With the environmental report submitted to the EPA for assessment/verification there is not much to do but wait. Whilst TASWATER were happy to accept a letter from the Environmental engineer stating the site is clear so that they could replace the water main, the same cannot be said for the Break O Day Council who have stipulated that they require confirmation from the EPA before proceeding with the footpath reinstatement.

Concerned that I hadn't heard from the EPA, I decided last Monday 12, to phone them and enquire as to the expected time frame for finalising the report.

After some confusion as to who I needed to talk with, the receptionist decided to email all in the department in the hope that one of them would return my call.

At 4:58pm Monday afternoon, I received a call from a lady at the EPA and after listening to my query replied with "we are very very short staffed at the moment and I have no idea when your paper work will be processed". followed by "why, is there something important hinged on this?"

I shared with her that the Council is refusing to reinstate the footpath until they have the paper work from the EPA, to which she replied "well I will move your file to the top of the pile".

I know I should have sounded grateful but I cautiously then asked "now I am at the top of the pile, how long do you think it will take?" The reply came back "oh, probably 2 weeks".

I enthusiastically check my mail in the hope that the 2 week time frame is a maximum. I can only hope that the Council, having had copious amounts of planning time, will be in a position to finalise works as soon as the paper work is in.

I have had two enquiries about the rubble from the footpath - yes, believe it or not, broken concrete has value! As the footpath is Council property, I have referred these people to Council and to my knowledge it has been agreed that the rubble will be transported to a new home rather than land fill.

As to when, I have no idea.

I am hopeful there will be no need for future updates.

Gonski School Funding

What is Gonski? Gonski funding for schools would ensure every school has the resources it needs to meet the needs of every child. That means that schools with higher needs including being a small, regional and rural school; students with additional needs or a disability; Indigenous students and students from a low socio-economic background will get more funding.

With Gonski properly delivered, every school would have the right resources to give students the individual support and attention they need.

What would it mean for our community? Gonski funding would deliver an estimated additional \$1.27m to St Marys District School, \$2.23m to St Helens DHS and \$632,746 to Bicheno Primary School over six years. This funding would be targeted to reach kids who need it most.

St Marys District School have looked ahead to what this would make possible in terms of extra programs and individual support. These programs could be: in-class one-on-one support for many more students, alternate programs for disengaged students and additional literacy and numeracy support for every student in need. It could also enable us to have more vibrant extra-curricular programs.

There would be more community engagement programs and family supports, such as extra social worker time and community liaison officers. We could offer additional assistance for students to plan their future and achieve their full potential. Gonski funding would give the school the ability to better plan for the long term, with more stability in staffing and programs offered and more flexibility in the way these are delivered.

The social and economic benefits Gonski would deliver our community are enormous.

What is happening now? Tasmania has a signed agreement to deliver full Gonski funding over six years; however, the current Federal Government will only commit one third of the federal funding contribution to Gonski. Added to that, so far schools are not receiving the full Gonski funding allocation for each school, and have suffered staffing cuts in last year's state budget.

We have formed a community group to fight for Gonski for our schools on the East Coast. We will be campaigning for these much-needed Gonski funds to be fully delivered to our schools. Tenders open for Perth to Breadalbane duplication October 16, 2015

TENDERS will be called tomorrow for the duplication of the Midland Highway from Perth to Breadalbane, one of the biggest safety upgrades in the \$500 million Midland Highway 10-Year Action Plan.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure and Regional Development Warren Truss said the \$60 million project, which has been developed with extensive local consultation, is one of the most significant road projects in Northern Tasmania in nearly a decade.

"Crashes are estimated to cost the Australian economy an estimated \$27 billion per year. This upgrade is therefore an investment not just for Tasmania but for the national economy as well," Mr Truss said.

Member for Lyons Eric Hutchinson said the upgrade will create a safer road and more jobs.

"This project will deliver a divided four-lane highway from Youl Road north of Perth to the existing four lane southern Outlet into Launceston, just north of the Breadalbane roundabout," Mr Hutchinson said. "It will create 60 full time jobs, improve freight efficiency, and most importantly, increase safety on this notoriously dangerous highway."

Tasmanian Minister for Infrastructure Rene Hidding said the project will bring safety and time-saving benefits for Tasmania's key north-south passenger and freight route.

"Our overall aim is to bring the full length of the highway up to a minimum AusRAP 3-star safety rating by the end of the 10-year action plan," Mr Hidding said. "The design features safer access to the highway for local residents and businesses, such as a new underpass arrangement for both Devon Hills Road and the business precinct on the western side of the highway. There will also be an underpass for airport and Hobart Road traffic, and the design includes substantial consideration of cyclists, as this area is a popular cyclist link to the Northern Midlands.

