LEST WE FORGET

In recognition of the national significance of Anzac Day and its meaning to many of us in the community of the Fingal Valley and East Coast areas, this editorial will look back on the history of Anzac Day and its meanings today.

Anzac Day is a time when we remember all those who have served and died in all wars and conflicts. Today many of us will think of individuals in our own lives who have been part of conflict, and those who are no longer with us. The spirit of Anzac has come to represent the qualities of courage, mateship and sacrifice, and is closely linked with Australian national identity.

Anzac Day is the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during WW1. In 1915, these forces formed part of an expedition sent to the peninsula of Gallipoli to secure an area called the Dardanelles for the allied naval forces. The ANZAC forces landed at Gallipoli on this day April 25 and battle ensued; by the end of 1915 over 8,000 Australian soldiers had been killed. The day of the Gallipoli landing has become a pivotal point in the history of Australia, coming to symbolise courage against great odds, companionship, and the conviction to carry out near impossible tasks. When we take part in community activities on Anzac Day we are recognising the strength and bravery it takes to do what we believe to be the right thing. The soldiers who formed those original ANZAC troops were doing something difficult beyond measure simply because they believed it was the right thing to do, and that is what we honour when we celebrate Anzac Day today.

Many cultural traditions have become part of Anzac Day remembrances. Flowers and wreaths are often laid on graves and memorials, symbolising our remembrance of those who have made great sacrifice. In many ceremonies, a very moving and popular stanza from the poem *For the Fallen*, by Laurence Binyon, is spoken aloud. As part of a long military tradition, the Last Post is the bugle call used to signify the end of the day; it is also sounded at military funerals and at commemorative services like Anzac Day and Remembrance Day.

Its symbolism in these situations is to indicate that the soldier has at last completed his or her duty and may rest peacefully hereafter. A period of silence is customary for reflection on those who have served, as a sign of respect, and to give honour to the fallen.

Perhaps the most mysterious and moving element of remembrance around the world is represented by the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. This tradition began in Britain in 1920 when the body of a single young soldier killed at the Somme was chosen from among four and entombed in Westminster Abbey. He could have been British, Canadian, Australian, or New Zealander, but his nationality was of less import than his significance, for he represented all those who were killed in war and the tomb became a focal point for the expression of sorrow, and honour. A similar tradition was begun in Australia in 1993 when the body of an unknown Australian soldier was recovered from France and interred in the Hall of Memory in Old Parliament House.

Every year the Dawn Service is held at the Memorial in Canberra and in 2012, over 25,000 people gathered to participate. Hundreds of smaller ceremonies are held all over the country. Even in today's multicultural climate, virtually all Australians, whether they were born here or chose to become citizens later in life, agree that the ceremony and its significance carries a message that is meaningful to all.

The last Australian to have fought at Gallipoli died in 2002. To date, forty Australian soldiers have been killed on duty in Afghanistan, the last in October 2012.

This is an editorial tribute to all past and present serving soldiers.

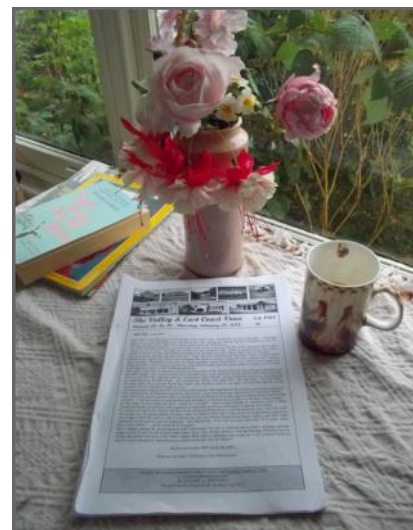

A slight accident occurred on the return journey, owing to a wheel coming off. The train was soon put right, and the party returned to Hobart and Launceston in the evening. All the Ministers were present. The train ran very smoothly. There was nothing important in the speeches, politics not being touched upon.

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Convict Stories from the Valley

Bridget Roarke

Over 100 convict women were assigned as domestic servants to residents in the Fingal Valley region. Some of the women married local men and settled in the area, while others returned to the Female Factories for reassignment or punishment, and served out their sentences elsewhere. Convict women's individual stories offer us rare insights into the not-so-ordinary lives of early settlers in the region. Here is a short story recently uncovered about a young Irish girl and her life in Fingal.

Bridget Roarke was a 20-year-old Irish girl born in rural County Galway; she lived with her widowed mother also named Bridget and a brother Thomas in Roscommon. Bridget was just 4'11" (150cm) with dark brown hair, brown eyes and a lightly freckled fair complexion. Although Roman Catholic and unmarried, Bridget could read and write. At the time of her conviction for theft in 1851, the disastrous effects of famine and disease among the Irish population were still being felt with many families left homeless and destitute. County Roscommon suffered terrible loss of life with the highest death rates recorded in Ireland.

