East Coast Vet Clinic in conjunction with the National Desexing Network are launching National Desexing Month in July.

Special offers are available during July for everyone, not just Concession Card holders .

Research by the Animal Welfare League of Qld shows that 65% of people who surrender undesexed cats and dogs have not desexed them because they just didn't get around to it or because of financial circumstances.

Desexing promotions and reduced prices can make an important incentive for people to desex their pets sooner rather than later, and prevent unexpected kittens and puppies.

Cats and dogs are safer and happier if desexed. They are less likely to roam and get into fights, be hit by cars or impounded. They are less likely to get mammary and testicular cancer, and urinary tract disease.

Owners often find it easier to care for desexed cats and dogs because they are more homely and affectionate, and less frustrated wanting to get out and find a mate.

NDN Director Sylvana Wenderhold stated that since the downturn in the economy, shelters and pounds around Australia are struggling with more animals being handed in and fewer animals being adopted.

"Our vet clinic is happy to contribute to National Desexing Month to help prevent the tragedy that befalls so many unwanted pets," said Dr Jeff Parsons, owner and Vet at East Coast Vet Clinic.




Take us on at your peril. We may have lost the initial battle but we won the bloody war.

I apologise for the reiteration of the following article. However, I

still find many newcomers asking about the protocol of the Guild.

We are a non judgemental, apolitical incorporated organisation which is open to both men and women who may be experiencing difficulties integrating into a new community. Our joining fee is \$20 a year which helps cover insurance costs. We ask that all new comers complete an induction course for health and safety reasons.

Our doors open at 10am and close usually at about 4pm depending on the availability of our volunteer members.

We do work for the elderly or infirmed at a cost recovery basis only, or for free. We believe in helping other struggling community groups by way of donating prizes or with monies raised. We have a presence at the Tasmanian Regional Arts Market which is held on the first Saturday of the month at the St Marys Town Hall via our sausage sizzle.

We hold monthly meetings at the club house to enable all members to partake in any of the decision making or general housekeeping.

If you would like to find our more please feel free to come down and share a cuppa with us. We are situated in the old Railway Goods Shed, St Marys. We are open everyday except Fridays and Sundays depending on volunteers. A cup of coffee will cost you 50¢. We charge \$2.50 per day to use the equipment or \$6 for the week; this contributes towards ongoing maintenance costs.

We have an Open Day Fair once a year which assists our fund raising.





Pressure on Pensioners

No one should have to choose between paying for electricity, water or healthcare. However, that's the choice that might be faced by some pensioners and concession cardholders as a result of the state and federal Liberal governments. Up until now the federal government has provided states with money to supply certain concessions for pensioners and Seniors Card holders.

The Federal government announced in the 2014 Federal Budget that these concessions for local government rates including land, water and sewerage; energy; motor vehicle registration and public transport concessions would be scrapped. The prospect that pensioners will lose these concessions is real.

Through questioning in state parliament, Labor was able to secure a guarantee that pension concessions would be maintained by the state government until the August budget.

However, there is currently no guarantee that these concessions will remain after the state budget is handed down on August 28th. A removal of these concessions would see each Tasmanian pensioner and concession cardholder slugged with around \$90 extra worth of charges for essential services such as rates, transport costs, electricity and water bills. This cost could be on top of the introduction of a GP co-payment and increase on the co-payment on prescriptions if these measures are passed by the Senate.

Around the country other states, such as New South Wales, South Australia and Queensland, have already provided guarantees that they will fund the shortfall to concession card holders due to the Federal budget cuts. The Tasmanian government must do the same.

I encourage anyone concerned by these possible changes to contact their local Liberal member and urge them to ensure that provisions are made within the budget to maintain pensioner concessions.

Liberal Government committed to supporting vulnerable Tasmanians



The Liberal Government is getting on with the job of fixing Tasmania's budget while ensuring the vulnerable

remain protected. Despite being left with a \$1.1b budget black-hole and projected net debt of \$400m by the previous Labor-Green Government, the Liberal Government has acted decisively to ensure that the interests of needy Tasmanians are met.

