The Say Cagerattler

First of all , a big welcome to our new Editor of the Valley Voice , Wendy Dawson from Cagerattler....and a huge thank you to Judy and Maisie over the past seven years putting up with my myriad of mistakes in The Say. Wendy , you don't know what you're going to have to put up with from me....

The ABT Wilderness Railway....In recent days there's been some hope that this iconic attraction and on many visitors 'to do in Tassie' list might yet continue on after April this year. When the announcement was made a couple of weeks or so ago , rail enthusiasts gasped with disbelief that such a thing could occur, me included.

The main reason was the need for expensive 'below the rails' refurbishment that had a figure of about fifteen million dollars chucked up, then it was mentioned that about six million dollars was more realistic. How long is a piece of string ? Regardless of the cost, the finger pointing , whose responsibility it is, whatever, the single most important factor is that it doesn't close at all. It does however open up many more questions, maybe even solutions to the long term success of the Wilderness Railway.

This week I listened to an interview with the owner/operator of the Ida Bay Railway who, although sympathetic to the ABT's plight , also mentioned that not much help came to her when she commenced the IBR some years ago, and not even \$50,000 could be sourced...but thanks to great helpers , private financial benefactors and some use of superannuation, the IBR began and continues to operate now quite well. We also have The Don River, Derwent Valley Wee Georgie Wood and others that similarly seem to run quite well but rely heavily on the expertise of loyal volunteers for this to occur.

I looked up the pricing on the ABT and without knowing the operating details, the ticketing seems quite expensive. This said however, no doubt the experience and service , food , beverages and commentary are first class indeed.

One of the news stories quoted a drop in clientele from 45,000 per year at one stage to a substantially lesser 30,000 currently. Could the expense of getting there and the high end ticketing have an effect, or are there other reasons ?

At this stage no new lease has been issued so a possible option would perhaps be something akin to other Tasmanian tourist rail services, with emphasis on voluntary operations restricted to weekends for a while.

It's understood that both Federal and State funds will provide the money to do the necessary below the rails work but as they say "No good without a business case" so where to from here ? One of the more fascinating aspects for me though is that this train is still a working one and our famous leatherwood honey makers and other small industries use the train as well for shipments - isn't that terrific . If the line was to re close after 10-12 years, where does it leave them ?.....up the creek too I'd suggest.

For a change, getting the government to help with money was not so difficult, but to find a visionary operator might not be so easy. In the United States there was a very similar situation, with the Durango-Silverton Narrow Gauge that all but went bust in the 1980s I think. With creative thinking it has ended up as one America's best rail trips by steam locomotive, and employs a whole community into the bargain!

Maybe one day the ABT can be the same..

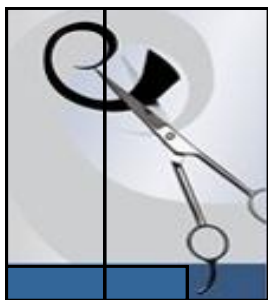

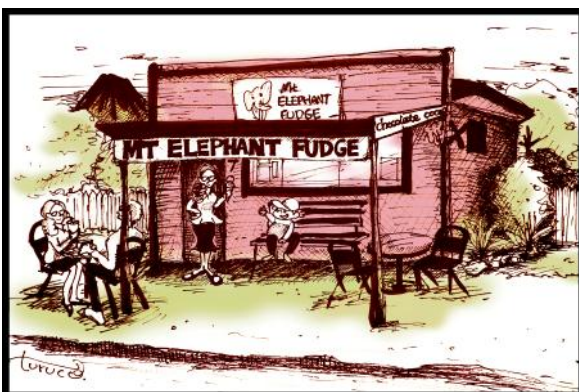

2012 – RAYC in Review

This fledgling not-for-profit community group had an amazing first year. We took enrolments in the first two weeks of opening of more than 30 students; ages ranging from 5yrs to 16yrs. Over terms two and three we maintained this high level of participation; although some left the Company their places were soon filled by new and eager students wanting to learn.

As the ability of local youth became apparent, we stretched the boundaries of our initial plans for our first year and our Artistic Director wrote a full show for presenting to the public. Roles, characters and routines within the show were developed over the months inclusive of ideas from the students.

At the end of the year, with a massive effort from all participants and extensive voluntary support from parents and other community members our “Gala Performance” was presented for one night only to the community.

St Marys Community Hall was filled to capacity – we even had to borrow seats minutes before the opening of the show from Mt Elephant Fudge (including Lizzie’s park bench!) ... as many more than anticipated purchased tickets to watch the youth from our local towns.

Final tally **238 persons seated and standing** were there to watch the very talented cast. And not all were family and friends of the Company members ... many locals were there to support also.

2013 will be a new and exciting year for us. We have determined to take a different approach and this means there will be no end of year main concert. Instead, we are presenting along with our classes, several workshops; where tutors from around Tasmania (and one from interstate) will be here in town to provide specialist knowledge to the community.

We have been invited to present dance & drama works at “National Youth Week” (St Helens) this coming April – what an opportunity for our teenage Youth to demonstrate their talents to the wider public.

