supported attendance by Day Centre clients.

A morning tea was provided, with recipes from the Families Tasmania Family Food Patch Program, including carrot cake balls, pikelets, pear dip and tomato and chickpea soup. Attendees enjoyed a range of craft activities such as fabric painting on calico bags - to take home - lots of freebies, drawing, storytelling, rock art and much more.

We hope to make this an annual event and to continue to build on these connections all year around.

### **POPPING UP IN A TOWN NEAR YOU!**

Service Tasmania is hitting the road with their mobile pop-up shop this October and November, visiting St Marys on Wednesday 16th and Thursday 17th November.

Providing Tasmanians with real choice in how to access government services is a big focus for Service Tasmania. While their 27 service centres put face-to-face services within easy reach for many people, they know that certain communities, like St Marys in Tassie's beautiful Fingal Valley, are still distanced from these physical shop locations.

The pop-up shop concept was first trialled last year and received some great community feedback. In particular, many customers commented on how helpful it was to have both federal and state government services sitting alongside each other in the one easily accessible location.

Service Tasmania is once again working alongside one of the Federal Government's three travelling mobile centres. These kitted out service trucks tour the country year-round providing Centrelink, Medicare and other federal services to remote and regional communities.

Staff in the pop-up shop will be able to offer most Tassie Government services, information and payments that can be

completed in service centres (eftpos only payments). So whether you have some bills to pay, need a new fishing licence, have a Seniors Card application to submit or a new vehicle to register, you might want to put these dates in your diary.

This is the second year of this pilot activity and will give insight on how valuable the mobile shop approach might be into the future for communities. If you'd like to support this initiative, head along and have a chat

to the friendly Service Tasmania staff when they come to town.

#### **ROYAL REFLECTIONS**

**1954** The early morning rays of sun illuminated Paddy's head as Dad waved goodbye. He was returning to his normal daily hard-working routine on our farm. Meanwhile, Mum and I were embarking on an out-of-the-ordinary experience. We walked briskly to St Marys railway station. I quivered with a mix of adventure, excitement and fear of the unknown. Upon our arrival, I was surprized to see the large number of people gathered on the platform. They were all watching the long, huffing, puffing 'dragon'. I desperately wanted to bolt and chase after Dad, but Mum was holding my 6-year old hand in a vice-like grip. "All aboard!" a loud male voice ordered and we found ourselves caught up in the surge of people entering the belly of the 'monster'. "You sit near the window dear, for a better view," my mother instructed. Somehow, my bottom connecting with the leathery seat brought me out of my fantasy world to reality. I wasn't a dragon's breakfast after all. I was in a real train taking my first train trip to Launceston.

The journey had me mesmerized - the scenery flashing by, the swaying motion of the carriage similar to the wind rocking me on my favourite willow branch, the harmonious click clack of the wheels. It all ended too quickly. Disembarking, I was overwhelmed by the number of people, and people, people were everywhere! Mum clutched my hand in that somewhat painful grip reserved for parents afraid of mislaying a child. Before I could lodge a protest, a smiling stranger handed me a small Union Jack flag. I was in seventh heaven!

Pushing through the crowd, flag jabbing and being flag-jabbed by other jubilant youngsters, we arrived at City Park. The hushed crowd waited and watched. Suddenly came an exuberant cheer, "Here she comes!" And there she was - the Queen. No longer just a picture in a magazine, but a beautiful, smiling, living woman accompanied by her tall handsome Prince! During the long train trip and cart ride home, I prayed we would soon have a rainy day. Rainy days were special - Mum helped me make paste from plain flour and hot water, sew any scrap paper we could find into books, and cut out pictures from magazines. That was scrap book weather! Bring on the rain! Firstly, we would need to visit my Auntie Dorry Singline. I held her in awe, for she bought the "Woman's Weekly" and "Woman's Day". When out-dated, she would give them to us. She would supply the royal material I needed.

