THE MIGHTY TIGERS ROAR!

Our third game of the season was played under lights at Windsor Park in Launceston last Saturday night. Our opponents were Sorell, a team St Marys played in it's very first Masters game at Campbelltown early last year. That time, St Marys went down narrowly so we thought we might be in with a chance this time.

The game started at a cracking pace and it was frantic end to end football. Sorell scored the first goal but St Marys quickly responded with a great snap from Darren Jones and from the sidelines you knew it was going to be a close game. Sorell were relentless in attack and had a couple of quick on-ballers constantly firing the ball into their forward line, but the St Marys boys were rock solid in defence and repelled attack after attack. Gary Cooper, Chris Turner and Michael Cooke were in everything, diving into packs and clearing the ball to players running past. The teamwork, talking and backing up were superb and you could really sense the boys bonding into a well drilled and disciplined team. St Marys managed to keep their nose in front and by half-time were a goal up.

The boys continued in the same vein in the second half. Erin Carr was simply superb in both attack and defence and became the go-to man in the centre. "Carrie" is a big man yet to see him scoop up the ball with one hand, side step a couple of opponents and then drill the ball 50 metres into the forward line was a sight to behold. Chris Smithurst continued his strong performance in the forward line and managed to kick a goal with his very first kick in his shiny new boots. What a great acquisition Chris has been to both the town and the team. Paul Whitecross was everywhere and so many times backed up his team mates and ended up on a long clearing run. "Zippy" was also in the thick of things and like all great players always seemed to have that extra half second to gather and clear the ball. The teamwork was fantastic; handpasses over the top to players in the clear or running past. Accurate short passes and great leads, strong marks, backing up and talking - it was all there and everyone I spoke to after the game commented on what an entertaining match it was. St Marys just got better and better and kicked away in the last quarter to win comfortably 6.7. 43 to 3.3. 21. While it was a relatively low scoring game it was more of a reflection of great attack and solid defence from both teams. It really was a great game of football and the only sad point was that the good folk of St Marys didn't get to see their team really hit their straps and perform at such a great level against worthy competition.

Goal kickers – Darren Jones 3, Ray Squires 1, Chris Smithurst 1 and Roger Salter (who bravely came off the bench with a crook hamstring) also kicked 1. Best Players – Man of the Match performance from Erin Carr. Other outstanding performances from Paul Whitecross, "Zippy", Chris Smithurst, the evergreen Michael Cooke (until an injured knee forced him from the ground) and Darren Jones who was deadly around and in front of goal. What a joy it was to see the boys in a huddle singing the team song; they like everyone else at the ground knew they had put in a great performance.

Next game is a double header at St Marys on Sunday 24 July where we will be playing a joint Sandy Bay/Claremont team. Watch for further details.

Thanks to the Dawson boys for running the water, Craig Freiboth for a great performance as umpire and a special mention to Bradley Mitchell who stood on the sideline for the whole St Marys game as an emergency reserve and then volunteered to help out as an umpire in the second match and did a great job. Thanks also to Roger Donald for the use of his mini-bus.

FINGAL SCHOOL

With the Fingal School threatened with closure, it is interesting to look back on the history of this wonderful institution. One important fact to be remembered is that the main building has been a large part of the lives of children and parents of the Fingal community for 127 years.

In the mid nineteenth century, Fingal was the hub of the Fingal Valley. It was there that the Police District was administrated and where all births, deaths and marriages were registered. It was also the headquarters of the first council, formed in 1863. It is no wonder then that the first public school in the Fingal Valley was founded at Fingal in 1856. By this time the Probation System at Fingal had finished and the Probation



buildings were used by other Government organisations, including the school.

Although the Probation buildings were rather elaborate structures, it appears few organisations wanted to share the space and all worked to have their own buildings erected. The Council was the first to move out when the foundation stone for a Town Hall was laid in 1882. The school followed a couple of years later in 1884. All of which points to a very busy time in the building industry at Fingal around that time.

To add to the council and school buildings, the Fingal Hotel was built in 1844, Holder Brothers Store 1859, St Peters Anglican Church 1867, St Josephs Catholic Church 1880, St Andrews Presbyterian Church 1881 and the Railway Station 1886. Whilst all this was going on the Prince of Wales Hotel and stables were under construction, plus the Probation Station was being dismantled and the stones relocated to build the Tasmanian Hotel, now the Neighbourhood House.

Like many other buildings in Fingal the school and master's residence were constructed from freestone taken from a nearby quarry. The proof of strength and durability of this material, coupled with the craftsmanship of the tradesmen, can be seen today when we look at these building still standing proud and sturdy, with little effects of passing time.

When the new school opened in 1884 it boasted an enrolment of 65 students, with one teacher and one assistant. The student numbers have not changed all that much over the years, but today from grade 7 on they have to travel to St Marys.

As the school has developed, playground facilities have been improved and new classrooms erected, but the original structures have been preserved, making the learning precinct one of only a handful in Tasmania with a nineteenth century history. This in itself, one would think, has enough merit to keep this school open.