We have ensured that concessions for public transport, electricity bills and water and sewerage bills will continue unchanged from July 1st and we are working through the longer term implications of this funding reduction as part of the budget development process.

We will continue to subsidise council rates for those on a concession for 2014-15. The State Government provides more than \$15m annually to reduce the rates faced by eligible concession ratepayers, delivering an average reduction of about \$400 per year.

Further, electricity prices rose by 75% in just 6 years under the Labor-Greens disaster, but from July 1st electricity prices will drop by almost 8% under the Liberal Government.

For a typical household, this is a saving of around \$164 on their annual electricity bill and for small business customers, this is a saving of around \$136 on their annual bill.

It is disappointing that Labor's Rebecca White has not welcomed these announcements.

Union launches a personal attack on Break O'Day Council General Manager - June 26th 2014

In a desperate attempt to advance their demands for a 6% pay increase, at a cost of an extra \$183,000 per year to Council which equates to another 4% increase in rates, the



Australian Services Union (ASU) has launched a personal attack on outgoing General Manager, Des Jennings. The union have stated that his refusal to accept their log of 34 claims demonstrates a lack of concern for the community and that their demands will be unheard once Mr Jennings leaves. Mr Jennings has stated that in the current economic climate, the community cannot sustain the financial and operational costs of the demands that the union have made on behalf of staff. Council has appointed an Acting General Manager, current Corporate Services Manager Bob Hoogland. Mr Hoogland is supported by the senior management team and will seamlessly continue the Enterprise Bargaining process.

Other union demands include a minimum of 20 days paid domestic violence leave, a \$100 per week increase in the on-call allowance, enforced union participation in management decisions, 2 extra days of bereavement leave, extra paid leave during Christmas shutdown period, a leave-buying arrangement for an additional 2-4 weeks of paid leave per year and a sick leave pool whereby staff who have used all their own sick leave can access that of others.

Contrary to the Union claim, Council has undertaken to maintain the current 6 weeks of paid maternity leave until such time as the federally funded parental leave scheme is implemented. The Union has demanded Council retain the current scheme funded by the community, in addition to the tax payer funded scheme.

The "certain public holidays" that Council has made a claim for is only for Easter Tuesday to revert to a normal working day and has proposed that medical certificates be provided after 5 days of sick leave is used.

Council has made an initial offer of a 1.5% per annum increase in salary, plus a 0.5% increase in superannuation, on the basis of financial sustainability which will ensure the job security of current employees. The 6% increase in rates quoted by the union, is part of Council's ongoing Long Term Financial Plan to move towards financial sustainability, primarily funds addressing the backlog of maintenance and renewal of essential infrastructure in the municipality, such as bridges and stormwater drainage.

Break O'Day workers left in EBA limbo - June 25th 2014 (sent by the BODC)

The Australian Services Union said the decision by Break O'Day Council General Manager Des Jennings to turn his back on employees, to join another Council in the middle of Enterprise Bargaining negotiations, highlights his lack of concern for workers and the community. ASU Organiser Nicoletta Vasilakis said that the departure of Mr Jennings leaves the union and employees in limbo, in regards to future negotiations.

"Mr Jennings had tried to either significantly alter or eliminate some important entitlements within the agreement, and now with his departure we don't know who we will be negotiating with or how long it will take before Council decide to bargain in good faith with their hard-working employees. Workers are already concerned with some of the proposed changes (elimination of existing paid entitlement of six weeks for parental leave, loss of certain public holidays), some of which would drastically affect their working lives."

"Our claims for a new EBA have been fair and either cost neutral or come at a minimal cost to Council in regards to entitlements. Council rates have recently increased by 6%, however management's wage offer is significantly less than CPI."

