamped a boat his two brothers were in about a mile out to sea. Again Mary didn't hesitate, she grabbed the boy, along with another man who was in the vicinity, and in no time had a boat launched into the angry sea.

It was a titanic struggle against the waves and wind before they finally reached the stricken boat. By this time, however, one of the boys had let go of the upturned boat and disappeared under the waves. In desperation Mary jumped into the water and took hold of the boy and literally lifted him into the rescue boat.

The journey back to shore was more terrifying still, and it took them a long time to reach safety, but when they did Mary simply wrapped the half-drowned boy in a blanket and took him to her home, where she nursed him until he recovered.

Mary received acclaim from far and wide for her bravery in saving the boy from the sea. But her ordeals did not end there. Later she survived a snake bite. Then soon after, when a horse pulling a cart she was in bolted, Mary was thrown to the ground and knocked about quite badly. But despite all of her tribulations Mary lived until she was 75, finally passing away in 1911.

Today Bicheno residents remember with pride the bravery of Mary Harvey, along with the Aboriginal girl, Waubedebar, who also saved the lives of two sealers from drowning after their boat had capsized. She too nursed those she saved back to good health, even though they had taken her from her tribe and family.

Colonial Secretary James Ebenezer Bicheno, who came to fame after donating 2,500 books to become the basis for the State Library, and after whom the town was named, would be proud I'm sure, to lend his name to a town where such courage was shown by two wonderful women. We, for our part, should ensure they always hold a special place in our heritage.

A Question of Safety and Sense of Place - St Marys Main Street Makeover

I feel compelled to add to Pattie O'Donnell's article of the 6th November 2008 regarding the lack of safety and aesthetic appeal for our town as a result of the angle parking proposal which was presented at the Public Meeting on the 8th October 2008. Those attending the meeting will know that speakers for the alternate parallel parking proposal were gagged by the consensus of the meeting. Unfortunately this had the result of the community not being afforded the courtesy of hearing the benefits associated with the parallel parking proposal.

As Pattie mentioned, being members of the Main Street Makeover Committee, we undertook to listen, investigate, consult and in the end produce plans for the enhancement of our town. Basically the recommended angle parking plan was compiled on the basis that shoppers "did not like to parallel park or could not parallel park" and that "businesses would lose about 5 or 6 parking bays". The consequences of this recommendation meant that traffic safety and safety for our children, elderly, disabled and visitors, were disregarded. It meant too that the opportunity to provide landscaping and street furniture on the shops' side was also disregarded. In fact, the angle parking proposal reflects the status quo but with a larger and wider "sense of car park" rather than what we initially set out to achieve - a "sense of place" with aesthetic appeal and safety.

Furthermore, with a lack of safety, aesthetic appeal and tourism considerations, the angle parking proposal falls short of complying with Council's \$150,000 Main Street Makeover Deed of Approval with the State Government and the guidelines referred to in Break O'Day Council's application for the grant.

Our Visitors/Tourists

Next year St Marys will be accommodating motor home and campervan visitors with quality short stay facilities based at the Recreation Ground. To qualify as a "RV Friendly Town" we are required to meet the needs of these mobile travellers. We already provide friendly hospitality and service; however appropriate parking and facilities for town centre shopping, needs to be addressed. The impact of tourists stopping and supporting our local businesses not only enhances the visitor experience but contributes to our social and economic outcomes.

The Safety Issues:

The current Australian Standards publication referring to On-street Parking, clearly describes the safety advantages of parallel parking over angle parking:-

Parallel Parking: presents, under properly controlled conditions, the least impediment to the orderly and regular flow of traffic along a road. It has the advantage of minimising accidents associated with parking and unparking manoeuvres. Parallel parking is also the best system for use where parking must be provided and street capacity must be kept to a maximum.

Angle Parking: All forms of angle kerbside parking present a greater hazard to road users than parallel parking. Studies show that when parking is changed from angle to parallel kerbside parking, the accident rate along a length of road decreases substantially and the traffic capacity is greatly increased.

Surely we don't need to refer to the Australian Standards to highlight the dangers of our angle parking. Pattie O'Donnell described some examples of visual hazards in her article, especially with respect to the vulnerability of our young children crossing Main Street. No doubt some of us have experienced, witnessed or even contributed to at least one of those unsafe situations or practices when reversing from an existing angled car bay.

It is important to understand that our young, elderly and disabled are far more at risk to cope with traffic. These groups have psychological and physical shortcomings. In children, issues such as peripheral vision, hearing, height (unable to see over vehicles), perception, concentration and behaviour contribute to their vulnerability. Similarly the elderly have to cope with deteriorating eyesight, reaction time, hearing, perception, walking speeds, balance (more prone to falls), confidence, insecurity and possible effects of medication. Add a disability to the equation and the situation is further exacerbated.

What is the alternative?

