## Land Gift

In a small informal ceremony at the Falmouth Community Centre on January 7, 2013 the Schier family of Falmouth made a generous offer to the Tasmanian Land Conservancy (TLC) and the North East Tasmania Land Trust (NETLT).

The Schier family signed over to TLC and NETLT the gift of a 50 acre block of land. This block is completely forested and is located on the north side of the North Sister and surrounded on three sides by Forestry reserve. It will have a conservation covenant placed on it and will now become a reserve in perpetuity.

Jane Hutchinson, the CEO of TLC was present at the ceremony along with members of the NETLT. Jane thanked the Schier family for their generosity in freely giving this land and congratulated them on their commitment to preserve the natural values of forests in the North East.

Jane said she hoped this generous gift by the Schier family would be a beacon for other north east land owners to follow.

The Schier block has many conservation values on it, being home to a range of rare and endangered species and as well as hosting many old blue gums that are ideal nesting habitats for the endangered Swift Parrot.

The title of the Schier reserve will be held by TLC while the yearly management duties such as weed control and rates will be the responsibility of the NETLT.

### Letters to the Editor Vol. 45 No 18, February 14, 2013

Answer to -These are my views only, Cllr Reon Johns. 13<sup>th</sup> Dec 2012.

I wish to make it quite clear that I don't intend making this an on-going slanging match.

Sorry Mr Johns, I didn't overlook anything that was as I thought necessary, to the explanation that I was getting across.

I was ask by some of the public to clarify our position, as they said that you were saying that the Railway building was bought for the Society and we had let you down by not occupying it. Well Mr Johns, we are not here to be dictated to by you, just because you talked the councilors into buying the building without any proper consultation with the prospective users.

I quite realise that you attended a meeting with Sue Atkinson and members of the Cranks and Tinkerers regarding funding. From that meeting, I got a phone call from Ian Summers and from Peter Troode, asking if I could meet at the Cranks and Tinkerers Museum, because they had an exciting prospect for funding. So Jim Haas and myself attended at the time requested, to find that Sue Atkinson was in attendance. I had already had dealings with Sue regarding a Probus trip. Bill Targett was also in attendance. Sue envisaged that the Cranks and Tinkerers, who were not incorporated, would need to be accepted under the Historical Society Incorporation, to have any chance of getting funding, and if we jointly applied for funding it would be a staged application, with the society applying for funding for the Railway building first, and then when The Cranks and Tinkerers were ready they would be stage two. Sue was quite confident that it had a good chance of being funded.

But then after some time, and from a meeting of our Society, I called in to see how Cranks and Tinkerers were going with their side of the application, only to be told be Ian that we would have to go our own way as they had taken a different direction and was going to incorporate. And somewhere along the way some smart person had told the real-estate agent that we were interested in the building and they put the price up by \$20.000 dollars.

Yes, we did know that you had contacted Darlene Wright, and I felt that you were probably being a bit pushy as Darlene had a sentimental value towards the Railway. That is why I contacted you, only to here you say that you didn't know who the President was. What a lot of Twaddle.

At the March 2011 meeting of Council, you had a 03/.11.7.2 Notice of motion-Railway Park, Clr R Johns.

That Council set aside a parcel of land PID 2777630 commonly known as the "Railway Park" to accommodate a building to house and display an eclectic mix of interesting and historic items. (Presumably for Cranks & Tinkerers)

This matter was moved to CLOSED Council pursuant to Section 15(2)(e) of the local government act meeting procedures regulations 2005.

So I can only assume that you amended that motion or somehow moved another motion, which set the moves to purchase the Railway Building.

Because after the meeting I have no doubt that you would remember getting your mate at St Marys to ring me to say that Council was going to purchase the railway. Presumably this was because it was a closed council matter, and you shouldn't have let it out.

Then when council did purchase the building, we tried to find out what the conditions of occupancy would be, but no one wanted to give an answer.

So the Society on the 18<sup>th</sup> April 2011 wrote a letter to the then Mayor Robert Legge, requesting a meeting for any groups, who were contemplating use of the railway precinct, and the council can outline their expectations for the ongoing management of this precinct, including the Old Railway building.

