A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Memories from Don Smith"

One of the most interesting forms of history research is sitting down and taking to the "old hands" about their lives and experiences in a time unimaginable to the vast majority of the folk today. They have lived through a period where the world saw technological and political changes never seen before, and most probably will never see again.

Don Smith of St Marys remembers when the motor car was rare around here. He remembers when he had to walk or ride his push bike to the Jubilee coal mine to work, or when things were bad in the mines he had to walk to the Mr Foster Range, or Legge's Hills as they were known to the locals, to snare possums or ringtails for their skins to supplement his income.

Don remembers the dairy herds from around the district when they were taken up onto the Mt Foster marshes to run for the winter. There were eleven herds of around twenty to thirty from Gray and a herd of fifty from Coopers at Seymour. As well, McShanes of Royal George would bring a herd up to Dukes Marsh in the Meadstone area. To add to the cattle, properties like Cullenswood, Killymoon, Malahide and Tullochgorum would take large mobs of sheep up to graze in the hills.

From Seymour to the Dome at Avoca the Mt Foster Range is dotted with marshes, most of which were given names by the early farmers and hunters. The largest of these are called: Thompsons, Jacks, Dairy, Round, Dukes and Gibraltar. Today they are grown up with tea-tree and bull rushes, but in days gone by the farmers would head up into the hills in September and burn off the marshes and the hills around them so by the time winter came around everywhere would be a mass of lush green autumn growth.

This would also be good for the winter hunters because the fresh growth would attract the wildlife as well. The hunters would set a row of snares in the bush around the edge of the marsh so the livestock wouldn't set them off and their prey would be caught as they came in to feed.

Some years ago Don went back to Dairy Marsh and found an old horse drawn plough and the remains of a hut belonging to Dudley Strochnetter and Doug Lehner. Don remembers the hut as being well constructed from split palings and shingles, with a stone chimney and a loft where the men used to sleep. For many years both men spent their winters up there tending the herds and hunting for skins which they would bring home every so often and take back what provisions they needed.

Don says the only real danger up in the hills in those days were the Jersey bulls. They were savage brutes, especially if they were left at the marshes for any length of time. Most blokes would carry a gun just to ward off the bulls if they were chased.

Bill Mitchell and his mate had a hut out near Dukes Marsh which overlooked Royal George. They gave the hut to Don in the 1950s and everything, including the pots and pans, were in good condition despite being out there for twenty odd years.

In the 1960s when most of the coal mines closed, Don went to work for the Forestry. One day whilst he was working in the Dome area above Tullochgorum he came across the sheep yards used by the Marshall's when they used the hills for winter sheep runs. The yards were all post and rail with three 250 millimetre (10 inches) wide rails slotted into the post in each panel. Each post and rail was split to a perfect size and fitted together in a way that would make any tradesman proud.

Men were fit in those days, but few were as fit as Kevin Gillies who it was said used to spend three or four hours going around his snares at the back of Cullenswood on Saturday morning and arrive home in time to play football. Kevin, like Don and a lot of their mates were good footballers and no doubt the kilometres they covered chasing the once valuable possum skin contributed to this.

Most of the folk from that era are gone now and the few who are left are like Don, in their eighties, but they have lived through a time when men were men, made tough by the environment and the way in which they were forced to make a living. We must preserve their memories because every story they tell has a momentous place in our heritage.

We are appalled and concerned about the lack of information that the Break O'Day Council have supplied about the amalgamation.

Many of us having lived in the valley most of our lives remember the local government amalgamation of Fingal and Portland and together with ratepayers who have moved to the area in later years and are now convinced that amalgamation should not be on the agenda again.

What did the ratepayers especially the lower end of the Valley gain by the previous partnership, in our view nothing.

We have been losing out ever since, example, capital works, the road to Ringarooma over the Mathinna plains would have been sealed years ago as the then Fingal Council was upgrading and sealing around 2 kms per year, this ceased immediately and not a metre has been sealed since. Secondary roads at Mathinna, Fingal, Mangana, St Marys and Cornwall were yearly upgraded and sealed, after all these years not many have seen this occur since and also what roads were sealed are now worn out and need resealing again.

Infrastructure, we had near new council offices at Fingal which were very accessible to this area, it was not long before they were closed and all administration was moved to St Helens good for the coast perhaps but a big loss for this area. Also council then sold off some of their buildings, which could have been rented out etc. i.e. Fingal Town Hall & Mangana School Community Hall which were heritage listed and used for community functions.

