Money for councils February 16, 2015

THIRTEEN councils in the electorate of Lyons will receive more than \$7.7m for service delivery from the next round of the Federal Government's Financial Assistance Grant Program.

"The great thing about today's funding is that councils are free to spend this untied grant money according to local priorities including for infrastructure, health, recreation, environment, employment and roads projects" Mr Hutchinson said. "I am looking forward to seeing our local councils target local priorities with this funding."

The Break O'Day Council will receive \$656,200.

The \$7.7m announced today for councils in Lyons brings to a total of \$30,927,960 for Lyons in the 2014-15 financial year.

Tasmanian job seekers get work-ready through Work for the Dole February 19 2015

Work for the Dole is a key focus of the Federal Government's plan to help create jobs and boost workforce participation ahead of a national rollout of the program from July 1 this year. Federal Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson today met with participants and host organisations at two Work for the Dole projects – Woolmers Estate and Redwater Creek Steam & Heritage Society.

"The Government has done a great deal since its election in September 2013 to practically encourage job seekers to find work and employers to take on workers," Mr Hutchinson said. "Work for the Dole gives job seekers the skills and experience employers are looking for, and today I've seen firsthand how the programme can help people build the skills they need to find jobs and leave welfare behind. I was pleased that the Minister for Employment Senator Eric Abetz was able to view first-hand the fantastic work which is happening here at Woolmers Esate and Redwater Creek," Mr Hutchinson said.

Mr Hutchinson said at Woolmers Estate, participants are helping restore a genuine depiction of colonial life by working on a variety of maintenance and development projects.

"The Redwater Creek Steam & Heritage Society provides work-like experiences in building, equipment maintenance and restoration of the Sheffield Jail, a heritage timber building," he said. "This includes painting, restoration of museum items, track maintenance, gardening and landscaping. As I visit Work for the Dole projects, the feedback I receive is overwhelmingly positive - from both the participants and the host organisations," Mr Hutchinson said. "Young people taking part in these initiatives are learning valuable 'soft' skills such as teamwork, punctuality and application traits that leave them better placed to find paid work." More than 10,800 people have taken part in the reinvigorated Work for the Dole scheme since it started in the 18 selected regions on July 1 last year, including a number of sites in Tasmania.

Break O'Day Indoor Multi-Purpose Stadium 18 February 2015

The Break O'Day Council at the Council meeting on Monday, 16th February 2015 approved the construction of the 'Break O'Day Indoor Multi-Purpose Stadium'. The first stage of the project is estimated to cost \$1.55m with two smaller stages occurring in the near future. The completed Stadium will be a nationally recognised multi-purpose facility.



The significance of this project is paramount for building and sustaining long term tourism on the east coast, as well as encouraging the health and wellbeing of the local area. It will provide a boost to the local economy by attracting people affiliated to, or participants in, state-wide and regional sporting groups, schools for inter-carnivals, musical concerts, annual exhibitions, large scale events, local and regional community groups, health and wellbeing enthusiasts and general multi-purpose users. Break O'Day Mayor, Mick Tucker explained that through extensive consultation with the community, the need to upgrade the current facilities at the St Helens Sport and Recreation Ground has been identified as high priority.

"A sustainable facility that meets the community's aspirations and growth potential provides greater opportunities for social inclusion and health and wellbeing" said Mayor Tucker.

Both State and Federal Governments have recognised the high priority community need for this facility to be constructed within the Break O'Day Municipality with the Federal Government providing \$500,000 and State Government \$250,000. "High quality community recreation and sporting facilities can offer direct benefits to a region's economy and were a key consideration of Councillors when considering the project" explained Mayor Tucker.



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


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Exciting new venture in St Marys

New Facebook Page a Runaway Success!

Within a few days of being set up, a post on the new *St Marys Cranks and Tinkerers* facebook page reached over 8,000 views. A video of its banjo-playing curator, Ian Summers, is the post in question (*facebook.com/stmaryscranksandtinkerers*). It was originally made for the *Go Behind the Scenery* tourism campaign in 2014, and already had national and even global circulation.

Social media is a great way to get the word out. It is quick, free and accessible. Daily updates keep it in the public eye, and it is easy to upload photographs or videos along with news updates and other information. So the new page was born, as a way to access an almost unlimited audience and attract visitors to St Marys.

The 'About' tab leads you to a site map (courtesy of Google) so that potential visitors can find it. Opening hours are listed, and an explanation of what it's all about is also featured:

"The St Marys Cranks and Tinkerers Museum showcases locally sourced railway and mining memorabilia as well as many other historical and interesting artefacts, including a wide range of ephemera and unique items. These exhibits are made available to the public due to the desire of the owners to share their collection with the general community. There is also a local history section featuring photographs of the area in times past, which is on loan from the St Patricks Head Historical Society.