But a school in a country town is much more than bricks and mortar; it is the life of the community. It is a place where infants first lean to interact and go on to gain those fundamental qualities necessary for future learning. Where better, can early schooling take place but their own town, in their own environment, being taught by friends and neighbours they have known most of their lives. By the time they do have to hop on a bus to travel to St Marys they have had a good basic education, making them much more able to cope with a larger, unfamiliar campus.

One can only imagine the fight the Fingal people had almost 130 years ago to get a school in their town. Today circumstances are quite different, but again the people have to stand together and fight, this time to keep what their ancestors built. Let us hope the Government of 2011 is as compassionate as the Government of 1856 and does not close what is not only part of Tasmanian history, but imperative to the current 50 plus students, their parents, teachers and, indeed, the town in which they live.

Few communities in Tasmania would have lost more industry, or businesses and services than Fingal over the past couple of decades. The "Heart of the Valley" is much weaker these days and now to lose their school for a mere pittance of what it would save the Government is a tragedy. The community can ill afford another loss, particularly one that will surely have adverse affects on the children.

Dear Valley Voice,

Thanks to Dr Alison Bleaney and her concern about water quality in the George River, St Helens residents now enjoy some of the purest tap water in Tasmania. This is because almost no other water supply in the state has an activated carbon purification system fitted to the intake.

Last year after the *Australian Story* program: Something in the Water went to air, the Director of Public Health, Dr Roscoe Taylor took the issue of water quality so seriously that he had an activated carbon purification system fitted.

The state government's Water Panel advised that there is no risk from, and no additional research needed on, the highly toxic foam in the river. Against this advice Dr Taylor spent a considerable amount of government funds (perhaps \$80,000) to further research the water quality of the George River. The two reports he commissioned are yet to be made public.

The recent apology by the ABC regarding the *Australian Story* program Something in the Water did not undermine the original claims made by the program that there are high levels of toxins in the George River and that these most likely have come from a plantation of eNitens.

Rather, the apology referred to 'contextual accuracy and balance' and this phrase related to the views of the state government, which according to Mark Scott, the Managing Director of the ABC, were not sufficiently conveyed in the program.

The state government's views were not conveyed in the program because state authorities would not speak to the program team. The production team did attempt to elicit comment from these authorities, and these attempts were detailed in the credits at the end of Part 2. It is unfortunate that ABC management has decided to apologize and in doing so, have unfairly punished their own journalists.

St Helens residents now have some of the purest tap water in the state, thanks to the concerns of the local doctor, Dr Alison Bleaney. However, for those people above the carbon filter there is on-going concern about their water quality as there is for the fish farmers in George's Bay.

The Say Cagerattler

We certainly face some difficult weeks as we watch what takes place regarding the possible closure of the Fingal campus of St Marys District School under the State Government's cost cutting programme.

What really interests me is that twenty schools around the State, generally in rural and remote areas, have been targeted mostly on the grounds of numbers. I've been listening to ABC Radio whereby some of these locations have called in to talkback, to say that their enrolments are either trending upwards or remaining steady. In other cases as documented by way of concerned parents or School Association personnel, some schools mooted for closure have superior NAPLAN results from those that the transplanted students would need to attend. This is after the Education Minister and other politicians involved in this exercise have claimed that this is as much about "improving educational outcomes and opportunities" as it is for financial savings.

Sometimes I wonder about the people we put in parliament, especially when things like this occur.

Apparently we need to close up to twenty schools to save 24 million dollars over the next four years to help repair a 1.2 billion dollar budget black hole over four years. So for us to save around a tiny 2% (24 million dollars), we need to displace all these students if my maths is somewhere near correct. That equates to 6 million dollars a year out of 300 million dollars a year in simple terms.. REALLY WORTHWHILE isn't it? Get this... if each of the half a million or so Tasmanians were to put a five cent coin into a jar each day for 2 years and 219 days, equating to about \$48 at that time, then gave it to the Education Minister, we would have the 24 million dollars to secure the schools savings amount. THAT'S thirty five cents a week per Tasmanian. What about that?

In my opinion and I'm sure just about everyone else's for that matter, one of the prime needs for our young people is to provide all with as much of a stress free education as is possible. Making students (especially really young ones) have to endure maybe up to 45 minutes each way bus trips, five days a week for most, if not all their school years, and still learn all they need to, seems a little shortsighted when based essentially on a short term financial dilemma that we seem to be in at present. There must be a better way.

To be totally fair though, there might be one or two of the identified schools that come under threat due to extremely low numbers or lack of educational programmes, but surely shared resources or joint days with nearby schools might be an alternative. I trust all this would be fully investigated first before the doors close for the last time.

Another valid issue is infrastructure. It has been mentioned more than once by those involved in many of the schools that the BER (Building Education Revolution) was of great benefit adding much needed amenities, buildings, and equipment to their school, now seemingly on the chopping block. In many cases this is half a million dollars or more. It seems that should that school end up closing, this infrastructure would be gifted to the community and local council. What if they can't afford the upkeep? Otherwise it will be put up for sale and lost forever in the main. Once again a bit shortsighted, I'd suggest.

