

A LITTLE BIT OF HERITAGE: Jim Haas "Australian Newsprint Mills"

For almost 125 years the coal industry has been a vital part of the economy of the Fingal Valley. But like most things in life the industry has not always had smooth sailing. Wars, recessions, strikes and competition has seen many mine closures and retrenchments over the years, with the worst time for the industry coming in the late 1950s and 60s when cheap oil was dumped onto the world market, making it impossible for coal to compete.

By 1964 when Cornwall, the largest coalmine in the Fingal Valley, closed, only the more mechanised mine at Duncan, Fingal, still remained. In ten years the workforce from coalmining in the Valley had gone from over 200 employees to less than 40.



Many families moved out of the Valley and for the majority who stayed a Government subsidised forestry pine planting project was commenced at Mathinna, Tower Hill, Mt Nicholas and Scamander. Although the work on this project was completely foreign to men who had spent their working lives under the mountain rather than on top, it did provide employment for miners who would have otherwise been forced onto the dole.

By the end of 1964 Duncan was down to working only three or four days a week on production and it looked inevitable that it too would close, seeing a complete end to the coal industry in Tasmania. But one customer, Australian Newsprint Mills at Boyer, remained loyal and the industry was able to stay alive until the mid 1970s when oil prices went back up and coal was once again able to be competitive.

The history of the Australian Newsprint Mills goes back to 1920 when the Melbourne based Mussen Group saw the need for an Australian paper industry and funded research into making newsprint from Tasmanian hardwoods. In 1932 a syndicate led by Keith Murdock of the Herald and Weekly Times teamed up with Warwick Fairfax of the Age and formed the Derwent Valley Paper & Pulp Company. Their aim was to negotiated extensive forest concession in the Florentine Valley with the Tasmanian Government.

In 1939 the syndicate formed the company Australian News Print Mills and began building the paper mill at Boyer, along with a residential suburb at New Norfolk for its workers. The mill opened in 1941 and ten Australian daily newspapers used Boyer newsprint, averting a serious war-time newspaper rationing.

Timber for the mill was extracted from the Florentine Valley area where comfortable workforce camps were set up. Harvesting was done with axes and crosscut saws and the logs were dragged to the rail sidings with steam driven haulers. By 1947 the township of Maydena was built as a base for the logging operations and thriving communities at both Maydena and New Norfolk developed. Company built amenities at both towns included community halls, swimming pools and recreation grounds.

The first Tasmanian conservation controversy, however, occurred in 1948 when the Government re-claimed 2000 acres of the Mt Field National Park to extend the Florentine concession. But a couple of decades later a large area adjacent to Maydena was included in the South West World Heritage Area.

By 1960 chainsaws and other modern machinery were being used in the bush and more up-to-date machinery introduced into the mill. This forced the workforce of some 3000 to gradually reduce. By 1988 when the operation was taken over by leading New Zealand paper manufacturer Fletcher Challenge the workforce was cut to 600 and the Maydena Depot closed in 1990. Timber for the mill now comes from all around Tasmania.

Another early feature of the Boyer mill was that the newsprint was carried from the mill down the Derwent River to the Hobart wharf on a series of barges, towed by a tug boat. Nowadays it is transported by truck.

With the closure of a number of paper mills around Australia in recent times, including Burnie and Wesley Vale, the paper industry appears rather volatile. Boyer newsprint, on the other hand, seems stable these days and being currently owned by Norwegian paper giant Norske Skog, whose world reputation for professionalism is second to none, the long term viability of the paper industry at Boyer looks positive.

This is no doubt good news for the Fingal Valley, because Boyer still remains one of Cornwall Coal Company's major customers.

Dear Editor

On behalf of the St Marys Association for Community Development Inc. I would like to respond to the comments make by Cagerattler in last issue of the Valley Voice regarding the Association of which myself and a number of hardworking community minded volunteers are active members.

It was clear to me that he did very little research before putting pen to paper on this matter and has very little awareness of SMACD's contribution to the local community. Just to set the record straight, here is a brief account of some of what we have been up to:

- Operating the **St. Marys Online Access Centre** for the last 11 years with around 200 people a month using the Centre, connecting St. Marys to the World through the miracle of Internet Technology! This includes **free E Learn Computer Training Courses** and our latest addition, a **Senior's Kiosk** with 2 state of the art Desktop Computers, each of which has Video Conferencing capabilities and are totally free for use, as well as computer training, for those over the age of 50.
- SMACD secured the funding to set up the Rural Transaction Centre, which is why there still is a Bank

in the town today!

After the closure of the Railway Station as a history room, the St. Patrick's Head & Esk Valley
 Historical Society Inc was set up under the auspices of SMACD. Its historical research office is housed at the Online Centre, facilitating the scanning and archiving of documents relevant to the history of the area. Visit their website (also set up by SMACD volunteers) to learn more:

- The Rec Ground Caravan Park and the River Park projects were both initially proposed by SMACD
- The Office Space which has been set up at the Online Centre is utilized by Max Employment and Advanced Personnel Management to help address employment issues in the area. Many people who have accessed the Centre for training and skill development have gone on to enter the workforce.
- The allocation of \$20,000 to upgrade the **St. Patricks Head Walking Track**. Unfortunately this funding was

taken over for a Bike Trail in Hobart, but thanks to SMACD's efforts, the track was stabilized enough to allow it to remain open.