"While a good deal of the works will take place adjacent to the current road formation, we recognise that there will be some disruption and delays for motorists travelling along the highway as the safety improvements are progressively rolled out, and we thank motorists for their patience."

The Australian and Tasmanian governments remain firmly committed to improving road safety along this strategic passenger and freight route.





Tasmania has been ranked bottom for waiting times for elective surgery in public hospitals nationally.

The Australian Institute of Health and Welfare (AIHW) found the median waiting time for elective surgery in the last financial year ranged from 27 days in Queensland to 55 days in Tasmania.

In the same period, the proportion of patients who waited more than a year for surgery ranged from 0.5% in Queensland to a high of 12.9% in Tasmania. That number increased from 9.6% in 2010-11 to 12.9% in 2014-15. While most states have improved their waiting times, since 2010-11 the median waiting time for elective surgery in Tasmania increased from 38 to 55 days. In response to the report, the Government said it had spent record amounts on health in the 2014-15 budget and was implementing reforms to cut waiting times.

In a statement, Health Minister Michael Fergusson said the report showed more elective surgeries were conducted in public hospitals across the country last year than in previous years. He said an increase in median waiting times was consistent with the Government's policy of ensuring that the longest waiting patients were now treated. "Many patients had waited so long for surgery that, once treated, their waiting times were large enough to skew the median wait time upwards," he said. "Clearing the longest waiting backlog can only be achieved by accepting a temporary increase in median wait times."

He said his government had delivered record spending of \$1.56 billion on health in 2015-16

The Nursing Federation's Neroli Ellis said the report was damning for the state's health system.

"Despite all the nurses and health staff working incredibly hard, the results show a complete lack of acute funded beds in the Tasmanian public health system," she said. She said hospitals were running at full capacity meaning surgical beds were being taken up with medical emergencies, which is leading to cardiac surgery being cancelled. "This [report] is just the tip of the iceberg," she said.

"We've got thousands of people waiting to see a surgeon in the outpatients department who haven't even got onto those lists yet. It is truly very damning for our state." Ms Ellis said she was not surprised but she was concerned about the people who were waiting up to 424 days for surgery.

"This is absolutely due to the fact that we've closed down whole wards due to budget cuts," she said.

The Australian Medical Association's Tim Greenaway said waiting times may actually be worse than those published in the report.

"The AMA has encouraged all governments to publish not only the waiting time to elective surgery, but also the waiting time to be seen by surgeons to be put on the waiting list," he said. "It is a marker of the strain that the public health system is under. It's also a marker that we do need to proceed with the reforms to the public hospital system in Tasmania. We're not doing well enough and things need to change. Business as usual just will not serve the Tasmanian people well enough."

Associate Professor Greenaway said the results reflected the fact that Tasmania had the fewest hospital beds per head of population in Australia.

This weather is really unusual for October as we all know - five days already with temperatures above 29c which hasn't happened for a very long time, barely halfway through the month. Already total fire bans have been enacted on some days as well; I wonder where this will lead by the onset of the summer months.

Tell you what though, the Tasmania Fire Service is already switched on. It's reassuring to know these hard working, dedicated people are on the job. That said, the onus falls on all of us, especially in low population areas like here in the valley. Two things that ALL OF US can do is to be vigilant, and responsible. Keep an eye out for small fires that may be otherwise insignificant, and be prepared to report odd or unusual smoke sightings just in case it is the start of a much more serious incident. Our responsibilities include adopting a Fire Plan (should a fire really threaten) and taking steps to manage heavy dry growth on properties, especially once we hit the expected hot summer months of December to February/March. This is tempered of course with common sense, and I trust that statutory bodies will monitor genuine fire hazards including their own responsibilities, not just the property/ land owners. I'm sure they will, or let's trust they will, because for some of our older folk, statutory growth lengths cannot be physically managed during peak growth times, or just too expensive to implement. I'd like to think that other local people will be able to help out, especially if this upcoming fire season turns out as they are predicting. Let's hope it's a peaceful, safe, summer period ... What do YOU think?

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

Cambodia Trip: Update

All staff and students have returned from the epic adventure to Cambodia and Singapore. 12 very weary students and 2 staff slept on the floor in Melbourne Airport on the way home, but what a wonderful adventure they had all had.

The kids were awesome and we could not have been more proud of how hard they worked within Donsava School. They had jam packed their bags with extra clothes and stationery items to donate to the school. The children and staff were actually on school holidays, but you can see how many children came into the school each time we visited. The photo below shows the enormous amount of goods our students and staff donated.





When we arrived at Donsava School we were informed that the quote to renovate the outdoor kitchen had been much too low and we had not raised enough money to complete this work. Instead, the school Principal had decided to go ahead with the renovation of the school library. The students removed all of the old furniture, washed down the walls, undercoated and painted on two top coats – all in over 30 degree heat and high humidity. The floor was then professionally tiled, and they moved all the furniture back in and put out the new books. (See before and after shots.)

