FINGAL COMMEMORATES QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

The Fingal community and Break O'Day Council planted four oak trees in honour of Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on Friday 16 December 2022.

Students, community members and dignitaries gathered at 4.00pm at the Fingal Recreation Ground, the same site where trees were planted for Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee back in 1897. Re-enacting the Diamond Jubilee planting 125 years ago, four

local children, Tarkyn Burn, Asha Woods, Evie Browning and Layla Woods, planted some young new oaks to add to the surviving old ones planted by school students in 1897. Brian Mitchell MP, Federal Member for Lyons unveiled a Platinum Jubilee commemorative plaque at the site.

Mayor Mick Tucker said the community and Fingal Neighbourhood House had arranged an amazing event that not just commemorated Her Majesty the Queen but also recognized

Fingal's history. "The Fingal community are very proud of their history and this was a wonderful day for the community to show case this. I'm really pleased Council was able to support them with our Break O'Day Communities Queen's Jubilee Trees project. There was a history display provided by the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House History Society which I really enjoyed exploring and I am sure everyone there did too,' Mayor Mick Tucker said. After the trees were planted, attendees enjoyed a BBQ,

market stalls and kids activities organised by the Fingal Neighbourhood House and local community.

NEW COMMUNICATION SYSTEM MAKES IT EASIER FOR TASMANIANS TO REPORT CRIME

Crime Stoppers Tasmania and Motorola Solutions have teamed up to design an online portal that makes it easier and faster for the public to report information about crime and criminals.

The new technology means Tasmanians can easily attach media files such as photos and video captured on smartphones, greatly increasing the level of quality of information provided anonymously to Police.

The new system includes improved information processing within back-end systems to streamline information sharing to Police in a logical user sequence on the portal, supported by useful prompts. Members of parliament, mayors, and Tasmania Police, attended the launch of the new portal in Hobart in December last year.

Crime Stoppers Tasmania Chair, Mr David Daniels OAM, said the portal enables his organisation and the wider community to provide greater value and support to Tasmania Police, and more broadly law enforcement. "It's a major advance for Crime Stoppers Tasmania. Our purpose is to support policing by providing valuable information that assists investigations and makes the job easier and more effective for police officers," Mr Daniels said. "Now, with Motorola Solutions' technology we are taking the next step to make it even easier for the community to play their part in creating a safer Tasmania."

Motorola Solutions managing director for Australia and New Zealand, Con Balaskas, said providing Crime Stoppers Tasmania and the state's emergency services with better technology is essential to building a safe, secure and prosperous Tasmania for the future. "Crime Stoppers Tasmania is empowering the public to report safety incidents and threats whenever they occur and our new online portal helps citizens to play a greater role in protecting their communities," Mr Balaskas said.

Crime Stoppers Tasmania CEO David Higgins stated that the new system removed obstacles that at times prevent reporting, such as fear, apprehension, or embarrassment. "When providing information about events they see in their communities, the Tasmanian public now has a highly effective, comfortable and secure way to share what they see. As always, the public can report information without the need to leave their details. However, it is important to know that by providing your details when reporting via Crime Stoppers, it gives police the opportunity to clarify points with you to assist in furthering their investigation," he added.

The information provided to police from the community is invaluable to fighting crime, it helps our law enforcement be intelligence driven and proactive in their response, which in turn improves the efficiency and effectiveness of our law enforcement. Every bit of information helps, and the Crime Stoppers portal makes it easier to tell us.

Crime Stoppers Tasmania receives over 6,500 reports a year, or about 18 reports a day. In recent times they have seen over 80% of reports being submitted online and with this improved portal, it is anticipated that the number of reports will increase even more.

In the entrance corridor of the St Marys Heath Centre a significant plaque is embedded in the wall. It is the plaque laid by Robert W. Legge on the 27th September 1928 to mark the commencement of the building of the St Marys District Hospital.

Mr Legge was carrying on the work of his father, Colonel William V. Legge who, until his death in 1918, was a strong advocate for better medical facilities in the Fingal Valley.