"Council have also proposed to eliminate the existing for time in lieu entitlement, again showing a lack of regard for single parents where time in lieu may be preferred. We have also asked Council to reinstate statuary declarations as evidence for personal leave. Without this option, members who live in rural areas face extreme difficulty in seeing the doctor for just one day off work. So far, the claims of the union and its members have been vehemently rejected, despite fair reasoning and examples to support our claims. Mr Jennings' behaviour has been antagonising and non-conducive, and he has provided workers with limited explanations. Now we are left with a situation where many of our claims will continue to be unheard, as Mr Jennings decides to take post at another Council."

"Break O'Day workers deserve to be heard. We call on Council to negotiate in good faith, and come up with a deal that is fair for those who provide many valuable services within the community."

Price on pollution good for Tasmanian jobs and services

Greens Leader Christine Milne says a weakened Hydro Tasmania with 100 or more job losses will be the first of many negative impacts on Tasmania if the price on pollution is abolished.

"Apart from tearing down action on global warming, the repeal of the price on pollution will be Tony Abbott's big hit to Tasmania's economy with millions to be lost from the Hydro and the state budget," Senator Milne said. "Global warming fuels extreme weather, and the price on pollution fuels jobs and services for Tasmanians.

My thoughts are with the Hydro workers and their families today. If we go down the path of tearing down effective action on global warming then there will be more to come. On top of Hydro job losses, Tasmanian police, nurses and teachers will be at risk of losing their jobs if the millions flowing into government coffers is ripped out of the budget by abandoning the price on pollution."

Some (more JAMmy) thoughts by Mel Norton

As we come to the end of term 2 at JAM, and as winter truly descends upon us all here in the valley, I thought it might warm the hearts to share some beautiful and positive experiences from *Jesus And Me*.

For most of this term we have been teaching the children about love and forgiveness. Our featured bible parable was a story Jesus told, which is recorded in the New Testament in the book of Matthew, chapter 18, verses 21 through to 35.

The parable is called *The Unforgiving Servant* and serves to teach us all about how important it is to forgive each other, just as we would want to be forgiven by God for all our mistakes, sins ... those conscious and unconscious things we do which often cause such grief and pain to others.

Seaplane to bring tourists to Tasmania's remote wilderness

Tasmania's remote wilderness areas will become more accessible with the State Government extending a local seaplane company's licence.

The Government will now push ahead with plans to open up Tasmania's national parks and World Heritage Area to low-impact tourism development.

The move was announced during the March election campaign, and earlier in June the Government called for expressions of interest from investors and tourism operators. The Hobart-based seaplane company had been in a trial for the past two years, flying to the Southwest and Freycinet national parks and Recherche Bay. Parks Tasmania surveyed non-seaplane visitors to gauge the impact of the trial, and the Government has now extended the operator's licence.

Environment Minister Matthew Groom said the trial showed the flights did not negatively impact on the environment. "We feel very confident that this is environmentally responsible," he said. "We think the operators have indicated a great respect for the natural environment, making sure they're doing it responsibly, so that's the basis on which we've extended the licence, further developing our reputation as the environmental tourism capital of the world."

Company spokesman Will Barbour was also optimistic about the expansion.

"We see the announcement as a vote of confidence by the Government in our responsible operations," he said.

The company was also given permission to trial flights between Hobart and Lake St Clair for 12 months. Premier Will Hodgman believed allowing development in or near national parks would boost tourist numbers and the economy.

"We're serious about unlocking Tasmania's potential," Mr Hodgman said. "Our tourism industry is one of our core competitive strengths, and the Liberal Government's right behind boosting it even further and that means new attractions." The Government said normal planning safeguards would apply, but environmentalists have expressed concern about the move. They feared developments would not be restricted to eco-tourism ventures and will turn into an "open season" for developers.

Captain Francis Joseph **Bailey** 1897 - 1970

Continued from last issue...

