Re: Principal, St Marys District School

Dear Editor

I am writing to express my concerns regarding comments made about the change of principal at St Marys District School.

There is no doubt that there has not been for quite some time, a Principal positioned at St Marys for a period long enough to give consistent direction and leadership to get the school on its feet academically, managerially and financially.

I suggest somewhere between 4 to 6 years is required for this to occur and it will only occur if the right leader is selected and appointed.

This is not to say that there has not been a suitable leader appointed to the Principals position previously, but the length of tenure has been too short to achieve the goals we as a community expect for our children.

No one should be condemned or criticised for looking forward and seeking new opportunities with regards to work and career.

What some commentators have omitted to mention is that there are within the community, people who deliberately and blatantly do their very best to undermine the leadership of our school leader and the constitutionally elected School Association.

Also the difficulties faced by Principals, teachers and students who are threatened and intimidated by parents and grandparents of some children attending our school.

Additionally, the backlash from some parents of making a decision regarding the closure of the school on days when flooding may endanger the lives of those needing to travel on busses etc through flooded roads simply because this may affect the need for working parents to look after their children at short notice.

The need for change on the way education is delivered and how the community and some staff members resist such "new" teaching methods - methods proven to be successful elsewhere around the country and the developed world, for that matter.

That a Principal is not made accountable for how the budget is spent, and the next appointed Principal is left with an empty bank account or perhaps a negative bank balance, and relies on additional funding from the School Association to provide funds just to help give our kids a decent education is astounding.

I could continue but I am sure you understand where I'm heading with this.

What is required from the community and parents by the Principal is trust, and if for any reason the community and parents have an issue with the way the Principal is running the school then there is an avenue through the School Association to raise your concerns, and duly expect those concerns to be taken seriously and in confidence, as the matter will be addressed as deemed appropriate.

Social chatting about problems, distortion of facts, and general undermining of the Principal and the School Association will only deliver more of the same, with regard to a Principal's desire to stay or not to stay with our school long enough to achieve goals required and expected from all of us. *Continued on page 6*

Any teaching staff who oppose change must be able to show why that change is not beneficial, not just oppose without foundation.



As for accountability, the education department needs to outline what is expected of Principals, with regard to delivering desired education/staffing outcomes within the schools budget allocation.

Facts on Cannabis Trials

In the past few years there have been a number of studies and clinical trials around the world which have examined the efficiency of the medicinal use of cannabis to treat a number of medical conditions. The results of these have shown that cannabinoids can reduce the effects of pain caused by abnormalities of the nervous system and pain experienced by patients with multiple sclerosis. Cannabinoids also reduce the nausea and vomiting experienced by cancer patients where patients fail to respond to standard treatment. The evidence is clear, medicinal cannabis could assist many Tasmanians suffering from terminal and debilitating illnesses by easing pain and associated effects of treatment. With the appropriate safeguards in place it's time to show compassion and permit a clinical trial of medicinal cannabis production, processing and administration in Tasmania.

The cultivation and processing of a small crop of cannabis for medicinal purposes would also provide benefits to Tasmanian industry. It's extraordinary that the Tasmanian Liberals are restricting Tasmanian farmers from the possible economic benefits of growing cannabis crops.

Already many Tasmanians have shared their stories of the benefits of cannabis to relieve pain and suffering. It's common sense that medicinal cannabis products should be available for Tasmanians to use in the same way opiates are available, strictly for medical use. It's the compassionate thing to do. Unfortunately Minister for Health Michael Ferguson has been steadfast in his opposition of this proposal for safe clinical trials into growing medicinal cannabis in Tasmania.

Labor is sponsoring a petition calling for the State Government to allow a trial of medicinal cannabis in Tasmania. The petition is available from Labor MP's offices. Open letter to Hon. Tony Abbott

When I heard the prime minister utter his latest diatribe in reply to the Japanese prime minister, Shinzo Abe, that 'we admire the skills and honour of the Japanese submarines during WW2, I was gobsmacked and soon incandescent with rage. His admiration must be either based on ignorance, insensitivity, sycophancy or serious foot-in-mouth disease. Furthermore, don't use the word 'we'; it doesn't include me, or many, many other people in Australia.

From 1936-August 1945, the Japanese military (including the submarines) displayed unspeakable brutality causing terror across Asia and the Pacific, from China, Korea, the Philippines, Hawaii (USA), Pacific Islands, the NEI (Indonesia), Indochina (Vietnam, Cambodia, Laos), Malaya, Singapore, northern Australia and even Sydney Harbour. Submarines attacked allied shipping carrying troops, civilians and the 'Centaur', a hospital ship painted white with big red crosses visible. The survivors were not rescued, but shot in the sea.

