"Cracker Night"

If you are ever in England around the 5th November, you will no doubt experience Bonfire Night, or Guy Fawkes Night. This is when many towns and villages across the country celebrate the traditional Guy Fawkes Day, with big community bonfires complemented with loud and colourful fireworks.

The tradition of the Guy Fawkes Day goes back to 1605 when a group of English Catholics tried to assassinate King James the First, an ardent Protestant. In the attempt, known as the "Gunpowder Plot", Guy Fawkes was caught guarding a cache of explosives placed under the House of Lords.

Following Fawkes arrest the King allowed the general public to make an effigy of Fawkes and burn it on a huge bonfire. From that day on November the 5th became known as Guy Fawkes Day and the tradition of bonfires, burning of the effigy and the letting off of fireworks continued.

The tradition was also brought to Australia with the early English settlers, but over the years as the new colony grew and developed its own traditions, most States, including Tasmania, moved towards Empire Day, the 24 May, as the best time for a bonfire celebration.



For most of the "oldies" growing up in the 40s and 50s, memories of cracker night are still quite vivid because there were three main events in a kid's life back then: Birthdays, Christmas and Cracker Night. The first week or so of the May school holidays would be spent dragging gum bows from the bush to make a bonfire that would be the biggest and the best in the district. As well, kids would save up their pocket money for months to buy those much sort after fireworks. There would be tom thumbs, big bangers, sky rockets, flower pots, sparklers, po-hahs, thunders, throw downs, Roman candles and of cause there were the colourful Catherine wheels fastened to the trees with nails.

Cornwall was always a good place for bonfires; indeed, most years there would be several burning around the town. One in particular, usually held on what is known as "The Flat" in the centre of town, would follow the English tradition of burning the Guy Fawkes effigy. The dummy was so real that on one occasion as the bonfires was lit a woman came running across the paddock screaming to put the fire out, that someone was on top of the heap.

1953 was a great year for bonfires; the day was moved from the 24th May to the 2nd June to celebrate the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. Bonfires were everywhere and the heavens were lit up with every colour of the rainbow as sky rocket after sky rocket exploded into the sky. Normally peaceful communities came alive with the sound of crackers, some seemingly as loud as a stick of gelignite.

These days fireworks are mostly confined to New Years Eve, with the 24th May coming and going with hardly a bang or a blaze. Perhaps this is partly due to the banning of the unlimited sale of fireworks in Tasmania in the late 1980s. Or perhaps the lobbying from animal lovers, safety concerns by the fire department, or the fact that kids of today have more things to do than build bonfires, had something to do with the cracker night demise. To add to this, the type of fireworks available today have nowhere near the bang, plus you need to obtain a licence to purchase, as well as provide an approved area to let them off.

Whatever the reasons it would appear that Empire Day is completely forgotten today and will never return in its former glory. Australia Day on the 26th January has taken over with quite different types of celebrations. But for those who still remember Empire Day, I'm sure they will tell you that a BBQ and a beer is nowhere near as much fun as Cracker Night.

Public meeting report. Janet Drummond

The State DIER (Department of Infrastructure, Energy and Resources) held a public meeting to keep the public updated with the progress of the works on St Marys Pass and Elephant Pass on Monday 6th June at the St. Marys Town Hall.

The meeting was well attended by members of the community who were keen to hear about the progress of the works being conducted.

It was explained that works on the St Marys Pass are currently slightly ahead of schedule but this status can change at any time, depending on the weather conditions in the area. The completion date was left at June 21st but if the St Marys Pass were to open prior to that date, the community would be given plenty of notice of the new date. Photographs of the work were displayed for the community to look at.

Once the work on the St Marys Pass is completed there will be an ongoing audit of the work that has been conducted and of the Pass in general. Works will be conducted as required to maintain the status of the Pass in good condition.

The Elephant Pass will be closed once the St Mars Pass is reopened and work will commence on the Elephant Pass. Further community meetings will be called as deemed appropriate by DIER

It was great to read recently that the Council was well and truly looking at being involved and investigating the proposed new Community Building at the historic Railway Station. This, in my humble opinion, is what Councils should be doing as one of their priority roles. Councils first and foremost should act in a way that encourages and supports developments that value-add to the community, provided of course it is financially sustainable, safe and wanted by the vast majority of that precinct it affects.

I personally know the people involved in the re-development strategy and I'm certain that if it all comes together as time proceeds then it will be a fantastic addition to a town (St Marys) in particular that will support and use such a facility well into the future. Of course this proposal is just that at present, and needs to go through consultation processes but with such things receiving due diligence it will show that this re-development will be fantastic for all of us.

Councils regularly get bagged (including me in this column) at times and on occasions they probably deserve it but in all honesty they do a pretty good job most of the time. This is a prime example of what Council can do. Let's just hope that a mass of building and budget interferences don't slow up the construction and usage of this new Centre too long into the future. Congratulations to ALL involved so far on a wonderful project and one day I'm sure it will be a beacon to get travellers to call in at and check out some of the fabulous local talents and incredible hospitality.

This of course brings up another matter. As it's been a while since mentioned I have been wondering about how things are going in regard to the Exhibition Hall as part of the St.Marys Recreational Ground Facilitation Committee Report completed in October 2006, which was adopted by Council in December 2006. Council was impressed with the report and supported the three recommendations. These three main areas that were key to the report were:

1.)Shower / Toilet Facilities (completed) 2.) Camping ground caravan short stay facility (well on the way to completion) and thirdly upgrading the Exhibition Hall which has yet to begin renovation but hopefully this will come to fruition not too long into the future because like the Railway Station concept this would allow community groups somewhere to run all sorts of things too diverse to mention here.

With all this done and including a 12 month Swimming Pool facility, already greatly improved short stay camping, arts/ cultural opportunities (Railway Station) etc. in place, St Marys could become not just a great place to stop for a little while, but indeed it could become a place where people from away set as a destination to do and see things, but locals could also long and short term benefit from at the same time. Wouldn't that be a great outcome on all sorts of fronts.




