Quad bike crush device wins Agfest safety award by Rose Grant

The "Best New Safety Product or Innovation" award at Agfest has been awarded to a New Zealand quad bike safety device.

The Lifeguard ATV rollover protection is a flexible, segmented arc that absorbs the impact of a quad bike roll over.

Matthew Tiplady says the device has already won awards in New Zealand in addition to the PASS Agfest award.

"This is the world's first flexible crush protection device for quad bikes and ATVs," he said.

"It's designed so that when the bike turns over the device will actually flex and it will not crush the person by the weight and the bar itself.

It's completely flexible, with



two cables going through, it's like your spine, it will flex with the turning over of the bike."

The PASS safety award judges said the novel design can hold up a quad bike in excess of 350kg, can be simply mounted to the rear carrier, and is able to be attached onto most brands of quad bikes.

They also awarded the "Best Safety Display – Safety Feature / Focus" award at Agfest to a private exhibitor, Boat Safe and the runner-up price to their "Marine pod" floatable container for storing survival equipment to be used when a boat sinks.

Dear Editor.

I would like to add my two bob to the Richardson Road Reservoir debate.

I have been a keen observer of the reservoir over the past ten years by way of its capacity to reduce nagging to a tolerable level. Grab the fishing rod and a couple of stubbies and watch the float jiggle as the trout play with the hook while surrounded by an absolute Tasmanian diamond. I sat on the wall one day while a platypus and two pups swam at my feet. I blinked, they crash dived and came up for air about 30 meters away. Those pups would now be teenagers and like most teenagers they should have been strangled at birth because I reckon they are the cheeky little buggers that have vandalised and breached the wall. They have reduced their idyllic home to a mud puddle and the eight or ten that used to be the dam clan are now living rough on the street God knows where. It is harder to feel sorry for the smartaleck trout who for the most part ignored hundreds of dollars worth of fishing gear over the years.

When there is a heavy rain event two creeks feed directly into the reservoir and meet at a 90° angle. This sets up a turbulent vortex motion across the water surface. The dam rises and spills and the hundreds of tonnes of silt gets a buffing but remains in place behind the wall. The St Marys Rivulet runs cloudy for a while then cleans up soon after.

The thing that worries me is what would happen to all this accumulated silt if there was a catastrophic failure around the already breached wall or worse still if some wet behind the ears engineer/economic genius was to have the wall removed. I reckon a large sharp rain event would see all this silt arranging its sticky, stinking, toxic mass on or about the flood level of the St Marys Rivulet in the middle of town.

The silt is made up of rotted eucalypt material, rotted water weeds and some mineral matter carried up to and retained in situ by the wall. The anaerobic mass will be highly acidic, loaded with tannins and if allowed to move en mass down the system it will suck the life out of everything it contacts. The food chain downstream will cease to exist until the silt dilutes and the poor bloody platypus are going to cop it again.

Simply draining the dam is not a solution. The 30cm plughole will be overwhelmed by inflow in a rain event and will quickly block with sticks and leaves. The two breaches around the wall are both in areas of earth fill and will rapidly scour out and the silt will begin to move.

There is a serious environmental problem here caused by humans in building the dam. Ignoring this and buckpassing are unlikely to solve the potential for disaster. Someone needs to take responsibility and sort this out real soon.

A short term fix would be to pump some concrete into the platypus burrows and see if the pesky little buggers can dig through that. The right thing to do would be to de-silt the dam, fix the wall (which looks like it was built by the same bloke who made the nuclear bomb proof missile silos) and turn it back into the absolutely sensational gem that it has been for the past fifty years or so.


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

Mayor Sarah Schmerl to retire at next election 5 May 2014




Break O'Day Mayor Sarah Schmerl has announced that she will retire from her roles as Mayor and Councillor at the next Local Government election, to be held in October 2014.

Rotary Aluminium Can Recycling Bin,

Recycling for your Community - What Goes Around Comes Around

In October 2013 The Rotary Club of St Helens launched our Aluminium Recycling Program. We decided it was time to look for a fund-raising exercise that did not require our community members to put their hands in their pockets, but just change the way they did things.

With the support of the manager of our local tip, MDG and Sims Metal we implemented the recycling program. We called it *What Goes Around, Comes Around, Recycling for Your Community*.

