How quickly we forget

TasWater - Mathinna and Cornwall

It wasn't that long ago Fingal was on a permanent boiled water alert. Since the construction of the treatment plant we enjoy the ability to grab a glass of water from the tap, although it is hard to actually complete this task after so long; the trust is not automatically there. You have to will yourself to take the leap, or should I say sip.

You forget there are still towns in our area who aren't able to grab a drink straight from the tap. TasWater put out a statement on the progress of treatment plants for Mathinna and Cornwall. Without being political on who would be better suited to run the organisation, the interest is for our fellow townspeople to be able to enjoy the same convenience we take for granted.

The following is an excerpt from the TasWater website 24glasses.

"Works are continuing this month for the treated water supplies in Cornwall and Mathinna with new water treatment plants taking shape on a factory floor in Launceston.

The factory was established last year to allow for the highly efficient construction of the water treatment plants in one central location. It employs more than 30 local workers with much of the site works in the regional towns being undertaken by Tasmanian civil contractors.

Reticulation network upgrades in Cornwall and Mathinna are being carried out by TasWater contractor Water Industry Solutions. The water treatment plant for Cornwall is expected to be onsite for testing in March. Construction is also underway on the new treated water reservoir and other site works with reticulation upgrade works already completed in the town.

Mathinna will also receive one of the plants from Launceston in the coming months with civil works beginning in March. Reticulation network upgrades are currently underway.

The fully commissioned plants will be lifted by crane from the factory floor onto a truck and then transported with an escort to the sites where they will be installed. They will then undergo testing before they begin operating."

Tap or Cap: at least now we have the choice, hopefully the rest of the municipality won't be far behind us.



EAST COAST NATUREWORLD







The newest addition to the family are the tiny baby sugar gliders. Inside the nocturnal house where all the animals who sleep during day hide away in the dark. These adorable little creatures crawl all over the parks keepers, who watch out for the nipping teeth of these unassuming pipsqueaks. Tasmanian devils take the spotlight at 10am with one of the keepers leading the talk about the habits and highlights of this amazing endangered species. A far more cuddly animal than the devil would be the teddy bear like wombat.



Most of the wombats in *Natureworld* have been orphaned by cars, then rescued and taken to the sanctuary where they are raised by the keepers. This human contact and coddling usually leaves the animals unable to be returned to the wild. The hand raising allows the keepers to hold and pet these compassionate creatures, who are often sleepy. Free rang forester kangaroos hop about and lay in the sun, feeding their joeys. They are not against a little hand feeding if you're lucky, just grab some feed from the front desk and give it a go. By chance you might even catch a glimpse of the white stag who stalks around the flora walk. That's if you're incredibly lucky!



Natureworld has received new enclosures and refurbishments such as the Quoll house, filled with the spotted cats like marsupials and their young. There is also the fully running café/restaurant with coffee, slices and delicious lunch and breakfast for the whole family. Can it get any worse in the United States regarding the ridiculous situation with gun laws? Doubt it. 


