BBQ OFFICIALLY OPENS AT CORNWALL


Around one hundred Cornwall residents and their guests gathered on Monday the 9th June to officially open their latest facility to the Coalminers Heritage Wall Park.




day coming up with suitable projects. In Cornwall's case it was a BBQ and pergola.



My interest intensified, on hearing reports of personal successes in beating cancer, completely through using a Rife machine, so I shared this information with a close personal friend, who too, had cancer.


Though my friend underwent a six week "treatment", of chemotherapy through the conventional medical system, the cancer, after two months of chemotherapy had remitted, but remained.

I would like to address some of the concerns that have been raised regarding my protest on Tuesday 10 June 2008 outside of the Council Office. In fact there were another two Councillors who indicated that they would join in the protest, but had a change of heart at the last minute. As is their right.

Firstly the reason behind the protest was in fact to highlight what I considered a serious breach of a basic human right, the right to free speech and to represent the people who voted for me.

One of my platforms was "I believe in open and transparent council with community consultation at all times" and I could not let the Mayor's motion to limit or gag Councillors pass without raising the issue in the public domain. I personally feel quite passionate about this form of censorship. I did advise the Mayor as late as Sunday that I would not support his motion and that I would fight against it.

Whether you agree or disagree with my actions the point remains that this issue is now being openly discussed and residents who normally take no interest in Council affairs are now aware of the situation.

I would like to thank all those who sent me letters, faxes and emails of support for my stand against the curtailing of the democratic process.

The Mayor made his comments on the protest over the ABC radio. So in condemning my right to free speech the Mayor was certainly actively exercising his.

The Acting General Manager, Tony Walker, has kindly donated a Norfolk Pine to replace the Xmas tree that was damaged by vandals. This tree is currently being removed from Tony's property and will be replanted in St Helens. The operation will take a few weeks and the cost to ratepayers should not be too great.

The Cornwall Community Group was unsuccessful in obtaining a basketball hoop under the Council's Sport and Recreation because the old tennis court did not past a risk assessment. However, I am working on an alternate plan.

(extracted from an article by Professor Peter Sheldrake, Executive Director, Graduate School of Business, RMIT University, Melbourne.)

The square peg in the round hole is a person who does two very important things. The first is to reveal, by their "bad fit", the real nature of the organisation. They are the people who help you see the effects of the culture, and the limitations and restrictions that a culture can invoke (as well as the benefits, of course). The discomfort tells you that there may be practices and procedures that are in need of review, renewal, or even rejection.

If you leave the culture as it is, you will keep losing the very people you can ill afford to pass on to a competitor the people who know your culture, but who can see how to do things differently, and help point the way to the next new business. At the same time, the square peg breaks and changes things - all those sharp edges keep on getting in the way. As the famous saying has it "if it ain't broke, break it"!

They are the people who see no reason to keep on doing something because it has been done that way in the past. They are the people who do see challenges as opportunities, and are always trying to see *how* to do something (as opposed to those who work hard to show why we should *not* be doing something!).

You have to **listen** to what is being said, and hear past the natural reaction to say "no" or "that's not the way we do things" or (most awful of all) "we tried that a couple of years ago"!

You have to ensure that your square pegs are linked to others they need to know, to sources of expertise and to networks: introducing them to others who will support their revolutionary ideas and approaches. You have to **support** your square pegs - and they can create tensions and damage in the organisation, so that a forward thinking chairperson will harness their energies and turn a negative into a positive.

Above all, you have to **protect**, for, without protection, revolutionaries run away before they are killed or expelled. In the pervasive and powerful cultures of conformity that characterise most organisations, these are critical skills.

St Marys 1903 David Clement

This story by David will be published in instalments beginning this issue.

This report on St Marys is written as though it was written in 1903. It is based primarily on two newspaper articles of the time, one published in 1903 and the other in 1906, but these have been supplemented by information from other sources, and with hindsight.

St Marys is ensconced on the north-east corner of an immense basin of good agricultural and grazing land, the Break O'Day Plains, in length about five miles and breadth three miles. On either side rise mountainous rugged ranges, with bluffs and peaks of basalt and sandstone, heavily timbered, their sombre hues throwing into bold relief the brightly green and fertile valley stretching its length at their foot.

Although it has been an exceptionally dry time in the Districts, the country was observed to be far less dried up to the east of Fingal than in the Midlands and South. About two inches of rain has recently fallen, which has served to freshen up the appearance of the whole country. Every rivulet and mountain stream is running, and some excellent crops have been harvested; dairying has not been very severely checked, although the drought has been sufficiently severe this summer in some parts to greatly reduce the flow of milk.

Early Days

St Marys is the township for the surrounding district; but was not always so: the "Cullenswood" property, two and a half miles distant, was regarded as such in former years, when all addresses were given as 'Cullenswood' or "near Cullenswood". Traces of that era may still be seen, remnants of cottages, an old wooden church of the Catholic belief dating from 1859, a diminutive stone structure announcing itself by a tablet over the door as the "Sunday School 1850", and Christchurch, the more commodious stone building erected by adherents of the Church of England.