The old railway station building was made available thanks to Break O'Day Council, after submissions were invited from the community for possible uses. The building was formally leased to the successful applicant, i.e. Ian Summers, after his submission was accepted.

Ian (otherwise known as Chief Crank and Tinkerer) is a retired teacher, and volunteers his time to host visitors and look after the collection, which he co-owns with his wife, Rita.

Entry to the museum is by donation, which helps to cover running costs, as this is an unfunded operation. Your donations



also help to provide tea and coffee to local volunteers.

Books on local history and other publications are available for purchase on behalf of the authors. Items on display are NOT for sale.

<u>Please note</u> - A small number of items in the collection have been donated or lent by members of the public. Ian and Rita are very grateful for these, and undertake to look after them as best they can. If anyone would like their items returned, this will be done as promptly as possible. An inventory has been made of all donated items.

Open Monday to Friday, 10am-3pm. If you can't make it during opening hours, please contact us to make an appointment; we are happy to oblige where possible!"





Postscript – Ian also sends visitors on to other local businesses and attractions. Many ask what else there is to see, where to buy lunch or

a good coffee and so on. If you have cards or brochures, you are invited to drop them in to the museum during opening hours.

NEW GREEN ARMY PROJECTS FOR LYONS February 22, 2015

Federal Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson is pleased to announce the successful Green Army projects in Lyons from round two of the Federal Government initiative.

"I'm pleased to announce that Break O'Day Council and Greening Australia will be hosting four Green Army projects in Lyons in the next two years" Mr Hutchinson said. "The Green Army provides opportunities for young Australians, aged 17 to 24 years, to gain training and experience in environmental and conservation fields and explore careers in conservation management while taking part in projects that generate real benefits for the Australian environment."

The Lyons electorate will also be involved with another three Green Army projects with the Denison and Franklin electorates, hosted by NRM South and rolled out by Conservation Volunteers Australia over the next three years. Green Army projects to be rolled out over the next two years in the Lyons electorate include:

.... Threatened habitat protection and resilience building in the Break O'Day municipality – **project one:** in 2014-15, aims to improve the integrity of the important native vegetation of Break O'Day including along its coastline, (cont next page)



(continued) waterways and heathland, wetland, coastal woodland and inland forest habitats. Activities will enhance aquatic systems such as Georges Bay and Henderson Lagoon and protect beaches used by the hooded plover and other important migratory and shore birds.

 \cdot Threatened habitat protection and resilience building in the Break O'Day municipality – **project two:** in 2015-16 activities will enhance aquatic systems such as Georges Bay, Jocks Lagoon, a RAMSAR site and project beaches used by important migratory and shore birds.

 \cdot Threatened habitat protection and resilience building for Break O'Day municipality – **project three:** in 2015-16 aims to improve the integrity of important native vegetation habits in the municipality including building up habitat corridors across farmland in the Fingal Valley and enhancing aquatic systems such as Georges Bay and Templestowe Lagoon and protecting beaches used by important migratory and shore birds.

• Restoration and revegetation at key Northern Midland and Mt Nelson sites – the Green Army will work on a landscape scale conservation program in the state's Northern Midlands on a special project at Greening Australia's community nursery and bushland management on a University of Tasmania reserve, helping revegetate 250ha and enhancing 800ha remnant vegetation.

The shared projects across Lyons, Denison and Franklin electorates will include working in Southern Tasmania to protect and conserve species and places through revegetation, regeneration and fencing activities. Each of the individual projects receives \$192,000 to run the projects over the prescribed length of time and have applied successfully for extra, small grants between \$750 and \$10,000 for specific project materials. A full list of approved round two projects is available at *www.environment.gov.au/green-army*

Applications are now also open for community organisations, environment groups and local councils in the Lyons electorate to apply for new projects from Round Three of the Green Army, Mr Hutchinson said.

"Green Army project activities could involve restoring and protecting native habitat, weeding, revegetation, cleaning up waterways, creeks and rivers, fencing, gully remediation, preventing erosion, protecting and conserving heritage places and values, monitoring and surveying on indigenous and non-indigenous lands" he said.

Applications for Round Three Green Army projects are open until March 17. Further information, project guidelines and the application form are available at www.environment.gov.au/green-army.

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

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Breast Screening:

The Breast Screening Van at this point in time is not scheduled to visit the Valley area this year.

The Van usually visits every second year with 2011 being the last scheduled service to the Valley and surrounding areas. In 2013 the service was discontinued with the reason given being a lack of interest. I believe this to be incorrect, in fact there was a waiting list of women requiring screens.

I have been informed St Marys has not been included this year in the schedule. The Van will be present at St Helens from April 27-May 15th. I, along with many others, celebrate the decision to retain the service to the St Helens area and don't want to see that changed at all.

