## CONNECT WITH NEW EMPLOYMENT TEAM IN BREAK O'DAY

A new holistic employment program, Break O'Day Employment Connect (BODEC), was officially launched on 30th September. The program is the result of a comprehensive Skills Audit conducted in 2018, which was completed with funding through the Tasmanian Government, and revealed gaps in service delivery in the area. The project aims to connect employers with skilled employees, and to connect jobseekers with meaningful employment, as well as identifying and facilitating skills training opportunities, and is designed to complement service providers already operating in this space .

Three positions have been created and funded through the project, which is being overseen by Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House Manager Gary Barnes, with a steering committee comprising representatives from a number of sectors and the community. The board is currently chaired by Break O'Day Council General Manager John Brown.

"We all hear stories of people missing out on jobs because they weren't in the know or employers can't find the person they need; this is something this project will deal with," Mr Brown said. "Assisting both job seekers to secure the job that they want and employers to find an employee that they desperately need is a 'win-win' for everyone, and something we are focussed on. What we are talking about here are barriers to employment; importantly this project has been based on work undertaken by TasCOSS and TCCI, who engaged with members of the community, job seekers, and the business community, to identify barriers which were being experienced," he continued.

"Notably there is a focus on our youth; after all, they are our future and it is vital that we assist them to find employment and follow their dreams, enabling them to stay in our local communities. The focus is not just about youth but more broadly to assist job seekers and the under-employed. At a time where COVID is having a significant impact on the futures of many people and businesses, this project is even more vital and its commencement will be a godsend for the Break O'Day area," Mr Brown concluded.

Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House Manager Gary Barnes said that after many months of planning and finalising the program's structure and wading through over 30 applicants for the positions, he was looking forward to being able to see the BODEC team in action. "There were some really great applicants for these roles, but after a comprehensive selection process, I could not be happier and more confident in the new team," he said. "We all really believe in this project and the team are all dedicated to finding solutions, creating opportunities and reporting real outcomes."

Three employees have been appointed, all from the Break O'Day region, led by Project Manager Steve Walley, who has 35 years' experience within the Tasmanian Education Department in various roles, and is also well known in the community for his volunteer roles with the St Marys and St Helens Community Bank and the East Coast Swans Football Club. Based on his experience, Stephen will bring strong leadership and focus on teamwork to the program and his highly motivated to see real outcomes from the project. He said: "Developing the capacity of others, especially within team environments, has been a high priority and motivation for me. **NEW DRONES ARE HELPING KEEP OUR COMMUNITIES SAFE.**

New additions to Tasmania Police’s drone fleet are the latest weapons in fighting crime as part of the Tasmanian Government’s commitment to keeping Tasmanians safe. Tasmania Police will now be operating 22 drones across the state, available to support Road and Public Order Services, Forensic Services, Search and Rescue and Marine, as well as specialist and tactical units.

“There are three new types of drones that are specifically designed to have increased flight times, remote area capability, 3D modelling to help with serious crash and crime scenes and the ability to drop objects into remote areas or to people. We currently have 20 remote pilots and are in the process of recruiting 5 more, to utilise the drones to assist in policing operations,” Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Services, Mark Shelton, wrote in a recent press release. “Last financial year, drones were used in 227 operations to support policing activities and investigations, which include successes across the state where offenders in stolen and evading vehicles have been apprehended with drone support.”

Tasmania Police has also located a number of stolen vehicles in bushland near Launceston by using drones, and have deployed drones to assist in searches for missing Tasmanians across the state.

The Tasmanian Liberal Government is investing \$400,000 into the drones program as part of our commitment to providing Tasmania Police with the best technology to keep Tasmanians safe.

## The Say by the "Cage Rattler"

There is something on the back of some social media and even in the public locally over the years that irritates me no end. That is stereotyping, and not least on religious and political matters. Gender and employment grounds too of course, but that is for another time.... sometimes these disjointed opinions are led from the top too, from people who should know better.