We had enough money left over to buy library books and posters, 80 school uniforms for the families who cannot buy their own uniforms, additional stationery items and we also purchased three pieces of new outdoor play equipment – two sets

of swings and a slide. The 420 children at this school were playing on 2 swings and 2 seesaws!

We should never underestimate the value that the money we donated to this school had.

The average wage for a Cambodian family is between \$30 and \$80 per month, so we had effectively taken at least two years wages for a family to the school.

We would like to thank our students, families, businesses and the wider school community for their donations towards our fundraising efforts.

We are putting together all of the photos which were taken whilst we were away and they will be kept on one of our shared drives.

We will also be coming to classes to talk to children about our trip, so that we can start fundraising again in the hope that we can renovate the kitchen on our next visit!!





Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group Review

The Mount Elephant and Beyond Book Group is one of LINC Tasmania's statewide network of book groups. The group currently has ten members who come from St Marys, Bicheno, Scamander and Beaumaris. Each month we meet to talk about a title we have selected from a list provided by LINC. Books may be fiction or non-fiction, and range from thrillers to chick-lit, travelogues to biographies and everything in between.

This month the group read *The White Tiger* by Aravind Adiga. The novel was Adiga's first, and won the prestigious Man Booker Prize in 2008. Adiga was born in Chennai, India in 1974 but migrated to Australia with his family in 1990. He subsequently studied at Columbia University in the United States and at Oxford University in England, and then worked as a journalist for several years. He currently lives in Mumbai.

The White Tiger is in the form of seven letters written by Balram Halwai to the Premier of China, to offer unsolicited advice and information on the occasion of the latter's impending visit to India. The Chinese Premier wants to find out about Indian entrepreneurs and Balram is an entrepreneur: India, says one of the characters, may not have drinking water or a sewage system, and no sense of discipline or punctuality, but it does have plenty of entrepreneurs.



Balram originally came from Laxmangarh in Bihar state, a village in the 'Darkness' where corrupt landlords enjoy feudal privileges and hold power over life and death. In the Darkness, democracy, of which India is so proud, does not exist; elections are rigged and anyone who speaks out risks being brutally killed.

In the course of the letters, Balram explains how he left his humble origins behind to become the head of a successful business, supplying cars and drivers to call-centres. Balram is not a humble man, and it is clear that he has been prepared to do almost anything to get ahead. Early on in the novel he states matter-of-factly that he has killed his former boss and he refers often, quite proudly, to the wanted poster that reports the crime.

As a child Balram is recommended for a scholarship, his ability marking him out from his schoolfellows: he is as remarkable as a 'white tiger'. However when he is unable to continue his education, it seems his early promise will not be fulfilled. Balram was born into the Halwai caste, traditionally a community of sweet-makers. His father seems to have lost the family business and has instead become a rickshaw driver. It looks as though Balram will follow suit, until he decides to take driving lessons so that he can become a chauffeur for the wealthy Mr Ashok, in Delhi.

Balram likens Indian society to a chicken coop. In the market, hens and roosters are crammed tightly into wire cages, pecking each other and jostling for air as they wait their turn for the chopping block. But they do not rebel or try to get out. In the same way the downtrodden of India do not rebel, they do not steal from their masters in spite of the temptation of very large sums of money. It is not because they are so honest, but because any mis-step could result in the deaths of their families at the hands of ruthless masters.

When Mr Ashok's American wife, Pinky Madam, kills a beggar in a road accident, Balram agrees to take the blame: if he refuses Ashok might exact revenge on Balram's family. Ashok's family are feudal lords in Bihar state. As it happens, the police do not pursue the case but Balram is aware that he too is trapped in the 'Rooster Coop.' He begins to steal small amounts from his employer: 'The more I stole from him, the more I realized how much he had stolen from me'.

Elsewhere Balram says that in British India the country was like a zoo, but that after the British left the cages were opened and now the law of the jungle prevails; there are only two destinies: 'eat – or get eaten up'. Balram cannot fight against the system, so he must become part of it. He feels no compunction about killing his master, stealing his money, forcing others out of business or paying off the police and corrupt politicians. And he has no fear of being caught: he has changed his name but as he says - 'I have switched sides: I am now one of those who cannot be caught in India ... I've made it! I've broken out of the coop!' But have his family back in Laxmangarh paid a terrible price for Balram's escape?

Although Adiga comes from a well-to-do background and has lived outside India for many years, he spent a great deal of time talking to people in Indian railway stations, bus stands, slums and servants quarters as research for the novel. Despite winning literary awards elsewhere, *The White Tiger* has not been well received in India, many suggesting that it is patronising and one-sided, and not portraying the real India.

The chatty tone of Balram's letters and his dark humour make *The White Tiger* very entertaining and easy to read.

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
