LYMPHOEDEMA – WHAT IS IT, WHAT TREATMENTS ARE AVAILABLE AND WHAT CAN YOU DO?

The Fingal Valley community is fortunate to have the not-for-profit Tasmanian Lymphoedema and Laser Therapy Centre located at the St Marys Community Health Centre. This Lymphoedema Clinic is very well regarded and attracts clients from across the state.

Lymphoedema occurs when the lymphatic system is unable to remove all the fluid that leaks from the blood vessels and then accumulates in the body's tissues.

Lymphoedema may occur when the lymphatic system is damaged by surgery and/or radiotherapy associated with treatment for cancer or when the lymphatic system has not properly formed and appears at birth, puberty or later in life.

Treatments offered at the Tasmanian Lymphoedema Centre include Manual Lymphatic Drainage massage (MLD) and low level laser therapy together with guidance and advice on diet, exercise and skin care.

All treatment protocols have been developed with advice and ongoing support from Professor Neil Piller, Lymphologist from the Flinders University Medical Centre in South Australia.

The Centre's practitioners are contracted by the Tasmanian Lymphoedema and Laser Therapy Centre Association. This Association promotes understanding of lymphoedema and its treatments and maintains and upgrades the Centre's facilities and equipment largely through community grants and fundraising activities.

Around one hundred Cornwall residents and their guests gathered on Monday the 9th June to officially open their latest facility to the Coalminers Heritage Wall Park.

Official guests included Michael Polley MHA, Mayor Robert Legge, Deputy Mayor Margaret Osborne, Councillors John McGiveron, David Clement and Reon Johns.

The facility was funded from a \$700,000 community recovery grant given to Break O'Day communities by the State and Federal Governments after the December 2006 bushfires.

In March 2007 part of this money was set aside for community projects in fire affected areas that would, not only help in the recovery, but be part of the

community for generations to come.

A Fire Recovery Reference Group was set up and with the guidance of Fire Recovery Coordinator, Howard Colvin, the group went about consulting the affected communities and at the end of the

day coming up with suitable projects. In Cornwall's case it was a BBQ and pergola.

Jim Haas, President of the Cornwall Community Group, opened the official part of the day by welcoming guests and residents

At the end of the day the event was a huge success with everyone enjoying good food and plenty of good conversation. The kids too had a ball with face painting and a jumping castle.



EMERGING LEADERS COMMUNITY CELEBRATE GRADUATING

Participants in the 2022 Emerging Community Leaders Program celebrated their graduation at the magnificent Government House in Hobart on Friday 10th February, in the presence of Her Excellence the Honourable Barbara Baker AC, the Governor of Tasmania.

Two of the graduates were local residents Casey Musika and Bronwyn Zemanek.

Casey Musicka has been the Project Officer for the Break O'Day and Bicheno Suicide Prevention Trial for the last three years, and is passionate about her community and helping people to live their best lives. She was a member of the 'CEEDM' team

Bronwyn is the Chairperson of the 'With One Voice' Break O'Day Community Choir. She adores how singing and supper creates connections and supports mental health and wellbeing, and thrives on being challenged.

The Emerging Community Leaders program recognizes the value of developing leadership skills, particularly those that will empower and enable participants to help their community prosper. Funded by a grant from the Tasmanian Community Fund,

up to 24 participants are engaged in a year-long course, developing skills in governance, finance, leadership, management, communication and project management. Participants in the program design, develop and implement a community project as part of their commitment to the Tasmanian community, and to put into practice the learnings from the program.

Working in teams of two to six people, they are responsible for all aspects of the project's development and implementation. The focus is on building leadership skills and understanding of self and others whilst achieving outcomes for the Tasmanian community. Sessions are both online and at specified residential workshops, which are compulsory.