The above mentioned "gagged" PARALLEL PARKING PROPOSAL is a safer consideration for traffic and pedestrians as well as providing enhanced aesthetic facilities within a "boulevard type" path in front of the shops (twice the current footpath width). This added width has provision for streetscaping such as seating, the planting of trees and flowers, as well as future alfresco type dining or community displays. The proposal also incorporates a 2.0 metre wide central median that separates both lanes of traffic for the full length of the shopping precinct. This design feature enables pedestrians, especially children, the elderly and disabled to cross Main Street with a high level of safety and confidence, further contributing to the town's "safe sense of place".

We have a responsibility to apply best practices in rectifying the deficiencies of angle parking and in doing so, ensure the community's needs, safety and welfare are all encompassing, for now and future generations.

Dear Editor,

The extensive thoughts of Mrs Peryman contained two truths relevant to the impact on water supplies of a change in land use from cleared agricultural land to intensive tree plantations. She rightly states "a re-direction in our thinking is probably what will sustain us" (Voice 9 Oct), and "man's activities have outpaced this ongoing evolutionary process in many cases" (Voice 6 Nov). She's got it!

Barry Aulich should read my lips. In "Death of a Town" (Voice 25 Sep), I stated (3 times)in the opening paragraphs, "plantations in the wrong place have the capacity to cause harm..", "a combination of plantations in the wrong place can have a cumulative and aggregate impact", "a plantation of 1200 trees per hectare in the wrong place can dry up water supplies".

Plantation trees are **not** my "pet hate", any more than glue factories - it depends where they are! Thousands of hectares in this municipality are being converted to plantations, but I can only recollect questioning half a dozen or so. My concern is that Council has no process for assessing the potential damage a plantation may cause in respect of the impact on water supply, road infrastructure and road safety, encroachment on human habitation, and the adverse environmental and visual impact on sensitive landscapes.

A proposal to build a house has to be assessed for its potential impacts on neighbours, why not a proposal to plant 120,000 trees over 100 hectares? What are the timber companies scared of in an assessment of the impact of their practices, if they are sustainable and cause no social or environmental harm?

Barry's thrust, apart from denying climate change as a result of human activity and insisting that "it will rain again", is what is the difference in water use between land covered with trees when Europeans settled here, and the same land reforested by plantations after having been cleared?

The difference is the difference between <u>maintenance</u> water need and <u>growth</u> water need; the difference between the minimal water used to maintain mixed age mixed native species forest which has established a minimum water use equilibrium over decades or centuries, and the water demanded for the initial growth of 1200 new trees per hectare, a single imported selected water hungry species, to be harvested in 14 years to generate over 200 tonnes of wood per hectare.

You won't see 378 rings in any of those trees, Barry, they are wham, bam, thank you, ma-am, trees, as far as water use is concerned, young guzzlers, water to wood to chips in 14 years, then the eco forestry carbon trading MIS funded companies plant the same land again for another and another and yet another short term maximum water demand harvest cycle.

And in a time and place of declining and irregular rainfall, plantation growth (and human beings) will increasingly depend upon groundwater. If your income (rainfall) is reduced, while you increase your expenditure (water use by plantations), you have to run down your savings (groundwater), because you are living beyond your means. In due course your savings will be exhausted (water tables will fall too low), and you will be broke (streams will no longer flow).

Even if your income (rainfall) was restored to the original level, you are spending more than before (plantation water demand) and will still be running down your savings (groundwater). More expenditure than before needs a higher income than before. So even if it does rain like it did before, contrary to scientific opinion, that will still not be enough to satisfy the new plantation demand. Is that practical enough?

And who determined that the plantation at Irishtown Road would dry up Margisons Creek? The forest industry's own regulator, the Forest Practices Tribunal, on the basis of the facts of the catchment submitted to it by expert witnesses, who were subjected to cross examination by FEA Ltd and Private Forests Tasmania and opposed by Forestry Tasmania. It was the self regulating forestry system of Tasmania which determined that plantations in the wrong place can cause harm.

The Naming of Wombat Walk

Many years ago the Council put a pathway along the river bank at St Marys from the bridge, up Frank St to near the residence where we resided.

Every morning I would walk along the walkway on my way to work at Wombat Post.

In the November 6th Valley Voice there appeared two curiously juxtaposed arguments in favour of plantations. At least I assume that is what they were attempting to argue.

One bombarded the reader with a condensed lesson in hydrology and soil science which appears to have been lifted ad hoc partly from a textbook, partly from some other source with incorrect hydrological terminology with the whole being totally irrelevant to the argument.

The other emanates from one who is obviously a global warming skeptic with a preference for reading trees rather than scientific research.

These arguments are simplistic with little or no basis in fact.

They refer to native forests and plantations as one homogenous group of trees when in reality both have non uniform requirements and both impact in very different ways on the environment.

The arguments fail to recognise many other issues including managed investment schemes with 100% tax breaks that place farmers on an uneven playing field. For example, a farmer who wishes to buy an adjoining property to increase the viability of his business unless extremely wealthy could never compete with forest enterprises.

Neither can he do anything about depleted ground water caused by a nearby plantation threatening springs that feed dams and putting at risk years of hard work and huge monetary investments. Furthermore he has no redress for this damage.

