The Valley and East Coast Voice is aware of the concerns of many residents about the ongoing viability of the private doctor's surgery at St Marys Community Health Centre, and is making enquiries about the matter. As the year is coming to a close and this is our final issue for 2022, we feel that it is not possible to publish a fair and balanced article.

Break O'Day Mayor Mick Tucker, State MP John Tucker and Federal MP Brian Mitchell have all made statements supporting Dr Latt, with Mr Mitchell having spoken about him to the House of Representatives on 5th September 2022.

Facebook also has many postings supporting Dr Latt, and he is a deeply respected and extremely valued doctor and member of the community, with many people praising him for his dedication and compassion.

It is noted that the problem recruiting and keeping doctors in rural and regional areas is an issue affecting many parts of the whole of Australia.

# Help protect our beach-nesting birds this summer.

Hooded plover are a small, threatened, beachnesting bird with only an estimated 3000 individuals remaining in the wild. It is believed that approximately half of the remaining population nest on Tasmania's northeast beaches, above the high tide mark.

#### Help protect them by:

- staying on the wet sand;
- know and adhere to the dog rules for your local beach; and
- keeping clear of temporary fencing installed to protect nests and chicks.



## **PROTECTING OUR SHOREBIRDS THIS SUMMER**

Did you know half the remaining eastern hooded plover population call Tasmania home? What's more, approximately 20% of these can be found on our north-eastern beaches!

Hooded plovers are small, threatened shorebirds. They live on beaches and rely on these areas to feed and nest. With summer here, hooded plovers are now in their breeding season and will spend the next few months creating their nests. Hooded plovers lay their tiny, speckled eggs in a shallow scrape in the sand above the high-tide mark, and while their eggs are well camouflaged from predators, they are also incredibly difficult to see, and easy to step on.

Some of the greatest threats to hooded plovers are people, dogs, horses, and vehicles on beaches that can inadvertently disturb and crush nests and chicks. Disturbing hooded plover parents can be as deadly as trampling - they spook easily and will abandon eggs and chicks if a perceived threat comes too close. Sadly, eggs and chicks can perish in as little as 15 minutes without the protection of their parents.

So, as you walk on the beach this summer, be mindful of where you tread, keep to the wet sand, and adhere to dog on-leash and exclusion zones. If you see a roped-off area, this means a nest has been identified - please be a good egg and give it a wide berth.

As you enjoy the beach this summer, you may spot some of our other resident shorebirds, such as pied and sooty oystercatchers, red-capped plover, fairy terns and little terns. These birds also depend on the beach for feeding and raising their chicks. You can give these new families the space they need to succeed; sharing the shore responsibly is the best way we can contribute to their survival.

From the folks at NRM North, Birdlife Australia and Birdlife Tasmania, the Northeast Bioregional Network, Tasmania Parks and Wildlife, and Break O'Day Council, who are working together for shorebird conservation on our beautiful east coast, we thank you for sharing the shoreline responsibly this summer!

The Hooded Plover Project is supported by NRM North through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.

## The Last Bell - Avoca Primary School

The school bell at Avoca Primary School has sounded for the last time.

Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> November 2019 saw over 200 people attend the Last Bell event at Avoca Primary School, marking the end of 160 years of State School Education. Past students, staff and community members reminisced together in the classrooms, corridor and school yard. The history of the school was on display in the form of books, newspaper articles, photographs, project books showcasing camps and events and a video display.

Mayor Mary Knowles OAM spoke to those present about her time at the school as a Teacher Aide, around the time that Launching into Learning was introduced in schools throughout the state. After speaking with the Principal at the time, Nick Finlay, they guessed they'd only have a few children in that age bracket attending. They had up to 22 preschoolers' coming along to the program on a regular basis. Mary also mentioned it was sad to see the areas now being faced with declining populations.

Nick Finlay (Principal from 2000 to 2014) said that it was the students that made the school. In his 14 years as Principal, there were only ever 3 suspensions. There was also a 'time out chair' that was located just outside the main office window. There was a time that the seat hadn't been used for 2 years!





Michele King started working in the area in the 1980's as a District Nurse and following a few job title changes, is a School Nurse in the area. She's attended Launching into Learning conducting health checks and also Prep screenings at the school over many years.

While listening to all the stories and memories drifting throughout the school, Roseanne Gray, a past student said that when the students moved up to the current school building, the children carried the student desks up from the Old School building. Glenda Spencer started her schooling in 1955 and finished here in 1965. She said there were lots of fun times and it was great to be able to catch up with fellow classmates here today.

