If you missed the Battle at Portland Hall & St Marys Hall on Saturday October 26<sup>th</sup>, you really missed an amazing night, and the causes, for which the funds were being raised, were so worthy. Both Scouts and Free 2b Girls focus on the development and support of our young people, so they can realise their dreams, challenge themselves, and interact socially in a safe and supportive environment.

With both Hall's doors opening at 6 o'clock that night it wasn't long before they were humming with energy, excited chatter, and warm welcomes. Energised with a drink at the well-stocked bars and munching on chips and snacks supplied by the hosts, many teams got down to business straight away coming up with team names and talking strategy.

The Battle was not just between tables at each venue but also between the two towns. At the end of the evening the winning town would be determined by the average score of each table competing in that town. So it didn't make a difference how many teams competed or how many people were on each table as the average score would even that out.

So at St Marys, ten teams competed, while at St Helens twelve teams threw down the gauntlet to vie for the coveted inaugural trophy. St Helens got off to a shaky start with late arrivals joining in almost at 7pm, putting Quizmaster, Carol, about 10 minutes behind in the scheduling. But they managed to make up that time throughout the night somehow.

By the end of Round 4, the quizmasters at each hall had exchanged scores, and there was very little to separate the two towns: St Marys 24.3 points and St Helens by a whisker on 24.41 points. This was shaping up to be a close one. There was no time to check scores again before the finish and a very nervous St Marys waited anxiously, although according to inside sources not necessarily patiently, for St Helens to finish and calculate their total. St Marys Hotel had put on a fantastic band that night so players were keen to party on after the quiz. At about 10.15pm the scoring was complete and the roar of approval that came from St Marys when told they had won could have been heard in Bicheno I think. However, the winning score announced that night for St Marys had to be corrected after a count back and careful scrutiny by the Quizmasters and Adjudicators. The final official score was:

#### St Marys 78.1 points and St Helens 70.83 points

#### WHY IS THERE AN HONOUR ROLL?

There have been many wars over the ages that have decimated populations. Some have lasted decades, even centuries, but none sticks in the mind quite so thoroughly as the First World War. It was a war so brutal, so savage, and so unlike those others in living memory at that time, that it has left an indelible imprint on our society.

Australia was tied to English foreign policy, and so, when England declared war on Germany in August 1914, a contingent of soldiers was sent to Europe to reinforce and support the British effort. Tasmanian men answered the call to arms, confident that the war would be short lived. They were wrong. The huge number of casualties, often as much as 50% in each battle, meant that the original state quota of 1,000 was quadrupled. Casualty lists were shockingly long. There were so many men lost that it was decided to create a central remembrance site for each community, to acknowledge the contribution of the men

who served in our armed forces. The fact that many thousands of men died overseas also meant that there were no graves for the families to commemorate their passing, so the memorials had a double purpose. Some memorials also included the planting of avenues of trees, the biggest of which was in Ballarat.

In the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House there is also a beautiful framed list commemorating all those who enlisted from Mangana Public School. Some of those names are also on the Fingal Valley Honour Roll. The picture above is of the timber Fingal Honour Roll that commemorates soldiers who were killed in action, or died as a result of their service in the First World War, and who lived in the Fingal area. It is beautifully made of Tasmanian timbers and the names are written in gold lettering. It resided for many years in the St. Peters Anglican church in Fingal. It was "unveiled" by the Archdeacon, the Venerable A.H. Beresford, and the Reverend W Earle, at a well-attended church service in St. Peters Anglican Church, on the 12<sup>th</sup> December 1920. Two beautiful stained glass windows, in memoriam for family members lost in the War were also dedicated at the same service. (Examiner 14<sup>th</sup> December 1920). The names of the community members who built the Honour Roll are not mentioned, nor are they on the back of the board. It has been suggested that this is the Parish Honour Roll, honouring those who were members of the congregation of St Peters Church. If anyone has any information about either of these points, we would love to hear from you.

There are the names of 86 men on the board of many different ages. Richard Barwick was 36 years old. Alan Parker was 24 years old. Bert Baker was 21 and was killed in action on 4<sup>th</sup> July 1918. There are the men of whole families recorded, for example, the Treweek brothers. Albert, 28 years old, Frederick, 26 years old and David, 22 years old, all enlisted. Their mother lived in Mathinna, and must have been one of the lucky ones to see all of her family come home in 1919. Others weren't so lucky.