Before "Cullenswood", the area was known as the St Patricks Head District, in recognition of the dominance over the area of the pyramid mount of St Patricks Head, which gained its appellation from Tobias Fourneaux, Captain of the "Adventure" and second-in –command during the second voyage of exploration in 1773 by the great James Cook. The rise and fall of these names as the identification for the district has been reflected by the changing name of the Post Office, "St Patricks Head" from I June 1835 to 23 July 1847 when it became "Cullenswood", until 12 April 1869 when it was altered to "St Marys", following the survey of the town site in 1857 and its proclamation as a town in 1864.

The Electoral Roll now shows a total adult population in the district of 678 persons, with 358 enrolled to vote at St Marys, and a further 219 at "Woodlawn" near the mining towns of Cornwall and Mt Nicholas.

The Arcadia of the Coast

Approaching St Marys, from the direction of Fingal, may be seen to the front St Patricks Head and Mt Elephant, and the Island Ranges on the right. To the left you pass Mt Nicholas, South Sister, that used to be called Mt Mary, and Cheeseberry Hill. Reference was made in 1864 in Walch's Almanac to "Mount Elephant", due to its perceived resemblance to the shape of the pachyderm, although officially it still appears on maps as Mt Logie, after the property name of an early settler in the area, Dr Alexander Thompson.

The town nestles snugly upon a gentle rise of the road leading to Georges Bay. When the traveller pulls up at St Marys Hotel, and has received the cheery welcome of the genial host, "Mick" Cullenan, a great placidity of soul takes possession, and all around is peace. This feeling is irresistible; the environment conduces to its existence, a huge smile of contentment seeming to overspread this arcadia of our coast. We are lost in wonder that the travelling photographer has not flooded the country with views of the place. On enquiring on the merits of the neighbourhood as a holiday resort, you will hear "fishing and shooting is good, at numerous places around here, Falmouth, Scamander River, Four Mile Creek and Seymour. Trout in the Break O'Day River are here at the back door, and duck and kangaroo shooting everywhere". "Beauty Spots?" "Yes, there's St Patricks Head, you can drive part of the way to it, and easily ascend the rest on foot. The view coastwards, seawards and inland is splendid. Then there are the Sisters at Germantown, and many other equally pleasant spots".

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor

I would like to add a few comments regarding the growth of plantations.

Further expansion will: degrade the land, which would take many years to rejuvenate; lower the water table affecting waterways and neighbouring water sources; put at risk survival of communities and employment; affect the landscape and mar views which are the historical heritage of local communities. But far more importantly plantations threaten our food production.

To allow limited plantations to compliment the need for timber from our native forests makes good sense. And true, the world demand for paper is growing. But the world demand for food is increasingly more urgent and for human beings at their present stage of evolution it would still appear to be the basis for life. Technology can find alternative ways to make paper; I doubt if a successful, healthy or ethical alternative for food production can be developed.

We are now living in a world where arable land is at a premium. Populations are growing and a serious world food shortage looming with competition for food and water becoming increasingly savage.

Not only is arable land a finite commodity, what little we have of it has also become increasingly degraded over the past sixty or seventy years. This is especially so in western countries by the over use of chemical fertilisers, pesticides and herbicides and other farming methods that have degraded land by destroying the natural bacteria and fungi and adversely affecting the humus content, both vital for soil health and fertility as well as giving some degree of protection against drought.

Even marginal land can be brought to successful production with the correct methods.

The spread of plantations threatens this and although the new premier has proposed a policy for controlling the growth on some farmland, it doesn't go far enough.

I wonder if he has heard of Evercreech? This is a fine example of the transformation of a successful dairy, supporting hundreds of cows on rich river flats, as well as crops, and giving employment for up to seventeen people. How many permanent jobs in this area were provided by the plantation that replaced it?

Eliminating so much employment in an area of economic depression and destroying a fertile food growing property should be regarded as an act of vandalism and/or criminality. Sadly some will still see it in their ignorance as 'good business development'.

Farmers are at a disadvantage and cannot compete with the 100% tax breaks given to plantations. They are further disadvantaged by rising fuel and other running costs while at the same time being subjected to fluctuating prices for their produce.

If market forces only are allowed to control land and water use without well informed government intervention and positive promotion of land for food, it is certain that we look forward to a disturbingly uncertain and bleak future.

Anyone got a good recipe for boiled, stewed or fried woodchips?

It seems our rail system is up for grabs again now that the current owners have decided to pull out of the state. Our politicians have made it clear that there is already interest to facilitate a takeover of this important transport facility.

Perhaps we should make it known also that we want our valley to be part of any upgrade to make the Tasmanian rail system a worthwhile service and a benefit to all.

A lot of us can still recall the early 1980's when our line was gradually shut down and the last freight ceased in around 1983, to St Marys. I suggest this in many ways had an impact on our roads once heavy haulage trucks became the only means to ship out our coal and logs. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure that out do you?