Whilst we commend the appearance of the towns of St Helens, Scamander and St Marys what with grants and ratepayers money spent on street makeovers etc in recent time, more attention should be given to this end of the municipality for a change, after all before the last amalgamation Fingal Council was in a very good financial state at the time and we feel we have received a somewhat raw deal ever since.

How are we going to fare if another amalgamation occurs? Only worse off than before as the numbers game is against us very large coastal area versus smaller rate based hinterland, equality should prevail as we can not all live on the coast, anyway we like living where we live, **once bitten twice shy.** All we can do is base our decisions on previous experiences. Dear Editor,

After a town meeting to discuss the proposed merger between the Break O'Day and Glamorgan Spring Bay Councils it was decided that we the Fingal District Progress Committee Inc., compose a written submission of questions and concerns that people have regarding the proposed merger. We hereby submit the following:

- Could you please identify the benefits?
- What sort of debts will the 'new council' be incurring if the two councils merge?
- Will we keep our own local depot and local staffing levels and equipment once merged?
- Where will the council chambers be located? Will there be a shop front or local agencies available throughout the whole community?
- What core services will be made available to our community? An example of this would be a community bus/car that would be available to take members of the community to various appointments at the hospital or locations.
- Will the merger have any bearing on the rates that our residents pay?
- What made Glamorgan Spring Bay Council change their minds from saying no to the merger to saying yes?
- Would there be adequate representation to the Fingal Valley region if the proposed merger takes place?
- If we didn't want to merge with the proposed merger, do we have an option of merging with another council? The coastal part of BODC and GSBC has a lot in common with the coastal areas and the valley has more in common with adjoining rural councils We are identified with other associations with other rural tourism projects: Greater Esk Tourism (www.valleyofadventures.com.au) and also the Esk Valley Historical Society.
- What are the ramifications of a voluntary merger with BODC and GSBC councils that we would face?
- What extensive community consultation have we had, prior to the report from the review board going to the minister?
- Has Ben Lomond water had an influence over the proposed merger? e.g. the loss of revenue to councils from the water and sewerage board taking this over. Has this influenced the talk of merger in any way?

What name would the new council be taking on if merged?

Some of our concerns are:

- * Lack of consultation and information
- * Impact on communities such as Fingal
- * Extenuated exclusion from the Coastal part of the municipality as part of the proposed merger
- * At the moment we appear to be a part of social exclusion. As being on the outside of many different things, we aren't recognised as part of the one municipality.
- * What would be the staffing and transitional arrangements for the voluntary merger and what would be the time frame of jobs being completed within our community.

60th Wedding Anniversary




Joyce and Jack Wines were joined by friends and family at the St Marys Hotel recently where they celebrated their diamond wedding anniversary.

LONG-TERM SOLUTION FOR ST HELENS BAR WAY NEEDED Report submitted by Jim Playsted, State Liberal candidate for Lyons

A meeting will be convened to gauge the extent to which there may be local community support for the establishment of a Georges Bay Trust to manage access to St Helens port.

St Helens is regularly beset with the problem of access to its port and this puts the local economy at serious risk.

Safe access to the port is vital for local business investment and job security, concern about reliable and safe port access is a major disincentive for mariners and industry.

At present, problems with the bar way are dealt with in a crisis management fashion.

Generally there is constant wrangling between various agencies and governments and long periods of delay occur while nothing much is done.

However, whenever the problem becomes sufficiently acute the State Government is then finally forced to act to provide funding to undertake the required dredging or related works.

The presently completing contract for a \$1.5M project to improve access to Georges Bay is welcome news in itself, but was a long time coming and will not provide a long term solution for the port.

The concept of a 'Georges Bay Trust' which is managed locally, and has regular income streams from a variety of sources including the State Government could be a superior model to provide for ongoing and regular maintenance which will keep access to the port of St Helens safe and reliable.

Following some preliminary discussions with local stakeholders including representatives from the Break O'Day Council and the Barway Committee there is value in having further exploration of this concept.

A meeting involving stakeholders and the local community will be a first step in deciding whether it may be worthwhile further investigating the establishment of a 'Georges Bay Trust' as a solution to the problems of port access.

Shadow Minister for Infrastructure Jeremy Rockliff and Liberal Member for Lyons Rene Hidding have been briefed on the concept and are supportive of further discussion of its possibilities.

CHANGES TO EAST COAST BUS SERVICES

Bus service changes to be introduced in September will provide improved links between East Coast towns.

