
"Flour Mills"

In the nineteenth century, water powered flour grinding mills were an integral part of the economy in Van Diemens Land. There is, however, some argument among historians as to where the first mill was built.

The Historical Society at Deviot, where the ruins of an old mill still survive on the Supply River, claim their mill, built in 1825 by Andrew Charlton, was the first in Van Diemens Land.

Hobart historians, on the other hand, claim that a mill built by Robert Nash and powered by water from the Hobart Rivulet was operating as early as 1818. Nash sold the mill to Arnold Frisk who built a second mill on the Rivulet named Waterloo Mill. This mill was described in the 1820s as a brick stuccoed building 80 by 35 feet in the basement and four storeys high. On the eastern end were six good apartments, all of which were occupied by the miller.

Nash is also credited with building the first water driven mill in the Australian Colonies when he built a mill on Norfolk Island in 1795. He came to Van Diemens Land after the relocation of the Norfolk Island convicts in 1814.



Farmers in the Fingal Valley were also prominent wheat growers in the nineteenth century and water powered flour mills were common in the Valley. A number of small mills existed like the one at "Rosegarland" near St Marys, which was powered by water from Gardiners Creek, but the two main mills were "Millbrook" in the foothills of the Mt Nicholas Range and Bean's Mill at Fingal. Bean's Mill, which was powered from the waters of Township Creek, ended up being the largest and longest running. It operated well into the twentieth century, but in its latter years was powered by steam.

For those people in St Marys, who frequently travel to the Mt Nicholas Mill Stream for their drinking water, you can be assured that the little stream has had many uses over the years, with its name coming from what would appear to be the first stream to power a water driven flour mill in the district.

Around the 1840s "Millbrook" mill was built by Thomas Ransom, who was the owner of the land around the little



stream at that time. From the onset, it would seem, Thomas must have thought the waterway had potential for a mill because he named the property "Millbrook" even before a mill was built.

Whilst the fields that grew the wheat are still here and the streams that drove the mills are still running the mills are all long gone, now only heaps of rubble. This is another example of an industry that played a significant role in the lives of many of our ancestors, but today has gone by the wayside.

With the world still demanding huge amounts of wheat products, one can only wonder why the Fingal Valley does not contribute to that demand.

ANZAC DAY 2011 in St Marys

Today is a national day of remembrance. We gather here to remember those who gave their lives for us.

One of those brave men is Private James Charles Martin, who was only 14 when he singed up to fight. Hardly a man yet brave enough to fight.

I will now read an article about Private Martin. About his early life, his involvement in WWI and the honours and awards he received.

James Charles Martin (3 January 1901 – 25 October 1915) was the youngest <u>Australian</u> known to have died in <u>World War I</u>. He was only 14 years and nine months old when he succumbed to <u>typhoid</u> during the <u>Gallipoli campaign</u>. He was one of 20 Australian soldiers under the age of 18 known to have died in <u>World War I</u>.

Early life

James Martin was born to Amelia and Charles Martin on 3 January 1901. His father was born Charles Marks, in Auckland, New Zealand however, after immigrating to Australia and settling in Tocumwal, New South Wales, he changed his name to Martin to avoid discrimination for being Jewish. Charles worked as a grocer, handyman and (horse-drawn) cab driver. His mother, Amelia, was born in Bendigo in 1876 to Thomas and Frances Park. Her parents had immigrated to Australia during the gold rush in the 1850s. The youngest of twelve children, she married Charles just before her 18th birthday.

Martin's family moved to many different suburbs in and around <u>Melbourne</u> before finally settling in <u>Hawthorn</u> in 1910. Born in Hawthorn, he was the third of six children, and the only son. He attended Manningtree Road State School from 1910 to 1915, during which time he also received basic military training as a junior cadet under the <u>compulsory training scheme</u>.

World War I

At the outbreak of World War I Martin enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 12 April 1915, against the wishes of his family. His parents finally agreed however when he made it clear that he would sign on under an assumed name and never write to them if they did not consent. He gave a false date of birth to the recruiting officer, claiming to be 18, when he was actually 14 years and three months.

Martin joined the 1st Reinforcements of the 21st Battalion as a private and trained in Broadmeadows and Seymour (later Puckapunyal) camps in Victoria before boarding HMAT Berrima in June 1915 to deploy to Egypt. In late August, he was sent to Gallipoli on the steamer HMT Southland, to take part in the fighting against the Turks. En route, his ship was torpedoed by a German submarine off the island of Lemnos and he was rescued after spending four hours in the water. After being picked up, Martin rejoined his battalion at Mudros Island where they were transferred to the transport ship Abassieh on 7 September.

The following morning, just before 2:00 am, Martin's platoon, 4 Platoon, landed at Watson's Pier in Anzac Cove. He then served in trenches around Courtney's Post, which was positioned on the ridge overlooking Monash Valley. During this time he wrote to his family telling them that "the Turks are still about 70 yards (64 m) away from us" and asked them not to worry about him as "I am doing splendid over here".

Throughout his time in Gallipoli, although his family were writing to him, Martin did not receive any letters from home due to a break down in the mail system.

Following a period of cold temperatures and heavy rain Martin contracted enteric fever (typhoid) in the trenches. After suffering mild symptoms for about a fortnight during which time he refused treatment, he was subsequently evacuated to the hospital ship *Glenart Castle* on 25 October 1915 after he developed diarrhoea. He died of heart failure that night, at the age of 14 and nine months, and was buried at sea the next day. At the time of his death only Martin's parents and his best friend, Cec Hogan—who was himself only 16—knew Martin's real age. Nevertheless, on 18 December 1915, Melbourne's *Herald* newspaper reported Martin's death in an article titled "Youngest Soldier Dies".

