From the ex-postie


To the community of St Marys, thank you for the last nine years of support as your local postman. Unfortunately my position was made 'redundant' on Tuesday 22/7/15.

NBN Co Hinders Transporting of Boats for Local Boat Builder 3 August 2015



The Break O'Day Council is calling on NBN Co to fix the

problem it created, which is affecting a local boat builder, when it installed low hanging overhead wires across a transport route to the St Helens Wharf.

Mayor Mick Tucker said "the installation of overhead wires was a last minute decision by NBN Co, undertaken without consultation or consideration of the potential impact on a local business such as Lyndcraft. Now NBN Co are charging Lyndcraft over \$15,680 to lower just two wires each time they need to take one of their new large boats to the St Helens Wharf; this is absolutely ludicrous" Mayor Tucker stated.

"NBN Co claim that this is the cost which is being charged by their contractors, if this is the case then we are being held to ransom by a contractor charging exorbitant rates in an anti-competitive environment" said Mayor Tucker.

Lyndcraft have already negotiated and are bearing the cost of \$12,000 for the assistance of TasNetworks who need to lift a large number of power lines, and now NBN Co are charging this additional fee for minimal work with road closures undertaken by the Council.

The Break O'Day Council raised concerns about the impact of low cables after they were first installed, to little avail, as there is no accountability by NBN Co. The federal / state governments appear powerless to make them address problems they create.

"The Break O'Day community faces the very real risk of this manufacturer closing as a result of this ongoing cost, with a loss of jobs having a flow on effect in the community - every job is vitally important to our community and should be protected," Mayor Tucker stated.

Mayor Tucker acknowledged that local federal / state members for Lyons had been working to try and address the problem, as had the Coordinator-General's office and the current cost quote was lower than quoted a week ago. "The Break O'Day Council has offered to assist with achieving a permanent solution, but despite numerous discussions with NBN Co, and what we thought was a genuine desire to fix the problem permanently, we have been hamstrung by the internal processes of NBN Co and their contractors," a disappointed Mayor Tucker said. "The time for talking has passed and it is time to fix the problem" stated Mayor Tucker.

Health in Focus

Health Matters

There is lots of talk about the pressure on the budget and the burden on the health system. However the real pressure will be that put on Tasmanian families who will need to find more money to afford the services they need to stay healthy. The Federal Government has announced their intention to charge a \$7 GP co-payment and a \$5 co-payment on prescriptions, undermining the concept of universal health care. Last week the Salvation Army released a report which found that of those surveyed 24% already couldn't afford medical treatment when needed and 34% were unable to buy medicines as prescribed by a doctor. The \$7 fee might just tip more of them over into avoiding health care altogether.

In addition to this charge the State Government has not ruled out charging a co-payment each time someone presents to the emergency department.

We know that the state's health budget is facing a \$27m reduction under the Liberal Government due to the Federal budget and that \$1.7b will be cut from health over the next four years. This will see the reduction or cessation of a number of services and programs from preventative health initiatives such as Move Well Eat Well, through to the dental grants program.

The Minister has failed to rule out the Liberal Government will not close regional hospitals including Beaconsfield, St Marys, New Norfolk and Smithton. This is extremely concerning as these centres provide important health care to regional communities and any changes to the services they offer will disadvantage regional Tasmanians greatly. Labor will continue to seek information from the Liberal Government about how they will ensure Tasmanians are not worse off when they hand down their budget in August. There's no doubt the Federal budget has placed additional pressure on the Tasmanian health system but Tasmanian families should not be fooled into thinking that these savage hits on health are the only option available to the Liberals.

Labor's deception on regional hospitals

Claims by Labor's Rebecca White that the Liberal Government is planning to close regional hospitals are wrong, alarmist and irresponsible.

During the State election, the Liberals recognised that rural hospitals were the lifeblood of communities, and play a critical role in the structure of our health system.

We committed to continuing our rural hospital services and this commitment has not changed.

We promised to work with local communities to ensure our rural hospital facilities and the health services provided from them met the community needs in each area. That commitment has not changed. In Parliament this week, we proudly reiterated those commitments.

It was Labor in Government that attempted to close or downgrade rural hospitals, including Rosebery and Ouse. At a time when major reform and new thinking is required to deal with the health mess we have inherited, Ms White's desperate scare is a very disappointing and pathetic contribution.