Due to declining enrolments, students have been transitioning out to Campbell Town District High School this year and from the beginning of term 4, became full time students there.

School Principal, Jenny Walker said "When the School Association announced at the end of last year that Avoca Primary School would close, we decided to have an event to remember all the great things

about the school. The Last Bell committee was formed, with Leeann Phillips as the organiser. Our primary aim was to bring past students, staff and members of the parent community together to reminisce about their experiences and to celebrate Avoca Primary School. We hoped that this would allow people to not only remember and share stories, but to create new memories to take with them after the school closed".

On Saturday, this was definitely achieved. There was such a positive feeling among all the visitors with many activities to keep everyone entertained. The photo displays caused quite a buzz with people finding younger versions of themselves or people they knew. Lots of 'I remember....' were heard throughout the rooms and corridor.

Thanks to the Northern Midlands Council, young people were kept amused with the Jumping Castle, Face Painting and Twisted Balloons; and everyone thoroughly enjoyed the platers of food and supplies of drinks. A very fitting event highlighting Avoca Primary School as a school that cares and celebrates success.

Event organizer Leeann Phillips was overwhelmed – "the day was fantastic and everyone enjoyed catching up!"

As I was leaving the school building, I heard someone's parting words as they walked through the corridor -

"Goodbye Avoca Primary School".

Dick - Please send goods at wons, want em for Kismis. 61bs raisints, them butes you sent aint the rite butes, they is 9 I take 7 you must think I got fete like black fellers canoos. Bag flour, 9 lbs sugar, 6 lbs rice, I had a bad fire today. Burned nearly all me grass, and fritened the doos out of the cows. Old womans been sick ever since, pound baking powder, packit corn flower, the cows have gorn orf there milk and sore tits and wont feed. 101b gud bacon, no dried horse like last time, with hide inch thick. 11b sugar lollies for kids. It gave particler el to the hares and rabits and burnt rite out, 6 tins jam. Tell the butcher to send 10lbs rostin mete and the bil I wil settil when I come down, all is well barin the missus and the cows orf there milk and too kids with messuls. Opin you are the same as it leeves me at present. Merry kismis, box anterbilyus pills, packet spice, tin peper, send coil barb wire, grindstone, 6 pare bute laces, strong ones, 11b cheese, good cheese this time, last cheese krawled orf table. When reflecting on what With One Voice Choir has achieved in the year 2022, I wonder how on earth we ever packed it all in! We had three main objectives for the year and I can say with great pride that all have been achieved.

With the generous support of **Break O'Day Council** and **Calows Coaches**, we were able to achieve our first aim: to take our singing sessions out from our base in Scamander to St Marys, St Helens, Cornwall, Binalong Bay, Fingal and Pyengana. The purpose of this gigantic task was to share the health and wellbeing effects of community singing with as many of our municipality's community nodes as possible. I describe these events with 2 key words: Fun and Feasting. We sincerely thank all the small businesses throughout the year who helped us with the feasting side of things. Look out for 2 more of these events next year.

Our second goal was to address the problem of accessibility to our weekly sings at the Scamander Sports Complex. Thinking of all the community members living outside of St Helens, St Marys and Fingal, we hatched a plan to run two small busses, one from Fingal and the other from St Helens, to Scamander. So anyone who wanted to come from those outlying areas only had to get themselves to the bus pick-up points and then ride in style on the bus with other singers to and from Scamander back to their original pick-up point. A very ambitious plan indeed! Well, guess what? Thanks to the generosity of **Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House**, we have been able to use their community bus to get Valley folk down to Scamander. Despite the terrible damage to St Marys and Elephant Passes, we were able to get all our Valley people down to Scamander for the Sings. Without the bus, many of our Valley members simply would not have been able to make it. And that would have been a terrible loss, because all of us have come to love and look forward to our sing session each and every week of the school terms. So that was part A of goal number 2 ticked off. And thanks to **St Helens Hospital Auxiliary and Tip Shop**, and our community bank - **Bendigo Bank**, we were able to make Part 2 happen. St Helens folk are all sorted for transport too. A heartfelt thank you from With One Voice Choir to these generous organizations for their support.

