THE PIT PONY

When we look at coalmining today with its state of the art machinery like continuous miners, shuttle cars and conveyor belts, it's hard to imagine that for the first few hundred years the humble pit pony played such an important role in the industry.

The use of pit ponies can be traced back to the 1600s when industrial coal mining first began in Northern England. In some of the deeper shafts around the world ponies were taken down the mines and left there to work until they died. It was much easier to cart the hay and chaff down to the ponies than bring the ponies to the surface to feed. After a time underground it was said the animals would go blind from continually being in the dark, but their instincts would still guide them through the dark narrow tunnels, pulling their skips loaded with coal.

The ponies that worked in the Fingal Valley coal mines were treated a little better, however. They were always brought to the surface after each shift, watered, feed and placed in a warm stable until it was time to return to work.

If you take the time to scrub-bash your way through the undergrowth near the old bank-top at Cornwall, you will find the old foundations and water troughs that were once part of a quite elaborate stable. In its heyday it was home to some dozen or so ponies each spending their working day down the mine and weekends roaming the adjacent paddock. Once or twice each year a couple of ponies would be given a rest and taken to a paddock half way between Cornwall and St Marys. There, for a month or so, they could roam and graze at their own leisure.

It was a favourite pastime for a few kids at Cornwall to sneak over to the rest paddock on weekends or school holidays and go for a ride on the ponies. It would be bareback of course and the bridle would be made up with just a piece of rope slipped over the pony's muzzle. One can only wonder how someone wasn't badly hurt.

Back at the stable the ponies were cared for by Ken Worsley, who was in charge of the stable for 35 years. Ken had a joinery shop just a few hundred metres below the stable and after seeing the ponies were ready for work each morning he would clean out the stable then go to work in his joinery shop until it was time to be back at the stable to see the ponies were watered, feed, brushed down, shod and put in their stalls for the night.

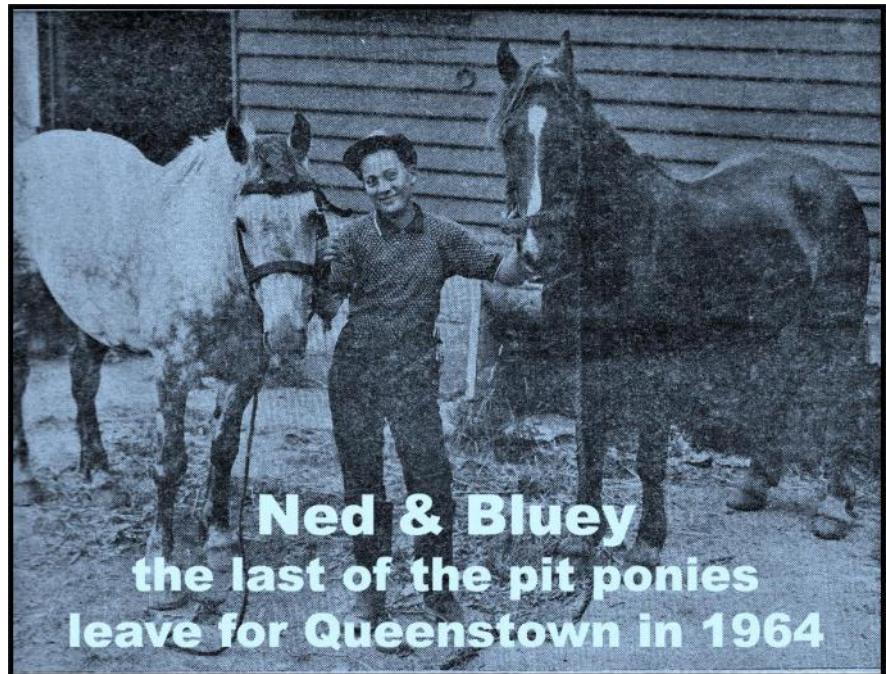
The stable was also a great place for the home gardener. On the way home from the mine in the afternoon you would see many miners carrying a chaff bag full of old hay and horse manure to spread on their gardens. As a result the miners at Cornwall grew some of the best vegetables in the district.

The men who handled the ponies were called "wheelers". These were usually young men and although they would often yell and curse at their pony for most of the day, many would build up a bond with the animal that was likened to a mateship.

The closure of the Cornwall mine in 1964 saw the end of the pit ponies in the Fingal Valley. At that time there were only three horses left in Ken's stable; two were sold to the copper mine at Queenstown and one stayed on for a few months to help with the dismantling of the mine. Where that pony finished up is unclear.