Robert McDougall was 18 years old, Charles Russell was 19 years old. All these details are on their enlistment documents. One recruit had to have his father's permission to enlist.

Francis Herbert Williams was a brave man. He was 22 years old when he enlisted in December 1914, and his records indicate that he very quickly showed leadership, because he was an acting corporal the following April, and a lance corporal in 1917. He became a trainer and was given two stints at teaching others the skills that he had acquired. The massive numbers of casualties forced him back onto the battleground where he was severely wounded. He was awarded the Military Medal twice for conspicuous bravery. The first time was on 3<sup>rd</sup> July 1917. In 1918 he was severely wounded in action, but his outstanding bravery meant that he was awarded a bar to the Military Medal, one of very few awarded in the War.

Other men, like Cyril Yates, enlisted, but were not able to go to take part on the battlefield. Their service was none the less valuable, supporting their fellow soldiers with work that needed to be done here in Australia.



The men who enlisted were looking for adventure, a regular wage, and had a measure of patriotism as well. They found treacherous and staggeringly difficult conditions, and the struggle to survive each day was very real. Coming back to Australia was also a major challenge to these returned soldiers. Tracts of land were set aside as small farms, and there are records of some of these men doing quite well. Others had little success, and the drought of 1920 did not help matters.

I would like to mention also that it was not only men who served their country in the First World War. There were many army nurses who also did their duty. Largely forgotten by history, these nurses received many awards, and undoubtedly saved many lives. While this Honour Roll only records the men who fought in the First World War, there have been many others since.

Our men and women are still overseas, serving our country today in many fields.

At 11am on the 11<sup>th</sup> November, stop for a minute of silence, to acknowledge their sacrifice, and their work to ensure that we have the freedoms and privileges that we enjoy today.

Maybe it's time that we start thinking about our region, especially the Fingal Valley, as a destination to come and enjoy doing things in, not as a pass-through point to the East Coast. Maybe it's time to get a few of us to talk about this and investigate.

Places like Derby have come a long way, and there are new opportunities opening up all the time, and while we may not see mountain biking as our opportunity, great bushwalks/hiking, climbing, maybe even four-wheel driving or trail bike riding in appropriate locations might one day be our opportunity.

I'd love to see a few replies to this and to get your thoughts and experiences on this topic, and to see if there is merit at all to pursue further ideas. Who knows, there might even be some business possibilities for some over time. Wouldn't that be great?

The Tasmanian State Governments, Department of Communities sought tender submission from Community Housing Providers to deliver new dwellings in regional areas of Tasmania, in collaboration with local Councils. The dwellings would need to be delivered in the next year and be used exclusively to accommodate priority applicants from the Director of Housing's social register.

#### Centacare Evolve Housing (CEH) Proposal

CEH offered construction of a number of new dwellings across locations state-wide, one of which is located in this municipality. The site located in the Break O'Day Council area is for 8 dwellings at Lot 20 Oberon Place, Scamander. #### Who is this "LCLC" and what do they do?

You have probably noticed notices each issue from "LCLC", telling you about an information day which is happening soon. So who are LCLC, and what do they do?

Launceston Community Legal Centre (LCLC) is our local free visiting legal service. They are not Legal Aid. The LCLC solicitors can give legal advice on a wide range of legal issues **not** including Criminal Law.

The idea behind the Commonwealth-funded Community Legal Centres, is to provide one-on-one free legal advice to vulnerable members of the community. They also work with communities to increase the level of knowledge about when the law may impact on someone's life, and what to do about it, so that it doesn't end up in unnecessary cost and stress. There are several ways they go about doing this.

In Fingal we have LCLC trained local Legal Literacy Volunteers (LLVs). The Volunteers are not lawyers and do not give legal advice. Volunteers have the time and expertise to fill out forms, read documents, give information and, if necessary, refer people to one of the LCLC solicitors.