Here is a chance to at least consider determining, for the long term good, if the Fingal Valley line is worth upgrading to allow significant movement of future such product again and minimising heavy vehicle constant usage on less than ideal roads.

Of course another benefit to the valley and maybe even the last few kilometres to StMarys one day, would be tourist trains akin to the Derwent Valley or Emu Bay Railways. Much of the former line included the close proximity of the South Esk River.

The possibilities are endless around Tasmania for a burgeoning and fruitful rail network to transport heavy goods and yes even people across our special state and making our roads a little bit easier to travel and maintain.

Also just imagine how much the next few years road freight costs are going to be, with fuel prices escalating like they are these days. Scary isn't it, because those fuel costs will be offset to the consumer as a necessity.

I know it will cost many tens of millions of dollars and several years to re-establish a viable rail service around Tassie but also consider this. How much of these costs can be recouped by reducing ongoing major maintenance of ageing roads similar to our stretches and in no small way fuel and infrastructure matters pertaining to very large trucking usage all over the place.

I'd suggest our incumbent Government could well take this opportunity in a far sighted way to at least consider these things for us.



Department of Primary Industries and Water Increased Compensation for

Farmers and Vets Under TSE Surveillance Program

The national TSE Freedom Assurance Program needs sheep and cattle brains, and will pay handsomely for them - \$300 each for cattle and \$50 each for sheep.

However, the brains samples are needed only if the animals are sick. The TSE Freedom Assurance Program is the program that Australia uses to prove to our export markets that we are free of mad cow disease. Tasmanian farmers are urged to single out animals showing symptoms for brain testing.

Under the TSE Program, each State supplies brain samples from sheep and cattle to be tested for evidence of any of the transmissible spongiform encephalopathies or TSEs (notably mad cow disease and, in sheep, scrapie).

Department of Primary Industries and Water vet, Dr Mary Lou Conway, said that the Program was not looking for healthy sheep or cattle.


"We are only looking for animals that are showing signs of behavioural and neurological change," Dr Conway said. "For this program, we need sheep that are 18 months or older and are displaying signs like temperament changes, wasting, being very reactive to sound or touch, itching or rubbing, or having wobbly or abnormal head carriage.

"We also need cattle that are 30 months of age or older and displaying progressive behavioural changes or nervous signs such as excitability, head shyness, abnormal head carriage, tremor and falling – where these symptoms are not related to infections and have not responded to treatment."

Farmers are compensated at the rate of \$50 a head for sheep and \$300 a head for cattle – a good price for animals that are sick.

Private vets are paid for carrying out the post mortems and sending samples to DPIW's labs for testing - \$200 for sheep and \$300 for cattle.

Dr Conway urged livestock owners with an animal that might fit the criteria for this important program to contact their local vet or DPIW's Animal Health and Welfare Branch (6233 6875).



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NEW \$20 BILLION FUND FOR NATION BUILDING PROJECTS Dick Adams, Federal Member for Lyons, is happy to report that the Rudd Labor Government will be setting up a new fund, the Building Australia Fund.

"The Building Australia Fund will be used to build critical economic infrastructure such as roads, rail, ports and broadband. "This Fund will be a real boon for regional areas, Mr Adams said.

"The Fund can be used to help our farmers, miners and manufacturers get their goods to market as quickly and cheaply as possible. Businesses and households will be able to take full advantage of the Internet and money from the fund can be used to ensure that regional centres improve the way they function."

The Building Australia Fund has been allocated with an initial \$20 Billion, sourced from the expected budget surpluses in the 2007-08 financial year. There is also the possibility of further deposits being made from future surpluses and The Communications Fund will also be rolled into the new Building Australia Fund.

The Fund should be up and running by 1 January 2009, and the first allocations made in 2009 - 10.

Allocations from the Fund will be guided by Infrastructure Australia's priority list, which will be presented at the March 2009 COAG meeting.

"We are now dealing with the consequences of years of neglect and underinvestment in infrastructure, Mr Adams said.

"This Fund will use the financial dividends of today's mining boom to secure a strong future for Australia.

"Labor has a strong tradition as a nation building party, and the creation of the Building Australia Fund, along with Infrastructure Australia, confirms that this Government is looking to the future and working to build a stronger regional sector in Australia", Dick Adams said.



At the St Patricks Head and Esk Valley meeting on the 15th June, the committee approved a cemetery index project put forward by Bernice Jurgeit.

The project is designed to compile a complete (or as near complete as possible) record of the graves and or burial sites in the area defined by the Society.

It will also including photographs of older headstones which are particularly vulnerable to weathering, for example, sandstone.

The record or index would contain such information as to be able to identify name, birth and death date of an individual for the purpose of family history research.

Given the magnitude of the project it is recognised that it would take several years to complete and may eventually be compiled into a publication available for purchase with funds contributing to the running of the Society.

The project will encompass the geographic area from Conara to Falmouth and Seymour, taking in towns like Royal George, Mangana, Mathinna and German Town. It will not only record council and church cemeteries, but graves on private properties as well.