To the old hands of Cornwall the ponies and the stable still hold special memories. To walk through the old stable ruins today the mind wanders and you can still hear the ponies snort, or break wind, or stamp their hooves. You can smell the distinctive aroma of horses, chaff and crushed hay as you look up and read names like Ned, Bluey, Ben, Foley, Robin, and Cardie painted on a board above the stalls. These names are as important to the history of the coal industry as any other and one could argue that they too should be included on the Heritage Wall.

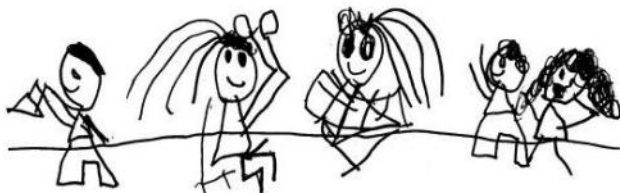

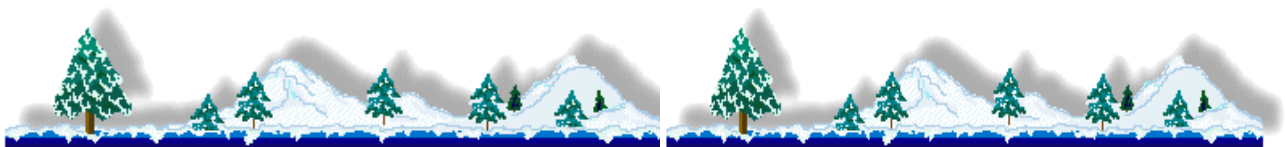

St Marys Pass repair work on schedule

The Premier, Lara Giddings, and Minister for Infrastructure, David O'Byrne, inspected progress on repairing the badly flood-damaged St Marys Pass in Tasmania's North-East. St Marys Pass has been closed to enable the repair work by contractor Hazell Bros to proceed safely at six different sites.

Ms Giddings said the contractors were working in challenging circumstances in steep and confined areas.

"I recognise the inconvenience and frustration the flood damage to these major roads has caused the local community," Ms Giddings said.

"The past summer of heavy rainfall has caused significant damage to infrastructure around the state and the East Coast has been particularly hard-hit.

"While other routes remain open to the East Coast, St Marys Pass is a vital piece of infrastructure to keep the region connected to the rest of the state.

"We need to ensure that residents stay connected and that visitors can reach the area to support local businesses."

Mr O'Byrne said the repair works are expected to be completed before the end of June, subject to weather and ongoing assessment.

"Work on St Marys Pass has commenced first while allowing continued movement of freight and buses from St Marys to the East Coast via Elephant Pass. Freight can also reach the region via the Tasman Highway," Mr O'Byrne said.

"Work on Elephant Pass will begin once St Marys Pass has been reopened to ensure continued direct access from St Marys to the East Coast".

Mr O'Byrne said the Government's current priority is to reopen the existing transport links but work had also begun on identifying long term access solutions to the East Coast.

"This work will be done in close partnership with the Break O'Day Council and recognises existing access from both the North and the South on the Tasman Highway, and from the Esk Main Road via both St Marys Pass and Elephant Pass.

"We will work with Council on the scope of this planning but it is important that it explore not just one route or one option," Mr O'Byrne said.

He said that planning should include:

- the identification of transport issues for the community;
- freight and tourism issues;
- consideration of options for improving the resilience of existing infrastructure;
- options for alternative accesses to be assessed in consultation with Council and the community; and the assessment of opportunities, risks, costs and timeframes of those options.

Ms Giddings said it should not be forgotten that St Helens is well and truly open for business.

"I would encourage Tasmanians and visitors alike to continue to visit and support this spectacular part of our state.

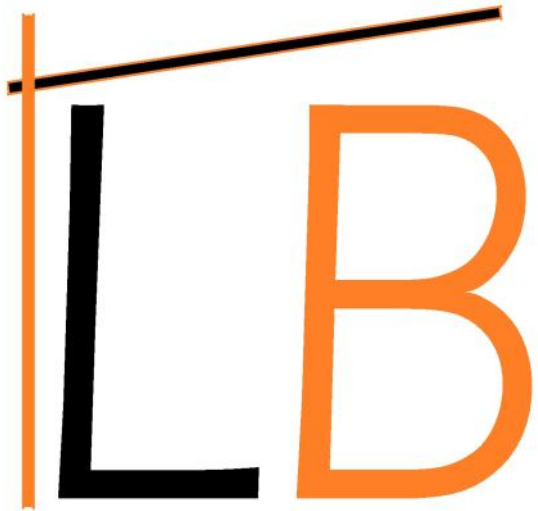