The Minister for Infrastructure, Graeme Sturges, pictured right has announced that the changes followed the recent Review of Core Passenger Services.



From Monday 21 September there will be a new service between

Bicheno, St Marys and St Helens, operated by Calows Coaches five days a week, which was previously not available.

"The district high schools in St Marys and St Helens will also benefit from this new service, as students will be able to travel between the schools," Mr Sturges said.

"The previous service from Bicheno, via Swansea and the Lake Leake Road, to Launceston will no longer operate because of low passenger numbers.

"Once this service ceases, new arrangements will be introduced for travel to Launceston from the East Coast.

"The new arrangements will take passengers from Bicheno to St Marys, then via the Esk Main Road to Launceston. Travel will also be available through to St Helens from Bicheno which was previously not available.

"Calows Coaches will also trial a new early morning service from St Helens to Launceston from 21 September. This service is available to the general public and, most importantly, will provide an alternative for students who currently live away from home, allowing them to travel daily to school in Launceston," Mr Sturges said.

"The Government has a duty to ensure that bus services continue to be affordable for passengers, profitable for business and sustainable for government."

Vietnam Veterans Day at St Marys

A Vietnam Veterans Day/Long Tan commemoration Service will be held on Tuesday 18th August at the St Marys Cenotaph.

The service will start at 12.30pm with a march of Veterans of 5th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment from the TARDIS at the pub junction in the middle of town, along Main Street to the Cenotaph through an Honour Guard of senior students from St Marys District High School, to the tune of the Regimental March of the 5th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment, "Dominique".


The service, which will be held between 12.30pm and 1pm, will commemorate and honour the service of the 50,000 Australian forces personnel who served in the Vietnam conflict, a conflict which cost the lives of over 500 Australians. A Roll Call of the Fallen will particularly remember those who died at the battle of Long Tan and all Tasmanians who died while serving in Vietnam.

Similar commemorations will be conducted in cities and towns throughout Australia, and the service at St Marys provides an opportunity for our local community to remember and honour the service of Vietnam Veterans and to acknowledge the sacrifices made and price paid by their families for this service.

Vietnam Veterans will deliver the Prayer, the Commemorative Address, the Ode and the Valediction, St Marys District High School student Shannon Roskelly will declaim the Roll Call of the Fallen and Envoy Melanie Norton of the Salvation Army will deliver the Commemoration of the Fallen and the Recessional. It is estimated that the service will close at 1.00pm.

Members of the 5th Batallion, the Tiger Batallion, Royal Australian Regiment Association were so impressed with the Anzac Day ceremony at St Marys that they have chosen to hold their 2009 commemoration at St Marys.

The service is being conducted in association with the St Marys Memorial Service Association, and a welcome and invitation is extended to all residents of St Marys and the surrounding district to join in this commemoration and remembrance of those who served in Vietnam.



5RAR at St Marys Commemoration

Last Monday John Smee, the Tasmanian Rep for the 5th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment addressed senior students of St Marys District High School on the Vietnam Veterans Day /Long Tan Commemoration service to be held at St Marys next Tuesday 18th of August.

John gave the students a brief overview of the history of Phuoc Tuy Province, and described operation "Hardihood" on the 24th May 1969, which was the first operation in which the men of the 5th B'n took part; he described the battle of Long Tan and the support given to the men of D Company 6 Battalion R.A.R by the Artillery units firing in support, the R.A.A.F helicopter crews who delivered much needed ammunition, to the troops on the ground who were fighting for their lives, and finally the following days up until the 20th of August when the men of 6B'n assisted by D. Company 5th B'n finished the weary task of securing the Long Tan battlefield and burying the enemy dead.

On Tuesday John appeared on Star FM. He was asked the reason for a service at St Marys. John explained that by holding services away from the larger population centres, the Regimental Association was aiming to be inclusive and supportive of those individual veterans who for reasons of their own had moved away from the general community and the Veteran's organisations by providing an opportunity to take part in a local community commemoration.

He expressed the Battalion's deep appreciation of the support and welcome extended by the local St Marys and district community for its commemoration service.





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Launching into Learning – East Coast

Tasmania's youngest children need the very best possible start in life, especially at that very significant time when they begin their first years of schooling.

The Labor Member for Lyons, Heather Butler said it is important that children and their parents have a firm foundation and support to help children enter what will hopefully be some of the best years of their lives.