The first board of directors of the new hospital were: R.W.Legge (President), C.S.F. Hood,

J.E. McKenzie, C.F. Salter, O. Holder, L.J. Steel, R.H. Warren, W. Graham, C.R. Jackson, B.J. Jackson, E.L. Ransom, A.F. Gurr (Secretary) and Dr C.B. Barryman.

At the official opening ceremony on the 25th April 1928, the then Premier of Tasmania, the Honourable Joseph Aloysius Lyons, paid tribute to the public spirit of St Marys and surrounding communities. He went on to say: "You are fully deserving of this new hospital. It is a fine little institution, constructed on modern lines and equipped in a manner that leaves nothing to be desired. It was opened to patients a few weeks ago and is already recognised as an agency for great good in the district.

"There is one phase of hospital work that appeals to me, that is the maternity ward. I moved in the House some years ago for an investigation to be held in maternity hospitals throughout the State and I was Chairman of the committee appointed for that purpose. In some country districts we learnt of the great trouble and inconvenience some of the mothers of our future citizens had to contend with. Some heart-rending stories were told of things that happened in the country. Since then everyone has been trying to bring about better conditions. My Government has been able to contribute in this by assisting communities to build more hospitals such as this in country areas."

Spokesman for the board of directors of the new hospital Mr C.S.F. Hood, the Superintendent of Cornwall Coal Company, made mention of the generous response the board had received from the people of the district when they were asked for support. He also thanked the Government for their contribution of two thousand pounds which had been given on a pound for pound basis. Whilst he said it would be doubtful the hospital would run at a profit, the highest dividend of such a facility was the health of the people.

In 1928 the hospital accommodated for five patients, with cots for three children. The original staff members were Matron A.N. Morgan, Sister A.E. Harrison and Probationer Miss Dawson. Another Probationer was engaged a few months after the opening.

Over the years, improvements and extensions, which have continued to upgrade St Marys Health Centre to a modern state of the art facility, have seen most of the original hospital disappear. But the foundation plaque remains as a significant reminder of the Centre's history.

So next time you walk through the main corridor, pause a moment at the plaque and spare a thought for those dedicated people some eighty odd years ago, all of whom were dedicated to improving the health system in the Fingal Valley.

SUPPORTING WOMEN IN SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY

Saturday 11th February 2023 was the International Day of Women and Girls in Science – a day to celebrate the contributions of Australian women across Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM).

In a press statement, Member for Lyons, Brian Mitchell MP, stated, "I was proud to stand in the national parliament this week and speak in support of a motion that enjoyed bi-partisan support for getting more girls and women into STEM. Across Lyons, STEM plays a vital part in our salmon industry, at the UTAS Greenhill Observatory, and across modern agriculture and manufacturing."

Science, technology, engineering, and mathematics is an umbrella term used to group together the distinct but related technical disciplines of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. The term is typically used in the context of education policy or curriculum choices in schools, and is widely promoted in Tasmanian schools. Through STEM, students develop key skills including: problem solving and creativity.

STEM is an interdisciplinary approach to learning. Concepts from the disciplines of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics are coupled with real-world projects enabling students to develop STEM literacy. (Source: stem.education.tas.gov.au)

"It is a simple fact of life that science, technology and mathematics are going to play bigger roles in our lives in the years ahead, and we must ensure women are part of that story.

Nationally, women make up just 16 per cent of people with STEM qualifications and that is frankly not good enough. It wasn't good enough 30 years ago, let alone 23 years into the 21st century."

He continued, "The Albanese Labor Government's actions to drive gender equality in the workplace will continue our support of women in STEM. We invested \$5.8 million from the October budget to support a more diverse STEM workforce, and funding to support industry-led projects like the Women in STEM & Entrepreneurship (WISE) Program. Just last month, Industry Minister Ed Husic announced \$15.9 million in new WISE program grants that are supporting more women to study and build careers in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

Here in Lyons, organisations like the volunteer-run STEM for Girls in St Helens run workshops and encourage girls and young women in our community become critical thinkers, problem solvers and innovators of the upcoming generation.

