Dear Mary,

We were in Tasmania last week touring the East coast, and also trying to locate the whereabouts of my husband's half-sister and family links.

We called at Fingal on Wednesday, and not realizing about the holiday, your Neighbourhood house was not open. We asked around the town but could not find out anything on the Baker family, apart from the grandparents' grave at the Cemetery.

Arthur Baker (from Campbelltown) was born 1783, he married Laura Florence Peck. Their daughter Phyllis May (1903) married Frank's father Frederick Briggs in Melbourne in 1928. Fred had been logging in your area at the time. Their daughter Marjorie was born in Melb in 1929.

They separated and Fred left for the Mallee area in Victoria. We do not know for sure after Phyllis came back to Fingal, whether she stayed in Tassie or came back to Melbourne?

Hoping to get some information from a lady near Campbelltown who has compiled a book on the Baker family but have not heard back as yet.

Hoping you may be of some assistance, as we were disappointed we arrived in Fingal on the wrong day.

New Fruit and Vegetable Taskforce to grow Tasmanian industry March 19, 2014

Scientists resign 'living dead' Australian species to extinction

The dramatic ongoing loss of Australian animal and plant species has prompted influential scientists to call on governments to start making tough decisions

about which ones to save - and which species should be left to face extinction.

The proposal to triage species comes from biologists who say the current focus on saving all of Australia's 1,500 threatened species is misplaced, and believe there should be more emphasis on saving the most vital ecosystems and species.

Professor David Bowman, an expert in environmental change biology, says the difficulty is confronting the notion that not all species are equal.

He says species numbering less than a few hundred in the wild, like the orange-bellied parrot, are "zombie species".

"There are heroic efforts to try to keep it going in the wild. You really have to look at that expenditure and ask 'is this really a smart use of money?" he said.

Pension increase for veterans community in Lyons


Veterans in Lyons will receive a pension increase of up to \$24.20 a fortnight from this week, said Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson. Mr Hutchinson said that the change to pensions started from last Thursday, March 20 as part of the bi-annual pension increase.

"This will help with the increasing costs of living for veterans and their families," Mr Hutchinson said. "The increase will help put money back into the pockets of veterans and their families and will have a flow-on effect on the local economy."

Pensions are calculated on a daily basis so the next pension paid after the increase (on pay day April 3) will be paid partly at the old rate and partly at the new rate. The first full payment at the new rates will be pay day, April 17.

Mr Hutchinson said that veterans in Lyons were among 272,000 veterans, their partners, war widows and widowers across Australia who would benefit from the increase.

Pensions are indexed twice a year in March and September taking account of changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the Pensioners and Beneficiary Living Cost Index (PBLCI) and Male Total Average Weekly Earnings (MTAWE).



JAM's latest excursion



'A red rag in front of a bull'

Nothing seems to stir up public and personal ire more than discussion on politics and religion, and especially a combination of both. Having been involved in political campaigning for the past two months I have found that many people believe Australia was founded on Christian principles, is therefore a Christian country and must abide by Christian beliefs and principles. However I want to issue a challenge by presenting a brief history.

In 1718 the British parliament passed the Transportation Act enabling convicts to be shipped to the American and Caribbean colonies. However, the American War on Independence put an end to this and new dumping grounds needed to be found for the British Isle undesirables. Prisons were overflowing so hulks on the Thames River were used for further incarceration. In all places of imprisonment, conditions were deplorable and diseases uncontrollable.

Between 1776 and 1795, about 1/3 of the 6,000 prisoners on the hulks died, ravaged by sickness. All prisoners were tormented in body, soul and spirit no matter where their place of confinement.

The majority of all prisoners were desperate people who, because of an unjust, inequitable and ignorant society, were forced to steal food and basic necessities in order to survive. Many committed petty crimes such as stealing a handkerchief from someone rich in order to buy food for their family. Unemployment was rampant due to the Industrial Revolution. In order to overcome Britain's social and economic woes, the British Empire declared that new lands had to be claimed for penal colonies. Successful naturalist and merchant Joseph Banks recommended New South Wales. Hence, in 1786, the eastern coast of NSW and adjoining islands were approved. This was the 'perfect solution' - expand the empire with forced labour.

