Redesign and upgrade of the intersection of St Helens Point Road and Tasman Highway.

7 April 2014

Break O'Day Council and the Department of Infrastructure, Energy and

Resources have both signed off on the redesign and upgrade of the intersection of St Helens Point Road and Tasman Highway. The project will involve the construction of north and south bound slip lanes and the upgrade and redevelopment of the surrounding areas.

The project has been made possible by a \$1m grant from DIER, with Council set to manage the works.

Council will now seek quotes for the design work for the project, and also consider the upgrades necessary to be undertaken in conjunction with the construction of the slip lanes; these may include the realignment of the car park, the replacement of the toilet block and improvements to the pathways, lighting and playground. 




St Marys Richardson Rd Reservoir

The reservoir at Richardson's Road, St Marys, has recently been the subject of some local discussion. Not currently in use, the reservoir was originally intended to be part of the Break O'Day Council's irrigation scheme. This idea was abandoned in 1999, due to a new bore being found for the town water supply. As the reservoir site was no longer needed for Council purposes, it was transferred to Ben Lomond Water (now known as TasWater) during the asset handover phase.

TasWater had no use for the asset, and it has now been deemed 'abandoned'. The land is currently managed by the State Government through Crown Land Services. There is the potential for the land to be taken up for use by Council or a community organisation for public



Around two months ago, a resident contacted TasWater to report a hole in the dam – it is believed to have been caused by a platypus burrowing through. TasWater drained the dam through a release valve, as they believed the dam could be at risk of becoming unstable due to the leak.

In the past two weeks, a number of people have contacted Acting Mayor Hannah Rubenach with concerns about the dam being drained, such as access to water for firefighting, platypus habitat being lost and a lovely picnic spot being lost. These concerns have been relayed by Hannah to Phil Thompson of Crown Land Services. However, if anyone has further related social or environmental issues they wish to discuss with the Acting Mayor, please contact Council on 6376 7900, and the matter will be further followed up with Crown Land Services.





Power outages

Transend Networks has been upgrading its St Marys substation over the weekends of 29-30th March and 5-6th April. The recent outages were all unplanned. The Fingal Valley, St Marys and basically the whole East Coast was being fed electricity supply from an alternative supply point while this upgrade work was being conducted on the Avoca and St Marys substations. Aurora put in place four large generators as a contingency during this upgrade work in order to support the voltage quality.

However, while this work was being undertaken, any unplanned outage had a larger impact than normal as the power supply had to come all the way from Triabunna, Derby and Palmerston substations to support the Avoca and St Marys area. Unfortunately there were unforseen technical issues with this arrangement that caused the outage on Saturday and Sunday and also the weekend before.

Transend's work is now complete and the system is now back to normal configuration.

A beginners French conversation class is starting 2pm on Thursday afternoons in St Marys and possibly also Tuesday evenings.


If you have ever wanted to learn some French in a warm and friendly environment around a coffee table, then these classes are for you.

We are going to start with the basics and each week we will build upon what we have learned before. NO experience necessary as we are starting from Bonjour! (Hello). IWD trip to Ross

On March 7th St Helens Neighbourhood House in partnership with Break O'Day Council organized a bus trip to the Ross Female Factory to celebrate International Women's Day (IWD).

Why the Female Factory? It seems a fitting place to commemorate IWD when one considers how such a day came into being.

Originally it was known as International Working Women's Day when first introduced at the beginning of the 20th century. Early 1900s was a time of great unrest - when oppression and inequality suffered by women drove them to become more active in lobbying for change, voting rights, better working conditions and pay. In 1910 an International Conference of Working Women was held in Copenhagen, Denmark and was attended by over 100 women from 17 countries. At the Conference was Clara Zetkin, leader of the 'Women's Office' for the Social Democratic Party in Germany, who put forward the motion of 'Women's Day'; an annual day when women from every country campaign for their demands. Thus International Women's Day was established and is now celebrated worldwide annually on 8th March. IWD has gone from strength to strength and is now an official holiday in many countries. Each year it has a different theme - the theme for International Women's Day 2014 was *Inspiring Change*. It is recognized, however, that whilst significant improvements have been made globally for the plight of women, inequality still exists in education, health, business, politics and pay structure disparity. Notwithstanding this the tone of IWD focuses on the positives of the achievements of women past and present, and acknowledges the potential of future generations of women to make a difference.

It was an absolutely glorious sunny day, as the coach made its way towards the historic town of Ross with 52 women on board. There was a sense of camaraderie and anticipation on the bus. It was great to see people who had never met each other before chatting away and by the time the bus reached Ross a lot of new friends had been made.