Mr Mitchell concluded, "People become what they can see and our government is determined to ensure girls and young women see more women in STEM. We will provide opportunities to give girls and young women the confidence to pursue further study and careers in fields they may not have otherwise considered."

ST MARYS HOSPITAL AUXILIARY TIP SHOP

The St Marys Hospital Auxiliary Tip Shop has completed another year of reuse of goods. The St Marys community has been generous in dropping off a huge range of goods that are surplus to their needs or no longer wanted. All funds raised go to the St Marys Hospital.

St Marys Tip Shop would like to thank the local community and visitors for their support in 2022 helping the Tip Shop to raise \$21,527.10 for St Marys Hospital.

And what have the funds raised been put towards?

These funds are going towards a 'Cuddle/Bariatric' bed to support palliative care patients and their families, which costs around \$33,000 and an ECG Machine, which costs around \$9,000.

Tip Shop improvements are underway. You may have noticed that the entrance area and behind the Tip Shop has been cleared ready for improvements to the shed and surrounds. The rear area is to be levelled and filled with two polytunnels for storage. The entrance will have a concrete slab and cover.

What can you do to support this worthwhile cause to continue?

- Volunteer for 1 or more hours whenever you can
- Let us know what you are looking for so we can move goods on more quickly.
- Talk to the Tip Shop volunteers about your upcycling ideas or help with recycling.

Here are two pictures of our volunteer Terry with his Tip Shop-sourced winch – total cost \$30. It consists of a trailer axle and hub, the centre piece of a tyre rim, 90ml of tubing into 100ml of tubing, a car jack and a boat trailer winch. It looks strong!

Whatever you need it pays to check at the Tip Shop first. Follow the 'St Marys District Hospital Auxiliary Tip Shop' Facebook page for new items in store.

Of course, none of this would be possible without the work of our dedicated team of volunteers finding space in the shed for goods, arranging and rearranging the container, covering furniture to keep it dry. A big thanks to Chrissie Hall Pascoe supported by Guy Pascoe who arrange the shed so it feels more spacious. Thanks to the other volunteers for keeping the shop running during this major rearrangement.

So, hoping everyone had a great festive season and a safe one.

First edition of the Valley Voice for 2023 but disappointing to begin with a subject that's been mentioned here numerous times.... the eastern end of Main Street St Marys. From the pub corner to Newman Street, guessing 250 to 300 metres, is nothing short of being in a very poor state yet again. It's been patched on patches several times and yet it remains a constant point of frustration, and quite frankly whoever is in charge of maintaining it needs perhaps to finally and expediently fix it properly. Trying to think of any other main throughfare that has this problem, given the traffic that needs to travel on it, and I am struggling. It'd be bad enough if it was a back street, but for the main road through town it is really disappointing.

On the western end of Main Street it's a totally different story and being upgraded and done properly quite a few years ago proves that it can be done and sustained extremely well. Just wondering if they tallied up the materials, workers' hours and time that has been spent on the bad end, and whether it would have gone a long way to having that end look and function as good by now.

What I'm simply asking is this; Can our Council or whatever agency who has control over this piece of tarmac please fast forward proper remediation and upgrading of the road section in question, so we can drive along it without fear of damaging our vehicles, because at times the ruts have been substantial. Not that good at present. I'd venture to say it's also potentially a risk of causing accidents if a person was distracted trying to miss the worst of the ruts.

I think the vast majority, if not all, of the locals could bear days of disruption while this is remedied because the current patch -on-patch fixes are just not good enough. Try and find someone who would disagree with me, I dare you. Please fix it properly this time

On a similar vein and once again something mentioned a few times before, the diabolical road section from the bottom of St Marys Pass to Upper Scamander turn off. Not unlike St Marys Main Street, this bit of road has been patched up numerous times over recent decades, but with ever increasing tourist traffic, not least motor homes, large caravans, big boats, larger trucks and so on, this road is just not sufficient any more. It's narrow and shoulders are limited, and safe passing is just not an option. Even worse is growing areas of damaged and broken tarmac. Would not be surprised if car damage has occurred from this. This has to be a priority.