Over the past two years we have been steadfastly campaigning to set up **recreational trails** in the area, one of which is to include the disused **rail track** from St. Marys to Fingal, a project which will have immeasurable benefits for locals and visitors alike.

Our other current project is a **Sculptural Elephant Seat** to go with the picnic tables on the small triangle of Council land next to the Online Centre. Alas, the shade tree had to be cut down and the area seriously needs a rubbish bin (which we have applied for). But we are still hoping that with some landscaping it will be a nice place to sit and look at the back of Mt. Elephant. Hopefully, one day the park will be graced with a **Sculptural Seat** on

How difficult can it be to send them all together or has mine just been mislaid or sent? I tried to ring MY WATER the other day and had no luck getting a message on either for some reason. I hope I have more luck this week. We'll see.

It's been well over a year now since the change from Council to this occurred, and I reckon all the billing details etc. should now be well and truly sorted. Let's hope that it is as simple as just being lost in the system or something.

What they really need to do though is to send out regular updates, bulletins or ad's to keep us fully informed on water and sewerage improvements in progress or targeted especially given that we face incremental price rises for the first three years. I'd like to know how my money is being used. Wouldn't you? Now where's that bill?

Whilst I love people writing back about the subjects I mention I just need to make a return comment this time, from the last Valley Voice.

So... reversing without full view into traffic is smart is it? Parallel parking is stupidity it seems. Woodworking Tip from Lou Knee

Most F-clamps (quick release) have a round disk on the end of the screw thread. To save looking around for something to stop marking your project use one of the round screw-on milk container tops. They fit perfectly so can be left on all the time.



Greetings from Lauren.

Lauren Quinn has spent the last four years in Hobart, studying a combined Bachelor of Arts/Law degree. Earlier this year she was given the opportunity to study a semester of Law abroad at the University of Lucerne in Switzerland. This is a brief description of a St Marys-raised girl's first time out of Australia.

17 August 2010

The first stop on my itinerary was Dubai. I chose to fly Emirates (cheap!) and their airport hub is here. I have a friend from Hobart who is currently working for a US company in Dubai so I've decided to stay for a week to check out a place I've barely heard of.

After stepping off an uneventful 16-hour flight, I stepped into a massive airport with gold-lined walls, double-storey water features and marble columns. Because it was so hot (42 degrees was the average temperature while I was there) I was wearing a low-cut singlet top, which I was worried about, considering I had no idea whether it was considered acceptable for Arab standards.

One of the many men dressed in full white garb and turbans did approach me in the airport and started speaking Arabic, which slightly scared me due to my semi-conscious, jetlagged state. Turns out he was an airport employee, just asking if we needed directions. (Note: you don't have to dress conservatively there, but it's recommended that your shoulders are covered, for decency.) Shorts and t-shirt is fine! It's probably a bit more relaxed than other Islamic countries like Saudi Arabia, as there's a lot more ex-pats here. Apparently the population of Dubai is only 20% Emirati and the rest are western. The city of Dubai is a bit of a spin-out, with so much development and construction going on everywhere.

All the buildings are huge and identical, and sitting on the edge of the desert.

The place I stayed was in a little gated "ex-pat" community about 10min from the Dubai CBD. There is a mosque and a mini shopping



centre across the road from their house, and the muslim call to prayer can be heard several times a day throughout the suburb, as they play it through megaphones and loudspeakers! It's a bit of a pain, especially at 4.30am. It was Ramadan (the muslim holy month) while I was there, which means muslims can't eat between sunrise and sunset. It also means you can't eat in public so you don't upset them, which I almost did when I wanted an ice cream because of the heat! Some muslims take the whole not-eating thing to extremes, with some even refusing to drink water or even swallow their own saliva, which is a bit extreme considering the daily temperatures. I did spy some construction workers having a smoko and water under a tree outside the compound though, so I guess it depends on how strong your faith is. It really messes people up though - my Dubai friend was telling me that the road toll increases 30% in Ramadan because everyone falls asleep or passes out at the wheel! The speed limit is 120km/h but the speed cameras don't kick in until it registers someone going over 160km/h.

We went for a venture to the supermarket across the road, which is a little one, slightly smaller than the St Marys supermarket. Because the United Arab Emirates is so barren and has no agricultural industry, most of the food is imported (the drinking water is entirely desalinated). We bought raspberries from the USA, oranges from Egypt, dairy products from the UK and meat from Australia! As it's a muslim nation they don't eat pork, so there's a little aisle at the back of the store with all the sinful pork products for the westerners.

18 August 2010

I'm probably going to be run over by the traffic here, as the cars drive on the other side of the road and I keep looking the wrong way when crossing the road! Although the men are very courteous here, some cars will stop after travelling at 110m/h just to let you cross the road. Also, even the travelators in shopping malls have the "up" ones on the right and the "down" ones on the left!

Checked out a couple of absolutely massive malls yesterday, which were about 4 storeys high each and filled with gold-plated panels and columns. The Dubai Mall has the largest aquarium in the world, which was pretty cool. We got lost several times and couldn't find anywhere to eat because the food courts were closed due to Ramadan. All except McDonalds, that is! It was open but you couldn't eat the food in the



food court, it was take-away only. We did see some Asian tourists digging into Maccas in the empty food court but were quickly shut down by the muslim security guards. It is possible to eat out during the day at hotel restaurants, due to the large amount of travellers there.