...In June 1925, Bailey filed for divorce on the grounds of Margareth's infidelity with an ex-army officer Lt. Francis James Fallen. The marriage was finally dissolved on July 19th 1926, and Bailey was

granted custody of their child.

On June 9th 1926, Supermarine Swan G-EBJY, configured as a 10-seat passenger flying boat, first flew with Henri Biard as pilot and F J Bailey (by then the Chief Marine Pilot of AIL and manager of the airport at Woolston) as his passenger.

In August that year Bailey married Edith May Anstee (nee Weaver), a widow whose husband had died in 1918 from wounds received in Flanders whilst serving with the Royal Engineers. They had been married for just three years when her husband died, and for most of that time had been separated by the war.

In September 1927, Captain F J Bailey was granted six month's leave in order to re-organize an experimental air service between Khartoum and Kisumu. The experience he gained in the area proved to be valuable preparation for IAL's introduction of the 'C' class flying boats in 1936.

From March 1929, the Mediterranean route between Genoa and Alexandria was serviced by IAL's Short S.8 Calcutta 12-seat flying boats but these 3-engine machines were not ideal, particularly when Italy began closing its seaports for political reasons. IAL obtained government backing to purchase three Short S.17 Kent 4-engine flying boats to replace Cpt F J Bailey posing with a them. These dual-control machines were fitted with a luxurious passenger cabin containing 15 high-backed lounge seats in four rows of facing pairs with a table between them. (Imperial Airways postcard) Manufacture began in October 1930, and the first machine, G-ABFA (later named 'Scipio') was launched at Rochester on February 24th 1931. It was test flown the same day and found to be in perfect trim.

On May 3rd 1931, Air Superintendent Major H G Brackley with Bailey as his co-pilot flew 'Scipio' to Marignane in the south of France. Brackley then returned to Rochester while Bailey took the machine on to Genoa. 'Scipio' was joined soon after by G-ABFB 'Sylvanus' and G-ABFC 'Satyrus' and over the next five years Bailey commanded 'Scipio' on every [sic] flight it made.

During an interview in 1947 Captain Bailey described some of the Short S.17 Kent operating procedures:

'The procedure regarding the three Scipio class boats was quite peculiar. Each boat had its captain and crew and no-one but that crew ever flew it. This developed a high esprit de corps and great rivalry. Every member of the crew was required to be able to do visual signalling (semaphore and lamp) and the crew were so proud of their aircraft that everything inside and out was polished and shone like a fire engine. In the air any

member of the crew not actively engaged in flying, or looking after the passengers, was polishing metal or woodwork even the radio officer had a long 'phone lead so he could get around the cockpit and polish and still keep a listening watch. The whole cockpit shone like a silver salver: dashboard, control columns, throttle levers and all.

In harbour, a jack staff was mounted on the cockpit roof to carry the Royal Mail pennant and was planted in its socket very smartly at the end of the landing run - not a second later. The jack staff was silver-plated (at the crew's expense) and the truck was, in the case of 'Scipio', a silver bust of Scipio Africanus. From the trailing edge of the upper main

centre- section, halliards ran down to the steward's pantry below and on this halyard the Air Ensign flew when on the water. As a further example of the high esprit de corps, it is interesting to

note that it was the practice to 'dip' the Air Ensign when taxiing past a man-o-war or liner (particularly a foreign one), and also to 'dip' to each other when we met. It therefore followed that a member of the crew of a moored aircraft had to be aboard (during his day of rest), to 'dip' the ensign to an incoming or departing aircraft. The crew was only four and therefore a roster was kept so

that this almost daily duty could be shared equally. If one failed to 'dip' ones ensign in response to their salute, one was liable to receive a terse letter on the subject.