Yes the meeting was arranged, and we all had input, but Council decided that a Business plan would have to be drawn up (I don't disagree with that) but has it ever happened, and then I suppose a strategy plan would be in order to see why they have a business plan.

At that meeting the Society proposed that we establish a Memorial in the Precinct for the Convicts who worked on, and built the St Mary's Pass.

We are still waiting, I suppose for the business plan.

I suggest Clr Johns that you get something moving, so we can get this project going. The late David Clements proposed a memorial for these convicts. We are getting older, but would like to see it happen in our time.

Hoping that you get my point this time. End of story.

# New Lease of Life for St Marys Cranks and Tinkerers Museum

Quietly and without fuss, St. Marys resident Ian Summers has done the mammoth task of relocating a unique collection of historic memorabilia out of temporary storage into a 'new' venue. After having to move out of the museum's previous premises early in 2012, his submission to Council was successful, and the St. Marys Railway Station is now home to a fascinating array of items. Ian and his wife Rita have been collectors for many years, and they are sharing their finds with the public once more, along with many other items loaned by members of the community.

The focus of the museum is trains, as befits the new setting. This includes a clockwork train set complete with tracks, and a model electric train with handpainted background and landscaping, assembled by Rita's late father, John Niebuur. Many of John's train modelling magazines are also on show.

Darlene Squires has contributed some of her collection of significant railway memorabilia, and the St. Patricks Head Historical Society has set up a display of photographs of the railway in its heyday. The station's close connection with the mining industry is acknowledged, too, and includes large handmade wooden casting moulds and other items.

The museum also gives an important insight into the everyday lives of the railway and mine workers. Many domestic objects, which would have been in their homes at the time, are featured. Examples include a cream enamel kitchen stove, cooking utensils and appliances, radios and radiograms, storage tins and old dressers. The workers' leisure pursuits are also represented by an abundance of models, vintage cameras (including a giant wooden camera from the 1800s), old magazines, books and much more. Even their children are represented, with vintage toy brick sets, comics, matchbox cars and a meccano set in its original box.

It is a unique place to visit, not least because it is mostly hands on. Chairs are pulled up at tables piled with books, magazines and comics so visitors can browse at their leisure. Ian's seemingly unlimited knowledge about the objects on display also provides visitors with fascinating insights into local history and what life was like for earlier generations.

If it wasn't for Ian's dedication and passion, and his willingness to give his time for free, this museum wouldn't exist. In addition, many unique items which would have been gathering dust in local sheds or thrown away are now preserved for the future. This rich visual history is a valuable tool in educating our children about life before electricity and information technology, and the ingenuity and skills of people with often limited resources.

Congratulations to the Break O'Day Council for being proactive in ensuring that this museum has been re-opened, and that the building itself is now in active use once more. Thanks must also go to Fingal Neighbourhood House for helping to organise public liability insurance, and to Darlene Squires and the St Patricks Head Historical Society for contributing photographs and other items. Ian is also very grateful for the generous assistance of locals Steve and Richard with the heavier items. Last, but not least, the contributions from the local community of many unique collectibles have been invaluable.

In order to maintain the museum, entry fees will be implemented soon. Until then, visitors are asked to contribute donations which will assist with ongoing costs such as electricity and insurance - a small price to pay for helping to keep this unique enterprise in operation for the future!

#### Make Flowerpots Hold Water Longer:

If your potted house plants dry out too quickly after watering, when you re-pot them, try this simple trick. Tuck a damp sponge in the bottom of the pot before filling it with soil. It will act as a water reservoir. And it will also help prevent a gusher if you accidentally over water.

## The Say Cagerattler

G'day for another year... I hope we can touch on some subjects that affect us and we all have a view on. Once again I ask for you help and responses and will appreciate

any ideas on subject matter. All I ask is that any opinions agreeing or disagreeing on the subject are not abusive to any group or individual, but respectful of an alternative view. Here goes...

RABBITS... Have you ever seen so many scurrying around our yards, nature strips and properties? A well respected local couple asked me to mention this a few weeks ago through this column to see if anything can be done to bring the numbers down. They were right. I have seen for myself rabbits in places I've not seen them before and have asked around many locals on this who all agree we have a bit of a problem.