#### History repeats itself, 1970.

Here I was again at St Marys railway station, ready to board a train to see the Queen and Prince Phillip, for as a questioning adult, I was leaning strongly for Australia becoming a Republic. But this work-colleague needed help supervising three robust little children. Anyway, it was an historical day, for a once-up passenger train had been commissioned to make this special trip to Launceston. Upon arrival at City Park, I was surprized to find myself swept up in the same euphoria I'd experienced 16 years ago. The Queen and her Prince radiated reassuring stability. With this unexplainable magnetic appeal, they had gained my support again. It was an exhilarating day.

During the long trip home, my friend and the children fell asleep. This allowed me time to reflect on my 'connectedness' to the Queen. I soon realized why. She and the Royal Family influenced my childhood and adolescent years - they had helped make home uniquely home, it went back to 1953. November of that year was the monumental step in modernising our family home and life. Dad and my 3 half-brothers had proudly completed building a lean-to onto our outdoor laundry. Wonder of wonders, it was a bathroom! Dating way back to the days of my great-grandparents, Saturday night was the Mitchell family bath night at Daisy Dale, Lower Germantown. Tradition decreed that each Saturday afternoon, an elected family member was responsible for keeping the outdoor fire burning, heating the large copper tub of water. After the evening meal, a large bath tub was hauled into the kitchen and placed in front of the big black stove. All able-bodied family members helped carry buckets of hot water from the copper and cold water from the outdoors water supply. Once the bath was ready, all but the youngest members (and the lady of the house if her supervision was required) were shooed out of the room. When appropriate, 2 or 3 children were in the tub together. Then it was ready for the next in line. When the water become too discoloured with the washing away of grime from a week's work and play, the water was bailed out and replaced with a fresh supply. This tradition suited me fine, for I was the youngest of my generation. However, it was not too great for my father; he had been number 9 of 14 children. No wonder he was now as enthusiastic as me about completing our bathroom. (It even had a cold water tap. The outdoor copper was still in use.) So what had that to do with the Queen? Well after the men had completed their part, it was over to Mum and me to decorate. Firstly, we tacked hessian over the hand-cut and planed boards. Then we pasted on several layers of old newspapers to keep out the draughts. Then came the exciting process - the final layer of carefully selected magazine articles. After all, what could be more luxurious than lying in a bath of your very own clean water reading the numerous articles on the wall. Of course, articles on the Royal Family reigned supreme! For weeks, I hadn't be allowed to cut out pictures for my scrapbooks. The royals now took their rightful, dignified place on the Daisy Dale bathroom walls.

For over 8 years, I had a weekly Saturday night rendezvous with the Royal Family. Each year, a couple of weeks before Christmas, Mum and I would repaper the bathroom with current monarch news, such as the photograph below. However, the original segment depicting the Queen's coronation remained undisturbed. It was so special. She remained in regal command even when we left the farm for the final time after our last family reunion at Daisy Dale, Christmas Day 1967.

The train screeched to a stop at St Marys and I was forced back to reality. I helped my friend put the sleepy children in the car and we headed home to Cornwall. Little did I know, a young man who was on the same train, was helping his charges, his neighbour's 3 children, into his car and heading to Gray. Five years later, he became my husband!

#### Things come in threes, 2000

As a home-schooling educator of our 6 children, I always advised, "Be careful what you teach, for there will be consequences." I should have practised what I preached. Having an acquired brain injury disability, our youngest son Tim loved hearing stories of overcomers - of situations and people rising above adverse circumstances. And so I told him the story of the Granny Smith apple. "One day someone threw the

discarded cores of apples onto the compost. One seed eventually grew

into a tree which bore delicious green cooking apples. These apple were picked and cooked by a lady known as 'Granny Smith'. Pies made from these apples quickly became a delicious success. From something once rejected emerged something wonderful."