Transportation resumed in 1787. Men, women and children were torn from their homeland, families and friends and condemned to years of hell on Earth. (During the transportation period 25,566 women alone were sent as convicts to populate the new colonies.)

With the arrival of the First Fleet in January 1788 the lives of the people inhabiting the land changed forever. The Aboriginal people became dispossessed people. They went from being independent nations to invaded nations with their lifestyle and cultures decimated.

A history of atrocities, brutality, injustice and mental, emotional and physical abuse to both non-Europeans and Europeans followed this invasion. A nation was formed and governed by power, corruption, control, injustice and inequality by a minority. Words sometimes may have suggested a hint of Christianity but convicts were forced to attend weekly church in an attempt to reform them by making them 'Christians'. Actions, however, were totally contrary to the Gospel of Jesus Christ for His law is love and His message is peace and grace.

In 226 years nothing much has changed from those barbaric beginnings. Power, control and wealth is still in the hands of an elite minority while the vulnerable are exploited and natural resources and environment disrespected.

Racism and religious intolerance and discrimination for anyone different still abounds. The Aboriginal community still waits for the minor compensation of having small but significant cultural sites restored to their custodianship. Asylum seekers are treated as illegals/criminals and detained indefinitely in threatening detention centres. Our society is ravaged by crime, domestic violence and sexual abuse such as pornography. Drug and alcohol abuse, used to alleviate hopelessness, depression and lack of purpose in life is increasing.

A 'don't care, throw away' attitude pervades all areas of our society. Don't all these things trace back to the foundation of un-Christian European settlement?

So what do I see is the role of politics and religion in Australia's welfare? To answer I will quote my daughter Hannah from a talk she gave at a political Christian forum at Longford on February 27th. "Should we expect our government to base their social decisions on Christian ideology, given we are a secular nation? What is the role of government? It is to look beyond belief systems, to protect the vulnerable, ensure everyone has a fair opportunity, ensure resources are used sustainably, ensure sound economic decisions are made and people's rights protected (including the right to have a religion).'

I see the role of religion/church as helping individuals mature in their beliefs by word and action; to encourage a person to be enriched in body, soul and spirit so they can make a better place by promoting and practising tolerance, understanding and love.

Census statistics show that 60% of Australians identify as Christians but does this label tell the truth?

I will challenge you with another quote from Hannah; 'When discussing Christianity and green politics, people often talk about a fear of erosion of Christian values. However, I believe Christian values are more eroded through loss of love, grace, compassion, kindness and generosity - the most basic principles of Christianity.

Nothing undermines religion more than religion itself when it fails to adhere to its core belief system (grace and love) and instead sticks blindly and narrowly to its laws.

I am concerned at the direction our nation is going - that God's destruction will come because we no longer listen to the cries of the poor and needy, our nation is full of pride and greed.'

No matter what the outcome of the state elections, we can as a state and nation progress beyond the dark beginnings of 1788 and together, from 2014 onward, create a better future; a future where religious and political discussions can be respectful, mature and peaceful and not 'a red flag to a bull'. Australia, and especially Tasmania, can be a place where justice, truth, freedom, compassion, understanding, grace and love abound for all people regardless of lifestyle, ideology, religion, culture, political views - whatever!

He reclined on the patio of his luxurious Byron Bay home, watching Julia, his third wife and by far the prettiest, as she tended their magnificent sub-tropical garden. You sign here,' he said, marking the spot with an x, 'and here...and here...Go on,' he said with a grin, 'you've nothing to lose but your immortal soul.' Geoffrey laughed...and signed.




Book Review by Lindy Scripps

This month the Mount Elephant and Beyond Group read *Room* by Canadian writer Emma Donoghue. *Room* is her most critically acclaimed novel and was nominated for the Man Booker Prize in 2010.