All members of the crew were required to know the name and destination of all passengers aboard (this was done by studying the passports and passenger list immediately after take-off) and believe it or not, on Christmas Day there was an illuminated Christmas tree in the cabin and hanging on it a diary for each passenger, with his name embossed on the cover, even if he or she had joined only the previous day! How was it done? Just thinking ahead - good staff work and possibly a quick run round to a printer the previous evening. When the Captain took the diaries off the tree it was expected of him that he would not falter in handing each to the correct passenger. Of course, all this took place in the

middle of a marvellous Christmas dinner of turkey etc., even down to a Stilton cheese with port in it - all straight from Fortnum and Mason.

The Kents flew from Brindisi to Galilee and Brindisi to Alexandria (the base) calling at Athens on both routes. There were also refuelling halts at Mirabella (Crete), and Castelorizo (an island near Rhodes).

As there were only three aircraft, it will be appreciated that an engine failure was an appalling offence, as the other two had to do your share of the work 'till you became serviceable. There was usually only one ground engineer at a station so the whole crew worked all night to get back on service, while the other aircraft crews left rude messages to encourage you as they passed.'

On October 22nd 1936, Short S.23 G-ADHL 'Canopus', the first of the Empire C class flying boats, left the river Medway en-route to the Mediterranean to provide the service between Brindisi and Alexandria. Captain F J Bailey, who had been chosen by Brackley to be the first captain of these new machines, took the pilot's seat with Brackley as his copilot.

Later that month Bailey flew 'Canopus' on a proving flight from Lake Bracciano (Rome) to Alexandria. He made the first scheduled outward-bound flight on November 2nd 1936, and then spent two months of scheduled flights between Brindisi and Alexandria. 'Flight' magazine dated August 9th 1945, reported that he had set a record by flying 4,500 hours in a 'Canopus'.

In 1939 he was taken off route flying and put in charge of the company's flying instruction at their Hythe facility. In mid-September 1940, Captains Bailey in VH-ABF (originally G-AFBL) 'Cooee', Davys in G-ADUX 'Cassiopeia' and Harrington in G-AUEF 'Corinthian' (all Short S.23 Empire flying boats) undertook survey flights up the Congo to Stanleyville and Lake Victoria, all arriving safely in Durban to reinforce the fleet and allow the 'Horseshoe' (the route around the Indian Ocean between Durban and Sydney) schedule to be doubled.

During the war he carried out various special assignments, which included the running of the air blockade of Malta in unarmed Empire flying boats and Catalina's.

With around 15,000 hours in the air and having flown more than 2,000,000 miles, Captain Bailey's career as a pilot came to a premature end in 1942 when he lost his right hand while taxiing a Catalina, believed to have been G-AGBJ 'Guba', in Poole Harbour. (Later, when discharged from hospital, he donned a diver's suit and retrieved the severed limb which wore his Rolex watch - still working.)

In July 1945, having spent almost his entire life on flying boats, Bailey was appointed *British Overseas Corporation Ltd* (BOAC) Operations Superintendent, Middle East Region, and transferred to Cairo.

On his retirement from BOAC in 1947 he also retired from the RAF Reserve in which he had served for 25 years. He was presented with the Air Efficiency Award in recognition of this long service. That same year Bailey, and his then partner

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Enid Lilian Poole Bailey (she later appended 'Bailey' to her married name by Statutory Declaration), emigrated to Tasmania where his daughter Joan and her family, joined them some years later (on the east coast in the Swansea area).

When his health began to fail in the mid 1960s it was decided he would receive better care in England.

The couple returned and took a house in Tiverton, Devon. That they named it 'Canopus' was no surprise to anyone.

Captain Francis Joseph Bailey died in the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital on March 8th 1970 from pneumonia resulting from lung cancer.

El Caminito del Rey

(The King's little pathway) is a walkway, now fallen into disrepair, pinned along the steep walls of a narrow gorge in El Chorro, near Álora in the province of Málaga, Spain. The name is often shortened to Camino del Rey (King's pathway).

The walkway was built to provide workers at the hydroelectric power plants at Chorro Falls and Gaitanejo Falls with means to cross between them, to provide for transport of materials, and to facilitate inspection and maintenance of the channel. Construction began in 1901 and was finished in 1905.

