#### ST MARYS CAR SHOW IS ON AGAIN!

"The show has been running for around 15 years, only missing years due to COVID and a flood, but even though the show was cancelled due to flooding, around 70 cars still turned up," one of the organizers, Jackson Spilsbury said. "The day was the brain-child of local car enthusiasts Grant Faulkner, Bill Target, Ian Summers and Reon Johns, designed to bring people into our community in the middle of winter to hopefully spend a few dollars in our shops while having a get together with like-minded people. In the earlier years, the show was held on Faulkners Green, but due to the increased popularity of the event, we now have to close part of the main street to fit all the exhibitors in," he added.

You can vote for the vehicle you like best, whether it is a car, motorbike or pedal car, and plenty of hot food and drinks will be available.

#### FINALISTS ANNOUNCED FOR THE TASMANIAN VOLUNTEERING AWARDS 2022

Volunteering Tasmania is delighted to announce the finalists for this year's Tasmanian Volunteering Awards. Tasmanians from across the state, from Westbury to West Hobart, have been recognised as finalists for this year's awards.

A total of 24 volunteers, three volunteer programs and three volunteer managers from the arts, sport, education, environment, emergency services and the community sector have made the prestigious final list. The judging panels for the awards were made up of 36 representatives from awards sponsors and industry experts, and judging was completed on 21 April 2022.

The winners will be announced at an awards ceremony on Friday, 20 May at Blundstone Arena, during National Volunteer Week. Her Excellency the Honourable Barbara Baker AC, Governor of Tasmania is the patron for the event and will attend the ceremony.

National Volunteer Week celebrates the significant contribution of Australia's almost six million volunteers, who dedicate more than 600 million hours each year to help others. The theme for National Volunteer Week 2022 is 'Better Together'. Volunteering brings people together - it builds communities and creates a better society for everyone. It's a chance to celebrate the vital work that volunteers contribute to our communities. Volunteering Tasmania's CEO Dr Lisa Schimanski said, "Volunteering is not measured through the number of hours people give, but by the connection and impact of what they're doing. It doesn't matter if you are giving one hour a week, a few hours each month, one day a year or more, collectively volunteers are contributing an estimated \$4 billion dollars to Tasmania each year and most importantly, providing enormous social and cultural benefits. For this, we thank them all."

In the 'Education, Science and Technology Volunteer Award' category, which is supported by Spirit Super, Rosina Gallace, who is the president of the St Helens Online Access Centre Association, has been nominated. The organization assists members of the community and beyond in their digital literacy needs. She displays a commitment to making the Online Access Centre an integral part of the St Helens community through sourcing volunteers and securing funding. Rosina's hard work has enabled the centre to be a fully functioning, successful and welcoming organisation.





The St Helens Hospital Auxiliary Recycling Shop has been nominated in the 'Volunteer Program or Group of the Year Award' category. This organization came to life five years ago when the auxiliary identified the need to raise money for the new hospital which was to be built in the town. In April 2019, the hospital opened, and since then the recycling shop has gone from strength to strength, with items donated for resale, raising vital funds for the hospital. The team of enthusiastic volunteers at the shop raised more than \$100,000 to support the fit-out of the palliative care unit at the hospital. The category is supported by CatholicCare Tasmania.

Well-known St Helens resident Barry Le Fevre is a finalist in the 'Lifetime Achievement

**Volunteer Award'.** Barry has been a tireless volunteer for decades, working harmoniously with others to provide opportunities to support his local community, and Tasmania as a whole. He has devoted thousands of volunteer hours to a range of organisations, including sporting organisations such as the East Coast Swans Football Club, as well as community fundraising projects, and mental health initiatives. Barry's ethos is to enrich the lives of those around him and bring about lasting initiatives which improve well-being on all levels. This category is supported by Aurora Energy.



"The Tasmanian Volunteering Awards celebrate those amazing people contributing to their communities in a multitude of ways, and every contribution is significant," Lisa concluded.

#### HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW OUR FEDERAL ELECTORATE OF LYONS?

All Australian citizens aged 18 years or over who are enrolled to vote, elect people to represent them in the two houses of the Commonwealth Parliament – the Senate and the House of Representatives. Australia is divided into areas called electoral divisions. Voters in each electoral division cast a vote to elect one person (a Member of Parliament) to represent them in the House of Representatives. Our electorate is the seat of Lyons. You can vote locally at the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House and St Marys Town Hall 8am – 6pm on the 21<sup>st</sup> May

The electorate of Lyons is named after both the long-serving former prime minister of Australia Joseph Aloysius Lyons, and Dame Enid Muriel Lyons, the first woman to join the House of Representatives. Lyons is a rural seat and Tasmania's largest, spanning 35,721 square kilometres. Lyons stretches along Tasmania's east coast and extends west to include the central and southern midlands.

- ♦ English is not the main language at home for 2.01% in Lyons. 6.5% of households in the state and 22.2% nationally speak a language other than English at home.
- ♦ The most common non-English language in the electorate is German. Across Tasmania the top language is Mandarin.
- ♦ A bachelor's degree is the highest level of education for 5% of the electorate. This is true for 16.2% of the state and 22.0% of the nation.

#### Wealth and inequality:

- ♦ 22.73% of the population live in the most disadvantaged socioeconomic areas of the country.
- ♦ The median personal weekly income is \$500-\$649. The median is \$573 for the state and \$662 nationally.
- ♦ 14.43% of the electorate are on old age pensions. This compares 14.21% in the state.
- ♦ 23.61% of the electorate are renters and 75.57% homeowners. 27.3% of the state and 30.9% of the nation are renters.



- ♦ 68.0% of the electorate have had more than two Covid vaccinations. The same is true for 58.25% of the state and 55.81% nationally.
- ♦ 14.21% of the electorate have three or more chronic illnesses. This is 2nd out of 151 nationally.

Voting on Saturday 21st May is compulsory. Make sure you have your say!

#### TAKE THE BLOODY OATH AND HELP SAVE LIVES

Jen Butler MP, Labor Member for Lyons, is a regular blood donor, and is keen to assist Australia Red Cross in asking Tasmanians to roll up their sleeves and donate. "Your blood is precious, and your donations are truly life-saving," Ms Butler said.

There is a nation-wide shortage of donated blood, and Tasmanian health services and the Australian Red Cross are calling out for more Tasmanians to help aid the drive. A series of disasters across Australia have meant that blood is more precious than ever. COVID-19 has affected supply chain and staffing, as well regular donators' planned visits to the Red Cross. The floods in New South Wales and Queensland have also impacted the blood supply. The biggest need is people with A or O blood types, as they make up the majority of people in hospital who require donated blood.

"The staff are fantastic, friendly and very comforting," Ms Butler went on to say. "They are more than happy to answer any questions and inquiries. One in three people will need donated blood in their lifetime. The person you are saving could be a friend, family member or loved one. So I encourage anyone, if you have a spare hour or two, please go forward and donate to the Red Cross."

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#### IN THE KITCHEN WITH KIRSTEN



How did you celebrate Mothers' Day? I asked someone the other day what they would be doing for Mothers' Day. Interestingly they said they don't celebrate Mother's Day but instead an English tradition called Mothering Sunday, which is ultimately the same but on a different day. I guess its all about acknowledging mums, whether they be biological, step, foster or other, or perhaps anyone taking that mum role.

I asked my students what does a good mum mean to you and the comments came back such as, "A person who cares about you... a person who never judges... someone who always makes sure you have treats... someone who truly actually thinks about you as a person and is there for whenever you need them." So... I hope you thought about those people who take on that role as a mum to you and your friends, and maybe just to anyone who needs it.

I would like to say 'Thank you', especially to my mum, to all my sisters and sisters-in-law who are mums, aunts and nieces who are mums, and to all you other mums in the world. I hope you had a HAPPY MOTHERS' DAY! We salute you for everything you do.

So, if you want to treat your special person, mum etc, here's a snazzy version of French Toast, using egg bread, that's easy enough for children to make themselves. You can make the orange butter the day before and, if you like, fry breakfast sausages or bacon separately to serve along with the French toast.