St Helens Kindergarten last week.

That's why the State Government is increasing the budget for the Launching into Learning programs to \$4.25 million, up by \$224,000 from last financial year, and is continuing on the program for the next four years.

Ms Butler said that partnerships and linkages with other agencies have led to cooperative work practices especially between schools, Child Health and Parenting, community houses and child care services.

The Principal of Bicheno Primary School, Andrew Woodard said that the LiL initiative has enabled his school to provide a network for parents to develop friendships, gather information and create early links with educational staff.

"Bicheno Primary provides a balance between a playgroup and *the Let's Play* program, early literacy programs such as *Let's Read* and *Let's have a Story* as well as a pathway of programs for early introduction to school life for children and their parents," Mr Woodard said.

Playgroup – weekly on Friday mornings from 9.00 until 10.45 am for children from birth to 4 and their carers.

Let's Have a Story fortnightly on a Monday Afternoon. This is for all preschool children and their carers.

Early Birds – Weekly for third term. This is an introductory program for the following year Kindergarten class. Children at first attend with their parents.

A recent initiative for the Bicheno LiL Program is an Early Childhood Parenting Network Group developed in conjunction with the Regional Health Service in the Glamorgan Spring Bay Region.

This group will work with parents to provide specialist assistance in areas such as Speech Pathology, Lactation Consultancy, Health Nurses and other relevant professionals.

The group is organising an Early Childhood Expo in Bicheno during October.

A major focus of the Bicheno Primary LiL initiative is to provide networks, information and learning pathways for parents who are geographically isolated, single parents and Grandparents who are Carers.

"This ensures that they are able to embrace support and learning opportunities for themselves and their children," Mr Woodard said.

The Assistant Principal of St Helens District High School, Melanie Thorne said that the school has two sessions running on a Thursday.

Birth – 3 years old group for families from 11-12.30pm.

Pre-Kinder children and their families 1.30-3pm

Ms Thorne said that the parents stay with their children for the sessions and are involved in a variety of activities including outdoor play, art activities, puzzles, games.

"The focus of all of these activities is oral language – developing the child's speaking and listening skills," Ms Thorne said.

"The teacher who runs the programs, Eloise Matthewson, also has a whole group time where stories are read and songs and rhymes are introduced to the children.

"We have an excellent attendance at the sessions and they provide the parents with the valued opportunity to meet other parents in the community, as well as opportunities for social contact for the children.

"The children also have the opportunity to borrow books to take home and return the following week."

Ms Thorne said that Launching into Learning dovetails beautifully into our Kindergarten and early years programs.

"The children are comfortable to come into the school environment which helps set them up for success when starting formal schooling."

Ms Butler said that Launching into Learning has been embraced by educators, parents, carers, schools and other community stakeholders, with a total of 121 schools from around the state now involved.

"Feedback from many parents in various areas has been very positive about these programs," Ms Butler said.

"Launching into Learning is playing a very important role in establishing a solid educational base for our youngest Tasmanians and it's fantastic that four more years' of funding is guaranteed through the 2009-10 State Budget."

Ms Butler said that extensive research has shown that patterns of learning in the first three or four years after birth are particularly crucial, and have a lasting impact on children's health, learning and life success.

"The Black Line"

After many years of conflict between the British colonists and Aborigines, known as the Van Diemens Land Black War, in 1830 Lieutenant-Governor George Arthur called upon every able bodied male in the colony, convict or free, to form a human chain to sweep across the then settled districts.

The line ran from the Western Tiers in the west to St Patricks Head in the east and over several weeks moved south east. Arthur's plan was to drive the aborigines into the Tasman Peninsular and block them off at Eagle Hawk Neck.

The incident was seen as a costly and fruitless exercise, as it was said only one old man and a boy were captured. It did, however, shake the aboriginal population so much that they were willing to accept the terms offered by the Government appointed mediator, George Augustus Roberson, and allow themselves to be resettled on Flinders Island.

This move did what the Black Line failed to do and eventually saw the demise of the original owners of what we now know as Tasmania.

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

Recreational Scallop Season Closes

The recreational scallop season closed at midnight on Friday 31 July.

The Minister for Primary Industries and Water, David Llewellyn, pictured right, said there were around half the numbers of recreational fishers taking out a licence for the 2009 recreational scallop season, as had been the case in the previous year.



"The reduced uptake in licence numbers is not surprising, as the D'Entrecasteaux Channel was closed for the 2009 season; and in previous years 98% of the fishing effort has focused on that area," Mr Llewellyn said.