In 1921 King Alfonso XIII crossed the walkway for the inauguration of the dam Conde del Guadalhorce, and it became known by its present name.

The walkway is 1 metre in width and rises over 100 metres above the river below. Constructed of concrete, resting on steel rails supported by stanchions at around 45 degrees into the rock face, it is currently in a highly deteriorated state and there are numerous sections where part or all of the concrete top has collapsed. The result is large open air gaps that are bridged only by narrow steel beams or other support fixtures. Very few of the original handrails exist but a safety-wire runs the length of the path. Several people have lost their lives on the walkway in recent times and after two fatal

accidents in 1999 and 2000, the local government closed both entrances. However, people still walk it.

In June 2011, the regional government of Andalusia and the local government of Málaga

agreed to share costs of restoration (including car parking and a museum) of €9m (\$13,150,656.00).

The project will take approximately three years to complete. Many of the original features will remain in place and the new materials that are used will be in keeping with the old design. In March 2014, the cornerstone of the rehabilitation project was laid by specialized alpinists.



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

St Helens Walking Group

The Saturday group were treated to clear sunny skies on June 21st - just perfect for the nine walkers to visit the Mount Victoria Forest Reserve. From the car park we set off for Cash's Lookout, an easy stroll with much of the track across the button grass plain on sturdy board-walks. Behind us, Mount Victoria and Mount Albert, so named for Queen Victoria and her consort, many years ago. The track then leads into tea trees with a thick mossy ground cover, and winds its way down to a constructed lookout. This overlooks the forested Cash's Gorge with a waterfall below and farmland in the distance. Back on the main track we continued on and entered into beautiful forest - tall tea trees, sassafras, celery top pines, acacias and waratahs The forest floor was a carpet of moss and ferns with little streams of water trickling throughout. We found many beautiful coloured varieties of fungi, some so tiny they can be easy to overlook. Draped through the trees were the epiphytic plants - lichens, mosses and ferns. We



eventually reached the rim of the cliff over which the Ralph Falls drop. These impressive falls feature a long 100 metre ribbon of water dropping almost vertically over a sheer rock face. A short walk down to another constructed lookout gives a great view back up to the falls and again, off in the distance, the farmlands. A last 600 metre walk uphill and we entered dense forest - this is believed to be an example of primeval Gondwana rainforest with an abundance of the non deciduous nothofagus. This completed the circuit and brought us back to the car park. A bit of cloud cover appeared, so we lunched in the enclosed shelter before returning home. A bonus for the walk today - no mishaps and no leeches!

The Wednesday walkers have been enjoying a variety of walks. On May 21st a large group set off from Healthy House and walked part way round Medea Cove, back via Kings Park. They enjoyed the last of the autumn colours, and identifying unusual fruiting trees growing in domestic gardens. On the bay, they also watched the antics of an egret which landed and waded over to observe a large stingray - there was a smart retreat when the stingray swam towards it! On the 28th, in beautiful sunshine, they walked from the Swimcart Beach turnoff up the Mt Pearson track. One eagle - eyed walker spotted a group of hooded orchids at the turn around point. Earlier in the month 14 walkers meandered their way through the popular Winifred Curtis Reserve. The sunshine wattle was in full flower and a few pink, white and red Erica's were blooming. Henderson's Lagoon was dotted with black swans and little grebes - always an interesting walk with lots of birds to observe. June 18th saw the walkers depart from Healthy House and make their way to the bird viewing point at the end of Quail Street. They continued on along the concrete pathway to the Georges River, terminating their walk at the jetty at Moulting Bay. Like the many cormorants seen drying their wings in the sunshine, the walkers too enjoyed sitting on the edge of the jetty soaking up the warmth before their return to town.



Two hours before sunrise on a cold, still morning, two men dressed in camouflage gear, with tiny LED lights fixed to their hats, were unloading stuff from the tray of a huge 4WD pick-up truck.