The third goal was to make some public appearances. As a community choir, this is a daunting activity. Many of us have never sung in choirs before, and we might not have all the musical skills of traditional performance choirs. We do love to sing though! So we calmed our nerves and rose to the challenge at Bay of Fires Winter Arts Festival. Next, we left town for the Big Smoke and performed at 'Festival of Voices' in Hobart. Extra daunting! Lots of nerves there!!! Back on home ground, we sang at the Lymphoedema Fund Raiser Garden Party.

## SPRINGTIME GARDEN PARTY FUNDRAISER SUPPORTS LOCAL LYMPHOEDEMA SERVICE

Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> November dawned bright and sunny in the Fingal valley, providing the perfect backdrop to a Garden Party and Open House at the beautiful Elephant Pass home of well-known locals, Bryon Beggs and Nev Shaw. Guests wandered the beautiful gardens, orchards, and vegetable patches, enjoying the many "garden rooms" and spectacular late spring flowers. Visitors were free to explore Nev and Bryon's completely off-grid, self-built home which features exquisite glass "bottle" walls, carved mud-brick features, and incredible mosaic art and sculptures. Nev and Bryon bought their treed block about 10 years

ago with plans to clear a small area for their house and garden. "It's taken a long time for this as there was no soil to speak of...and the whole house block is on a sheet of rock so soil [and other materials] for the garden beds had to be brought in," they said. "Our dream was to create a magical garden with atmosphere, colour abounding, and artistic touches throughout, with scope to expand this through the bush block, creating a trail with unexpected viewing of sculptures along the way. This is getting closer to reality as the home area is all but finished and can be just maintained and grow in stature." Return visitors were impressed by Nev and Bryon's continued hard work which has seen them recently extend their spectacular landscaped gardens and food growing areas, and add new feature paths, artworks, and buildings. A crowd favourite was the recently completed artists' studio, many calling it "The Hobbit Hole" on account of the rounded blue door set into earth walls.

Mid-morning was marked by a performance on the lawns by the With One Voice Break O'Day Choir. Most visitors indulged in the delicious morning teas on offer, each receiving a generous selection of sweet and savoury home-baked delicacies. Many also did a little shopping, taking the opportunity to buy plants, second-hand books, hand-made lavender bags, and other donated items.

Nev and Bryon have often opened their property to the public. "We have in the past opened our home and garden for the Bay of Fires Arts trail, bus tours and garden clubs, and anyone who is interested in living off the grid," Bryon said. This event was specifically held to raise funds for the St Marys-based Tasmanian Lymphoedema and Laser Therapy

Centre (TLLTC). Nev and Bryon previously sat on the TLLTC Committee for some time and said they saw need to support this very worthwhile cause. "[Hosting the garden party] was a way we could give back and help others benefit from the treatments offered."

The TLLTC delivers a unique combination of lymphoedema treatment and photobiomodulation (laser) therapy. The two local therapists, Bree Piscitelli and Katrin Alexander, both joined the Centre about 18 months ago and provide information, education, and treatment for lymphoedema and musculoskeletal injuries. As a registered not-for-profit charity, the Centre relies on generous community support and fundraising activities. "The open house and garden is our main fundraiser, it means

everything to the centre, and the community support is phenomenal. The funds raised help us to cover our running costs, such as insurance, certifications, rent, and equipment maintenance, Bree and Katrin said.

The Garden Party and Open House was previously held annually, but due to several Covid-19 and rain-related cancellations, this event was the first since 2019. It was a huge success, raising well over \$3000 from entry fees, and sales of raffle tickets, plants, lavender bags, and books. A large team of volunteers banded together with Nev and Bryon to make the event so successful. "This event was a lot of work behind the scenes by a lot of people. We all worked together as a team to raise important funds needed for the clinic and having fun along the way," Bryon said.

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## The Say by the "Cage Rattler"



This Christmas story is dedicated to all pet lovers and for our pets who reciprocate love.

I extend empathy to all who have lost a beloved pet. This is our family's story.

#### Christmas Eve 2008

Headlights from the steady stream of cars pierce the darkness of Christmas Eve night 2008, as travellers journey to their respective destinations. As an anxious mother, I pace the verandah, looking for the car that will turn into Dalmayne Road, Gray. This will mean all our family will be safely gathered home for "Christmas. Finally, at 11.30pm, the long-awaited car comes up our driveway. Our home has been quiet for a while as each family member has retired to their rooms, but now there is a stirring as they emerge to welcome James home. Of course, we are all very happy to greet him, but tonight there is added excitement, for he is about to introduce us to a new addition to the family. I hope our youngest son, Tim, will continue to sleep through this excitement, for he is destined to meet this new arrival come morning.