The novel was inspired by the case of Austrian Elisabeth Fritzl who was imprisoned in a cellar by her father for 24 years. Among the children born during this period was Felix, five years old at the time of the rescue. As Emma Donoghue thought about this boy's life the story of *Room* began to develop.

Room is told from the perspective of a five-year-old boy, Jack, born during years of captivity to a young woman known only as Ma. Jack's mother was kidnapped seven years earlier at the age of 19. Since then her home has been a soundproofed, reinforced garden shed, 11 feet square (about 3.3m by 3.3m). She is repeatedly raped by her captor, 'Old Nick', a violent and manipulative man.

Jack has never been outside of the shed. All the objects in Room are capitalised – Wardrobe, Lamp, Rug, Bed - as if to emphasise the fact that these are the only objects that Jack knows. Ma has tried to provide Jack with as normal a life as she can in the circumstances. She has developed a routine to fill in the days. Meals are at set times and there is 'phys. ed.' where the two follow a circuit around the room. They make their own toys and games, and there is time set aside for reading and television. Although Ma and Jack watch television, she has persuaded him that only Room is real. At night Jack stays in Wardrobe counting the creaks Bed makes during Old Nick's visits to his mother. Of course he doesn't understand what is going on. Ma has tried as far as possible to protect him from the reality of the situation.



There seems to be no hope of escape, but shortly after Jack's fifth birthday matters come to a head. Old Nick has been out of work for several months and is complaining about the expense of keeping Ma and Jack. He tries to strangle Ma after a minor accident that he holds her responsible for and subsequently cuts off the power to the shed. They have no hot water and no way of cooking food. They rely on Old Nick for everything – what if he didn't come back? Jack also starts to ask questions about things he has seen on TV and Ma begins to tell him that there is a world beyond Room. Ma plans an escape but it all hinges on Jack managing to keep a cool head. After a tense few pages the pair is finally safe.

In the second half of the novel Ma and Jack have to deal with the outside world. Room was Jack's home where he at least felt safe and secure – Outside is another matter. There are all those people, vast spaces, noise, brightness, stairs, and fast cars. He has never known fresh air, the warmth of the sun, rain, objects that are more than three metres away – it's a lot for a small boy to deal with. Emma Donoghue handles this aspect of Jack's development particularly well. Ma on the other hand finds that nobody really understands what she has been through. Her mother wants everything to be back

to normal while her father cannot deal with Jack. The media are particularly intrusive and inane, to the point of offensiveness.

Characterisation is one of the book's strengths. Ma comes across as a brave young woman with great mental tenacity. She has developed coping mechanisms to help her deal with her terrible situation and has managed to create a life for her son, educating him and instilling him with values. There are occasions in Room when she cannot cope and on these days she mentally shuts down. Jack knows she is 'Gone' and plays quietly by himself until she is back in the world again.

Although we do not know much about Ma's captor, (and it's presumably no coincidence that he is called Old Nick, a name for the devil), what we do know is chilling. He went to extraordinary lengths to ensure that the shed-prison is escape-proof, and appears to have been stalking Ma before he kidnapped her. At one stage he tells her how lucky she is to have a room above ground; other girls are kept underground. This reminds us not only of the Fritzl case and similar cases but also of those who never escape.

The decision to tell the story from Jack's point of view was a bold one. At first the language seems somewhat contrived and it takes some getting used to but the reader soon becomes emotionally engaged with the story. Jack's voice as the narrator is generally consistent although there are occasional discrepancies where his understanding seems to be more sophisticated than one would expect of a five-year-old.

Room is original and often moving. However it is an admirable rather than an enjoyable book and at times it is grim reading.

St. Marys adult learner wins an iPad mini

In October 2013 **LINC Tasmania** held a state-wide poetry competition to celebrate **26TEN** week and St. Mary's adult learner Shane Squires won the iPad mini with his Acrostic poem. The Break O'Day area had three prize winners in total. In the limerick category Bill Greer from Mathinna won first prize and Chris Stunden from St. Helens won third prize.