An over-riding theme with ALL OF THE SCHOOLS talked about in the media, not least Fingal is that these schools are mainly in small farming/rural communities where that school serves as a meeting place and a social hub for the whole area, and to lose this facility will only add to a sense of the community breaking up to a degree.

It's not just those twenty schools that are forced to change. What about the schools that take on the students from the closed schools. There is space, bussing, staffing and overall management issues involved there too of course, so essentially this needs to be a much wider decision by EVERYONE who is affected by any of these closures. It would affect a lot of people in all sorts of ways.

This is why we need to send a message to Parliament that school closures really need to be the LAST OPTION on the table and not just to save a few measly bucks in the whole big picture. Let's hope this ends up being the case.

It is a relief that the St Marys Pass is now open. Business in St Marys can now get back to normal winter trade and St Helens should benefit too, as the flow of goods to and from the coast can take the shorter route. The crew who worked on the Pass deserve a hearty pat on the back for a job well done. They worked from dawn to dusk to achieve the repairs and open the Pass ahead of schedule.

That's the good news now the bad.

The State Government has decided to look at closing some schools that fit into a selection criteria, when this is done they well then go into community consultation phase.

I feel that this is being done backwards and not all sides of the question are being looked at. To this end, I moved an emergency motion at the Council Meeting on Monday 27 June 2011; this was passed by all Councillors. Below is the motion.

Notice of Motion- Council Meeting 12 July 2011- Cllr Johns

That Council calls upon the State Government to reconsider its decision to close Fingal campus of St Marys District High School.

SUBMISSION IN SUPPORT OF MOTION

The closure of these schools will have an impact on the travel time for the students.

The statement by Minister McKim -"that no student will travel anymore than 40 minutes." is incorrect.

This statement is making light of the fact that this is only from school house to school house, some students live beyond the school house: e.g. a student living in Mathinna is 30 minutes from Fingal School. If this student were forced to travel to St Marys, another 30 minutes away then all up they are travelling for 60 minutes each way.

The economy of small settlements could be affected by these closures, as much needed cash flow will diminish as teachers and staff move from the closed schools. A knock on effect could develop as other businesses are forced to down-size or worse, close.

Surely there are better ways to reduce expenditure on small school and still keep them open.

Uncertain Future for Nine Lyons Schools

Federal Member for Lyons Dick Adams was shocked to learn that nine schools within the Lyons electorate face uncertain futures under the 2011/12 State Budget.

Bracknell Primary, Avoca Primary, Glenora District High School, Westbury Primary, Kempton Primary, the Fingal Campus of St Marys District High School, Mole Creek Primary, Sassafras Primary and Meander Primary all face uncertain futures.

"In the unfortunate event that all nine of these schools do close, more than 500 students will be without a school to attend, over 50 teachers without a job, and more than 50 support staff, including cleaners, teachers aides and office staff will be out of the job", Mr Adams said.

"This will also mean that \$3.8 million of BER funding will have been wasted", he added.

Mr Adams said that while these schools might have small enrolment numbers, they were nonetheless vital to the communities in which they are located.

"In some rural areas populations tend to peak at about 200, and student numbers in these schools make up a considerable portion of the town's residents. This should not dissipate the importance of the education that those students receive", Mr Adams said

Mr Adams also added that closing schools would add extra costs to communities, with some students having to leave their local communities to attend school, there will be gaps.

"A number of students hold after school jobs in local businesses. If students have to leave their local communities to attend school, local businesses will soon find that they no longer have the after school help that many local businesses rely on," Mr Adams said.

Mr Adams also added that closing schools would mean extra transport would need to be found to get students to the nearest school.

"For a number of communities, this is simply not possible, and where it is, the cost of getting that transport has to be considered", Mr Adams added.

"There are a number of students who live in far flung areas of the Derwent. If Glenora District High School closes, that will mean these students will have to travel greater distances or move to New Norfolk to complete their high school education", Mr Adams said.

"This is a strain that neither parents nor students should have to feel", he added.

Mr Adams also questioned a statement made in 2007 that said under the Future Schools Fund no small regional or remote schools would be closed.

"This is the complete opposite of this promise, and is a slap in the face for parents in rural areas of Tasmania who only want the best education for their children", Mr Adams said.

Mr Adams also said that while small student numbers were being brought into question, he says that this is not a bad thing for students in regards to having one-on-one time with teachers.

"Smaller class sizes means teachers can spend more quality time with each student to ensure that they are getting the best education and the latest technology allows them to interact with the rest of the world. This is where schools in Lyons have an advantage.", Mr Adams said

Mr Adams said that education is something that is very important to him, and it seems ironical to him that all these schools are around timber towns.

"Give us more timber and the schools will be viable!" he said.

"This is not the end. I have always believed that all students, whether they live in rural or suburban environments, deserve to have the best education possible. These nine schools are certainly no exception. I will do everything in my power to ensure that these schools are not closed", Mr Adams said.



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

My first trade was Landscaping and Paving which was awesome to have a go at. The guy was helpful with telling us how to get into this trade.


My next one was Barista with Tim Jaroz who comes out to our school to show us the art of making a great coffee. I made a Latte