Tim asked me to write down the story, adding how he aimed to be an overcomer. He took the piece of paper and stored it in his 'treasure box'. I forgot about it. Time didn't! When he heard the Queen and Prince Phillip were visiting Launceston, he asked if we could go. This surprized us, for at 14, Tim had a great aversion to females. When I questioned him he said, "She and that man (referring to Prince Phillip) understand things." On the morning of see-the-queen-day, Tim scanned the fruit bowl. He looked disappointed, so I asked what he wanted. "An apple to give to the Queen," he replied. "You can't give the Queen an apple," I told him. "Why not?" he questioned. "Well because people always give her flowers," I responded. "Why does it have to be flowers? Why can't I give the Queen an apple?" "I guess you could if you wanted to," I foolishly replied. "There's red apples there in the fruit bowl," I flippantly told him. "They're no good. It has to be a green apple," he insisted. Just before we left, Tim retrieved something from his 'treasure box' and placed it in his pocket.

When we arrived in Launceston, Tim insisted on going to a greengrocer. There he bought a carefully selected shiny green apple. In keeping with tradition of my past two visits to see the Queen, we lined up on the edge of a pathway in City Park. The hushed crowd waited in anticipation. Suddenly came an exuberant shout, "Here she comes!" I noted a shadow pass over Tim's face when he saw Prince Phillip would walk close by with the Queen on the inside beside her Prince. However, he reached into his pocket and pulled out a crumpled piece of paper. He put it on top of the green apple.

The procession came level with us. Tim instantly stepped out in front of the Prince. His minder moved to block Tim. Prince Phillip glanced at Tim and stepped in front of his minder. "Have an apple," Tim invited. The Prince smiled and reached out. He accepted the apple and Granny Smith story! It was only a couple of seconds of exchange, but Tim was happy. The Prince had shown him empathy. Mission complete, Tim pushed through the crowds to go and see the monkeys.

That day I was reminded of the saying, "A nation's greatness is measured by how well it respects and treats its weakest citizen."

In that brief interlude, Prince Phillip and Tim connected! (And one more thing - after his brief glimpse of Queen Elizabeth, Tim decided some females were OK.)

In the future, we Aussies will probably need to decide if we remain with the Monarch or become a Republic. Whatever the outcome, Australia will be truly blessed if our leaders show the stability, understanding, dignity, graciousness and empathy of that Prince and that Queen!

### St Marys 1903 David Clement 8th instalment

### The Roads

Great excitement was caused on 29<sup>th</sup> May last when a motor car passed through, enroute to the East Coast, the first vehicle of it kind to pass through the town. The roads of the district are the responsibility of the St Marys Road District Trust, currently composed of Mr Michael Cullenan as Chairman and Treasurer, and Messrs Phillip Lohrey, Thomas William King and Thomas Berwick as Trustees. The Road Rate for the year has been set at one shilling in the pound (5%) on all private property, and sixpence in the pound on Crown Lands, as shown by the Assessment Roll for the Municipality of Fingal for the year 1903.

There has been some discussion locally on the appointment of Mr Bryant as Road Overseer, on the basis that he was not a local man. However, a report states that "the Road Overseer for the past fortnight has been engaged in erecting a new bridge in the Parish of Gray. The work is very neatly and safely executed: concluded that "Mr Bryant is showing his ability in a very pleasing and satisfactory manner:. Tenders have been called for grubbing briars and gorse on the road between Killymoon and St Marys, but only one tender was received and was deemed too high in price, so that the Trust thought it advisable to have the work executed by its own staff.

Whilst almost all receipts of the Trust are from the Road Rate levied on property owners, it did last year charge the Education Department £6 for clearing stones from the playground at Gray School, and earned sixteen shillings from selling materials from drains, of Total Receipts of £490. The major expenses were Day Labour £242, Stone Crusher £90, Cartage £62, Horse-feed £32, Blacksmith's work £15 and Fencing Scrubbing and Clearing £6. The cost of the horse feed generated some correspondence To the Editor:- "Sir, a report of the St Marys Road Trusts last meeting stated that about four tons of chaff were used in keeping the road horse from January 1 to May 30, a period of five months, for a cost of £11. As the Trust have now disposed of their horse, why do they not purchase one in its place? We are now paying a carter four shillings a day for his horse, amounting to £30 for four months. The carter does not supply his own dray, but is utilising that of the Trust. If we allow eight shillings a month for shoes, or £2 over the four months, there would be a balance of £17 in favour of having a horse of their own, even allowing for blacksmithing work. Yours etc."

