FINGAL VALLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE RECEIVES FUNDING


FOR HEALTHY EATING PROGRAM

HAPPY and healthy lifestyles are being yielded in Fingal Valley as part of a new program being rolled out in the area.

The Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House was announced as one of the recipients of Aurora Energy's recent round of Community Grants on Friday 11th October, 2019, when Jordan Abell, Corporate Affairs Adviser and Laura Reed, Community Program Coordinator of Aurora Energy visited the House, along with Guy Barnett MP, to speak with staff and visitors.

The grant will assist them to deliver the 'Happy and Healthy' program, including refurbishing the kitchen. The program is designed to teach participants a complete healthy eating lifestyle, from growing and harvesting food from their vegetable garden, to preparing and cooking healthy meals from the seasonal produce.

Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House Manager Gary Barnes said getting people to think about their own health was a critical first step to helping alleviate the common long-term health conditions relating to lifestyle diseases.



"There are no other examples of this style of project within the area of Fingal. There have been short classes on healthy cooking but nothing long term which follows the whole process from growing, harvesting, distributing and cooking vegetables and greens."

Aurora Energy CEO Rebecca Kardos said the energy retailer was proud to support a program which encouraged Tasmanians to live their best lives.



"We support local projects and programs that foster inclusion and contribute to making Tasmania a great place to live and the Happy and Healthy program is exactly one of those," Mrs Kardos said.

After the visitors toured the Neighbourhood House, Mr Barnett commented on the impact that the organisation has in the Fingal Valley, and the wide range of programs and activities which it offers.

The grants, of up to \$5,000, are assisting to deliver projects or programs that

make a practical difference in the lives of vulnerable Tasmanians.

The other successful applicants were Strike It Out, The Salvation Army, Bravehearts Foundation, Community Response to Eliminating Suicide (CORES) Burnie/Wynyard Community Network and Surf Life Saving Tasmania.

Aurora Energy's next round of Community Grants is expected to open in the first half of 2020.


TASMANIAN FIRE SERVICE PREPARE FOR THE BUSHFIRE SEASON

We must always be alert to the risk of bushfires and how this might impact on our homes, towns, infrastructure and businesses. Community bushfire safety is something we need to be aware of over the bushfire season.

The Tasmania Fire Service (TFS) is preparing for the upcoming fire season along with the Parks and Wildlife Service and Sustainable Timber Tasmania, by holding information sessions for the public in all bushfire-prone areas. We have a number of paid fire experts in each agency, and our bushfire response capability would not exist without our magnificent volunteer fire fighters and the arrangements with the Australian states and New Zealand fire services to help each other out when needed.

This is the most effective way of responding to fires, which in one year may be minor, but in other years, such as last summer, may be bigger and last longer.

The fuel reduction program has reduced the fire risk across Tasmania. But reparation doesn't stop there, as every one of us has a role to play in preparing for each fire season. We need to rely on the expert advice of the TFS to prepare and practice bushfire survival plans, and to prepare properties by removing flammable material from yards and gutters and to know how you will act when a bushfire threatens your property and property around you.

Know **YOUR** bushfire risk. Make a plan.







The three agencies concerned with bushfires have implemented a state-wide fuel reduction program that is helping councils and landowners to keep Tasmanians safe. In the past few years, there have been more than 600 fuel reduction burns in targeted areas around Tasmania. This has been backed up by research and modelling.

In the Hobart area strategic burns have resulted in large relative risk reductions of between 50 per cent and 75 per cent in suburbs to the north, west and south. Other significant risk reductions include a between 50 per cent and 75 per cent risk reduction in the Orford and Spring Bay area, 47 per cent on Flinders Island and 65 per cent at Conara.

We have seen real world examples of the effectiveness of the fuel reduction program. The communities of Rossarden, St Marys, Scamander, Beaumaris and Zeehan, have been spared disaster due to fuel reduction burns that allowed our firefighters to successfully tackle fires started by lightning.

The strong action to date has led to the lowest rate of risk state-wide in over 15 years. However, we must not be complacent, and we must approach every fire season with vigilance and with resolve.

Our fire agencies do an outstanding job keeping Tasmanians safe.