I'm so thankful my prayer for a safe and happy family reunion have been answered, but I must pray for one more thing. "Please, God, grant Tim his special Christmas request." For many years whenever we ask Tim, "What do you want for Christmas?", he replies, "Just to feel well for Christmas Day!" For over twenty years, Tim has lived in an almost constant 'seizure state'. As a result of contracting meningitis as an infant, he suffered acquired brain injury, resulting in epilepsy. For him to have an almost seizure-free day is a rare and special blessing. Tim remains asleep during James' arrival, so all seven of us troop out to James' car to greet the newcomer. There on a blanket on the front seat is a gorgeous 10-week-old golden Labrador! For us all, it's love at first sight. However, puppy doesn't share our joy. This is understandable - he has been wrenched from the only home he has ever known. He is separated from his mother and siblings in the dark of night. His dogbreeder owner has handed him over to a complete stranger. He is fearful of his first car trip, so he whines all the long trip from Perth to Gray. All he wants is to feel the warmth of snuggling up to his dog family, but instead he is saturated with affectionate pats from unfamiliar humans. So as not to awaken Tim with puppy's 'I-miss-my-mother' barking, Hannah has agreed to care for Tim's special Christmas present. She takes the confused little puppy to her nearby cottage. She knows both she and the dog will have a sleepless night, but the sacrifice will be worth it to see the surprize and delight on Tim's face.

#### Christmas morning 2008, 5.30am

Tim stirs. "Is it Christmas Day?' he sleepily enquires. "It is," I assure him. Immediately he jumps out of bed and heads to the Christmas tree. He scans the presents. As his present is not yet under the tree, Peter and I suggest he takes an early morning bath to be sparkly clean for Christmas. Thankfully, he agrees. While Peter assists him, I hastily awaken everyone and race to Hannah's place to collect her and the puppy. We hurriedly place puppy behind the tree before Tim enters the room. Puppy emerges from his hiding place right on cue. Tim stares in awe! "Is he real?" he finally manages to ask. Puppy instinctively runs to Tim. There is an unexplainable instant bonding.

And so begins an amazing heart-warming totally connected life journey for a special little puppy and a very special 22-year old young man!

Puppy has brief moments of sadness throughout the day, as he misses his former life, but somehow he seems to sense his new home and new life is the fulfillment of his destiny: he was born and bred to be an Assistance Dog! Puppy is showered with love by us and our Christmas dinner guests. He enjoys roast turkey, gravy and vegies. While the humans indulge in Christmas pudding dessert, he decides to sample his own unique treat - tinsel from the Christmas tree (He chucks it up an hour or so later - oh the delight of having a new puppy!) "What are you going to name your new puppy, Tim?" everyone asks. "I'll think of something by night-time," he confidently replies.

Christmas Day draws to a close. It's been a wonderful day full of love shared with family and friends. Prayers have been wonderfully answered, for Tim has spent the day with only a few minor seizures. Tim is ready for bed. He reaches and pats puppy. "I'm calling him 'Firefighter'," he declares. We all nod our head in approval. 'Firefighter' is so appropriate. We know exactly why Tim has chosen this name. The proximity of the 2006 East Coast bushfires caused Tim much trauma. Compounded by his acquired brain injury, the extreme anxiety caused him to lose much of his communication skills. Tim's great hope and comfort at that time was the fact that his sister Hannah was one of the fire-fighters protecting our communities. By giving his puppy the name 'Firefighter', he is saying - "This dog is my protector." Healing has begun! "Firefighter is a great name for your dog, Tim," Hannah says, "but perhaps it a rather big name for such a small puppy. People call fire-fighters 'Fireys' for short." Tim beams. "Let's go to bed Firey," he calls, and Firey obeys. He and his inseparable companion conclude this perfect day with puppy curled up content at the foot of Tim's bed.

## TIM AND FIREY continued

## 27 December 2008

Tim is having a tonic clonic (grand mal) seizure. Firey turns to us with questioning eyes, so we place him near Tim so he can observe. We know he instantly understands he is to always be Tim's support and protector. He will be an amazing assistance Dog!