### Minerals


With the exception of coal, no other mineral appears to have been seriously prospected for in the district. Why such is the case would be hard to say, for the ranges around have all the indications of auriferous and stanniferous possibilities, and they do not present the same difficulties and hardships which the prospector on the West Coast has to encounter. About 16 years ago a little prospecting work was done close to the town on the Georges Bay Road. It consisted in putting a shaft down and driving an adit (entrance) in, giving prospects of gold and galena, but whether these were payable or not there are no records to show. Probably at that time they were not considered payable, as the efforts of that prospector were contemptuously dubbed "House's Folly".

### Health

Of course, in any district, no matter how healthy, there are always to be found infantile problems. While, the general salubrity of St Marys would seem to prevent the possibility of a "medico" from earning his salt, should he take his chance here, it is necessary – as disease and accidents are always lurking – for the residents to guard against danger, and have the services of a medical man close at hand. Indeed, whooping cough and influenza have been prevalent in some houses and the winter weather was accompanied by bad colds and sickness. At present, Dr Hoskings of Fingal is the nearest medical man. He was only recently here in the town, engaged in vaccination against smallpox. The residents have been astir, and signatures to a guarantee of a fixed income as an inducement for a doctor to settle in St Marys were obtained by a vigorous canvas organised by Messrs McHugo and Schiers, with the result that Doctor Walker has been obtained for the town. It is to be hoped that he will be happy with the practice, and that his arrival may prevent some of the less happy consequences of self-treatment. An inquest recently found that Miss Mary Davis at Fingal died of congestion of the brain due to an overdose of creosote, as a consequence of placing a wadding dipped in the substance on an aching tooth.

### Gone Before

Some eight years ago there was a public meeting convened to discuss establishing a Public Cemetery for St Marys. A subsequent meeting announced that suitable ground had been found and steps taken to secure it, and the ground in Gray Road was commenced three years back, consecrated firstly by the Methodists in 1899 and the Catholics and Presbyterians two years ago. As yet, the Anglicans have not done so. There are two Undertakers in the township, Mr Mitchell and Mr McHugo, apparently keenly in competition, with rates of ten shillings for a grave and five pounds for a burial. Last year Mr W G Mitchell complained in the "Examiner" that "it is virtually impossible to find vacant ground in Cullenswood cemetery. Sometimes three attempts are necessary to find ground that does not contain other bodies". Mr Mitchell urged that now there was a public cemetery in the area, burials at Cullenswood should be ceased, except for reserved sites. The Accounts for the St Marys Public Cemetery for the year ending 31 December last year (1902) showed receipts of £2-15-6 from fees for private graves and £1-0-0 for public graves, insufficient to meet the £8-0-0 interest on loan, which needed to be met from the balance of the previous year's operations.

### The Say by the "Cage Rattler"



This is a very personal comment to some of the people out in our community. And yes, I am directly involved with the wonderful people that this refers to. It saddens me greatly that there are people in this very local community who find it necessary to have a bit of a go at people who quite literally provide invaluable contributions to this town. I won't directly embarrass anybody for some very inconsiderate behaviour or ongoing disrespect to an intrepid, and I do mean that literally band of folk, but I will say this. GIVE IT A REST.

Our local Sports Centre, of which I am a proud senior committee person these days, has in the past few years come from almost closing to a vibrant, growing and essential part of St Marys and surrounds. In that period, and in particular the last five or six years, thanks to some exceptional work of a dedicated crew, the club has gone from strength to strength. Not only has the club kept its head above water, but its membership has steadily increased and prospered. Among the people who have worked countless hours voluntarily is our current Secretary, some excellent organisers, amazing caterers and dedicated supporters both on and off the bowls green and golf course. This is previously and currently. It is an intensely proud person like myself that has witnessed all this. Thank you to every single one of you.

For whatever reason though, we have some people who find it necessary to decry our wonderful club and have a go at what they consider its shortcomings. Add in the less than ideal way people let their dogs wander all over the place on what is basically a private members' facility and allowing their animals to defecate where they please. This is not on any more guys.

