August's book was In Other Words by Jhumpa Lahiri, the daughter of Bengali immigrants to the USA where she was raised. She is the well regarded author of short stories and the novels The Namesake (which was made into a movie) and The Lowland. She says "What drew me to my craft was the desire to force the two worlds I occupied (as an immigrant) to mingle on the page as I was not brave enough, or mature enough, to allow in life.

This work is a non fiction book which deals with her "love affair" with the Italian language and her ambivalence over her identity. She became so involved with the learning of this language that she moved her family-husband and two children- to

Rome for two years so that she could thoroughly immerse herself in Italian. She writes the account in Italian and has it translated by someone else so that she does not somehow "betray" her new language by using English herself!

Many of our group found her motivation baffling. It is tied up with a search for identity. Her parents had tried to maintain connections with their Bengali heritage by insisting on the use of Bengali in the home but English was the language she spoke outside the home and in which she wrote and studied and made a name for herself as a writer. Yet she never felt as though she could fully identify with either language, perhaps because she was always conscious of looking different from those around her. By immersing herself in a new language she felt as if she was creating a new independent identity for herself. This is a very internal, personal journey and we learn little of her experiences with the culture of Italy or anything about her family.

In Other Words, a title loaded with meaning, is not an easy or fast paced read but as a thoughtful exploration of how language forms one's identity it may appeal to anyone who has seriously tried to learn a foreign language. It is also interesting to reflect on the connection between language, culture and identity in the migrant experience and may lead to a greater understanding of their difficulties.

"This is his lifelong dream, and we really want to give him this opportunity. 100% of our profits will go to him for August and September 2018. This young man has been living a very difficult life, facing challenges both physically and mentally."





Strange Careers:

1.The 'knocker-upper'

What did people do before iPhone alarms to wake them up in the morning? They employed a 'knocker-upper'. The knocker-upper was paid to wake people. They would use a truncheon to tap on the door or, if on an upper floor, a peashooter to send these little missiles to tap on the windows. The activities were repeated until the person was up for work... there was no snooze button!

2. The 'battledore maker'

Often the word to describe the occupation gives no clue at all to its meaning. Take for instance a 'battledore maker'. This job had nothing to do with battles, or doors, but was the art of making beaters, usually from cane or reed, to remove dust from cloths or floor mats. It appears to have been a seasonal job undertaken around the time of a spring clean.

The 'scourger'

In the 1822 muster, there were five 'scourgers' working in the colony. Their role? To wield the whips over any misbehaving colonist sentenced to receive the lash. There was one for each district in New South Wales at the time: John Roach worked in Sydney, William Reynolds at Windsor, William Yates at Liverpool, James Walton at Parramatta and William Edwards at Argyleshire.

4. The 'pettifogger'

The origin of some surnames harks back to our ancestors' occupations. Ones such as 'Taylor' (a spelling variation of the occupation of tailor), and Cartwright (a maker of carts) are fairly simple and self-explanatory. But you may not be so happy to have the surname 'Pettifogger' – it meant you worked as a dodgy or shyster lawyer.