My Deluxe French Toast with Orange Butter and Fresh Fruit Medley; this recipe makes 4 servings.

#### Orange Butter:

1/2 cup (125 ml) unsalted butter 1 tsp (5 ml) finely grated orange rind

1 tbsp (20 ml) orange juice, room temperature

Lightly warm the butter and then beat using a wooden spoon until softened and fluffy; mix in orange rind and juice. Cover and chill.

#### Fresh Fruit Medley:

12 large strawberries 1 kiwifruit 1/2 cantaloupe 1 orange

Hull strawberries. Peel kiwifruit. Seed cantaloupe and cut away the rind. Cut kiwi and cantaloupe into 5mm slices. Thinly slice and seed orange. Store fruit separately in the refrigerator while preparing toast.

#### French Toast:

4 eggs 1/3 cup (75 ml) light cream
1/4 cup maple syrup 2 tbsp (40 ml) orange juice
1/2 tsp vanilla 1/4 tsp freshly grated nutmeg
1 pinch cinnamon 1/4 cup butter (approx.)
8 slices good bread, sliced about 3/4" thick 2 tbsp icing sugar

Mint sprigs, optional Maple syrup, optional Maple syrup, optional

In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, cream, maple syrup, (you can use rice malt or agave syrup), orange juice, vanilla, nutmeg, and cinnamon: set aside.

In a large frypan over medium heat, melt 1 tbsp of the butter. Dip 1 slice of bread at a time into the egg mixture, press down and let soak for 10 seconds; turn and press again for 10 seconds. Lift out, letting excess egg mixture drip back into the bowl. Fry soaked bread, in batches, for 1-1/2 to 2 minutes on each side or until golden brown, adding more butter to frypan as needed. Transfer toast to a baking tray or serving dish and keep warm in 70°C (150°F) oven while frying the remaining bread.

Place 2 slices of toast on each plate; garnish with an assortment of fruit. Dust with icing sugar and top with a dollop of Orange

Butter. Garnish with a mint sprig and orange sections, and drizzle with maple syrup, if using. A nice dollop of good King Island cream or yoghurt also makes a lush addition.



#### **MATHINNA GOLD**

Mathinna was proclaimed a town on 26th March 1872; previously it was known as Black Boy when the first gold was discovered at Black Horse Gully Creek and Long Gully Creek. How early this event happened is a bit obscure, but in 1855 a report from the police magistrate stated that a number of miners from Mangana gold fields had moved to the Black Boy Plains, which was situated between the sites marked out for townships named Evercreech and Fonthill.

In the week ending 2nd August 1856, the number of men employed at the goldfields was 18 and the amount of gold found was

1 1/2oz's, with half an ounce being found by an old man in one day. Black Horse Gully was later the site of 'Volunteer Consolidated' mine and then the 'Golden Hinge' mine. J M Dooley in 1870 had developed the 'City of Hobart' mine, and by now the Black Boy goldfields was known as the 'New Ballarat'. There were 40 to 50 men in small parties sinking holes at Lucky Marsh, and the holes were being bottomed at 3 - 25 feet. A store had opened in the middle of the gold fields by Mr Sutherland, and there were a number of canvas tents. The sinkings were light and bottoms were blue-pipe clay, producing nice nuggety gold averaging an ounce a week for nearly every man located at the diggings, with an ounce being worth £4.