Convicted of stealing clothing at Roscommon on 4th January 1851 Bridget was sentenced to seven years transportation and like many other Irish women and their children sentenced to transportation, was confined in Grange Gorman Gaol in Dublin City for eleven months in terrible conditions, eventually sailing from the port of Dublin on 28th December 1851 aboard the convict ship *John William Dare* for Van Diemen's Land.

Tragically, the five month sea voyage was too much for some of the women and children; many of those in poor health before departure were not strong enough to survive the voyage. Four Irish convict women and two children perished during the voyage. The surviving women and children arrived in Hobart on 22 May 1852.

Bridget was assigned as a country servant to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Alford and family at their residence 'New Prospect' near Fingal. Charles Alford also leased 'Top Marshes' and agricultural land in the region, employing male and female convicts on his properties. John Stokes was one of them. John was born in Bradford, England, and was 21 years old when he was convicted with two other men for housebreaking. John was a literate quarryman, unmarried, and a Protestant with one prior conviction for robbery for which he was sentenced to two years imprisonment in England.

On three occasions John escaped from custody in England, once by running across a corn field, next by jumping over board when imprisoned on a prison hulk and a third time by hiding in a small boat. He was sentenced to transportation for life together with his partners in crime - William Allen and John Gough, two older men who left behind their wives and children and who were never to see their families again. The three men sailed aboard the convict ship the *Marquis of Hastings* arriving in Hobart Town four months later in November 1842.

Bridget and John met, most likely at Alford's property 'New Prospect' where Bridget was in service, and married in March 1855 at the chapel in Fingal. Their first child Hester was born in November 1855 and a second daughter Eliza born in November 1856. By coincidence the Alfords had also celebrated the birth of their second daughter Elizabeth. At that time the Stokes family lived in a hut on 'New Prospect'.

Boxing Day 1856 - Unwelcome Visitors

On the evening of 26th December 1856 at 9.00 p.m., three armed men arrived at John and Bridget's hut and called John outside. They demanded clothing, John's watch and guns, and pointing a gun directly at John's head one of the armed men threatened to 'drop him'. John handed over his watch and explained that he had no money, but that his gun was inside the hut and that the family had one coat to spare, in use covering his infant daughters as they slept. Bridget gave the men a possum skin rug and John retrieved his gun and handed it to the gang leader. The three men then made their way off into the night, leaving John and Bridget shaken but unharmed.

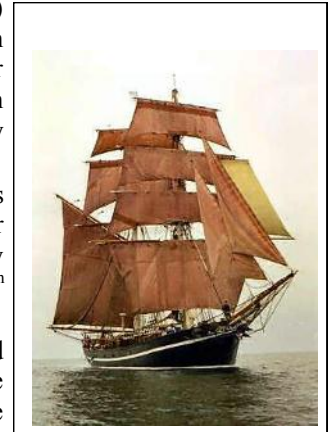
The following day as John and Charles discussed the previous night's events, one of the three men returned to the scene of the crime apologizing, stating that he would not have harmed them and was under the influence of the more threatening leader of the gang. Charles sent for the police and all three men were apprehended. Two were found guilty of robbery and threatening to kill John, and both were sentenced to death by hanging. Following the verdict, John, Charles and others successfully petitioned the Court for leniency for the two condemned men. Their sentences were commuted to eight years imprisonment for the man who had apologized, and life imprisonment for the gang leader.

John and Bridget Stokes went on to have twelve children, all born in Fingal. Charles and Catherine Alford also had more children and life seemed good for both families. However, fortunes changed rapidly and only a few years later, both families found themselves in very different circumstances.

This includes ALL conflicts and peacekeeping times. My uncles witnessed things first hand that thankfully most of us will never have to and I recall basing my address around that. These two ordinary blokes in World War II like many tens of thousands of others travelled to distant places to just try and 'do the right thing' by their country.

In most cases that was the only reason they went. In the First World War, there was for some the sense of adventure and bravado initially but soon the horrors of war, especially during Gallipoli for the Anzacs and later on the Western Front and the Somme, showed these blokes what it truly was. Those who returned home became fathers and saw their sons and even daughters go off to war again only two decades later, which would have tempered a sense of adventure out of them no doubt as the experience did with my uncles...but they still went, still died and still endured maiming and other problems if they came home.

In a way ANZAC Day is as much for the survivors as it is for those who died.

Isn't it great that our country continues to pay our undying respect for all these people who 'did the right thing'? See you at one of our local services.