"All other State waters were open for recreational dive-fishing for the 2009 season.

"This was the fifth recreational season since the recreational fishery was re-opened in 2005, following many years of total closure.

"Hopefully, by closing the D'Entrecasteaux Channel for a relatively brief period, we can enjoy better scallop seasons in the future.

"The Tasmanian Aquaculture and Fisheries Institute has been conducting surveys of scallop stocks in the D'Entrecasteaux Channel.

"The Department will assess this information to see if there needs to be minor changes to managing the Channel fishery to secure the future sustainability of these scallop stocks."

Mr Llewellyn reminded fishers that the Marine Police would be on the lookout for those who are taking scallops out of season.

"Members of the public can help protect our fisheries by reporting any potential illegal fishing activities to Fishwatch on 0427 655 557," he said.



A petition was received from some residents at Binalong Bay, over a series of works in the car park.

The Mayor's motion to reduce the speed limit in Welborough was moved by the Mayor and seconded by Cllr Johns and passed by all.

Cllr Clement moved a motion, seconded by Cllr Johns, for "reports on benefits of amalgamation" Cllr Clement argued that there was not enough information on this topic and the residents were entitled to all information and that the Departmental Managers supply a report on any benefits to the community of amalgamation. Motion lost 5-2.

Cllr Clement moved a motion seconded by Cllr Johns, to introduce by laws in respect of the application of pesticides within the Break O'Day municipality.

To the Mayor

1. Have you, or the General Manager, within the past 12 months commissioned any report by a consultant, firm or agency on the potential impacts of a merger with the Glamorgan Spring Bay Council that would identify any benefits to ratepayers of the Break O'Day municipality of such a merger?

2. Have you asked the Local Government Board for an individual private meeting with the Board to discuss the possible merger with Glamorgan Spring Bay, separate from any meeting by the Board with Council as a whole? The Mayor answered NO to both questions.

The new Environmental Health Officer proposed a new set of fees and charges for Health and By-Laws for the 2009/2010 financial year. Cllrs Clement and Johns asked that this proposal be moved into a workshop as this officers recommendation was complex and there was consensus that not all Councillors understood this recommendation. The new fees were passed 5-2.

Water remission on all water meter accounts under \$5-00 as at 30 June 2009.

The Grassy Bottom Regional Arts applied to have all Hall fees waived; Cllr Johns moved that Grassy Bottom be given a lease for 3 years. This was supported by all Councillors.

The Council decided to agree to a lease on the Old Exhibition Building at St Marys Recreation Ground to the St Marys Fitness Group. This was decided after the St Patricks Head and Esk Valley Historical Society withdrew their request. Grassy Bottom advised that they would only want it for storage; this could lead to OH&S issues.

The Council decided to refuse consent for a Development Application for Optus to install a communication tower on the St Marys Recreation ground due to the impact on the landscape; however the communication tower at Scamander tip was supported.

That the Council owns the scavenging rights to the waste transfer station? All the attendants have been advised that there is to be no scavenging at the tips. Council is in the process of establishing "tip shops" at Scamander and St Helens. *Please note that I have changed my visits to the LAST Thursday of each month.*

MEDIA RELEASE HODGMAN MIDLAND HIGHWAY VIDEO A DANGEROUS STUNT

TALKING to passengers can be as dangerous as talking on a mobile phone according to university research. The revelation follows the release this week of a video of Tasmanian Liberal leader Will Hodgman taking his eyes off the road to talk into a video camera while driving along the Midland Highway.

Ironically he was filming the video to get publicity for what he claims are the highway's safety problems.

A 2006 study by the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute showed "drivers who have conversations with passengers exhibit similar levels of driving performance as drivers who use cell phones" said Michigan university's news service website.

"Will Hodgman is illustrating perfectly that driver behaviour is the Midland Highway's biggest problem," says Rebecca White, state Labor candidate for Lyons.

"The Midlands Highway needs sensible solutions, not stunts. Mr Hodgman takes his eyes off the road to speak to the camera and is concentrating on his rehearsed lines, not the road, where his focus should be.

"He is setting a very poor example for young drivers.

"Mr Hodgman should find safer, more appropriate ways to get his message across that do not put himself or other road users at unnecessary risk."



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

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

10:00- I have arrived at Chicken Feed and had 10-15 minutes to buy what I wanted with my money.


10:20- I am back on the bus and ready to go home.


