


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#### Thank you St Marys Community

To feel as if you don't belong anywhere, that you have no home or shelter, and no one to support you, is one of the most distressing experiences a person can have.

Affordability of housing and property prices in Australia are rapidly increasing. Unaffordable property prices are the leading cause of homelessness. Each year in Australia, additional quantities of people are becoming vulnerable to homelessness. This is a horrifying concern for many people, including future generations, which will predominantly be affected. There are several solutions

which will influence this matter positively, however, they are required to be acted upon. It is vital that we assist the homeless and prevent further concern, not only for the people but also for the sake of Australia's housing stability. To address this issue, Australia needs your help and support to achieve the greatest results when addressing this matter.

I strongly believe that as a society, Australia is continually failing to realise how serious this issue is. Without housing stability, it is impossible for people to feel safe and comfortable. Unfortunately, the lack of Australia's efforts to address this issue has resulted in homeless figures rapidly increasing. This is as a result of insufficient support provided by Australia. Consequently, people are forced to live on Australia's streets. We do not want to grow up in a society where funds are spent on unnecessary items, as opposed to preventing and fixing the greater social issues of the world. Mandatory changes need to be reinforced to address this issue. You are able to assist these people in ways beyond belief and it is crucial that you do so. These resolutions will undoubtedly resolve this problematic concern and influence the lives of those facing homelessness. Action must be taken to address this issue; otherwise, homelessness rates and the affordability of housing and property prices will continue to accumulate. Consequently, future generations will be unable to afford basic living needs and no one will be safe from becoming vulnerable to homelessness. The importance of this issue cannot be emphasized enough. We must prevent homelessness in Australia; however, it is up to you to make this change possible. 

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Bird Cloud is a "memoir of place" written by Annie Proulx, the well known American author of such novels as The Shipping News, That Old Ace in the Hole and the short story, Brokeback Mountain. This, however, is the account of the building of a house she envisaged in the remote high prairie land of Wyoming, a place that she loves and feels a strong connection to. She likens it to the area around Uluru, both for its geological significance and its importance to the local Native American people of the past.

This book may resonate with readers who have attempted to build their "dream house" under very difficult conditions. Not only is the site remote from supply depots, builders have to contend with searing summer temperatures and dust storms followed by winters of extreme low temperatures, blizzards and deep snow that regularly cuts access to the house for months at a time. The reader

might wonder why Proulx was so determined to build there but there is no mistaking her connection to the landscape and its creatures. As much as an account of a very unusual building project this is also a detailed journal of her observations of birdlife, in particular, the geology and botany of the area and its history, both Native American and of the pioneer people. She also gives us an account of her family origins in French Canada and New England.

The "James Gang"-her builders- are four local men, three of them brothers, with whom she develops a close personal and professional relationship over the course of the two year project. Sometimes they go off camping with her when she sees that everyone needs a break! She has very definite ideas about what she wants and the men seem prepared to follow her whims without much opposition. There MIGHT be another version of the story from the viewpoint of the men! In her account, however she presents us with a picture of them all working with a common purpose. The main source of conflict turns out to be with the architect and his vision versus the practicalities of creating a liveable house, perhaps a common source of disagreement...

Although this book is not designedly about Proulx herself but rather the building of a house and the environment around it, nevertheless we learn a lot about the woman. She is certainly determined, strong minded and tough. Some members called her cantankerous! Above all though, it is the picture of a woman of acute observation of the natural world. We know from her fiction that she is a keen observer of human nature, with a wonderful, wry sense of humour. This must have stood her in good stead over the course of the build. If you've ever read any of Proulx's fiction you will find this an interesting revelation of her character.



#### The Say, by Cagerattler

These days I'm essentially a non practising Catholic. These days also I watch with dismay how the churches face uncertain futures in the wake of the abuse claims from so many victims across different Christian denominations. The Anglican church has even considered selling churches to offset the cost to compensate victims of sinning priests and other clergy.

I grew up with some great times, some comforting times later on also when our local Catholic Church provided great support, comfort and guidance to the family when we lost our loved ones. I can say with certainty that our local church was amazing to be part of.

After a series of less than happy situations that were very personally disappointing and then for some considerable time the lack of our own parish priest after the untimely death of our much loved priest, I found myself drifting away from the church. This though comes with faith in the overarching message of faith I still believe in that Christianity offers.

I respectfully suggest to a number of Christian churches that people like me might need to see them move into the modern world faster than they are. Maybe human frailty that triggers terrible abuse by small numbers of priests is intensified by having to live lives where human desires are denied by archaic rules that go back countless centuries. This of course cannot excuse abuse and the cover up of abuse but might go some way to understanding that weaker individuals within the clergy prey on the vulnerable and cause untold damage. Maybe it's time that a whole new holistic approach from the churches is looked at and a whole raft of changes are adopted. The world has changed massively since so many of the laws set by Popes, Cardinals, Archbishops, Kings, Queens and so on were created for teachers of Christianity.

Even within the churches the demographic from country to country differs to an incredible degree as explained by a spokesman on Christian theology I listened to intently the other day and what prompted this article. What works in Africa, North, Central and South America, Europe, the Pacific including Australia of course and anywhere else is not uniform and can never be, yet the rules that Christians are asked to live by are set almost in stone it seems.

As much as it pains me to say it, just focussing on my own Catholic faith, I have need to say that a strong Pope has to take the bit between the teeth and demonstrate a serious method to change in so many ways before the church becomes less and less relevant in many countries. Maybe it's our current Holiness Pope Francis or a following one but one of them have to. A great start would be to tackle the abuse issues head on and do it with compassion and yet unbending will to find and fix this crippling problem especially evident in western society it seems. The really sad part of all this is that the massively vast numbers of priests would never carry out these acts but more will continue to tar them with the same brush that calls increasing doubt on all of them. SO WRONG unfortunately though perception will often cloud fact. Even if the church was to systematically offer specific training, guidance and help to any priest at first signs of improper conduct and expect that priest to 'own up' to wrong desires would be a start. Anything is better than what has happened to date in this regard as the Pope has clearly been educated in a staunch and loyal Ireland in recent days.

The really confronting thing for me is that as the Christian faith battles in many dominions to deal with this debilitating problem these days yet the church has so much to offer and millions have been happy to rely on faith to get them through some bad times, celebrate great times and offer them hope for the future. Christianity has so much to offer and has helped us with our imperfect selves so much. I can attest to that personally on that front. One day if and when the Catholic Church in my case looks at doing a bit of "wheel re-inventing' and tackles some vexing issues facing our modern times in a modern way and not anchored to the archaic past them many more Catholics might start coming to Mass in numbers. You just never know what mysteries might occur do you?

It was a busy day at the Utas Stadium and Invermay Park on Sunday where the teams from all over came to play.





## Australia's Physical Activity & Sedentary Behaviour Guidelines for Adults (18-64 years)

- Doing any physical activity is better than doing none. If you currently do no
  physical activity, start by doing some, and gradually build up to the
  recommended amount.
- Be active on most, preferably all, days every week.
- Accumulate 150 to 300 minutes (2 ½ to 5 hours) of moderate intensity physical activity or 75 to 150 minutes (1 ¼ to 2 ½ hours) of vigorous intensity physical activity, or an equivalent combination of both moderate and vigorous activities, each week.
- Do muscle strengthening activities on at least 2 days each week.
- Minimise the amount of time spent in prolonged sitting.
- Break up long periods of sitting as often as possible.