Allied troops, women and children were imprisoned and humiliated, used as slave labour, sex and scientific and medical experimentation, depriving them of food and medicines at every turn. If anything, the native populations of these countries suffered even more; millions of lives were lost and survivors debilitated physically and mentally, often for the rest of their lives. At best, they lost all their worldly possessions.

Three submarines planned to attack the USS Chicago in Sydney Harbour, but missed and blew up HMAS Kuttabul, an accommodation venue moored at Garden Island, killing 21 young Australian sailors.

All might be fair in love and war, as the saying goes, but WE certainly should not admire what the enemy meted out on us over the years - nothing I have read, seen, heard or experienced leads me to admire the Imperial Japanese Forces.

This statement from you is not honourable, Tony Abbott. It is decidedly dishonourable, and an apology should be forthcoming.

Have your say on our National Landcare Program

The Australian Government will hit the road in August to talk to Australian communities about getting involved in the National Landcare Programme.

Federal Member for Lyons, Eric Hutchinson MP, said from August 4th, community information sessions would be held in capital cities and regional centres across the country, telling people about the opportunities on offer in the National Landcare Program and how to get involved in local projects.

Mr Hutchinson said the information sessions would be held in every capital city as well as ten regional centres, so that farmers, environmental groups, local Landcare bodies and natural resource management organisations could have a say about how the National Landcare Program could benefit their local area.

"The Government is keen to get as many views as we can, so a consultation survey will also be available online for all Australians to have their say on the National Landcare Program," he said.

"We want to work with regional natural resource management organisations, Landcare groups, community organisations and individuals to deliver simple, local and long-term solutions to environmental challenges."

Online consultation will make it easier for those in regional and remote Australia to have their voices heard.

"The Government is committed to empowering local communities to undertake projects with long-term benefits, based on local and regional priorities."

"The consultation survey is a great opportunity for communities to help shape the program in Lyons and I encourage people to participate in this process," Mr Hutchinson said.

The Government will also shortly announce details of funding for future small projects and a one-off grants programme to coincide with the 25th anniversary of Landcare.

These units combine to offer an extensive range of wavelengths and intensities, enabling the therapists to optimise treatments for certain conditions ranging from lymphoedema, post-surgical, wounds and musculoskeletal injuries.



East Coast RC Flyers news - August 2014

Moderate to strong winds make RC flying more difficult. RC flying is difficult? It can be. A pilot sitting in the cockpit of a 'real' aeroplane can rely on eyesight, the vestibular system (balance system in the ear), cockpit instruments and on the sensations in his or her bottom to see and feel any changes in the attitude of the plane. A model flyer has just the eyesight.

Is this an explanation for the many crashes the club has experienced since inauguration last year? It is partly to blame; but, unlike flying a 'real' plane, crashing is part of the learning process. Crashes will become less frequent with experience, but will always be in the mind of the RC flyers. They are also a constant source for jokes and laughter.

Fortunately, most trainer planes are cheap and made of a fairly crash resistant type of foam. They can handle a misjudged landing or a crash into a tree. However, a steep dive into the ground will result in many hours of gluing together the bits and pieces - if everything can be found.

This is not to dishearten any potential new member, but to highlight that crashes can and will happen. The club provides good training to minimise the risk of a crash, up to a level whereby a model aeroplane pilot can fly on his or her own. In aviation, this stage is known as flying solo.

If you have never flown before, feel free to visit the flying field and ask for an introductory flight. If, on the other hand, you were a RC flyer, but had a break for several years, the club is quite happy to offer you refresher flights.




Topp Twins performing in 1981

The Topp Twins have performed as a country music-singing comedy duo for more than 30 years. In the late 1990s they created their own TV series, which ran for three seasons and showcased their iconic cast of New Zealand characters, including *Camp Mother & Camp Leader*, the *Bowling Ladies* and *Ken & Ken*, roles for which they cross-dressed as 'typical kiwi blokes'. The series won them several awards at the New Zealand Film and Television Awards and screened on the ABC and Foxtel networks in Australia. The twin's documentary feature film, *Untouchable Girls*, directed by Leanne Pooley, was released in April 2009. It broke all previous records for opening day and opening weekend, for a NZ documentary. After just four weeks at the box office, it made over \$1m. To date, it has made almost \$2m in box office sales. The movie was produced by Arani Cuthbert and the film's cinematographer was Leon Narbey. The film was well received, and has been shown at numerous film festivals world wide, winning awards at the Toronto International Film Festival, Melbourne International Film Festival, Göteborg International Film Festival, Portland International Film Festival and the 2009 New Zealand Film and Television Awards.

In March 2013, Lynda married her long-time partner Donna Luxton, a preschool teacher. The Topp Twins were inducted into the New Zealand Music Hall of Fame at the APRA Silver Scroll Awards in Auckland in September

Exploring more options for retirement income products

The Government is delivering on our election commitment to review regulatory barriers restricting the availability of retirement income stream products.