Shane's winning poem for the adult literacy client category 'SKILLS' highlighted the triumphs and the hardships he has experienced in dealing with literacy issues. Shane has been working with St. Helens Literacy Services to improve his skills.

Shane's winning poem is only one of many achievements since working on his literacy skills. He has participated in a state wide Child and Family Conference held in St. Helens. Shane was a guest speaker along with his volunteer tutor, Marie Owens, at a literacy workshop. Fiona Watts the Literacy Coordinator said participants at the conference described Shane as "inspirational, amazing and motivational."

Since joining with Literacy Services Shane has been successful in gaining his White Card, First Aid Certificate, Chainsaw Licence and MAST boat licence. When asked what has changed since getting literacy support Shane replied "Everything, life is much easier, I do the shopping now and I'm keen to read the kids a book when they ask."

Shane and Marie both said that at their first meeting they were quite nervous and didn't know what to expect. Shane was Marie's first adult learner and she said "you do the training but you're just not sure how it will all fit together until you meet your client."

The ownership of the empty dam has not been determined.

TasWater say the dam was transferred to Ben Lomond Water (now TasWater) in 2009 from Break O Day Council. However, it was an abandoned asset which was no longer being used. BLW wrote to Break O Day Council stating that it would not accept the asset and that it should be handed back to Council.

The responsible Field operators were not fully aware of this, and approximately two months ago the dam was reported to have a hole in the wall and was leaking. TasWater staff drained the dam to mitigate the risk of a major piping failure as a result. Operational staff were made aware that the asset was not TasWater's, but is in

Richardsons Rd dam 2014 fact, Break O Day Council's.

The (unofficial) word from BODC is: The reservoir was originally intended to be part of the Break O'Day Council's irrigation scheme, but this idea was abandoned in 1999 due to finding a new bore for town water. As the site was no longer needed for council purposes, it was transferred to Ben Lomond Water (now Taswater) during the asset handover phase. As Taswater no longer needed the asset, it has been deemed "abandoned". The land is managed by Crown Land services, and has the potential to be taken up for use by council or a community organization for public purposes if required (and the obvious risk management of the dam walls would need to be considered). Around two months ago, a resident contacted Taswater to report a hole in the dam - it is believed to have been platypus burrowing through. Taswater drained the dam through a release valve as they believed the dam could be at risk of becoming unstable due to the leak.

Enquiries are now being made to the Crown Land Services. Article and pictures by Ed.

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
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

Lady Gaga's Charity Spends More Money on Legal Expenses Than Actual Grants

The Born This Way Foundation has come under fire after their 2012 tax records show that the charity has spent over \$1.85m in operational expenses while only doling out \$5,000 in grants.

The Born This Way Foundation's 2012 form 990, which names Stefani Germanotta (a.k.a Lady Gaga) as its director, her mother Cynthia as its president and her father Joseph as its treasurer, claimed total revenue of



\$2.66m, \$1.85m of which went to operational expenses. So where did the money go? The 501(c)(3) organization spent \$406,552 on legal expenses, \$348,000 on event production, \$150,000 on philanthropic consulting and \$77,923 on travel. In terms of grants, the foundation lists just one \$5,000 gift in 2012.

Beer batter makes a light and crispy coating for fish, chicken or even pineapple. It leaves the inside of the fish juicy and the outside with a nice crunch. Use your favourite beer! Method:

In a bowl, add the self-raising flour and beaten egg. Add beer slowly and whisk in. Place into fridge for 1/2 an hour to rest.

Heat oil.

Cut pieces of fish to serving sizes. Roll in flour and shake off excess.

Take batter from fridge and give a light whisk to ensure it's all incorporated. Using a fork, dip the fish pieces into the batter and let the excess batter drain off.

Lay the fish gently into the hot oil. Cook until golden brown. Drain on kitchen towel and serve with wedges of lemon and tartare sauce.