We were lucky enough to have the support of most in our community, with several people donating and sponsoring Green Wheelie Bins, now sign-posted and placed in strategic spots throughout the community. Bin donors and sponsors were Ann and Jack from Soul Foods, Sally Spurway Smith from St Helens Reflexology, Peter and Ian Power - Lawrence from Rainbow Retreat St Marys and Lesley Armstrong McKellar, one of our beautiful local St Helens ladies.

Locations of bins as follows:

St Helens-Binalong Fire Station, Neighbourhood House, the IGA shopping centre between Banjos and Choc'a'lolly, Mitre 10, St Helens District High School, Falmouth Community Centre, St Marys Op Shop and The Bookstore Café. The main drop off point is the St Helens Refuse Tip, and the management have given us the use of their skip bins for the collection of cans, so all aluminium cans dropped off at the Recycling Station at the tip go to our Recycling Program.


We said at the onset that we want to put this money back into our community via smaller clubs and youth activity groups, such as sporting groups etc. This is still our plan. Our hope was to be able to raise in the vicinity of \$2000 over the first year, and then offer the opportunity for the small clubs to apply for a share of this money.

Just this week we received our very first cheque from Sims Metal for October 2013 to February 2014. Thanks to the amazing support from our local community members, we managed to raise in this short time the grand total of \$992.00.

Here we go - I knew this would happen.

This "We have a mandate" Federal Government is about to impose an unheralded levy and other measures



on us, which will really hurt many low/single income families. One percent of say \$40,000 is \$400; for so many people amounts like that may well wipe out a small tax refund needed for helping with something vital.

SOME THOUGHTS

Have you ever set a trap - for a possum or maybe a feral cat?

You no doubt positioned the trap where you hoped you would succeed in making your catch. You probably then selected the bait... bread, fruit, meat or even cheese. You may have scattered the bait around the entrance to the trap, inside as well on the floor, but possibly your last act was to mount some of the bait onto the hook which hangs down from the roof of the trap.

That hook is a *snare* because it tempts or lures the animal into the danger of being caught. It is from the action of the animal chewing on the bait, while it is hanging on the hook, that you do indeed make your catch!

Why? The movement of the hook causes the attached spring or lever to close the door, thereby entrapping the animal. Now did you know that the name of the hook on which the bait hangs, the part which lures the animal into the trap... comes from the Greek word SKANDALON, which means OFFENCE.

I wonder how many times a day we get trapped by choosing to take offence at something which has been said, or not said to us, or by thinking we have been left out, or forgotten, or being spoken to rudely or having to wait in a queue, being interrupted, ignored or even gossiped about?

Offence is a trap.

If we choose, (and we do choose, because we all have free will) to take the bait, to be offended, to get upset, to feel rejected or to hold a pity-party (and not many guests will turn up to one of those!) then we are trapped, just like the wild animal.

The worst case scenario of taking offence is bitterness, resentment, hatred and unforgiveness, which in turn can breed like a cancer and progress to sickness: physical, mental, emotional or spiritual.

What's the remedy? The remedy is to treat being offended like the plague! We need to avoid it at every turn, to guard our hearts against it, choose to love and forgive instead.

But that's so not easy.

Taking offence does not help us to grow – it hinders us, like a stumbling block and puts all sorts of 'stuff' in our way. I have opportunities to take offence every day, but with Jesus as my Guide, I'm slowly learning to choose instead to ask Him to help me not to take the bait…to leave it on the hook, so I don't get trapped.




The plan for the next few weeks is:

- Research and collect information, including photographs on possible characters for the People Poles. We need your input for this especially if you have a family ancestor or historic character you would like to sponsor. We are planning that any business, family or individual will be able to sponsor a People Pole for approximately \$250, with a discount for those who have contributed to the fund-raising campaign; sponsors will have a say in who the poles represent, their appearance and, subject to Break O'Day Council requirements, where they are located. Once we have a list of 20 + characters we will circulate this information to the community for feedback and make a priority list.
- Prepare drawings of selected characters and sketch plans for where they might be located. We will be looking for artist(s) to help us with this.
- ♦ *Produce one or two portable models* approximately 1/3 or 1/2 full size and using the funds already raised, for illustrating the project and to show potential sponsors.
- Produce Peg People Barbara Longue, Heather Lye and photographer Glyn Johnson will be working on this, hopefully with the assistance of local youth such as school art classes and/or the BODRA youth group, making small 'People Poles' from wooden clothes pegs that can be sold for fund-raising and given as gifts and rewards.
- ♦ **Produce Figurines** John Robinson brought over from Geelong a model of one of their bollards, approximately 25cm high, which are sold as souvenirs for \$25 each. I will be ordering a few more to illustrate the project, and I have asked the Woodcraft Guild and some others to experiment with making similar wooden ones for our project.
- ♦ Seek out potential corporate sponsors HST Tree Specialists P/L have given us a very good quote for felling 8 trees, scaling and cutting into 2m lengths plus making woodchip from the waste (another source of revenue) and we will be seeking other major corporate sponsors for the project. If anyone has any suggestions or contacts let me know.
- ♦ *Keep going with Community fund raising* if you haven't already done so please support this project, particularly if you are involved in tourism in any way. It is going to happen and it will benefit your business.

The next meeting of the St Marys People Poles Project Working Committee, Ian Whitehouse, John Robinson, Hannah Rubenach and myself, will be 1.30pm Wednesday 28th May. If anyone would like to contribute and join this committee please let me know.



'That's right,' said the djinni.


'And you're a genie?'

History or Mystery? 'Jack' Hooper (b. 1876) and Florence Celia Terry (b. 1889)

Part 2

If you read Part 1 of this article, you will notice that Part 2 has had a slight change of title. This is because of the previously unresolved question of the true identity of Florence Terry's husband, 'Jack' Hooper.

As I've mentioned before, if you reach a dead-end or stumble over contradictory details, it is a good idea to check and re-check the information collected. The transcript of Flo's death notice stated that her husband was H J Hooper. However, these transcripts are done electronically and the type in the original notices is sometimes indistinct.

What if the 'H' was really an 'R' and the letter had been mis-transcribed?

I looked at the original scanned image online. Sure enough, Flo's husband was R J (Robert John) Hooper, not H J (Harold John) Hooper.

The online genealogical group of which I'm a member had tried to point me in the right direction, but I needed confirmation that Flo really was married to R J Hooper, a man who was some years older than she was. I had now found that confirmation. No wonder I hadn't been able to discover any record of H J Hooper in the records of lighthouse keepers! When the marriage certificate I've requested arrives, I expect that it will add further proof of Hooper's identity.

I was also waiting for the book I had requested from the State Library to arrive - 'Guiding Lights - Tasmanian's Lighthouses and Lighthousemen' by Kathleen M. Stanley.

When it arrived, I could find only three references in the entire book about R J Hooper, but these were more than enough to establish his place in our family tree. They also add a very human element to what was ultimately a tragic story.

Other details also came to light, such as R J being recorded variously as John, R J, J R and (possibly) T J Hooper. Nothing is said of his nickname, but perhaps it was only family and close friends who called him Jack. Certainly, my mother-in-law knew him by this name.

When the Kawitiri was wrecked at Hell's Gates (see Part 1), witnesses reported that Hooper, 'a lighthouse man', was waiting on shore for his (first) wife Marion and their two

sons. Unfortunately, the women and children, who had been placed in a lifeboat, were in more danger than those who remained on board ship. All those on the wreck were saved, but six people on the lifeboat were drowned because of the rough seas - two women, two children and two infants. Marion Hooper and the two boys were among the dead. Two men were also lost when another boat capsized in a failed attempt to recover mailbags from the wreck.

The inscription on the tombstone marking the resting place of the first Mrs Hooper and the boys reads as follows:

They were lovely and pleasant in their lives and in death they were not divided. (Strahan Cemetery)

IN MEMORIAM OFER.—In ever loving memory of Marion of her two little sons, Jack and Wilfred, be dearly loved eldest daughter and randsons of Captain and Mrs. A. B. Robinson, of Eddystone Point, who were aveiably drowned in the wreck of the Kastiff, Macquarle Harbour Bar, August 13, 67. and her tw Port after stormy see Always remembered. Inserted by her loving parents, sisters bothers.in_law, and three dear brothers.