Lighting up rural roadside churches July 17, 2015

Country churches along Tasmania's roads will be illuminated with sound and light displays, thanks to Federal Government regional arts funding. Federal Lyons MP Eric Hutchinson today welcomed the Government support for Boomer Bay artist David Patman's project titled Pastoral.

Mr Patman will receive \$2500 towards the project, which will involve a collaborative group of artists creating an illuminated spiritual path around the state by curating a series of sound and lighting installations in rural roadside churches. Artists will work with local art and community groups to produce the installations each incorporating aspects of community history or identity. The aim is for the installations to encourage passing travellers to stop and inquire about the local community, arts and culture. Mr Hutchinson said that the Regional Arts Fund supported local artists and arts organisations to create work that not only spoke to their communities but allowed people to participate in the process of the creation.

Mr Patman's project was one of 68 arts and cultural projects worth more than \$745,000 announced by Federal Arts Minister George Brandis.

"Our regional artists and arts organisations are some of Australia's most innovative and exciting cultural producers and this support will enable them to continue to create projects that inspire, engage and reflect local communities," Mr Brandis said

The newly-funded projects will animate community spaces, provide opportunities for participation and increased understanding of artists with disability, assist in the preservation and transmission of Indigenous culture and provide opportunities for local artists to build and share their professional practice.

As a Christian community, we have decided that, regardless of politician affiliation, we cannot stand by while people are treated inhumanly by past and present government policy.

We have asked ourselves - what would Jesus do in this situation? What is he expecting his church to do and say? It isn't a hard question to answer. We must love our neighbour, and we must show compassion to the refugee and traveller from foreign lands.


We have set up actions that show support to refugees and asylum seekers held in detention in Australia and off-shore. We will help people to access accurate information about the issue in a safe and unbiased way. The Say by Cagerattler

A week or so ago I was talking to a friend, workmate and keen fisherman of both trout and sea variety, about local fishing. Both are in crisis I think. Regarding our very local trout fishery, the Break O Day Rivulet, this once amazing fly and otherwise fishing heaven for salmo trutta, we now find is not much to rave about at all. He didn't tell me that outright, but I understand that despite some great efforts by local enthusiasts the fishery is still struggling to regain it's former glory. This is a tragedy. From memories growing up I recall these great things about our rivulet - first was the ability to catch beautiful 4-5 pound wild brown trout very often and secondly there was substantial cover around the river for bugs, feed and the chance to see the river develop deep holes such as the Daisy Hole, the Big Hole and out on Harefield the Swimming Hole just as examples. The trees provide cover, protection, and most importantly feed from the tree dwelling bugs to see our local fish grow into truely big and powerful fish. Anyone from the 1960s-1980s especially will surely remember seeing some really big trout patrolling the river and I have fond memories of "Scarback". This monster I reckon was at least seven pounds if he was an ounce, or 3.5kg ... used to hang around the little bridge at the back of the school and we used to go down often to see if we could catch a glimpse. He was an old battle scarred fish that no-one wanted to catch but he would have been too canny for that anyway and we concluded his scars around his dorsal fin came from either a cormorant or a tangled fence after a flood. Many would recall him I'm sure. On Harefield a similarly sized fish used to be often seen by me under an overhanging tree at the entry to a wider hole before dense trees started further up. One Friday night after school near the Recreation Ground junction bridge I vividly recall catching two three pound browns in the space of ten minutes on worms, and so many similar sized fish abounded. The sign to tell visitors about TAME FISH was a real tourist treat when they'd go to the bakery and buy small bags of bread and then go to the Town Bridge to feed the absolute swarm of trout that swooped on the morsels. Sometimes the river boiled with splashing fish everywhere. Then someone had the bright idea to remove all the river willows along big lengths of the river bank and since then I'd suggest our very local fishery has dwindled to an afterthought and just a fond memory. This is a genuine tragedy and it beats me why it's been allowed to happen to this extent. In fairness if the people behind the decision to remove all those trees three or so decades ago knew this was going to happen I suspect it never would have happened the same drastic and total way. I hope that in future decades as some tree structure returns to the river, they'll let it stay. One day maybe in the distant future, big wild trout might again frequent our rivulet. Equally disturbing is the recent fish kill in the Scamander Estuary from algae and other associated backed up barway issues. This iconic fishery is crucial to the local economy as a 'must do' bream experience for all and the reasons and remedies have to be found quickly. These two local fisheries are extremely important for all sorts of reasons.