I suppose it's possible given the new cat control legislation leading one day to fewer undomesticated, feral cats the rabbit numbers may well continue to increase too. It's less than ideal with the damage they do to native fauna but they do kill and eat rabbits I believe which helps in a small way, possibly in some places. With stricter control, micro-chipping and sales restrictions of cats, the concept is to eventually eradicate feral cats which overall is a good thing, no doubt encouraging responsible cat ownership over time.

So, back with the rabbits... I asked one of our long serving councillors the other day if there was any assistance available on that front and he suggested that he would take it on board and have it discussed at an upcoming workshop which would be a good thing.

If they were on farming of forestry etc. land it's not such a big issue as there are approved methods of taking them out of the picture but those methods such as Calicivirus, baiting, trapping and shooting in really close proximity to the town/s is much more risky for kids, native animals and pets of course. Maybe the first thing we can do is try to calculate just how many rabbits exist at the moment and it'd probably shock you if you knew.

The funny thing is that for many in hard times rabbits were a staple diet and for some, one meat that was cheap and easy to get, but now you have to have more tickets than a parking inspector to butcher and sell rabbit meat, precluding most, otherwise who knows, there might be an income for someone to market our bunnies.

All jokes aside, we've got to do some thinking about the rabbits before as they say... "They're breeding like rabbits"...

BUILDING REGULATIONS More on this later but... After talking to a much respected local person hoping to have become an owner/builder well and truly by now, as well as an accredited Master Builder member, both on the same day, I'd be petrified if I had to whack up anything much more than a chook shed these days. On the surface it beggars belief, the red tape, engineers approvals, safety conditions, wind, soil assessments, certain scaffolding and fencing, permits etc. .so you can cover all the deemed necessary requirements. It's got to be easier than this. The Master Builder mentioned it was crippling the industry in so many ways and our own local owner builder was even contemplating not even commencing yet, if at all, unless a bit more assistance ensued. Building should be enjoyable and exciting (certainly is expensive) but not frustrating and annoying. It has to change surely.





## **Transition Town Initiatives in Break 0'Day**

Back in early December the Transition Tasmania Roadshow held seminars in both St Helens and St Marys. In both localities around twenty participants were challenged, informed and motivated to move forward in a more sustainable lifestyle.

This has stimulated a number of small groups which have begun meeting to plan how we can be a more sustainable community. Expect to soon hear more about community gardening, a walking school bus in St Marys, plastic versus calico shopping bags, fresh locally-grown food, "100-Mile Dinners", a Seasonal and Regional Produce Fair and the bulk purchase of items such as solar panels, water tanks and poly-tunnels.

The latter group, with an interest in bulk purchases, would love to hear from anyone in the municipality who might be interested in investing in their homes or shacks during 2013 with the addition of any of the following items: solar panels and power systems, battery banks, solar hot water panels/systems, water pumps, rain-water tanks, or poly tunnels for their gardens. If we can find enough customers we will be in a position to ask for quotes for a bulk discount!

Customers wanting these items will not be required to be active in our group. Our research of other communities doing this indicates that generally the organising group firstly finds a group of customers and then approaches suppliers and installers to quote for a bulk order. Each customer pays the supplier/installer directly.


Other Tasmanian communities have been very successful in this regard. By May 2010 the South Hobart Solar Group were able to celebrate the completed installation of more than 150 household solar power systems (valued at \$1.7 million)

in and around South Hobart! Currently a number of Tasmanian communities are facilitating bulk buying, such as the Transition Derwent Poly Tunnel Purchase group.

"Tasmania must not repeat the mistakes that were made after such recent natural disasters as Cyclone Yasi in Queensland and the ACT bushfires, where long-term damage was done to their tourism industries because the damage inflicted was talked up and those areas left unscathed not promoted," said Federal Liberal candidate for Lyons, Eric Hutchinson.

"I note the Tasmanian Government has announced that it

plans to do more to market the State in the wake of these fires, but tourism operators need urgent action, not words. They are open for business and they need the public to know