The golf course itself is actually a private members annual subscription facility, magnificently maintained by three or four regular volunteers. It takes thousands of man-hours a year to mow, spray, weed, water and groom the course. We also have to maintain a fleet of machines to do this. This is done by these same people and some exceptional local mechanics who pitch in as required. We DO NOT receive any financial assistance currently to do that, so a lot of our fundraising is dedicated to keeping our course in the great condition it is becoming renowned for. We do not want any further 'fertilizing' of the facility thanks, so dog walkers please note that it's your responsibility to clean up your dog or cat in one case's impediments.

We have absolutely no problem with people walking their dogs on the precinct that the course winds through. That is, of course, if they can guarantee that they closely monitor the animals the whole time, and do the right thing if the pet relieves itself during the visit. Let's make this quite clear. We love our dogs visiting, but to the few who are known to just let them loose to do what they want...not so much.

To our walkers...this is unprecedentedly wet times and please understand this. We will always do our best to minimise the clippings where ever possible, even to the point of costing us time and money to do so. In my 45 years of membership, a former greenkeeper and so on, I have never before seen the incredible situation we have now. The way that Smithy and Macca have kept things under control is nothing short of phenomenal. Please do not anyone dare to think you know what they have to do to keep things manageable in these extraordinary times. Take it from me, no one could do it much better, and any complaints are unwarranted. Leave it at that.

Finally to our friends at Break O Day Council who have provided us with in-kind assistance from time to time, assistance with finding machinery and assistance with support for grants, we appreciate that support and trust it aids the whole community not just the club. It's very appreciated.

To our detractors...please realize that some of the negative comments, some of the pet issues outlined and some of the obviously ill-informed folk would be better served and genuinely surprised if they had a mind to think about how great the St Marys Sports Centre actually is. All we ask is you take a more overarching view of things, and be willing to understand that not everybody can be satisfied or accommodated every day in every way, but we will do our best. It's a two-way street though, and we ask the few that abuse their responsibilities now, should that be fixed, we will greatly appreciate your efforts.

### MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW Written by Pam Bretz

What a challenge this past month's book brought to our Book Group! Stephen Fry, British actor, broadcaster, comedian and lover of words, wrote 'The Ode Less Travelled' (a play on the title of the poem by American poet, Robert Frost, "The Road Less Travelled.") Its subtitle is 'Unlocking the Poet Within'. An "amateur" poet himself, Fry believes that "if you can speak and read English you can write poetry. But it is no fun if you don't know where to start or have been led to believe that Anything Goes."

So begins a step-by-step guide to what makes poetry. He starts with metre, the beat or stress given to words in a line, and he encourages us to read aloud his chosen examples, some of them written by the great poets and some of them written by him, often very amusingly, to illustrate his lesson. At the end of each section he sets the reader exercises and some of the group actually attempted one or two of these. We were impressed by their offerings!

Next comes rhyme in all its various patterns, then form, like ballads, odes, sonnets, even limericks and finally diction; the choice of words and language. By this stage, few of the group had found the necessary discipline to continue the exercises or to methodically read the rest of the book!

Love him or hate him, Fry has a way with words and he peppers his writing with hilarious asides, judgements and pronouncements. His pet hate is the belief that poetry is the outpouring of feelings onto the page. He says, "Genuine feeling which isn't pressed into some sort of shape is a tantrum or a sentimental mess." And, "Concentration and total commitment to language are far and away the most important qualities needed for poetry writing." He leavens his 'lessons' with occasional obscenities and double entendre and his individual 'voice' is unmistakeable.

Fry equates the writing of poetry to composing a piece of music or painting a picture. This is not something that just happens but, "True ease in writing comes from art, not chance." Working towards becoming an artist, a musician or a poet, it is essential that we become familiar with the work of the great masters, so he urges us to read as much as we can of their poetry.

This would be a helpful and instructive book for anyone who is trying their hand at poetry writing (a good one to have on the shelf) but it is not one suited to a reading group, we decided. It would be an excellent textbook for students of literature.