"FIRST PERSON"

Book Review by Pam Bretz

"First Person", by well known Tasmanian writer, Richard Flanagan, was the novel our Book Group read in September. Published in 2017, this novel had been percolating away in Flanagan's mind for over 30 years before he finally committed it to paper. It tells the story of a struggling Tasmanian would-be writer in the 80's, Kif Kehlmann, with a small child and a pregnant wife expecting twins. He is eking out a living in Hobart working as a builder's labourer while trying to write at night. Out of the blue, he is contacted by a man called Siegfried (Ziggy) Heidl who wants him to basically ghost-write his autobiography in 3 weeks! This man has been arrested and is awaiting trial for embezzlement. Desperate for the promised \$10,000, Kif agrees and flies to Melbourne



to begin what becomes a nightmare of a task. Heidl is the ultimate conman and is impossible to pin down. Like a chameleon he changes his story, his behaviour and his mood, and proves a most unreliable and frustrating witness. Meanwhile, the creepy publisher is breathing down Kif's neck to get something on paper. Kif's long time friend, Ray, turns out to be Heidl's bodyguard and feeds Kif confusing information from Heidl's background. Kif feels himself being drawn into Heidl's bleak and negative world view. By the time he manages to produce a cobbled together and largely invented "memoir" his life is changed forever.

If you do a little Googling or listen to Richard Fidler's Conversation with Flanagan, you will discover that most of this book is a thinly disguised version of reality. Some of you may recall the name "John Friedrich" from the 1980's. He was a notorious conman who headed up the Australian Safety Organisation, and while doing so, managed to defraud banks of millions and hoodwink gullible government agencies. He was even awarded an OAM! He was finally caught out, and while awaiting trial, he contacted Flanagan and...the rest is in the book!

Flanagan's anti-hero, Kif, is not Flanagan, although the basic facts of the Heidl story are close to Friedrich's. Kif is something of an innocent, confronted by a world of evil, seduced by the cunning, world-weary Heidl into a web of lies and deceit. We feel his frustration and anger at this man as he tries to find some coherence in Heidl's stories, until finally he loses his own sense of judgement and moral centre. The setting is Melbourne in winter-wet, dreary and full of threat. The characters are unlikeable. We come to understand, as readers, that a man such as Heidl Friedrich plays on the inclination of people to believe shysters and frauds because they tell us what we want to hear!



Break O'Day Community Triathlon: 16 Weeks to go!

With 16 weeks to go until the Break O'Day Community Triathlon on Sunday 9 February 2020, what's your training starting to look like? Have you dusted off the bike, found your runners, dipped your toe in the water? Perhaps you've been chatting with friends, work colleagues or family about who in your team will be doing the swim, bike or run leg and if so that's great! One of the best ways to stay motivated and stick with your training plan is to exercise with friends or a group.

If you are contemplating doing the triathlon yourself you could find you are more comfortable/stronger in one leg than the other whether it be bike, swim or run, and weaker in the others. This is where the team approach comes in handy and the more involved the merrier right? Either way, we are pleased to let you know that starting from Saturday 19 October we welcome swimmers to meet up at Beauty Bay St Helens, bright and early at 7am. These friendly, casual and supportive sessions are suitable for both beginners and the experienced. Bring your goggles, a swim cap and maybe a wetsuit if you have one.



Swimming is often the aspect of triathlon people are most hesitant about but it doesn't have to be that way. The important thing is to start your training off slowly and work gradually at increasing distance over time. Swimming with flippers is a great way to increase the amount of time you can swim for when you first start out. You won't be able to use them on race day though, so over time start training without flippers to ensure you can swim well without them.

Sometimes it's hard to know what kind of bike training to do when preparing for your first triathlon. Basically though, training at a consistent speed you are comfortable with for the entire length of the cycling leg is a good place to start, using the bike gears as you would for a car. If training on the open road is not for you initially, then a stationary bike is a good interim alternative though there's also bound to be some off road paths you could take advantage of as getting used to breaking and cornering is important. If you're keen to join up for a ride session we're seeking expressions of interest at this stage.





So what about the run leg? Anyone can run and just like everything else it takes a bit of practice and that all important 'starting off slowly' approach. A great way to get going is to alternate between walking for one minute and jogging for one minute, building this up to two minutes, three minutes and so on. You'll be amazed at how effective this is in getting started as well as the distance you cover without even realising it! A good tip is to train in the shoes you plan on wearing on the day so they are well broken in.

We're also extending you an open invitation to join a casual running group each Wednesday starting 23 October at 5pm meeting up at the BBQ area on the foreshore in St Helens (across from the Break O'Day council offices). This friendly group session will be tailored to your abilities and will cover a maximum distance of up to 5km.

Another little training tip is to remember that you should be able to maintain a conversation with someone while you're jogging or cycling. If you're not able to, slow it down and pace yourself.