## December 2022, Gray

For over 10 years, Firey and Tim had an amazing total connectedness. Without any training, Firey automatically knew his role. He quickly know how to detect and respond to the thousand of seizures Tim endured. He would frequently forewarn us of impending seizures by standing beside Tim and gazing into his eyes. One day, using his nose and paw, he tried pushing the oxygen mask onto Tim's face - he obviously thought we were too slow responding in our duty of care...

When Tim died on 22 May 2018, Firey shared the family's deep loss and grief. His health began to decline as a result of the special bond being broken. We would often find him lying near Tim's grave.

Sadly, on 14 April this year, we had Firey 'put to sleep'. He rests beside Tim at 'Peaceful Place', our private burial site on our property. Both Tim and Firey delighted in beach excursions. Now both lie where there is a wonderful view of the distant ocean. Like Tim, Firey loved the little blue fairy wrens. He would let them come and sit on his back while Tim fed them. Now the bushland surrounding the two graves is a haven for these little birds.

Christmas 2018 was as sad a time for Firey as it was for us. We all knew Christmas would never be the same again, for a vital link was missing from the family circle. We first noticed the extent of Firey's anguish when we put up our Christmas tree. Previously, Firey would sleep beneath the Christmas tree. Every night, throughout the night, he would spend on hour or so beside Tim's bed, then move to sleep under the tree for an hour or so. This year, he made no attempt to sleep under the tree, preferring to spend all night by our bed. Christmas morning, he sniffed the presents, then went to Tim's old bedroom searching for him. That year, when he was 'first cab off the rank' to receive his present, there was only the barest wag of his tail. Traditionally, Tim received his presents first, then he would give Firey his present (a new ball and lots of doggie treats). Firey would quiver with excitement of anticipation. That dog loved Christmas as much as any human could! Like us, he still made the most of the festive season, loving the company of other family members. He still loved roast turkey, gravy and vegies, and a sliver of Christmas pudding, (instead of tinsel!) After all, he was a Labrador - the great lover of food as well as the great lover of people.

Firey came to us at Christmas as a little puppy and brought us joy and love. That reminds me of the true meaning of Christmas. On that first Christmas, the angel told the shepherds, "Don't be afraid. I'm here to announce a great and joyful event that is mean for everyone, worldwide. A Saviour has just been born in David's town; a Saviour who is Messiah and Master. This is what you are to look for; a baby wrapped in a blanket and lying in a manger."

As Firey grew, he became a carer, a friend and a protector. And so it is with Jesus!

Sadness, emptiness and grief from suffering loss lessen with time, for LOVE is all-powerful and constant. This year, we will still have a huge empty 'Tim' space in our hearts and 'miss-you-Firey' space, but we will rejoice: rejoice because Christmas is all about the giving and receiving of joy and LOVE. Tim and Firey knew this and delighted in Christmas.

May you all also be blessed.

Joy to the world, the LORD has come!

## MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW Written by Pam Bretz

The Snow Child, published in 2013 and the debut novel of Alaskan writer Eowyn Ivey, was well received by the entire Book Group. Very unusual! Set in 1920 in remote Alaska the story was inspired by an old Russian fairy tale retold by Freya Littledale in a children's picture book which the author came across in the bookshop where she works. In Ivey's version of the tale, Mabel and Jack, a childless couple, decide to leave their old life in Pennsylvania to become "homesteaders" in the wilds of Alaska. They are attempting to leave behind their grief at losing a child in miscarriage ten years before by carving out a living in the harsh but beautiful environment, building a cabin and ploughing the land to raise vegetables. Thanks to the most wonderful neighbours, George and Esther and their sons, they slowly learn how to survive this most trying of climates.

Rousing themselves from the depressed exhaustion that weighs heavily on their relationship, at the first snowfall they build a small snowperson, decorating it with mittens, scarf and hat. Jack carves a delicate face onto the figure. Next morning the figure has disappeared and a set of small footprints lead away from where it had stood and into the forest. Jack is the first to catch sight of a small girl flitting between the trees and hesitates to mention it to the vulnerable Mabel, but soon she too makes contact with the child, Faina. Now begins for the reader, and indeed, for Mabel and Jack, the enigma of the origin of the child. Is she real or some kind of manifestation brought on by the longing for a child that plagues both Mabel and Jack? Slowly they begin to interact with Faina but the question remains as to how a human child could survive in the wilds and the extreme cold of an Alaskan winter. The reader must suspend disbelief, accept the fiction and go with the story of how this child restores life and love to this couple.