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
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Michael Smith, remembered for his passion



The Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group Review


The Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group is one of LINC Tasmania's statewide network of book groups. The group currently has ten members who come from St Marys, Bicheno, Scamander and Beaumaris. Each month we meet to talk about a title we have selected from a list provided by LINC. Books may be fiction or non-fiction, and range from thrillers to chick-lit, from travelogues to biographies and everything in between. This month we read *The street sweeper* by multi-award-winning Australian lawyer and author Elliot Perlman.

The street sweeper is a complex novel that encompasses the American civil rights movement and the Holocaust of World War II. The novel explores themes such as racism, guilt and memory through the personal stories of a cast of characters who at first appear to be unconnected.

The setting of the first chapter is the United States and the time is the present. The first character that the reader meets is Lamont Williams, a young African-American who has spent six years in jail after being innocently involved in an armed robbery. He is desperate to get a steady job and to re-establish contact with his young daughter. Despite his misfortunes and the injustices he has suffered, Lamont maintains his dignity and his sense of what is right. Also living in the present time is Adam Zignelik, an historian at Columbia University and the son of a famous Civil Rights lawyer. Professionally at a dead end, Adam's lack of purpose and self-esteem lead him to end a long-standing relationship with the woman he loves.

Other parts of the story take the reader back to Poland in the 1930s and 1940s, introducing Chaim Broder and his wife Rosa Rabinowicz. After finding Rosa with another man, Chaim deserts her and takes their daughter with him to the United States, where he changes his name to Henry Border: he finds that professional advancement is easier if he is not known to be Jewish.

The inclusion of Henry Border's African-American housekeeper Cally and her family introduces further examples of injustice, discrimination and racial violence in the United States. The story is updated to the 1960s via Jake Zignelik, Adam's father, and his friend William McCray, both Civil Rights lawyers. The episode involving a young black girl bravely attempting to enter a supposedly desegregated school in the face of a hostile crowd is particularly tense and moving.



When Henry Border goes to Poland after Word War II to study the speech patterns of displaced persons, as Holocaust survivors were then described, he finds more than he bargained for. He uses a pioneering technique to record interviews with these people and in the course of his research he discovers the full horror of the Nazi death camps, and the fate of his wife Rosa, who had been left behind in Poland. Decades later Adam re-discovers these recordings as he becomes inspired to pursue a new research project.

In the meantime Lamont has secured a janitorial position at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Centre in New York, where he befriends a patient named Henryk Mandelbrot, an elderly Jewish man originally from Poland. When Lamont visits Mr Mandelbrot after work, he hears the old man's recollections of his experiences as an unwilling attendant in the gas chambers at Auschwitz death camp. Mandelbrot goes to great pains to ensure that Lamont remembers the details, making him repeat the names and pronounce them correctly: this is reminiscent of the oral tradition by which events were recorded for thousands of years before electronic recording devices became available. In emphasising how important it is that the story of the Holocaust is not forgotten Mandelbrot is echoing Rosa's final words, 'Tell them what happened here'.

It takes considerable skill and more than 550 pages to weave these stories together. *The street sweeper* is based on years of research, and characters such as Henry Broder and Henryk Mandelbrot are based on real people, some of whom Perlman interviewed for the novel. The book is an amazing achievement for its complexity and breadth of scope but it is not without its faults. At times the novel seems too didactic - Adam's lecture on the nature of history goes on for too long for example. Some of the coincidences are a bit implausible and some of the connections seem too neat but when it all seems to be finally coming together at the end, it is just saved from being too corny and predictable.

The book is dedicated to eight people who are represented in the book – four young girls who were killed during racially motivated violence in the US during the 1960s, and four women who were executed in Auschwitz, all of whom died from the same 'disease' i.e. racism.

The novel is extremely harrowing: although many readers would be familiar with stories of the Holocaust, the personalisation of the horror and the level of detail make for very grim reading indeed. Although engaging, the novel is a challenge for readers, both because of its length and its confronting subject.

On Saturday July 18, several members of the club attended the 100th birthday of Duncan MacDonald at the Medea Park Residential Care facility.

