Now that the election is over, the decision about the Government has been made, and life can go back to its usual quiet self.

We at the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House are looking forward to working closely with BODC and the Government on the funding for the Old Tasmanian Hotel, that then Senator Steve Martin announced when he visited the Break O'Day region in March 2019.

As reported in the last issue, the money—\$500,000.00—was not an election promise, and has been factored into the 2018/2019 Federal budget. The Break O'Day Council has started the process of beginning the project and accessing the funds.

We in the Fingal Valley now look forward to the restoration of the Old Tasmania Hotel with the funds provided by Senator Steve Martin before the election.

Everyone involved with the House is extremely excited to see the renovations begin, and we all look forward to working with the Council and Government to see this project started. This will mean we will have a meeting room, Valley Voice office, counselling spaces, aboriginal interpretation room, office spaces for visiting services, and, eventually, some short-term emergency accommodation. There will also a lift installed in the future. We are sure that it will be a very exciting time ahead!

### Song Makers Workshop

On the 30th of April and the 1th of May, students of St Marys District School participated in a two day program called Song Makers. Jean Paul (J.P) Fung, Katie Wighton and Tina Broad visited the school to mentor the students and help with their song writing journey. J.P Fung is a producer who has worked with multiple bands including Birds of Tokyo, Cold Chisel and Client Liaison. Katie Wighton is a member from an Australian band 'All My Exes Live in Texas'. Tina Broad manages APRA's Song Makers program.

On day one the selected music students were introduced to the mentors. The mentors spoke about their career, song writing tips and the aim of the program. The aim was to share the importance of original songs and learn what it's like in the musical industry.

Katie performed her song 'Dear John' and explained the meaning behind it and her experience writing the song. The students were split into four groups and started developing their own musical composition. By the end of the day, the 4 groups performed their demos and day one was complete.

Day two consisted of the final touches and the recording of the demos. J.P Fung created a makeshift recording studio which included a professional studio microphone and his recording software. He created a backing drum beat for each song before groups recorded. The recording process started with the instrumentals and then the vocals. At the end of the day the students came together to listen to the final songs. Here's what the students thought about it:

### St Helens – St Marys Community Bank Branch Small Grants Presentation

A key function of the **St Helens – St Marys Community Bank** is to return a portion of its profits to the community. Since opening its branch in February 2018, \$29,000 has been awarded to community organisations via the Community Small Grants and Sponsorship programs.

Early this month presentations were made to the following organisations at the St Marys Community Health Centre:

**East Coast Motocross Club** that provides a safe, controlled environment for motocross enthusiasts to learn and develop motorbike riding and racing skills, received \$500 to upgrade its track.

**Falmouth Community Centre** was established in 1984 to organise and conduct community oriented sporting activities. The grant of \$1000 will be put to resurfacing the tennis court with Plexi-pave.

Medea Park Residential Care received funds of \$500 to help establish a dementia-friendly sensory garden for its residents.

St Helens Football Club Inc. The \$500 grant will help the Club to upgrade its 30-year-old kitchen and equipment.

**St Marys Child Care Centre** received \$631 to build a community garden to teach its young children about growing food and healthy eating.

**St Marys Community Car & Bike Show Inc.** was established in 2006 to hold the increasingly popular annual event. The \$500 grant will pay for Public Liability Insurance cover.

**Tasmanian Lymphoedema and Laser Therapy Centre** provides vital low-level laser therapy, education and guidance on lymphoedema self care and associated treatments. The \$500 awarded will help in bringing Professor Neil Piller, a lymphoedema specialist and long term supporter, to the Centre to consult with clients and share his expertise with the Centre's team.

With One Voice Choir meets each Wednesday evening in the slick, modern Performing Arts Centre at St Marys District School to sing, socialise and share a meal. The \$300 granted will help to meet the cost of transport for singers.

### **Book Review**

Our Book Group read Ceridwen Dovey's book, "Only the Animals", during May.

She is a South African born, young Australian writer, and this is her second book. It is a collection of 10 short stories which are all linked by a common theme. Each of the 10 stories is told from the viewpoint of an animal that has died during some sort of human conflict, ranging from nineteenth century outback Australia, to the battle for Sarajevo in 1992, to the Beirut conflict in 2006. We are presented with Soul of Cat, Soul of Dog, Tortoise, Camel, Chimpanzee, Mussel, Elephant, Bear, Dolphin and Parrot. This is a multi-layered piece of



fiction, in that these stories are not just reflections on human relationships to animals but they also, at times, mimic or reference various famous writers, echoing their writing styles and their attitudes to animals. These writers include the poet Sylvia Plath and her ex-husband, poet Ted Hughes, Tolstoy, Virginia Woolf, Kafka and George Orwell, among others.

The first story called "The Bones" and subtitled "Soul of Camel" references Henry Lawson, who is also a character in this story. We learn not only about the Afghan camel drivers of the nineteenth century but the question of Aboriginal massacres is raised and considered, all in the rather laconic style of a Henry Lawson short story. Some of the stories are very moving and dark in theme, but Dovey uses whimsy and humour to leaven the seriousness of tone. Indeed, Soul of Mussel is written using Jack Kerouac's "beat" language to tell the story of a footloose, travelling mussel (of all creatures!), as he follows his sense of adventure, hitching rides on battleships and eventually being blown up at Pearl Harbour! Then there's the heartrending story of the Elephant in Mozambique who becomes a victim of the Civil War there, and its devastating consequences for the environment and the people.

Dovey says that "the whole book is really a love letter to reading", and "an excuse (for her) to read more." One critic called it a "journey into empathy" and it is certainly that. It will leave you questioning the human effect on animals when we use them for our own selfish and often cruel purposes. There is a rich vein of irony in many of the stories such as in the Soul of Dog, where Himmler's German shepherd (sister to Blondi, the real dog that Hitler doted on) reveals the warped motivations of the Nazis and their treatment of humans they considered less than animals.

This is a thought provoking read, and most of our members found it stimulating and rewarding but certainly not straightforward. Dovey is an intelligent writer with a love of reading, and this is revealed in the clever way she has put her research to use in creating a complex piece of writing.