The story largely escapes sentimentality because of the author's unflinching account of the harshness of this life. As someone raised in Alaska and familiar with the landscape, the changing seasons, the wildlife and also the brutal reality of survival in this environment she confronts the reader with graphic descriptions of hunting, killing, gutting and skinning, that bring what could have been a fey and fanciful tale back to stark reality. George, Esther and their youngest son, Garrett, are grounded, experienced survivors in this land and their cheerful, earthy household provides a sense of the everyday and of hope for the future for the struggling Jack and Mabel.

The book raises such psychological issues as the longing for a child, the potentially smothering effects of domesticity, the difficulty of physical and emotional isolation and it plays with questions of the supernatural. It hovers between fairy tale and reality and eventually the reader must simply accept the fantasy as enchanting, bewitching and intriguing.

I wish you all a happy and healthy Christmas and New Year and hope that you find lots of good books in your Christmas stockings! They make wonderful presents. One writer to look out for is young Tasmanian writer, Robbie Arnott, whose latest novel, *Limberlost*, is an impressive coming-of-age story of a boy growing up in the war years on an orchard in the Tamar Valley.



## **ST HELENS WALKING GROUP**



The walk on **Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> November** from Taylors Beach to Scotsmans Creek via Margery's Corner was a repeat of a walk that received positive feedback when undertaken last year. Everyone, on that occasion, was able to clamber over a short slightly tricky headland, so advisedly the grade should be ranked as medium. Even with an extension to include more foreshore to the north, the length barely exceeded 4 km.

Thank you Revel for leading this walk.

On **Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> November**, Alana's intention to guide intrepid members of the group to the Sphinx Bluff on the Ben Lomond Plateau had to be postponed, primarily on account of closed roads and highways. Access to the NE was still reasonable, so a replacement proposed by Revel followed a 4km section of the Briseis Water Race. We returned to the cars along a 4.5km of Ruby Flat road, thus a loop walk. Revel knows about this historical structure very well. All the traverse was level. It is understood that some track maintenance has occurred but trees may have fallen since. Reasonably easy walk expected, but be prepared for slippery surfaces. The meeting point was Branxholm, with a car pool from St Helens Neighbourhood House car park.

Thank you Revel for coming to the party due to the postponement of the Bluff Walk.

## Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> November

This Wednesday's walk is an easy stroll to look at the profusion of wildflowers along Beaumaris. If you feel like a shorter, undemanding walk with lots of flowers and morning tea afterwards, this is the walk for you!

We'll begin at the playground in Beaumaris Avenue and amble along the footpath to the Beaumaris Beach B&B on Tasman Highway. Stuart and Judy of Beaumaris Beach B&B have kindly allowed us to wander over their front "yard" where the flowers are in a semi-natural state, with mown paths for easy walking and spotting. We're free to go off the mown paths, but try not to walk on any flowers if you do. We'll then proceed a little way up the bush track alongside Reedy Creek, then back to the Tasman Highway. We'll cross the highway and walk back to the playground via the beach. There we can check out the flowers between the BBQ area and the fence along the footpath, as it still has plenty of wildflowers. The BBQ area is shady, so we can have morning tea after the walk for those who would like it. I'll bring juice and cake, dips, etc. and you can bring your own thermos (or a mug for juice). Toilets and water are available at the playground as well.

During the last year, sections of the 28km-long Wurrawa timber tramway, [circa 1926] have been traversed by the group in the vicinity of The Gardens. We remember walks behind Taylors Beach and also at Sloop Point along the tramline.

For the walk on **Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> November**, the plan was to follow this old rail formation further inland. A section about 1.5km in length starting from Big Lagoon was the next instalment. With no evidence that this section had been walked in recent years and never by the group, this walk was "adventurous" in nature. The route was free of major obstacles but somewhat rough and ferny, suited only to those with bushwalking gear eg, stout boots, long trousers or gaiters etc.

A very interesting walk and many thanks to Revel for leading it.

**Saturday 19th November** saw a group of walkers explore Seymour and Long Point. We included the Seymour and Templestowe beaches as well as the rocky headland, where we saw the remains of a jetty built to transport coal. We had to walk through a bit of water from excess rain but overall managed to stay quite dry.

This was a great day and very informative thank you to Ian, Revel & a special thank you to Andie who didn't manage to stay dry! The rain held off until we finished our walk - another amazing day.