Honours and awards

Martin was awarded the 1914–15 Star, the British War Medal, and the Victory Medal. His name is recorded on the Australian Memorial at Lone Pine and on the Australian War Memorial roll of honour in Canberra.

Private James Charles Martin, the youngest ANZAC to sacrifice his life, and the many other brave men will always live on in histories page.

The single biggest topic on many community members minds at present is the imminent closure for quite some time (a number of weeks) of the St Marys Pass.

No one denies that it is essential, given the most recent water damage but it makes it no more palatable does it?

For a lot of folk this 5.8 kilometres of bendy historic road is their daily link to or from the coast and is the only viable option. It disappoints me to think that other than us locals, not too many people with the power to make a real difference on this important matter seem to be genuinely considering the long term options for this region. Is it being put in the "too hard basket"?

It has to be asked whether it's time to lobby State and Federal politicians for a solution that will give more certainty of travelling around this region. Our biggest problem is that we don't have a larger voting population. If this Pass existed closer to a major population base the pollies would be bending over backwards to find money or make election promises to fix the issue quite quickly. Of that I am certain.

What makes things worse this time round is that Elephant Pass also has issues involving it's structural integrity, so let's just pray that during the coming weeks we don't cop another substantial rain event. That has to be a real and potential

As many of us know the Forestry/Upper Scamander option is also fraught with safety concerns. It was never meant for periods of extended use by general traffic as indeed is the Upper Scamander road. Traffic meeting in certain places there are not ideal to put it mildly. For those of us who only need to make periodical trips it is not such a problem but for a substantial number of commuters, not least our schoolkids, who need to get to work or school it is a real problem and not popular at all.

Regardless of the outcome of this repair about to happen it is AN ABSOLUTE MUST that we demand our elected representatives that EVERY OPTION is explored thoroughly because we all know this won't be the last time St Marys Pass will be out of commission... I think we are worthy of serious and meaningful consideration in the long term. Aren't we?

I have written to momma separately with words of comfort and laughter knowing full well that my letter is filled with deceit. You and I sister, have shared too many years together for me to even try in a letter to protect you from the horrors I see and feel.

Just yesterday I came so close to meeting my maker... he took instead my close friend Jimmy. I feel sick at heart when I recall the promise he told me he made to his wife... that he would one day be home. Little does she know that he will never leave this place.

I am sorry for exposing you to my feelings of grief, but I have no one else with whom I can share my darkest moments. Please pray for me Kathleen and my many comrades that one day soon we will walk upon homeland soil.

Give my love and best wishes to little Tommy and Bernard...and god bless.





Campaign to reduce problem gambling

The State Government has launched a \$412, 000 community education campaign to help Tasmanians avoid gambling addiction and big losses on poker machines. The Minister for Human Services, Cassy O'Connor, launched the new problem gambling prevention campaign last week, aimed at revealing the pitfalls of on-line gambling and poker machines.

"The prevention campaign aims to stop gambling problems from developing in the first place," Ms O'Connor said.

"Poker machines alone took more than \$215 million in losses out of the pockets of Tasmanians last year, and research shows that many of these people come from areas of socio-economic disadvantage.

"The bottom line with problem gambling is that it is often those who can least afford to pay, who pay the most.

"This education campaign debunks some of the myths about on-line gaming and poker machines and hopefully will save many gamblers from becoming addicted."

Ms O'Connor said two television commercials lead the campaign, covering how to avoid trouble with poker machines and online gambling, in particular offshore casino and poker websites.

"This campaign is based on recommendations from the Productivity Commission that the States look at improving consumer understanding of the risks.

"It is alarming that many people believe poker machines are eventually due to make a big payout – in fact, there's always a 10 per cent house edge working against the punter.

"That's 10 percent of every bet that gets kept by the machine. So the more you play, the more you lose."

The Productivity Commission also recommended that advice to players and community education campaigns should concentrate on the cost of play and the amount being lost.

The advertisements have commenced on Tasmanian television. The campaign also has press, radio, cinema, posters and brochures.





PRECIS OF SERVICE

We operate a community legal service and our lawyers have recognised that there is a general need for an increased level of "Legal Literacy" across the community. "Legal Literacy" is important for everyone and does **not** presume a lack of general literacy skills.

As a result we applied for and received funding from the Tasmanian Community fund for a pilot Legal Literacy Program to be run in 7 North Eastern towns, Beaconsfield, Campbell Town, Deloraine, Exeter, George Town, Scottsdale and St Helens.

The new program will use locally recruited volunteer advocates to assist other locals to resolve issues before they become overwhelming.

For example a person may have a form to complete and return to Centrelink, the tax office, local school, magistrates or family court or a contract or insurance renewal or policy and not be sure of exactly what is required.

Currently many people in this situation take the form to a friend, neighbour, the post office or bank for assistance or just sign the document without fully understanding what it is that they have signed. This can be problematic on many levels; privacy, conflict of interest, confidentiality, time taken from the business approached, possible disastrous consequences and so on.

Using the advocacy service the person will receive assistance and the confidence to deal with the form/issue in strict privacy with implicit confidentiality before the issue they face develops into a crisis.

Where an advocate identifies that there is an underlying legal issue that needs to be addressed by a lawyer then this program provides access to the **free** resources of the Launceston Community Legal Centre.

This all sounds as if it is common sense and that such a service should already be in place....but it isn't.

Volunteers will encourage and empower clients who use their services to build their confidence to see that they can "do it for themselves" wherever possible. Although we expect that legal literacy is something that even highly literate people may need assistance with we recognise that there will be people using the service who will need assistance with their general literacy.

These clients will be encouraged where appropriate to check out the assistance available through their local LINC.

We commend the program to you and ask for your assistance to promote it locally in your area.