We have also been invited to participate in the upcoming “Spring Solstice” which BODRA is currently developing for September 2013.

Break O'Day Mayor Responds to Editorial and Developer's Perspective on BODC's Planning Scheme

The developer's perspective and the editorial suggest that Break O'Day Council and its planning scheme are anti-development.

- This is absolutely untrue and Council has had one of the most flexible planning scheme in the state and Council has worked with many developers to achieve very good outcomes.
- A recent example of a large project is a new coal mine operation at Fingal. This was a multimillion dollar development project with multiple environmental and infrastructure issues and Council worked with the stakeholders to achieve a very constructive and positive outcome.
- Council is very pro-development and understands the benefit to our economy of projects that add to business, tourism, social and employment activity. However, Council does not believe in development at all costs, there is always balance required in achieving development within the accepted parameters of the community's expectation and planning schemes set these parameters.

"Council put obstacles in his way for two (2) years"

- Four (4) months was a result of Council's belief that a revised planning scheme was coming (September 2011 – January 2012).
- One (1) month could be allocated to Council not having a full time Works Manager/ Engineer to respond as promptly as possible to engineering aspects of the development application.
- Late in the planning process, the issue of the stormwater impact of the development application was identified, that is, if the project went ahead, as proposed, the flooding in the main street of St Helens would be increased. An impasse between Council and the developer contributed to the delay, including the developer appealing Council's decision, but this was as much a problem with the developer failing to communicate with Council as it was a failure on Council's part.
- There are state Planning legislation time frames which Council must comply with, which were completely complied with by Council. These are designed to prevent these types of delays and, although it is easy for a developer to blame Council for time taken to progress an application, there are documented records that demonstrate that the actual time taken was nine (9) months, and the reasons for part of this are identified above.

"I have spent \$30,000 without putting a spade in the ground"

- The developer changed design companies several times and instigated an appeal process which was subsequently withdrawn, which could have been avoided by more effectively communicating with Council.
- Council's planning fees for this development application were \$840. Council resources to facilitate this development far, far exceeded these fees.

"Council put obstacles in his way 20 parking spaces, an eight-metre setback ... and a demand to fund stormwater infrastructure"

- Planning scheme requirements were clearly indicated in the planning scheme and his designers should have been well aware of them – set back and parking space requirements.
- The developer was advised virtually immediately of an option to provide a variation to his development that addressed the parking requirements, eliminating the requirement to provide 20 parking spaces. Although this option was identified promptly after Council receiving the application, this was not taken up by the developer until several months later. The variation, when received by Council, was accepted virtually immediately.
- The setback requirement was a part of Council's existing scheme and Council had hoped that this would be rectified in the revision (as identified above). As soon as Council realised that this was not possible, Council amended the scheme to remove the requirement. The state government also cooperated in ensuring that this amendment was fast tracked as much as possible.

- It was identified that the project would add to a problem caused by inadequate stormwater infrastructure and thereby exacerbates the flooding of the St Helens main street. Council did not require that the developer fund the upgrade of Council's entire stormwater system but that it either retain the stormwater within the property boundaries or contribute to that part of the increase in impact on the drainage system. Council worked with the developer to ensure that the contribution should only match the impact created by the development and, in the end, the developer identified a process of retaining the stormwater within the property boundaries.

The "eyesore in the centre of St Helens"

- Councils do not have any legislative power to address an "eyesore". Council can, does, has and will discuss and negotiate with owners to try to achieve good outcomes but does not have the power to just step in and tidy up a block.

- Council does have the responsibility to address fire risks to neighbouring properties arising from untidy allotments. However, Council cannot arbitrarily decide that an eyesore is a fire abatement risk. There are specific thresholds that justify the issuing of a fire abatement notice and until they are met, Council cannot step in.

- There is the statement that machinery was offered to Council to clear the allotment and that Council squandered this opportunity. Council can not authorise a third party to go onto someone's private property, and tidy it up. Council does not have, nor should it have, the right to do this. If someone wants to make such an offer, and it is a very generous and community spirited offer, it needs to be made to the property owners, not Council. 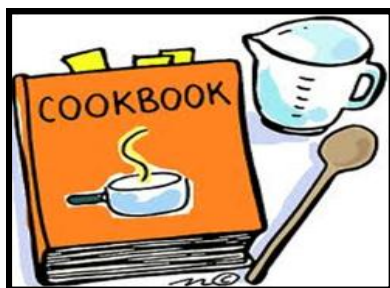

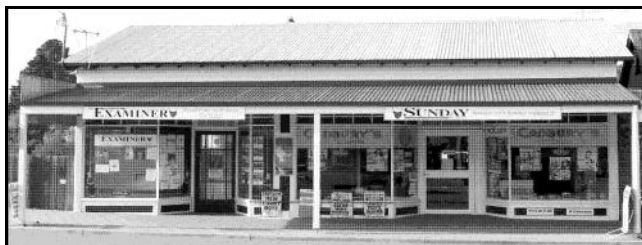