The CEEDM team called their project 'Purposeful Planting', and its aim was; 'To repair the loss of community connectedness for our seniors, by implementing inclusive activities.' 4 events were held in both the north and the south of Tasmania during Seniors Week. At Okines Community House, students from the local primary school joined community members to plant herbs, flowers and tomatoes. The event at Glenorchy focused on gardening, sustainability and providing senior support services. Lunch was provided, guests from Landcare and Zero Waste spoke and guests decorated pots and were given seeds to plant in their pots to take home. The day at St Helens Community garden was supported by St Helens Neighbourhood House and Storm Disability Service, who brought clients to the day, encouraging interaction with members of the local community. The final function was held at the Northern Suburbs Community Centre. Migrant Resource Centre and community members planted herbs, flowers and fruit trees, then a memorial cherry tree was planted with a plaque to commemorate the day. Lunch featuring dishes from a number of different cultures, followed by singing and dancing from those cultures.

"I saw the growth of fellow staff-members at St Helens Neighbourhood House who had done the course, and as soon as applications opened last year, I jumped in," Casey said. "The course built my self-confidence, both personally and in my role. I made mistakes, but I used these to learn and to refine skills, and I met people from a wide range of situations, all working towards the same goals in different ways. Life experiences were shared and it was interesting to see things through the eyes of people from different cultures," she added.

Casey strongly recommends people joining the emerging Community Leaders course, as there so many areas to learn from and people to work with, all contributing using their strengths and learning how to develop weaknesses and be better at their job. "And I made some great friends and network connections, too," she concluded.

The team of which Bronwyn is a member was called lutruwita ekatha which in English means 'Tasmania together'. They called their project 'People of lutruwita', and its aim was: 'To bring the people of *Lutruwita* together through story, and raise awareness that, despite our differences, we are all connected through the love of our Island home and to reinforce that, as humans, we all have similar needs, wants, and goals for family, security, love and support.' "We created a book called "People of Lutruwita," Bronwyn stated. "We interviewed many diverse people of all ages and backgrounds, asking them 20 questions about their life and thoughts, then brought it together in a way to showcase the similarity and diversity of the people who make up our wonderful home." The questions included, 'What makes you laugh the most', 'What did you want to do when you were small?' and "What do you look for in friendship?', and the replies share what we have in common and what differences we have. The page are illustrated with beautiful photographs of Tasmanian landscapes. The team are hopeful that they will be able to publish and sell the book to the public.

I would not have been able to pay the full cost of such a course, and the learning, experience and connections I made has already made a huge

difference to my life and directly benefited my choir team. It has given me skills and confidence to get out and do good for, and within, my community."

Each team provided a presentation about their project at the graduation ceremony before receiving their certificates.

The program for 2023 is already underway, with Rebecca Tuck, Community Care Adviser at the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House, participating.

The Say by the "Cage Rattler"




Do you recall the hysteria surrounding the Y2K Bug In the year 2000? So many, including experts, thought that banking systems and systems heavily reliant on computer control might shut down, leaving the world in crisis. It turned out to be a non issue... Later that year though, I fondly recall the Sydney Olympics and the hype matched by delivery of one of the greatest of Olympics. A week or so ago, I stumbled on a video that recalled the XXII Olympiad held in the Harbour City in a great way, and it rekindled for me memories and excitement of the night of the Opening Ceremony on Friday September 15th that year.

They say it's just sport, but it's more than that I'd say. Over the 16 days of the games, Australia as a whole swelled with pride and wonder. No doubt every other host venue before and since has been the same. Others are critical of the massive cost to put on the Games, and this is already being pointed at Brisbane hosting in 2032. What is often not mentioned though, is the employment and skills that are value-added for years before and after the event, the opportunities for a vast number of businesses, contactors, supply tenders and manufacturers, and the inspiration to young athletes to live healthier. It's not all about the cost centre numbers.

Australia's third hosting of the Olympics seems a long nine years distant right now, but I'm betting the people in charge will use the next year or two leading up to the former seven year announcement period that Sydney had, wisely. No-one around 30 years ago (1993) will forget Juan Antonio Samaranch 's famous words, "And the winner is Sydney". Total euphoria tempered with a reality that seven short years stood between the announcement and the actual event. Now it's 10 years...