St Helens Walking Group wishes all readers a very Merry Christmas and a safe and prosperous New Year. We would love to see new faces in the New Year come walking with us!





## **FISHING REPORT**

The fishing the last month has been very challenging to say the least, the weather has been very inconsistent and changing from one day to the next in typical Tassie climate style. Those families chasing a crayfish have had mixed bags at times and reports of people doing well for a few days and then days of hardship. Fresh water anglers are continuing to have success for the time put in, and the salt water reports are starting to improve, with the waters clearing and returning to normal. The Break O'Day and the South Esk Rivers have continued to run high and were clearing nicely until we had the heavy rain on the 14<sup>th</sup> December, which has again flooded the river and will make lure fishing difficult over the Christmas break.


## Fishing Reports

**25**<sup>th</sup> **November:** headed up to Lake Leake for a couple of days fishing, arrived around noon and was meet with a strong NW wind blowing, headed across the lake to more sheltered waters on the lee shore. A few red spinners were flying along the shoreline and a few smaller trout were jumping for their feed. Every now and then, larger trout would poke their noses up and take the spent fly life off the top, you just had to be ready to cast in front quickly because they only gave you a quick window to put the flies in front of them.

**26<sup>th</sup> November:** up before daylight and on the water while it was still dark. I slowly headed across the lake looking for fish in the small wind-lanes that had been created, but only the occasional fish would appear and a lack of food in the wind-lanes resulted in a early morning failure. The boat was loaded and headed for breakfast with the plan to head down the hill for a

hit and recognisance mission at the Swan River. We found the Swan River very dirty, like most rivers, and started the search for schools of bream on the sounder. We couldn't say we found anything and had a couple hours blind casting before calling it quits and heading back to the lake, anticipating a dun hatch with the day turning into a warm muggy day. Arrived back at the lake around noon and had a quick lunch and recomposed myself after the disappointing Swan River attempt. I headed up into the snowy area of the lake where a couple of my Kalangadoo friends were

already up there waiting for the duns to start hatching. I decided to set one of my flyrods with two Orange Bead Head nymphs and slowly search the water until the duns started; this method resulted in some smaller Rainbow Trout boated. One of my friends was having trouble with the set-up of flies he was using and wasn't having much luck. I asked him if he'd like to try a couple of my Orange Bead Head nymphs and then he started to catch fish as well. I must say it is nice to catch a fish on a fly that you have tied yourself, but it's much more satisfying to help someone else having a struggling day and for them to catch a fish on one of your tied flies. Around 2.00pm the duns started hatching, so a set-up of two possum fur emergers and a brown nymph dropper were cast to the fish



**31**<sup>st</sup> **November:** Lake Leake - the day didn't start too good as I moved into a small bay, first up I noticed a fish moving along a shoreline and turned the boat off and proceeded to make a cast, this fish was coming straight for the boat and sitting down in my seat so as to not spook this fish, I tried a fancy cast that was a total disaster, even more so on the back-cast, when one of the flies lodged into my fishing companion Ollie the dog's head. I must say he wasn't too thrilled with his new jewellery item stuck in his head! A quick in-boat hook removal operation was performed and we continued with our day's fishing. The plan was to find some dun Feeders, however, despite duns on the water, not a lot of fish feeding and struggled for the afternoon. Later in the afternoon I snuck into a quiet shoreline and noticed a lot of fly-life floating on the water and thought surely a fish must be lurking somewhere. I positioned the boat a good cast from shore and just sat and waited, and surely enough, along came a green nose, sipping insects off the water; I ended up saving the afternoon by using this stealth method, waiting, watching the water and only casting when a fish appeared and presenting the flies quickly if front of the fish's feeding path.

**1**<sup>st</sup> **December:** Lake Leake, out at daybreak and picked up the occasional small rainbow in the wind-lanes. A quick breakfast and back out at 10.00am, searching for fish. I had a friend come up for the afternoon and I was sitting just off Kalangadoo Bay boat ramp waiting for him to arrive with nothing feeding and a stiff southerly breeze blowing, when the wind stopped and the lake glassed off and up the trout come feeding on whatever was on the water! The windless time only lasted for a short time but it was frantic fishing trying to trick one of these fish into eating the flies. I picked my friend up and headed up into the snowy area, fishing a team of nymphs to start with and then trying a dry fly, and we were lucky enough to pick up a few fish, mostly all rainbow trout caught during the afternoon.