There are several documented instances of this occurring in Tasmania.


But more importantly the two arguments totally ignore a vital and basic issue which ought to be central to any discussion regarding plantations. That is the encroachment of plantations onto arable land – a finite and scarce commodity which is becoming increasingly degraded and one without which any of us can survive.

It could easily be demonstrated that the uncontrolled spread of plantations is socially, economically and environmentally unsound. It would also seem to be a product of outmoded, unimaginative and short term thinking.

There were so many good practical ideas, submissions and proposals submitted during those several meetings, many of which were adopted in the final plan, that made you proud to be involved.

Now that we are on the eve of the first really tangible development (amenities block) we must not lose sight that this is only the beginning of a series of improvements that one day will let people enjoy much more their time in our neck of the woods.

When our facilitators and community members submitted their final submission and proposed planning it was well received by all and Council likewise as should have been the case. It was something worthwhile and we were pleased that Council were proactive enough to let this happen.

All we ask of the current Council is that the works as accepted continue to occur at their earliest possible time so that in ten years time we are not grizzling that it's only half done.

\$1.75 million to combat skills shortages

About \$1.75 million is being invested to train Tasmanian workers who want to upgrade their skills in occupations experiencing skills shortages.

Premier David Bartlett said last week that 12 training organisations would deliver 40 nationally-recognised qualifications under the Productivity Places Program's Existing Worker initiative.

Training organisations were selected following a Request for Tender inviting registered training organisations to submit proposals.

Mr Bartlett said that the program, jointly funded by the Australian and State governments, would see qualifications being offered in areas such as automotive construction, community services and health, hospitality and transport.

"Tasmania is experiencing skills shortages across a range of industries and occupations," Mr Bartlett said.

"Existing workers, in a range of occupations can achieve a first qualification or upgrade to a higher level certificate or diploma qualification under the program.

"Increasingly, Tasmanian workers require higher level skills to undertake the more advanced work required in the 21st Century economy.

"The aim of the program is to increase existing worker skills through the funding of a range of qualifications at Certificate III to Advanced Diploma level to existing

workers in order to address a range of skills shortages."

The successful training organisations were TAFE Tasmania, Jenard Training and Personnel, Work & Training, Esset Australia, Pragmatic Training, International Child Care College, Direct Training, MEGT, EDA-RTO, Stepping Ahead Training and Development, MST Workplace Solutions and BEH.



the lovely Heather Summers. Well done one and all.



Barry Gillies won the raffle of a Cherokee Indian Necklace, the latest "in" thing. Expect to see Mrs Gillies on the


warpath at any time.



"I'm also very impressed with the hot house vegetable garden, young people can learn a lot about the environment and food production from simple projects like these.


"Other projects that received funding were new computer desks and chairs and shelving in the library, along with a concrete sand pit and shelter.



THE SHOW

Tasmanians who have never ventured off the beaten track are invited to become "armchair bushwalkers", as the Launceston Walking Club's 43rd "Do You Know Tasmania" multimedia presentation takes its audience into the rugged and remote wilderness areas of Tasmania. "We are inviting people to enjoy a "virtual" experience of Tasmania's wilderness "said DYKT committee chairman lan Ross. "Many Tasmanians aren't fully aware of the variety of scenic delights and wild places in the state, and we are hoping to surprise many with the broad range of subjects in our show."

The Club's popular wilderness slide and film shows have delighted many hundreds of Tasmanian and mainland audiences since the first public show in Launceston in 1955. Superb colour photography taken by club members on their forays into the wilder parts of Tasmania have shown our flora, fauna, and dramatic landscape at their best. The shows have justly achieved a reputation for photography at the highest standard, produced with professional commentary and Hi-Fi quality stereo sound.

THE PRODUCTION STORY

It has been five years since the club's 42nd "DO YOU KNOW TASMANIA" show, and it was starting to look like the last, as slide photography was gradually supplanted by "1 hour" colour prints, then rapidly overtaken by digital technology in the last few years. However a submission to the Tasmanian Community Fund in 2004 for the digitising of our film archives and wilderness slide shows was successful, and we now have the technology to continue our shows in a digital format.

This TCF special grant round in 2004 was for the "preservation of Tasmania's cultural heritage" and our submission was presented in two parts: Firstly the preservation of the clubs movie archives by transferring them to digital format, and secondly, facilitating the transition of our "Do You Know Tasmania" shows from slides to digital. The continuation of our DYKT shows was in the balance unless we could start utilising the digital photos that most club members were now taking on club trips. The film digitisation was completed and we are currently digitising the audio tape soundtracks for digitally editing the video and audio to produce DVD versions of each movie. These can then be used in future shows, and also be made available for research in the State Library collection and film archives in DVD format. The second part was completed with the successful presentation of this current 43rd show in Launceston in November 2006. The future of our DYKT shows is now assured, with the ultimate purpose of all our "amateur" efforts being to communicate to the Australian public our passion for this beautiful state of Tasmania.