What we need to do is support the reintroduction of the Van to St Marys for two weeks every second year.

The retainment of this service is a fundamental right of all women who live in our Municipality. Given the high prevalence of breast cancer detections in the area I believe it is essential, and common sense, for this service to be reinstated.

Our Council has worked diligently with State Politicians in recent weeks to support a change of decision regarding the breast screening.

ST. MARY'S... Examiner Launceston 8/09/1908

St. Mary's has apparently gone into recess, as nothing of importance has happened of late to move us from the even tenor of our way. A lovely fall of rain has given the farmers and dairy men all the moisture they are in need of for present operations. Dog-poisoning is again in evidence, several valuable dogs having been poisoned. This matter is one that owners themselves must systematically try to stop, as owing to the cunning of those who do the mischief it is very hard indeed to catch them in the act of laying the poison, and nothing but a good lookout with something in the watcher's possession, is likely to do much good to cope with this evil. In common with the greater part of Tasmania, the rainfall for this district during 1906 has been below the average, though the rain of this month has evened things up a little. Up to the time of writing (midday, September 5) the fall for 1908 has been 16 inches, as against 32 inches 57 points during the same period for 1907. The weather for the time of the year has been unusual in two respects - the absence of wind and

the continuance of frosts, more frosty weather having been experienced this year than for the past 15 years. Several transactions in property have lately taken place at prices that indicate values to be on the up-grade. New buildings are still being erected, notably one opposite the Post Office by Messrs. J. and T. Gunn for Mr. S. Birrell, which is to be used as bank premises for the National Bank. There is not an empty house in the town, thus evincing the solidity of its progress. There has been quite an influx of couples spending their honeymoon at Scamander lately, the last being Mr. J. Cunningham, of Launceston, and his bride (nee Miss Cochrane), only daughter of Mr. W. Cochrane, of Fingal. Their many friends were not slow in wishing them every happiness in their new sphere of life. Several anonymous letters have been received here by different persons. It is trusted that the senders will be found out and made an example of. Stabbing a man in the dark is anything but a manly action.

This is a much needed piece of work, and when the road is completed much benefit will be derived by those residents at Gardiner's Creek, etc. It is springtime. All the trees and hedges are putting forth their new green leaves, and the meadows are carpeted with the grass, while the gardens are spangled with pale primroses, shy sweet violets, and the yellow daffodils. What a profusion there is of the flowers that are, as Longfellow says, "emblems of our own great resurrection." The building in course of construction, to be known as the National Bank is making rapid progress. Several additions to premises and erection of houses have improved the look of the township. The cutting up of at portion of the "Londavra" estate into small blocks has certainly tended towards the progress of the district.

On her brother noticing his sister in the water, he providentially ran away home, a distance of about 300 yards, when his father's attention was directed to the spot by his cries, Messrs. S. Ditcham and R. Mace accompanying him. Proceeding there he found his dear daughter floating on the river. Mr. Mace plunged into the water, and handed the child out, to all appearances dead. Mr. Ditcham took her in hand, and, thanks to his assiduity, respiration was obtained in from 7 to 10 minutes. I am sure it was only Providence that has saved the child, for she must have been in the water at the least 10 minutes. The father and mother are most grateful to Messrs. Mace, Ditcham, Boles, and Coombs, also to Mesdames R. Hardy, Mace, Holloway, Cramp, Oliver, and to all those that have called and expressed their sympathy at their trouble. The little one is getting over the shock very well.



Many visitors are interested in researching family histories so this will also be an area of focus.


The first workshop is **10am-3pm, Monday 2nd March** (dates for further workshops TBA).

We do have some volunteers but if anyone else is interested in preserving our history and heritage please come along as you will be most welcome. We want/need your ideas and input.



Tasmanian hemp industry law changes welcomed by farmers

Tasmanian farmers are celebrating after the State Government announced plans to ease industrial hemp industry regulations.

The new industry laws include extending licensing from one to five years to give farmers more certainty, and increasing the permitted level of the drug delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) to bring it in line with New South Wales, Queensland and the Australian Capital Territory.

Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association (TFGA) president Wayne Johnston said farmers had been trying for years to grow industrial hemp fibre, grappling with what he claimed were many hurdles unique to Tasmania.

"It is pleasing to see the Government move forward on the recommendations of the industry inquiry that was tabled in Parliament in 2013," he said.

"This will finally allow a potentially profitable and competitive young industry the scope to grow within the state."

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

Council has awarded the tender for the St Marys Sports Centre Upgrade to FJM Homes. The new additions and alterations include:

- installation of an accessible toilet facility (fully disabled compliant)
- extension to the north side of the building allowing for an extension to the kitchen facility
- provision of office space, relocating entry point and new deck
- a new roof is also proposed to the eastern side of the building to protect the building from prevailing weather
- a new water tank