Australians are looking for more options to better manage their retirement income and manage associated investment and inflation risks.

The discussion paper is now available at treasury.gov.au/ConsultationsandReviews/Consultations) and submissions will be accepted until 5 September 2014. The Financial Systems Inquiry is also considering some of these issues. There is also an opportunity for submissions (<http://fsi.gov.au/consultation/>) to be made to that inquiry.

\$11m fund SUPPORTING NEW INVESTMENT IN LYONS

Local businesses in Lyons are being encouraged to create projects to diversify the local economy, with an application under the Australian Government's \$11m Innovation and Investment Fund for Tasmania, said Eric Hutchinson MP, Federal Member for Lyons.

"This fund is an important part of a regional economic diversification package for Tasmania and will support local businesses to deliver sustainable industry opportunities, help diversify Tasmania's economy and create new jobs," he said. "I meet regularly with local business owners and operators in our area, and while they recognise there are challenges in our region, they're also very keen to see new economic growth, new jobs and long-term business opportunities created in the region. The fund is part of a \$106 million Australian Government package aimed at stimulating economic growth and new jobs in Tasmania, in addition to other initiatives under the Government's Economic Growth Plan for Tasmania.

"The Australian Government is working with the local community to help strengthen industries across Tasmania to become more competitive by investing in technology, modernisation and business capacity building. The fund will stimulate real action to build a strong and prosperous Tasmania by making a difference in terms of growth, jobs and raising living standards."

Applications will be assessed to ensure they represent value for money. Grants, from a minimum of \$50,000, will be awarded through a competitive, merit-based process to ensure that funded projects are commercially robust.

"The Government recognises the importance of reinvigorating the Tasmanian economy and identifying new opportunities. We are determined to create the right environment to facilitate new investment. We've scrapped the carbon tax and we are getting rid of red tape and other disincentives for investment," Mr Hutchinson said.

To most of us, talking just comes naturally. But I wonder if we're aware of how much power exists in words. We underestimate their importance, their potential to cause both joy and pain, to uplift or destroy, to build up or tear down, to create harmony or dissension, to distribute truth



(Some thoughts, continued)

or gossip, lies or slander.

We toss words about like so many bits of flotsam and jetsam.

There are some really important words....like 'please' and 'I'm sorry' and 'forgive me' and 'you're welcome' and 'I love you' and 'I need help' and 'can I help you?' and 'I made a mistake'. Sadly there are two others which don't seem to be used as much as they used to be: 'thank you'.

One of my favourite parts of the Bible is in the book of James, chapter 3 (in the New Testament). In this section God inspired the writer James to teach us about our need to tame our tongue - that small but powerful organ surrounded by our teeth, which he likens to the bit in a horse's mouth, the rudder on a ship and the spark which can set a huge forest ablaze. The bit controls the direction of the horse, the rudder controls the direction of the ship and the tiny spark can result in a devastating fire.

James points out that from the same organ can flow both good and bad words. He tells us that for such a small organ, it can do untold damage or great good! He goes so far as to say that no man can tame his tongue.

So what's the solution to taming the tongue? James suggests the answer is wisdom. Real wisdom. God's wisdom, which begins with living a life after the model of Jesus ... getting along with others, being gentle and reasonable, ready to forgive, overflowing with love, being honest and desirous of peace, not fighting useless battles shaped by intolerance and vengeance, not storing up hate by repeatedly retelling the negative events, aiming instead to just get along with each other, treating everyone with dignity and honour.

All too hard you say?

By ourselves, yes ... impossible.

But, with Jesus as our best-forever-friend who alone can change hearts and motives, and therefore our words, absolutely possible.


I think I'll put that sign in a safe place. A genuine Kevin O'Shaunssey, late period - might be worth a quid one day.





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

Lamb shanks with thyme and rosemary

- 4-6 lamb shanks, French trimmed
- flour, for dusting
- salt and cracked black pepper
- 1 large carrot, coarsely chopped
- 1 large celery stick, coarsely chopped
- 6 pickling onions, peeled and halved
- 400g can crushed tomatoes
- 3 cups (750ml) beef stock
- 3 sprigs rosemary
- 3 sprigs thyme
- 150g baby spinach leaves
- couscous, to serve, if desired

Dust the lamb shanks in the flour, salt and pepper, and shake off excess.

Heat a little olive oil in a large deep saucepan over medium-high heat. Cook the lamb shanks, in batches, for 3-4 minutes or until browned.

Reduce heat to low and return all the lamb shanks to the pan. Add the carrot, celery and onion and cook for 3-4 minutes. Add the tomato, beef stock, rosemary and thyme.

Cover the pan with a lid and cook for 1 hour.

Uncover and continue cooking, stirring regularly, for another 30 minutes or until shanks are very tender.

Stir through the baby spinach leaves and cook for another 3-4 minutes or until wilted.

Serve with couscous, if desired.