All LCLC services are free of charge. All LCLC staff and Volunteers are required to maintain absolute confidentiality for every client they see. This means if they see you outside a "Legal Literacy" appointment, they will not acknowledge they have ever seen you as a client. It also means that this is probably why you have never heard of them!

From time to time, LCLC will organise "Community Legal Education" or other talks, in response to issues which seem to be topical in the community. These talks are designed to give everyone an introduction to important areas of law we all need to know a bit about. Working with LCLC, Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House has organised several talks to happen on the same day, Monday 18<sup>th</sup> of November at the House under the umbrella of "Life is Short ...Be prepared!"

The program is:-

**10am** The LCLC solicitor will give a talk on "Wills, Powers of Attorney and Enduring Guardianship". This is a surprisingly interesting area and it is worth coming along to watch myths being blown away and facts being presented.

**11.30am** The Financial Information Service Officer from Department of Human Services will give a talk on retirement income considerations.

How does the pension income and asset test work?

What, if any, changes has the Government made to the rules lately?

How do I go about making a claim? And lots, lots more.

**1.30pm** Palliative Care Tasmania will give a talk on "Advanced Care Planning and What Exactly is Palliative Care". This talk is designed to give everyone the tools to stay in control of their lives to the end.

The day is full of information you are not likely to get in one place on one day again. Everyone in the Valley is invited to join LCLC and put names and faces to these valuable local and visiting services on the 18<sup>th</sup>. Morning tea will be provided. You don't have to attend all sessions, just come to the ones that you want to know more about.

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

# CAMPERS URGED TO TAKE CARE WITH FIRES AT CAMPSITES AS RESTRICTIONS REMAIN IN PLACE

Restrictions on campfires, pot fires and other solid fuel stoves are now in place at identified Parks and Wildlife Service (PWS) campgrounds around the State to help reduce the risk of bushfires. These

restrictions are important to help protect visitors and the community. Refer to the attached map for the areas affected.

In the current dry conditions, campfires can easily escape, spread rapidly, are difficult to control and threaten people in campgrounds and nearby communities.

Restrictions have also been imposed on the use of pot fires as sparks, embers and disposal of ash from pot fires can also provide an ignition source.

Gas stoves and gas barbecues will be permitted.


The seasonal campfire restrictions apply to:

All coastal reserves from Bellingham to Bridport, the north east coastal strip from Waterhouse Conservation Area to Mt William National Park, Snaky Creek and Tooms Lake Conservation Areas, and Maria Island National Park.

All other national parks and reserves in the Break O'Day, Glamorgan – Spring Bay, Sorell and Tasman Municipalities.

Further areas may be added if the fire risk in those areas escalates over spring and early summer.

#### Get In2 Gear Learner Driver Mentor Program is looking for Mentors.

Do you remember when you were learning to drive? All the jerky starts, the constant reminders to slow down or speed up, the near misses as you took the corner too fast, and the relief on your parents' faces when you got home safely?

The State government has started a new campaign aimed at improving the safety of newly licensed drivers. It's called "Quality Time", and is built on the premise that learner drivers, and new licence holders, need MORE PRACTICE, MORE CONDITIONS, MORE OFTEN, to help them be better motorist.

"More Practice" means that learner drivers need as much supervised driving practice as possible. This builds experience, and allows them to get the skills they need to make safer decisions on the road, and be safer drivers. The evidence is that 80 to 120 hours of practice driving reduces a learner driver's risk of a crash when they start driving solo.

"More Conditions" refers to the different road states and weather conditions we experience as we drive. Gravel roads, road works, driving at night, rural traffic and city traffic all carry different requirements for safe driving, and the more experience learner drivers have while they are supervised, the better they will be at handling them after they gain their drivers' licence. Trucks make up a large number of vehicles on the road, and the skills needed to drive safely behind and in front of them are vital for avoiding accidents involving heavy vehicles.

"More Often" means that the learner sees how the time of day, and the day of the week affect the driving conditions in different area in different ways. The time of year also is an important factor, with more interstate and foreign drivers being common in the tourist season. Farm equipment are a risk factor in rural areas, with seasonal road use a part of country life.

There are 15 short videos that capture the challenge - and the humour - learner drivers and their instructors experience when learning to drive and being a supervisor.