In November 1872 it was reported that at the Black Boy there was: the 'City of

Hobart' who crushed 100 tons and yielded 60 oz's; 'Pride of Mathinna' - 30 tons and yielded 8oz's; 'Monarch' - 15 tons and yielded 1oz; 'Golden Gate' (Grieves & Co.) - 90 tons and yielded 4 dwts to the ton; and 'Caledonia' - 49 tons and yielded 4 dwts to the ton, and another crushing of 16 ton and yielded 7 dwts to the ton. 'Dwt' is a pennyweight, equal to 1/20th of an ounce. 'City of Melbourne' was carting stone to the Caledonian battery for crushing and Perseverance, - Messrs Grieve and Turner - applied for a lease of 10 acres. 'Half-Caste' was down to 35ft, the reef was 18 inches wide and the stone showed well, and Mr Millar and party had found a new reef in the township between Black Boy Hotel and Mr. Goodall's house. The 'City of Hobart' mine by now was crushing night and day, and by the end of 1877 they had reached the 500ft level. But it was short lived, as at the lower level the stone was of poor quality. By June 1878, the claim was worked by tributers and they only managed to yield 68oz of gold in a four-week period. By September, the 'Tribute' had run out and the company was wound up.

By this time, a lot of families had left and headed for Brandy Creek (Beaconsfield) and Goulds County. At the end of 1878, a new company had formed, 'The New White Boy Reef', and the town was once more a bustling hub of activity. 1885 saw the once-prosperous gold field abandoned once again with just a few diggers left working the alluvial deposits. All machinery had been moved and the 20 stamp heads that were at Mt Victoria were sitting idle for want of quartz to crush. Mr A Loane discovered the site of the New Golden Gate mine in 1887, and by March 1889, a 10 head battery began crushing, which produced 1448oz of gold worth £5792 pounds. This mine became significant, as it proved to the investors that gold could be found at great depth, as previously they had been scared off deep sinking. When gold was found at the 100ft level, the 'New Golden Gate' was the deepest gold mine in the colony.

Between 1888 and 1904, the 'New Golden Gate' mine produced approximately 232,225 ounces of gold and paid £355,200 in dividends. The shaft was sunk to a level of 1800ft and a winze was put down on the east reef to a further depth of 103ft, and total depth was 1903ft below the surface. The work from 1300ft downwards was carried out between 1904–1908. Between 1888 and 1912, 260,000oz of gold had been found. The company wound up its operations in 1912, and the leases were sold to Edward Moses, where he continued operations until 1923 with reasonable success.





Mr W G Stephens and Mr David Dick discovered the 'Miners Dream' mine after one of the miners had a dream that he had discovered a lode in the exact location. They went searching and sure enough, just below the surface, there was the capping of a lode close to the 'New Golden Gate' workings. By July 1904 they had followed the lode to the 100ft level and it paid well. Total gold from 80 tons was 388 ½ oz, which was worth £4, 0 shillings and 6 pence. The 'Miner's Dream' was destroyed by fire on 10th November 1927 and the mine was abandoned.

There were approximately 55 mines and mine sites, maybe more; some would have had a name change as the lease was taken over, while others just closed. Some companies moved out and others moved in and the history is rich.

#### 5 MINUTES WITH THE MAYOR



As I mentioned in my March column, Council was lucky enough to secure \$1.8million in funding through the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grants funding program. This money will fund four projects in the Valley; a Telecommunications Cell at Mangana, a multi-purpose community hub at St Marys, a youth park at Fingal and a community shed in Fingal.

Council officers are working on these projects now with two, the St Marys Multi-purpose hub and the Fingal Youth Park, both out for community consultation at the moment.

Council staff held a meeting in St Marys a couple of weeks ago with the user groups of the St Marys Sports Complex to show them a concept plan and discuss their vision for the multi-user hub. There was a great turn out, and Council staff received some great feedback on the concept plan which have been passed on to the architects. Once this feedback has been incorporated into the concept plan, we will start asking the wider Valley community what their thoughts are. The vision of this project is to deliver a building capable of housing the gym, change rooms etc, but which can also be used as an evacuation centre if ever required.

met with adjoining property owners, as well as presented the Draft Concept Plans to the community as part of the Township

Review meeting. But there will be more opportunity for the community to have their thoughts heard. When we are ready we will publicise this in our newsletter, website and social media.

The Fingal Community Shed project we are delivering in partnership with the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House and it will be located within the House's footprint. The idea is that the shed will provide a place for people of the Valley to connect. The space will provide both woodworking and metal working equipment.

When opportunities to get involved with these projects come up we will promote them through our newsletter and social media. 