The other night, as I watched bits and pieces of the Sydney Olympics recounted in the video, not least the very famous Cathy Freeman gold medal win, it was proof beyond any doubt that this country could do it then, and can do it in 2032.

Finally, happy to see the Main Street repairs have happened; will be interesting to see if they hold longer than a few months this time, but at least we won't need to drive like dodgem cars trying to avoid the ruts, for a while. That said, I still hope plans are afoot for a proper remake, something akin to the western side of the pub, in the not too distant future....it's certainly way overdue.


ANGLICAN PARISH WELCOMES NEW MINISTER

Chewy Chocolate Gingerbread Cookies

<u>Ingredients</u>

1½ cups plus 1 tablespoon unbleached all-purpose flour

1/4 teaspoon ground cloves

1/4 teaspoon freshly grated nutmeg

½ cup unsalted butter, room temperature

½ cup dark-brown sugar, packed

1 teaspoon baking soda 210 gms bitter 70% chocolate, cut into 1/4-inch chunks

Method

1 ¼ teaspoons ground ginger

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 tablespoon unsweetened Dutch-process cocoa powder

1 tablespoon grated peeled fresh ginger

¼ cup molasses

1 ½ teaspoons boiling water

¼ cup granulated sugar

Line two baking trays with baking paper. In a medium bowl, sift together flour, ground ginger, cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg, and cocoa.

Beat butter and grated ginger until lightened, about 4 minutes. Add brown sugar and beat until combined. Add molasses and beat until combined.

In a cup or small jug, dissolve baking soda in boiling water. Beat half of the lour mixture into butter mixture. Beat in baking-

soda mixture, then remaining half of flour mixture. Mix in chocolate, then turn out onto a piece of plastic wrap. Pat dough out to about 1 inch thick; and seal with wrap. Refrigerate until firm, 2 hours or overnight.

Heat oven to 180° C. Roll dough into 1 1/2- inch balls and place 2 inches apart on prepared baking trays.

Refrigerate for 20 minutes, then roll in granulated sugar.

Bake until the surfaces crack slightly, 10 to 12 minutes, rotating halfway through. Let cool on sheets 5 minutes, then transfer cookies to a wire rack and let cool completely.

Cookies are best the day they are made, but can be stored in an airtight container at room temperature up to 5 days.



"WHO ARE YOU"

James Thomas loved the peace and isolation of his architecturally-designed beach house, so perfectly suited to the wild East Coast of Tasmania... It was designed to blend into its environment among the ever-shifting pure white sand dunes that were being gradually stabilized by the planting of dune grasses. The new day dawned dark, with ominous storm clouds hanging heavily over the horizon to the south east, turning the sea a deep navy blue, the southerly wind whipping up the tops of the surf and churning them into lines of raging white foam.

Would she be there today? James was drawn away from his work, to the window, to scan the beach for her. What was it with him and his sudden interest in this wraith like creature on his beach?

It was the winds blustery act of catching her long floral skirt that alerted him to her presence on the beach again. There she was. A week went by. He was compelled to a daily vigil now, searching for her on the beach. Moving back and forth from his work at the computer to the window to watch for her. As the days slipped into weeks, he began to accept the fact she may not return. He became more aware of his surroundings, things he had not noticed before. Between the sunrises and the sunsets was that ever-changing miracle of nature, playing out before his eyes daily.

It was more of an awakening really. He began to wonder just how many sunrises and sunsets he had missed, or how many of those magnificent changing seascapes he had not experienced, those silvery reflected paths of the moon on the ocean as it had raced to the shore on the calm still nights, or those magical awe-inspiring strikes of lightening that lit up the sky on a dark stormy night as they danced on the sea. And the moments those magnificent, migrating whales breached along the horizon. His senses were now awakened to this truly amazing a theatre of life being played out before his very eyes every day.

In that moment he realized he had answered that unanswered question...

He spoke to the silence.