A couple of the most blatant ones are on religious grounds. First up with Muslims. It seems in the views of some, that if you practice or are born a Muslim, you must be a terrorist, a Taliban supporter or follow some crazy lifestyle governed totally by the faith. It's undeniable that there are some that find reasons to claim a right to carry out terrible acts in the name of Allah and seek justification as martyrs for that, like the evil acts in France over recent years or indeed in the Middle East and other places, but in actual fact, the vast majority are moderate, loving, caring family people that want to live in harmony. The sight of groups of Islamic gun-toting people claiming to be righteous Muslims are actually a very small minority, but too many people form an idea that this is a general view of the Muslim faith. It certainly isn't, I'd strongly suggest in most predominantly Islamic countries. Of course, this can then lead to resentment and hatred toward them, and is based on a stereotypical way they are depicted. It's probably equally true though, that their views on other faiths, not least Christianity, are often stereotype depicted as 'they're all the same and infidels' as well, which only adds to the chances that extremists will act on hate. Of course that is certainly not the case that anybody different to your faith has to be evil....the old saying that hate creates hate applies here.

Still on another religious based stereotype.... 'All priests are paedophiles'. This is just ridiculous of course, but I find it incredulous that some people actually think there's some truth to it. While the Catholic and Anglican Churches in particular have made some terrible calls on handling cases over the years, and even tried to cover up perpetrators who are indeed or used to be priests or other clergy, this doesn't lead to the fact that there are lots of the priests who have done terrible acts. There is a tiny, tiny number who have been found to carry out awful attacks, yet a stereotypical view formed by people is that it's normal. The vast number of criminal paedophiles have no or very little religious tie-in at all. They are not priests. They are just sick demented individuals.

Politicians of different persuasions are also stereotyped as all the same, based on ideals that those people view a basic mantra the party follows. Labor politicians are not all communists, Liberal/Nationals are not all blue-blood upper-crust farmers, and not all Greens are tree-huggers or chain themselves to bulldozers all the time. In all sorts of ways, they have sensible compromises on views and strong opinions, but it's unfair to lump them in all together, whichever party they represent, as all the stereotypically same. I know that even within political parties there are big differences in opinion on many issues, and some even cross the floor to vote against their own party at times.

We're not all the same in so many ways, and yet a certain view is formed based on perception and not on fact, often media driven and, nearly always, that causes problems. Us humans claim to be intelligent, but when you break it all down, stereotyping is not all that smart. A certain German mid-20th century infamous leader led his people to believe that Jews were evil, and some of his followers took the lives of about six million innocent people who were all lumped in one basket. This is probably the most extreme act of terrorism in history. That's what stereotyping can lead to. We need to not do this. Don't we?

**WARMER AND LONGER DAYS MEAN  
IT'S KITTEN SEASON!**



When spring has sprung, there is more than just pollen in the air. It is the season of new life, and around this time of year there will inevitably be some frisky feline flings taking place. As the weather starts to get warmer and the days get longer, the fruits of such spring exuberance become evident, with the number of abandoned or surrendered female cats and kittens increases markedly.

Jan Davis, RSPCA Tasmania CEO, has said that, "Kitten season refers to the warmer months of the year, generally from spring to late summer, when cats reach their reproductive prime. Cats can start breeding from 16 weeks and they get pregnant easily. With so many un-desexed fertile cats around, the result is an influx of unwanted kittens." It's vitally important to have your cat desexed to prevent unwanted pregnancies. Research shows that desexed animals actually live longer, are less likely to get certain illnesses (like uterine infections and mammary gland cancer), and experience a reduction in behaviour problems like roaming, aggression and urine marking.

The benefits to keeping your cat at home are many, and include preventing unwanted pregnancies. Contained cats are less likely to become lost or injured by being hit by a car or attacked by another animal, less likely to get into cat fights, and less likely to catch diseases like FIV (Feline Immunodeficiency Virus). Keeping your cat at home also reduces their impact on wildlife from hunting – and means you get to spend more time cuddling them!