The Ross Female Factory is open daily, free to the public, from 9am to 5pm. The factory contains interesting historical data, model reproductions housed in glass cases and photographs printed onto large, easy- to-read information boards on every wall within the site.

"Originally the site of a male punishment station, from 1847-1848 the buildings were adapted for use as a probation station for women. Known as the Ross Female Factory, it housed between 60 and 120 women at any one time, as well as accommodating the inmates' babies. It operated as a hiring depot, nursery, probation and punishment station until 1854-1855. The prison was demolished in the 1880s leaving the foundations intact. This has enabled many archaeological discoveries over a series of digs at the site."

Ross Factory is the most archaeologically intact female convict site in Australia. Some of the interpretive displays contain reproductions of intriguing extracts which demonstrate the solidarity and unanimity of the female prisoners towards each other...

...there was a violent exhibition of disorderly conduct on the part of the women confined in the Nursery and in the Crime Class. On the occasion of carrying one of them across the yard ... to solitary confinement, the Constable, Taylor, was attacked first by the woman ... followed by the vigorous co-operation of the rest ...Missiles were thrown at both the constable and Asst. Superintendent Imrie ...The efforts at pacification ... were quite ineffective until ...Mr Imrie produced the Batons ... the rioters stood back and eventually the woman sentenced to solitary confinement accompanied Mr Imrie to the cells. The women holding passes were separated from the yard ... but their cheers and shrieks added to the confusion ...

Comptroller-General of Convicts records, 1848

The self-guided tour doesn't take long to complete and fortunately the factory site is situated three minutes' walk from the centre of Ross Town. Lunch was scheduled for midday in the Town Hall Supper Room. This allowed the group some time for a leisurely stroll around the town, exploring some of the historical sites or for shopping!

After lunch we were treated to a talk by Mrs Debra Cadogan-Cowper, Manager of the Tasmanian Wool Centre and Ross Female Factory. Debra had been booked as guest speaker and her brief was to provide a talk about the origins of the factory and an insight into some inspiring women who were incarcerated within its walls. Debra advised that it was a daunting task because trawling through the historical records of the factory revealed very little in the way of inspiring deeds by any of the female inmates. Despite this she managed to engage the group with fascinating anecdotal snippets of the lives of two of the female inmates which were a mixture of funny and heartrendingly sad; two women from the 19th century transported halfway across the world for some petty crime committed at a young age whilst struggling to survive. This was a time in history when stealing a blanket to stay warm cost the most vulnerable of society their freedom and consigned them to slavery. We sat pondering her words, thankful that those days were long gone, reassuring ourselves that in today's enlightened society such barbarities do not occur.

Debra provided us with a comparison of today's equivalent of transportation and slavery. She spoke about the need for global education on human trafficking and made us aware of the A21 Campaign – an international antihuman trafficking organisation dedicated to the abolishment of slavery in the 21st century and the rescue of human trafficking victims. You could hear a pin drop when Debra informed us that every 30 seconds another person becomes a victim of human trafficking. We were held spellbound listening to the heroic actions of volunteers working to help bring freedom to those enslaved. And just as we were feeling overwhelmed thinking what difference could one of us make Debra ended the talk by quoting Max Lucado "No one can do everything but everyone can do something." A quote that definitely inspires change.

We were a happy contented group that travelled back to Break O'Day that day! There was of course the obligatory sing along session. As I looked around the bus I saw happy faces, lots of new-found friends – and plenty of shopping bags! There was plenty of discussion about where the next destination was going to be – always a sign of a successful trip.

My husband Ken and I had not so much as a parking ticket between us when we decided to turn to crime.

hadn't realised crime, especially successful crime, could be so exciting. Perhaps a little too exciting for Ken; I noticed he was looking quite pale, and starting to tremble.

Just a delayed shock reaction I thought. I'll make him a cup of tea, and suggest he lie down for a while. Then I saw a dark spreading stain on the front of his overalls. One of the guard's shots had not been so wide after all and Ken, bless his dear, brave soul, had driven all the way home without mentioning it.

"Marjorie my dear, make sure you spend it wisely," he said with a smile as he toppled slowly to the floor. When I bent over him I could see he was quite dead.

I sat quietly for a while, reflecting on our years together, and how this venture which was to have provided for our comfort during what we hoped to be a lengthy retirement had gone so horribly wrong. I also realised I had a problem on my hands: I couldn't very well phone the police and tell them Ken had run into a stray bullet while painting the letterbox. I would have to dispose of his body.

