Parks and Wildlife Discovery Day

A day full of discovery was at St. Helens Tidal Waters when the rangers came to town, full of learning experiences for all ages. Gloria Andrews taught parents and children about Aboriginal culture and creativity. Ranger Liz had a table set up of stuffed Australian wildlife, which was quite fascinating for the younger kids around the table. Michael Thow had a live reptile exhibit open where he taught the audience about snake awareness and lizard information. He showed a large variety of reptiles from the large Carpet Python to the smaller Mountain dragon.

Gloria Andrews had the table set up with native grasses, shells and eye catching beads for children to braid into very long and beautiful necklaces. Once you got into the rhythm of braiding, it just felt like you could never stop, it's just too fun. Ranger Liz's beautiful display of stuffed wildlife with the Fairy penguin, bandicoot and owl being the stars of the show. After the wildlife the children were quickly drawn to the devil masks activity to make their own to take home.

As the excitement started to settle down Michael Thow had fully set up his mini enclosure where he showed off his reptiles and venomous snakes, as the show went on Michael brought out a Tiger snake, copperhead snake and a whip snake, teaching parents and children the signs of when a snake is going to bite and how to back away from a snake if you see one. Michael brought out the very pregnant Mountain Dragon and explained why he wanted the law to change on how Tasmanians can keep this lizard as a pet. Instead, have the local law changed on importing Bearded Dragons to keep as pets instead of the Mountain Dragon.

There was an exhibit on fish care and how to look after our fish in the ocean but I was unable to see the exhibit and looking forward to viewing it next time.

Over all the Discovery day was a huge success and an educational day full of fun for all ages.

CHARLOTTE Maze Runner: The Death Cure

A Review.

The Death Cure marks the final installment in the Maze Runner series, following a group of young adults trapped inside a maze of murderous potential. This last movie features the remaining group of "gladers", lead by Thomas, trying to rescue humanity from a deadly disease that is turning all adults into zombie like creatures.

The Death Cure is full of action, with never a dull moment to be had. Multiple plots created through all three movies provide constant suspense with the audience constantly on edge, waiting for the next betrayal of alliance.

The movie is comparable to another dystopian style series, The Hunger Games with both featuring a group of young rebels fighting against selfish government plans and cruel experiments. With these movies having such strong similarities it is almost guaranteed that fans of novels like The Hunger Games would thoroughly enjoy The Death Cure and Maze Runner movies.

The only, very small, downside in the film would be that without watching the two Maze Runner movies released before it makes it can be difficult to understand. If however, you were simply interested in watching a good action film regardless of backstory, it does provide enough information to still be enjoyable.

Overall, The Death Cure is a fast paced action film, with complex and suspenseful plot lines. It is a perfect finish to the trilogy as well as a captivating watch on its own, a definite recommendation for young adults and upwards.

To finally wrap things up, the book series is well written, and exciting as well as being an amazing read if you're ready, of course, for an emotional roller coaster.






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Watch 'Wildness' and help raise funds for the North-East Tasmania Land Trust (NETLT).



February Book Review



Our book for discussion over summer was Jennifer Livett's Wild Island. The original idea for the novel was as a sequel to Charlotte Bronte's 19th century classic, Jane Eyre, but we all felt by the end of the story that that thread had become fairly irrelevant and that the story of Harriet Adair, the young widowed artist- cum- carer, and from whose viewpoint much of the tale is told took over and was much more interesting. She is hired by Rochester to care for the "mad" woman in the attic. As readers of Jane Eyre would remember, it is revealed at the wedding ceremony of Rochester and Jane that he already has a wife-Bertha the woman in the attic. From this point on Livett plays fast and loose with the old story and all the characters from Bronte's novel finish up on a ship bound for Van Diemens Land where they hope to discover the "real" husband of Bertha.

A huge amount of research of early Tasmania went into the writing of the novel and most found the portrayal of actual historical figures of the 1830's and 40's fascinating. She brings to life people such as Sir John and Lady Franklin in the early days of Sir John's term as Governor of Van Diemens Land. The book reads like a

Who's Who of those early days of the colony and we meet people such as Charles O'Hara Booth, Commandant of Port Arthur, the Reverend Knopwood, John and Elizabeth Gould on one of their forays to record the birds of the colony and numerous other officials. Livett brings to life these characters and presents us with sympathetic pictures of Booth and Lady Franklin.

Harriet is a fictional character but through her eyes we learn of the machinations of the clique of former Army officers from Governor Arthur's rule and the wheeling and dealing among officials that at times seemed all too familiar to us! They are determined not to hand over power to the new Governor Franklin. The Franklins are subjected to criticism from the press and are hampered at every turn. Sometimes it is easy to forget who is a "real" person and who is a creation of Livett's imagination. The love story that develops between Harriet and another fictional character, Gus the government surveyor, is developed gradually but begins to dominate the last third of the novel and the mystery of Bertha/Anna Rochester is eventually resolved, though it seemed unimportant and somewhat artificial to some of us by the end of the story even though that had been the motivation for the trip to Van Diemens Land.

If you are interested in the early history of Van Diemens Land and the personalities of the early movers and shakers of the colony, then you will enjoy this novel. Livett also explores the idea of the loneliness and displacement suffered by early settlers. Some of the characters long for the familiarity of the English countryside and never feel at home in the new land. Others see opportunity and freedom away from the old restrictions and repressions of the class system. This is not a difficult read and most people would find something in the story to capture their attention.