Hell's Gate Lighthouse Macquarie Heads

Only a few words, but what a depth of grief and loss is expressed in those two lines ... The author, when recounting what happened, was obviously not unaffected by Hooper's loss and further tragic events in his life:

The story of John Hooper could well be the saddest in the long history of Tasmanian lighthousemen. Some said that he became temporarily deranged and would wander about at night on the shore by the breakwater trying to find his wife and children. Others said that he changed the colour of the white-painted stones to black. This was only the beginning of his tragedy. Some time later he married Miss Florrie Lambert, of another lighthouse family. There was further sorrow when she died giving birth to twins, who also died. A third wife, Miss Terry ... also predeceased him. (page 141)

This was the man Florence married – a man who had grieved much, but who dared to hope for new happiness by marrying for a third time. The wedding photo (included with Part 1) seems to support this, with both bride and groom looking contented and happy, even relaxed, at the start of their new life together. And yet, a mere twelve years later, Hooper was again a widower. Was he also childless?

The last paragraph in this chapter says it all:

Nobody uttered a word of reproach when he (John) refused to take any part in the events attendant upon the death of John Hague at Deal Island many years later. He had had enough sorrow of his own. (page 141)

The next mystery to unravel was Hooper's service as a lighthouseman. Appendix 1, a general list at the end of the book entitled Men who have served in Tasmanian Lights (including present staff), includes Hooper, J. R (an understandable error, since he seems to have preferred his second name).

We already know he was at Macquarie Heads in 1907.

However, despite what Flo's funeral notice said about Hooper being keeper at Eddystone Point, he is listed in the records only as being an assistant to Keeper F. Lambert in 1917, along with Furness, King and Sellars. This would have been a year after his marriage to Flo Terry. He did not become keeper at Eddystone in his own right until 1933, five years after Flo died.

A T J Hooper is also recorded as serving at Currie Harbour from 1927 - 1930. My feeling is that this is a typographical error. If so, when Flo died in 1928 he was working at Currie, not at Eddystone. So this part of the mystery is still only partly unravelled!

At the time of writing, I do not know if Jack and Flo had any children together, or how Flo died.

Dare to be different! Part 1.

It was with great interest I read the article in the Valley Voice 23rd April 'Thousands of Parents Illegally Home Schooling'. My response - well done you brave ones!

From 1985 to 2001 my husband Peter and I were 'illegal' home schooling parents. What a great and adventurous time it was.

In February 1983, like all conforming parents, we enrolled our eldest daughter Sarah at St Marys District School to commence Grade 1. In February 1984 we enrolled Hannah. Sarah had spent a year at pre-school and loved it; Hannah spent one day and hated it! We were warned by teachers she would be totally disadvantaged because of this loss of early education but she coped well. Sarah however struggled, having difficulties figuring out which way '2s' and 'Ss' were supposed to face, and distinguishing between 'p' and 'q', and 'd' and 'b'. But we had great confidence in the school and staff; we knew them well as I had worked for nine years as a Lab technician at St Marys High School and Peter was there as a tech/woodwork aide. However, in the midst of this normalcy were persistent thoughts that we really wanted education for our children that was more consistent with our Christian beliefs and self-sufficient, simple life style. In fact, during those two years we had looked at starting a Christian or parent-controlled school in St Marys. All our attempts failed so we prayed for other options. I frequently thought of my own primary school days of Correspondence School they were happy days with a broad and varied education of practical work combined with formal learning.

Peter had hated school; he loved learning but his independent and practical nature was restricted by formal classroom education. We had no grounds to apply for Correspondence School but God miraculously opened a door to home schooling. We quickly decided we would be the fourth family in Tasmania to use the Accelerated Christian Education (ACE) newly formed home schooling program. So we did all the right things, and enrolled Sarah, Hanah and Andrew with ACE. This American-based system was internationally recognised as legal education and its headquarters were in Brisbane.

We attended the required training programs held by schools using the ACE program in Tasmania. This helped establish a great support network for home schooling in its experimental stage.