In addition, the messy internal combustion engines, running on methanol and gasoline, are being replaced by clean brushless electric motors. There is still a place for the combustion engines, particularly for larger models, but the ease of use and cleanliness is a big advantage of electric motors.

June was a successful month for Greg Bennett and Brenton Murphy, both of St Helens, who achieved their solo flights. Flying solo means that a RC pilot performs a take-off, a short flight, and a safe landing by him or herself. Josh Stingle, also of St Helens, was soloing again after a few months absence, but proved that he hasn't forgotten anything and it is just like "riding a bike."

Be part of the action on the club's flying days. The website (*eastcoastrcflyers.org.au*) shows you the location of its flying field. However, the weather isn't always helpful and there is a "Next Flying Days" box in the right-hand column of the site. Not connected or not interested in the Internet? 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

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



St Helens and St Marys District High Schools Extending To Year 11 and 12

As Liberal Member for Lyons, I welcome the Government's announcement that St Helens and St Marys District High Schools will extend to Years 11 and 12 from 2015. This is fantastic news for the Fingal Valley and East Coast and another example of the Liberal Government delivering on its election commitments.



The Liberals went to the election with a clear plan to invest an extra \$45m in extending high schools in regional and rural areas to Year 11 and 12. This announcement represents a significant first step toward our commitment to extend 21 high schools in rural and regional areas to Year 12 in our first 4 years in office.

Last week's announcement that six schools, including St Helens and St Marys District High Schools, will extend from 2015 is an important first step in the Government's commitment to improving education, training and skills qualifications. Under the Liberal Plan, young Tasmanians, in regional areas such as the Fingal Valley and East Coast, can develop the skills necessary to participate in the modern economy and reach their personal potential within their own communities.

St Marys and St Helens (working in partnership) will be provided with a minimum 1.5 full-time-equivalent staff to manage the Year 11 and 12 program and be resourced to hire up to five new teachers, depending on student enrolments. Schools will receive the same amount of funding for every enrolled student as colleges receive. Schools will also receive a one-off payment of \$10,000 to support staff mentoring relationships with neighbouring colleges.

Students will be able to choose classes from essentials like maths, science and English, to career oriented classes including business studies or a VET Certificate. Extending these schools to Year 11 and 12 will provide more choices for students and improve retention rates. The Liberal Government believes in education and is taking concrete steps to invest in our children's future.

Corned beef

- 1.5kg piece corned silverside, rinsed
- 1 onion, studded with 6 cloves
- 1 stalk celery, chopped, leaves included
- 1 carrot, coarsely chopped
- 1 clove garlic, halved
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 teaspoon black peppercorns
- 750g small chat potatoes, washed
- 1 bunch Dutch (baby) carrots, peeled
- 1 bunch baby turnips (see notes)
- 250g baby green beans, trimmed
- 50g butter, chopped
- 25g plain flour
- 1/4 cup (60ml) pouring cream
- 1/3 cup chopped flat-leaf parsley
- 1 1/2 tablespoons wholegrain mustard

Place meat in a large saucepan, add enough water to cover and bring to the boil. Drain. Wipe pan clean and return meat with studded onion, celery, carrot, garlic, bay leaves, peppercorns and enough water to cover by 5cm. Simmer, partially covered, over medium heat for 2 hours or until meat is tender. Set aside.

Strain a third of the cooking liquid into a clean saucepan and bring to the boil over medium heat. Add potatoes and cook for 5 minutes, then add carrots and turnips and cook for 3 minutes. Add green beans and cook for 3 minutes, then drain. Return vegetables to pan. Add half the butter and season to taste.

Heat remaining butter in a pan over low-medium heat. Stir in flour. Remove from heat. Gradually stir in 2 cups strained cooking liquid. Return to heat and stir until mixture boils and thickens. Add cream and bring to the boil. Add parsley and mustard. Remove meat from cooking liquid and slice. Serve with vegetables and sauce