It just meant that there was never any worry when the bills came in, and I could afford a holiday in Queensland every winter. The neighbours thought I stayed with friends, whereas in fact I rented a 5-star apartment on the Gold Coast. And of course I had my garden.

The garden had always been a source of many pleasurable hours. My main social contact was with fellow enthusiasts and this, in the end, was to be my undoing.

I had become friends with the treasurer of the local Rose Grower's Society, a retired bank manager named Clive Lewis. He often passed my house when walking his labrador Jess, and often dropped in for a cup of tea and a chat. He would tie Jess's lead to my front fence while I took a break from gardening and he from his walk.

This ritual would have continued indefinitely had not Jess slipped her collar one day. Unnoticed by Clive and me, deep in conversation, she ran around the house to the backyard and, as dogs do, began to dig for bones.

PRESCRIPTION MEDICATIONS

This article is to outline important information regarding prescription medication and includes your responsibilities in regard to the safe disposal and any expired or unused medications. It is also to highlight that it is illegal to share or giveaway prescription medication and that you may be subject to charges of supplying a controlled drug.

Sharing or giving away prescription medications.

Prescription medications are powerful medications that require the expertise of your doctor and pharmacist to ensure they are the right medication for you and that you are aware of the potential side effects.

Sharing prescription medications with family and friends may seem harmless, but used incorrectly these medications are very dangerous and may cause significant harm, or even death

It is for this reason that it is an offence for members of the public to share prescription medications with someone else.

If someone was to come to harm through the use of a prescription medication you supplied to them, you would be facing very serious charges.

If your doctor has advised you to cease a particular prescription medication the safest thing to do is to return the medications to your local pharmacy.


Medicines stored at your home can be the source of poisonings for children and also a potential source of confusion for you.

Your local pharmacy will be happy to receive your unwanted medications as part of the Return Unwanted Medicines (RUM) Project.

The RUM project is designed to safely destroy unwanted medicines to minimise the environmental impact of these medications and to protect patient and public safety.



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

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A giant squid has been thawed and preserved for public display

A giant squid that was found frozen in a block of ice has been thawed and meticulously preserved by scientists for display in the Deep Oceans exhibition.

Mollusc expert Darryl Potter says the squid on display may seem large at around seven metres long, but the species can grow all the way up to 13 metres in length including their 'club tentacles' used for killing prey.

Giant squid live in some of the deepest parts of the ocean and were

thought to be mythological creatures until around 100 years ago, but the first sighting of a live giant squid in the ocean was in September 2004.

"They were spotted by mariners in early days and that lead to the tales of monsters from the deep," Mr Potter said.

"That of course led to all your science fiction movies with grossly distorted facts about the size of these things and what they ate."

Mr Potter says the giant squid on display in the Deep Oceans exhibition, is known as Cal, short for calamari, is one of the best preserved specimens in the world.

When a Boil Water Alert is issued, water should be brought to a rolling boil and allowed to cool before use. Residents in affected areas should use cool boiled water for drinking, food preparation, cleaning teeth or gargling, washing un-cooked foods (such as salads or seafood) or making ice. Dishes should be washed in hot soapy water or in a dishwasher.

If your property is supplied by TasWater in an area affected by a Boil Water Alert you should ensure that all occupants, including rental tenants, are notified.



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

Spicy fish tortillas

Ingredients

- ♦ ½ cup plain flour
- ♦ 1 teaspoon ground coriander
- ♦ 1 teaspoon ground chilli
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
 500g boneless white
- ♦ fish fillets of choice,
- cut into strips
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- ♦ 8 small flour tortilla wraps



- ♦ 1 cup snow-pea sprouts
- ♦ 1 tomato, chopped
- ♦ 1 avocado, seeded,
- ♦ peeled, sliced
- coriander leaves, to serve

Mayonnaise

- ♦ 2/3 cup whole egg mayonnaise
- 1/2 teaspoon chilli paste

In a shallow bowl, combine flour and spices. Dust fish in flour mixture, shaking off excess.

Heat oil in a large non-stick frying pan on medium. Cook fish 2-4 minutes each side, until golden and cooked through. **MAYONNAISE:** In a small bowl, mix mayonnaise and chilli paste together.

Heat tortillas following packet instructions. Spread each with chilli mayonnaise, then top with fish, sprouts, tomato, avocado and coriander leaves. Season to taste and serve hot.