Duncan is the father of Mike, one of the club's senior RC flyers. He frequently appeared at the flying field with Mike and enjoyed the companionship and flying activities. Sadly, his health deteriorated after his 99th birthday and he was no longer able to attend the flying days. However, in recognition of his interest in model flying, and to celebrate his 100th birthday, the club presented Duncan with a honorary member certificate.

Despite the inclement winter weather, club members were active improving and maintaining facilities. In addition, they were busy building and preparing new model aeroplanes. Some of these had their maiden flights on the few calm, sunny days.

However, gone are the days when a new aeroplane meant another crash-resistant foam glider. Today, more and more scaled-down versions of civil and military aircraft appear in the sky over the club's flying field. It is an awesome sight when a Kawasaki or Mustang fighter plane, or a civil Piper Cub or Taylorcraft, roll onto the runway for a realistic take-off.

Just like the St Helens aerodrome, the club's flying field is registered with the Civil Aviation Authority and all members are fully insured.

HELP needed!!! Just rescued this gal from a grown cormorant she had taken on in my dam!!! She is a rare little fella and although she owes me a few chooks she deserves saving - who can help????? 2/8/15, Stephen Taylor, St Helens.

"Unmistakable amongst raptors, this truly spectacular forest raptor has only been recorded in its pure white morph in Tasmania."

This magnificent bird came into our care at North East Vet Clinic on the first Monday of August, a very cold morning. The previous afternoon it had taken on a cormorant, and came out second best after being pushed under water for quite some few seconds by the cormorant. The rescue effort to get her onto dry land and contained safely was the very crucial first step, and after one night of being kept warm and safe, she underwent a full examination at the vet clinic.

At first glance, there were no outward injuries – but she could not sit straight nor stand up properly, and struggled to use her wings to balance, which suggested either spinal (as is common in birds) or head injury. But most of all, Karen was worried about the possibility of pneumonia, given the history of submerging under water. A strong dose of antibiotics was administered and a quiet environment was provided for her to regain her strength.

On Tuesday (2 days post event) she improved a fair bit, able to sit up and look around with good control of her head, which is when we took this photo of her, you can see she would've been a spectacular presence in the sky:

"Juveniles in their first year have pale yellow eyes which go orange in their second

year and then red when mature. Females are formidable predators about 55cm long and

about 850g in weight; cockatoo size but with huge talons. As with most birds of prey males are much smaller at about 45cm long and 450g in weigh, about the size of a corella."

Our patient was an adult female. Adults prefer wet sclerophyll forests but outside breeding season they do venture out into woodlands. Immatures are very mobile and can turn up almost anywhere, even in towns. Young females in particular are relatively fearless and can be attracted to poultry both for the chooks and the vermin that goes with them.

Most hunting is from ambush, the goshawks almost disappearing when sitting quietly in a canopy. Although not fast fliers they can accelerate quickly and dash out from cover to chase prey.

Prey is killed with the talons, unlike falcons which pin the prey with talons and break its neck with a bite. With their great size difference male Tasmanian Grey Goshawks mainly take insects, rodents and small birds while females tackle larger prey – rabbits, ringtail possums, native hens etc. And yes, a little pied cormorant has been recorded as prey before.

In 1988, there were estimated probably less than 110 breeding pairs in Tasmania, mostly in the Northwest. These days the population is more evenly spread throughout the state. In general, numbers have since risen a little but Grey Goshawks are still very rare to see unless you are lucky enough to live in their backyard. Electrocutions are still a major problem and since they occasionally eat roadside carrion they encounter cars. Another adult female was recently killed by such at Four Mile Creek.

Nick Mooney and Simon Plowright, both experts in this field, were contacted and the plan was to bring her to East Coast Nature World in Bicheno where Simon can provide rehabilitation. Sadly she passed away early Wednesday morning, with all suspecting a spread or deterioration of her pneumonia.

"Flying birds get it so quickly and severely simply because of the air sacs and hollow proximal bones allow rapid development of disease without much blood supply for antibiotic delivery", says Nick.

So, thank you everyone involved in this rescue effort, and everyone who asked about her and care about and for our precious wildlife.

The bird will go to a public museum to join the scientific collection - a proper use of such specimens in good condition.