If you find a litter of kittens, first check if they're warm and healthy-looking. If they are, leave them alone and wait to see if their mum comes back for them, as she may just be away trying to find food. If there is no mum around, don't delay in getting orphaned kittens the help they need - the quicker they are placed into the care of an experienced foster carer, the better. But remember that cats and kittens are lactose intolerant, so please do not feed them normal cows' milk.




"Now more than ever is a time to be aware of the many kittens which may soon be born to uncertain futures. For those who consider opening their homes and lives to a cuddly feline friend, the rewards of course, are tenfold," Ms Davis said.

If you are not sure whether you want to make the final commitment to owning a cat, then you may wish to foster one of the cats or kittens cared for by the RSPCA. It's a great way to make a difference to the lives of our feline friends, while enjoying their company. You will receive lots of support through their information session, and all food, bedding, toys and litter are provided. Once the kittens have gained enough weight and have completed their vaccination regime, they go back to the RSPCA for desexing, microchipping and matching with their forever families.

## FINGAL PLAYCENTRE CELEBRATES CHILDREN'S WEEK

The Fingal Playcentre celebrated Children's Week 2020 on Monday, with the opening of a display of self-portraits of the children who attend the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House Playcentre. Facilitator Tanya Greenwood welcomed those who attended, and thanked Janet Drummond, member of the Break O'Day Council, the parents and the little people for coming. Tanya noted that the children had faced "a really tough year", but were still smiling. Tanya then spoke of the educators, Mariah, Tash and Natalie, who work hard to ensure that each child receives the necessary attention, and thanked them for their hard work. "We adore your little people, and admire how you have all coped this year, and have helped your children to grow," Tanya told the parents.

Children's Week celebrates and promotes the voices of children, and supports the value of children and families all over the world. Events held during this time focus the attention of the wider community on children, their rights and achievements, and celebrates the right of children to enjoy childhood. The theme for this year is "Children have the right to choose their own friends and safely connect with others." One of the displays features a photograph of each child, which was then sketched by Tanya's daughter Sarah, and painted by the child. Sarah has been able to capture the spark that makes each little person an individual with their own personality, and the painting shows how each child feels about themselves. Also on display are black-and-white photographs of children in the early part of the 20th century, and albums containing illustrations and items made by those who have participated in the 'Building Blocks' program since it started 6 years ago.

Ollie Byard showed me his painting of himself, and told me that he loves riding the bikes, playing with the tractor and painting. "The playgroup has helped Ollie develop better relationships with us and with other kids," his mum Kayla commented. "He is learning how to share, and it will be a good transition into school. Ollie has been coming for nearly two years, and really enjoys it. I think the Playcentre is really important for Fingal. With more families moving into the town, it is a great asset to the Neighbourhood House, and needs to continue," Kayla concluded.

The display is now located on the second story of the Neighbourhood House until the end of November, and can be accessed by anyone who would like to find out what playgroup is about now. Parents and former 'Building Blocks' attendees are encouraged to visit the display and recall the children they played with, and other parents they chatted with. A picture of the late Vicky Howard, who ran the playgroup for a number years, is included. Tanya mentioned Vicky's contribution, and spoke of how she is sadly missed.

### Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> September 2020

11 people walked today in stunning weather along beautiful Steele's Beach to Winifred Curtis Scamander Reserve (WCSR). The acacia genistifolia, as well as prickly Wattle, were in full bloom as was Euromyrtus Ramosissima, pictured right. Frogs serenaded us when we walked close to the swamp areas, which were full of water after recent rains. Blue skies, no wind and a vigorous walk made for a great activity. Some ended the walk with a coffee at Swims Cafe.