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





### **FISHING REPORT**

### By The Happy Hooker



October is here and the fishing is starting to get real, with some nice species being caught in both fresh and salt water. Some nice salmon have been caught off the east coast beaches despite the fresh dirty water, salmon and nice-sized trevally from Georges Bay, and bream from the Scamander River.

Some great catches of trout from the fresh-water lakes and rivers have been taken by anglers from around the state. Lake Crescent is one lake that is producing some trophy-sized trout. This lake has made a exciting recovery from the years of being closed due to the European carp infestation and their eradication process.

The East Coast Fishing Club held their annual Bream Competition on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> October, and some lovely-sized bream were caught and weighed in; the winning bream weighed in a whopping 1.570kg, a magnificent specimen to come out of the Scamander River and a Black Bream that would be the envy of any sports fisherman worldwide.

October is time for fly-fishing for trout on a dry fly. Fly-fishers look forward to this time of year all winter, as October/ November is when the insects begin their lifecycle activities with the warmer weather. Mayflies, spinners, midges, and caddis, just to name a few, will hatch given the right conditions, and the trout will be waiting (hopefully). I have been spending a bit of time at the fly-tying bench over the last few weeks to replenish the fly boxes with flies to represent these insects ready to attack once the conditions are right. Flies like shaving brushes, Possum tail emergers, black and red spinners, brown nymphs in various sizes and weight, smaller deadly buzzer nymphs - which are the most plain-looking fly tied out of a piece of red darn for the body and a strip of peacock herl as a head, the easiest fly to tie but one of the most deadliest of flies in the right moment - used mainly in the morning wind lanes when the fish are feeding on small fly life sitting on the surface. The set-up I use is a dry fly of some sort to float on the surface and to act as an indicator, with the buzzer on a dropper around six inches underneath the surface, then find a fish feeding, and with long casts so as to not spook the fish, set a trap by casting the flies in the trout's feeding path and watch the flies. The fish will either eat the dry fly or the dry fly will disappear underneath the water, indicating the trout has taken the buzzer, and hang on for a fight. Some mornings, the fish are a bit more cunning, and these mornings it sometimes pays to give the flies a small twitch as the trout approaches, to imitate a bit of life. The buzzer flies represent small pre-hatched nymphs like the mosquito wrigglers we all see in stagnant water.

Our local rivers have been flooded the past few weeks with the above-average rainfall we have experienced, and although this will slow the fishing for now, the trout should be in great condition later in the season, which is just what the river system needed after the past few seasons of drought which decimated the trout population of the upper South Esk and Break O'Day Rivers, along with a overpopulation of cormorants, however the trout would have successfully spawned with good flows in the spawning creeks over the winter to replenish the systems.

### Fishing Reports

<u>On 16th October</u>, at <u>Evercreech Dam</u>, I went for a walk around the edge of the dam looking for signs of any fly-life at evening time, and was pleased to find a few red spinners flying along the sheltered shore line. No fish were on them, but it was encouraging to see that the world of nature is once again doing its thing, as the red spinners hatch around the middle of October every year. One smaller fish was ringing around on dark, looking for stick caddis I'd presumed, and as it was too dark for my poor eyesight to change flies, I sent out a trap of a small black wooly bugger that I had on. I quickly cast it near the trout feeding and slowly stripped the fly a couple of times, then the little fellow obliged and ate the fly. To myself and fishing companions it doesn't matter on the size of the fish big or small or the number caught, they are all the same (as we let most, if not all, the fish go), it's the challenge and being with nature that makes being in the outdoors so enjoyable.

<u>Scamander River</u> was the destination on <u>19th October</u>, and we went down after work on a Thursday evening to do a bit of a reconnaissance mission for the upcoming fishing competition. We put the boat in at the bottom boat ramp and picked up fish on hardbody lures here and there, we then pushed up to the section of the river where the bitumen and the gravel meet along the Upper Scamander Road. By watching the sounder, we found schools of fish sitting on the bottom and caught some nice fish by dropping plastics down and working around the fish.