The thing is that our governing bodies involved with maintaining our roads have proven they can do a great job. Case in point is the Diana's Basin to St Helens upgrade. This is a major plus and deserves lots of kudos and thanks, but this sort of work MUST go further, and I'm imploring our agencies to look after more sections of our long suffering roads sooner, not later.



been dumped. These are at Goshen, off Terry Hills Road and at another site off Ansons Bay Road.







MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW Written by Pam Bretz

Over December and January our group read 2 novels that couldn't be more different, one being written in the 19th century in England and one in 2018 in Western Australia.

The first one was *The Woman in White* by Wilkie Collins, an early example of detective fiction and quite recently made into a TV series. It was a highly popular novel at the time and was serialised, like those of his contemporary and friend, Charles Dickens. It is always a challenge to read the prose from the 19th century, the language seeming to the modern reader very elaborate and requiring dedicated time and attention, but most of the group actually read the 600+ pages and enjoyed the visit to another place and time. The story concerns two half sisters, the beautiful and vulnerable Laura Fairlie and the independent-minded and non-conformist Marian Halcombe. Living with their self-indulgent and perpetually ailing uncle, Frederick Fairlie, Laura has been promised to a man in marriage by her late father. The story has multiple narrators but the main one is their art tutor, Walter Hartright, who on his way to take up his post with them meets the mysterious woman in white. She is being pursued by two men who are bent on returning her to a lunatic asylum from which she has escaped. She will play an important role in the unfolding drama. Over time he and Laura fall in love, but of course this cannot be allowed to continue and


he is dismissed from his position. He goes overseas on explorations but is eventually called back after a shock death occurs. He then turns detective and painstakingly collects witness reports, which make up quite a large part of the story.

There are some stock 19th century characters and the novel fits the then-popular genre of "sensation" novel, full of melodrama and helpless females and evil men, but the narration bowls along at a good pace and kept our interest. The social mores of the time are, of course, so different from our own but that's what makes delving into the literature of the past so interesting.

The second novel was *The Shepherd's Hut* by our own much loved and admired Tim Winton. His story tells of a 15 year old boy, brutalised by a drunken father, who beats both his wife and son, and who is fleeing from his home town on the northern edge of the wheat belt in Western Australia in a stolen car. Jaxie Clackton is the boy, a foulmouthed, abused teenager but

who has the strongest survival skills and determination to get away from the horrors of his life. It is his voice we hear as he narrates his journey and what a powerful and confronting voice it is. Winton is a master of the vernacular and once the reader becomes accustomed to the limitations and crudity of his language, one is carried along into his world of struggle. After some days, and on the point of collapse, he comes across a sheepless shepherd's hut on the edge of the saltpan desert country. It is inhabited by an old Irish priest, who appears to be in exile after some misdeed. They make an odd pair but over the weeks learn a certain respect for each other. This is the first adult male who has ever treated the boy with decency, and Fintan MacGillis proves to be a saviour of sorts for Jaxie, while Jaxie eventually becomes the means to the bloody redemption of the priest.

Winton's themes are big. He is interested in the nature of maleness in Australia, often toxic and brutal, in the influence of family violence on the individual. Redemption and salvation are the overarching concerns of this story. Winton's characters are often outsiders and the landscape is

FISHING REPORT

The fishing along the East coast has been very consistent over the Christmas and New Year period. Beach fishing has been rewarding with some nice-sized salmon and flathead coming off beaches such as Four Mile Creek and the Chain of Lagoons. Georges Bay at St Helens has been rewarding for holiday-makers with the usual schools of salmon and taylor. There have been reports of small kingfish mixed up below the schools. Schools of bream have been found feeding on sand patches at the Stockman's Flat area of the bay at Akaroa, and fishermen casting hard body lures have been rewarded for their hard work with some nicely sized bream.