Ted Thornley offered to take the walk to Halls Falls, thank you Ted! The track to the falls starts from about 1k up the Anchor Road just before Pyengana. It is an easy walk, but does include a steep descent down to the base of the falls. The walk starts in dry forest with tall eucalypts, then descends into wetter forest with ferns and mosses. The falls consist of a picturesque series of cascades among pretty rock pools. The walk was sheltered from the wind and there was no rain. Sturdy shoes were mandatory, as the track can be a bit wet and muddy after rain. Snake bandages were also included in packs just as a precaution, as these slippery serpents are starting to emerge! The second part of this walk was to the Anchor mine. We bush-bashed under Revel's direction through to the open cut full of water with platypuses, then on to the battery.

This made a big day for a Wednesday walk, but a lot of fun.

### Saturday 19th September 2020

There were 18 walkers for Bare Rock despite the weather! The walking commenced up the side of Bare Rock to the top, then followed Fingal Rivulet Rd and Mt Foster Rd until the hair pin, before descending down the ridge line to Marriot Street. There was a short car shuffle that cut out 45mins of uphill walking. Great walk, Alana - many thanks.



### GOOD CATCHES TO BE PRAYED FOR AT ANNUAL CEREMONY

For 63 years, St Helens fishermen and their families have gathered at the wharf in Georges Bay, to pray for a successful season, and to ask for safety for the fishermen and their boats, along with good catches. It is believed to be the longest continual 'Blessing of the Fleet' ceremony held in Tasmania, and this year, the ceremony will be held on Saturday, 25th October, starting at 2.00 pm.

The 'Blessing of the Fleet' is an annual religious tradition adopted by many fishing villages and ports throughout the world, to bless the boats and crews before the opening of the fishing season.

In St Helens, the ceremony was initiated in 1937 by the Anglican Church, but is now conducted by a combination of all 4 churches in the town, which brings the commercial fishing community together for a time of remembrance and celebration.

The honour roll of fishermen of the area who have lost their lives while at sea is read by the Mayor, followed by the floating of flowers in George's Bay in remembrance, and the blessing of the Marine Rescue boat, by either a local church leader or a visiting guest speaker.





## MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP

### BOOK REVIEW

*Machines Like Me* (People Like You), the 15th novel by English author Ian McEwan, was our book for last month.


Charlie Friend is a 32 year old one time anthropology student, now living in a mean Clapham, South London flat, hoping to make his fortune playing the stock market. He is just breaking even. Upstairs lives Miranda, ten years younger, a social history PHD student. Charlie would like to become more than just neighbours and casual friends. With most of an inheritance from his mother, he buys an android, named, significantly, Adam, one of 25 experimental robots, and hopes to share the programming of Adam with Miranda, rather like creating a child between them. All does not run smoothly, however, though in the process they do become lovers, and he discovers her secret past. Always at the centre of the story, however is Adam, the android, a constant presence in the household and something of a challenge, especially to Charlie.

This is a dystopic novel, where their 1982 is not the 1982 we knew. Margaret Thatcher takes Britain to war against Argentina over the Falkland Islands - and loses! Alan Turing, the code breaker and mathematical genius hounded to death because of his homosexuality in 1954, is still alive and working on robotics. People are connected to the Internet and travel in computer driven, automated cars. Meanwhile the miners' strike runs on, the garbage collectors have gone out in sympathy, and the streets are filled with protest marches. The question we could not answer was why McEwan chose to set his story in this altered universe instead of in the future, but it did give him the opportunity to reveal the amount of research he undertook, and rather lengthily at times. Although Charlie was the narrator it often wasn't difficult to spot the puppet-master McEwan behind the narrative!

The androids are challenged by the inconsistent and ethically compromised behaviour of their "masters", and some begin to self destruct. We are asked to question whether the law is anything more than a blunt instrument to deal with the complexities of human life. It's another take on the themes and issues raised by the excellent 2015 film *Ex Machina* and the British television series *Humans* of the same year.

For those fascinated by the idea of Artificial Intelligence this novel will provide yet another journey into a fascinating world that is already upon us.