- we purchased all our ACE materials
- we set up school in our home
- we notified the school that we were withdrawing our daughters
- we contacted the Education Department to inform the powers-that-be we would be home schooling in 1985

February 1985 - The Battle Begins

- We are ordered by the Education Department to register. We refuse to do so! We stand firm in our belief that it is our God-given right as parents to choose the education we want, and that as parents we respect our children also and young as they are, both Sarah and Hannah want to be home educated. Also, we argued, we did not have to register with the Education Department when our girls attended St Marys school we simply enrolled them. We had now enrolled our daughters with a legally recognised education body in Australia, ACE, and that is all we will do.
- We invited the Department to send inspectors to our home whenever they wished, announced or unannounced, as we had nothing to hide. It was up to the Department to prove we were acting illegally.
- We are frequently told by family and friends that we are being irrational and irresponsible for we will turn our children into ignoramuses socially isolated and ill-equipped to cope with life.
- ♦ As well as this external conflict I am enduring internal conflict. As a requirement of ACE, prior to purchasing materials, Sarah and Hannah had completed aptitude tests. Many gaps were found in their learning. It was suggested Hannah do some Grade 1 work and Sarah do some Grade 1 and pre-school work. This would correct the problem she had in distinguishing p's from q's, d's from b's and writing 2s and Ss backwards. I have guilty mum complex I am setting my girls backwards instead of forwards. However, the wonderful ACE staff remind me that the ACE program was especially designed to cater for the individual needs of each student. Each child set their own goals and worked at their own pace to ensure learning was 'line upon line concept upon concept' to stop any gaps in learning.

Thus we began our home schooling journey.

First Day of Autumn - First Day of Home Schooling 1985

8.30 am. A perfect autumn day as I walk my students the five metres from our lounge room to the schoolroom. Three year old James and four year old Andrew want to go to school like their two big sisters. All four have their own 'office' - a spacious, private desk located at their chosen spot in the room, and decorated to their personal taste. Everything about our ACE program is about the individual. Two year old Esther has her own special place on a mat with books and toys. We follow the recommended opening of singing, prayers and discussion on any topic the children wish.

9 am. Formal academics begins for Sarah and Hannah. Their work books are called Paces and cover English, Word Building, Maths, Social Studies and Science. Extra curriculum Paces are available in Art, Animal Science, Bible Study etc. but we'll keep them for a later date. For now we have to concentrate on rectifying their learning gaps. ACE uses the phonetic program. I familiarise Andrew, and a very curious James, with the pre-school program, the abc's of ACE. We take a five minute break every half hour to reduce eye strain and stimulate concentration - a tired child will not learn easily. We have a 15 minute morning tea/playtime break.

12 pm. Goodness! How could time have moved so quickly? I know what our afternoon program will be. As Peter left for work this morning he said 'I've noticed there are blackberries ripe down in the gully. They need picking soon.' A hint, no

doubt, that blackberry pie would be appreciated for evening dessert!

1 pm. We go blackberry picking.

3 pm. Our first day of homeschool comes to a close.

A mouth-watering aroma wafts from the blackberry pie made by all five children. They are eager to see if it passes their father's taste test tonight.

Night time. I share our day's experiences with Peter (and yes, the pie was great - 'When are you good cooks going to make another?' Peter had asked his five proud children).

This, I concluded, was the ultimate in schooling; the discipline of formal academics, the practical applications of learning, the delight of enjoying God's creation on such a perfect sunny day, the blessing of doing fun things together as family - the sharing, the caring. Thank God for this journey we had embarked on today. May there be many more such blessed, fulfilled days!

Garlic-Lemon Double Stuffed Chicken Breasts

Ingredients



- 4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves
- 125g cream cheese, cut into 4 slices
- 125g Cheddar cheese, cut into 4 slices
- 1/2 cup milk
- 3/4 cup seasoned or plain bread crumbs
- 125g grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 cloves garlic, minced or finely chopped
- 100g butter, melted
- 1 lemon, juiced
- 1/4 teaspoon salt, or to taste
 - 1/4 teaspoon paprika (optional)

Preheat oven to 180°C. Lightly coat a large, shallow baking dish with oil.

Slice each breast in half horizontally through the centre, cutting almost but not completely

through. Place one slice each of cheddar and cream cheese in the centre of each breast. Close again as if placing between the pages of a book. Set aside.

Pour milk into a shallow bowl. In a separate bowl, combine breadcrumbs and parmesan. Carefully dip each breast first in milk, then in breadcrumb mixture, patting lightly to firmly coat. Place breasts side by side in a single layer in pre-oiled baking dish, tucking edges under to seal.

Melt butter in a small saucepan over medium heat. Stir in lemon juice and garlic, and drizzle evenly over chicken. Season breasts with garlic salt and paprika, if using.

Bake in preheated oven for 30 minutes, or until no longer pink in centre and juices run clear.