Fresh water fishing is continuing to be productive at different waters around the state. Great Lake fly fisherman have had terrific sport out in the middle on bright sunny days, with a northerly breeze chasing trout cruising the waves looking for food of any sort. This type of fishing is known as 'shark fishing' and there have been reports of some special days with the fish up and cruising about. Other waters such as Little Pine Lagoon and Penstock Lagoon are fishing well and it is pleasing to see many mainland number-plated vehicles back on the Highland roads, spending their money at the local businesses. The South Esk River in the Fingal Valley has really come back from the sad state it was a few years ago after a few years of drought and low water, where the inability to spawn and an over-population of cormorants really decimated the trout population. After the higher rainfall these past years the trout have been able to grow and return this fabulous fishery to somewhat its former state, as there has been some really nice-sized trout being taken using lures and fly. Lures such as the ever-reliable Celta type lures are lures that I don't know what they represent, but during the summer months the trout can't resist the temptation of a humble Celta lure.

<u>26th December:</u> Left Fingal at 3.30am to be at Lake Leake before daybreak, the expectation in my mind was it going to be a morning of trout feeding everywhere due to the previous day being quite hot and a big insect hatch must have occurred. I was on the water while it was still dark, and once out on the water while slowly cruising across the lake looking for that ring or sign of a fish feeding, a nice wind lane was showing in the increasing light. Right, game time, turn the motor off, set up the electric motor, get the fly rods prepared, check water for food...yes, plenty of food, ok now find the fish.. And that's where the fairy tale ended, with not a sign of a trout feeding all over the lake; wow, disappointing to say the least. The highlight of the morning was a meeting in the middle of the lake with my fishing friends in their boats, having a cup of coffee and a biscuit and listening to some dreadful music one friend thought may bring the fish up. That may have been the problem? Score 0! <u>2nd January</u>: Walking along the banks of the South Esk River, casting 'Celta' lures like we have many times since our childhood, we had great afternoon catching 13 nice sized trout casting between the gaps in the willow branches. It was a windy afternoon but the fish were on, with many other hook-ups and fish dropping the hooks. The 'Mepps Celta' that I was first using had quite big hooks, so a bank-side hook changeout to smaller trebles seemed to improve the hook-ups.

<u>13 and 14th January</u>: Decided on a late afternoon trip up to Lake Leake on the Friday to be on-site Saturday morning expecting a good hatch. Arrived Friday around 7.00pm and headed straight out on the lake. A stiff easterly breeze was blowing and not a lot of fly life was evident on the water, so I decided to fish on the eastern shore with a few small trout jumping after spinners, with the spinners slowly making their way out over the deeper water. The breeze started to die out and a wind lane was forming out in the middle, so as the line in the movie 'Field of Dreams' goes, "If you build it they will come," I went out and sat on the edge of the wind lane and watched and waited, and sure enough, green noses started to sip food on the top when the sun went down behind the hills. A frantic hour of fishing produced nine trout to the boat. On Saturday morning, despite the calm morning, a few trout showed but were very spooky and you had to cast a full-length line with a long leader to be in with a chance.

<u>27th and 28th January:</u> Went up to Lake Leake with a friend for the weekend, but the fishing was very tough with not a lot of fly life. Our day started off well with my fishing companion snagging a nice-sized brown trout within the first five minutes and a thought of what may be, but that was the only decent fish boated. The next morning, we woke to the sound of a strong wind so a decision was made to head to the Swan River to catch a bream. We arrived to a calm river which was unbelievable considering the wind up the hill. We tried up the river and down the river but couldn't temp a bream with any lure, so we packed up with our tails between our legs and returned to the lake for a trout, and as the fishing gods were not on our side that day, we never caught a trout either, so back to the camp and enjoyed a cold beer and a nice feed and watched some Big Bash Cricket.


