

### **BUNNIES OR BILBIES?**

A traditional sight at Easter is the Easter Bunny, delivering Easter eggs to eager children, and hiding eggs ready for the Easter Egg Hunt on Easter Sunday. But since the 1990's, the bilby has also featured as part of Easter in Australia.

Bilbies are native Australian marsupials that are endangered. To raise money and increase awareness of conservation efforts, bilby-shaped chocolates and related merchandise are sold within many stores throughout Australia as an alternative to Easter Bunnies.

A bilby is an Australian marsupial. It is thought that they have been in Australia for up to 15 million years, and were found across 70% of Australia. The two species are known as the lesser bilby, extinct since the 1950s and the greater bilby, now commonly referred to as the bilby. They live in the deserts and are listed as a vulnerable species. They grow to about 55 cm long, with the tail measuring another 29 cms. Their fur is usually gray or white, their ears are very long, and their nose is pointy. They dig burrows and can easily be mistaken for rabbits. Their diet consists of insects and their larvae, seeds, spiders, bulbs, fruit and fungi, and occasionally small animals. They don't need to drink water as they obtain moisture from their food. The female bilby's pouch faces backward, so that it doesn't get full of dirt as they dig, and bilbies have the shortest gestation period of all marsupials, about 12 days.



The first documented use of the Easter Bilby concept was in March 1968, when a 9-year-old girl Rose-Marie Dusting, wrote a story, "Billy The Aussie Easter Bilby," which she published as a book 11 years later. The story helped spark the public's interest in saving the bilby.

In 1991, Nicholas Newland from the 'Foundation for Rabbit-Free Australia' also developed the idea of the Easter Bilby to raise awareness about the environmental damage that feral rabbits cause, and to replace the Easter Bunny with true native wildlife. Australian children's book author and illustrator Irena Sibley produced three Easter Bilby books between 1994 and 2000, including the best selling "The Bilbies' First Easter", published by Silver Gum Press in 1994.

In 1993, Australian children's author Jeni Bright wrote the story of "Burra Nimu, the Easter Bilby". It tells how Burra, a shy but brave little bilby, decides to save the land from the rabbits and foxes who are ruining it. Burra and his family and friends gather together for a wonderful time painting Easter eggs to give to the children and ask for their help. But before they can set off on their journey to the children, they must outwit the rabbit army. As well as the story of the Easter Bilby, the not-for-profit website 'Burra Nimu, the Easter Bilby' contains factual information about bilbies and other endangered Australian species. It is illustrated by Australian illustrator Janet Selby.

The first chocolate Easter Bilbies were sold at the Warrawong Sanctuary in South Australia, and other shops soon followed suit. Although other major chocolate manufacturers have made them in the past, they are now made predominately by Pink Lady (Fyna Foods) in Victoria, and Haig's Chocolates (South Australia). Fyna Foods also manufactures other Australian animals in their Australian Bush Friends Easter chocolate range. For over 13 years, Darrell Lea also featured chocolate bilbies, and donated \$173,000. This year, a limited number of chocolate bilbies made by the company are available from a major retail outlet, with a portion from each being donated to the Save the Bilby Fund.



The aims of the Save the Bilby fund are

- to support research into the biology and ecology of the species
- to identify the reasons for population and distribution decline, to direct management efforts towards addressing threatening processes
- to re-establish populations, based on the biological knowledge gained through the research

Bilbies are slowly becoming endangered because of habitat loss and change, and competition with other animals. There is a national recovery plan being developed for saving them. This program includes captive breeding, monitoring populations, and re-establishing bilbies where they once lived, and a number of them have been re-introduced to sites in Western Australia and Queensland.

































### HAMBURGERS, ANYONE?

If you are looking for a great hamburger at a good price, you can't go past the red tent in the grounds of Integrated Living on the corner of Talbot and Brown Streets in Fingal!

Run by Mathinna residents Joe and Michelle Holmes, the stall offers egg and bacon rolls, hamburgers and chicken schnitzelburgers, along with soft drinks, tea and coffee.

Originally from Queensland, where Joe worked with disability services and Michelle worked in a sugar mill, the couple came to Tasmania on a holiday to escape the heat, and fell in love with the state. "We love Tasmania and this area, so we bought a property at Mathinna, where we were made to feel welcome. We had food stalls at markets, selling crepes and hot dogs, but they weren't very profitable. We did notice that there was nowhere to get a hamburger in Fingal, so we thought we would give it a try," said Joe.

They discussed the idea with manager of the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House, Gary Barnes, then approached Integrated Living to see if they could use a corner of the grounds. They then went through the process of being approved by the Break O'Day Council and obtaining insurances, as well as the tent and other equipment they needed. "Integrated Living and the Council were both encouraging, as were the people of Mathinna," Joe said. "We make everything with fresh ingredients which we source as local as we can including the Fingal Valley Supermarket, and people keep coming back, so we must be doing a good job!" he continued. "We love chatting to our customers, whether they are locals or visitors, and often tell them about places that are good to visit, such as Mathinna Falls," Michelle added.

With the cooler weather coming on, the couple will review sales after Easter, and make a decision whether to continue over the Autumn and Winter seasons.

"We wanted to provide locals with good quality hamburgers, made with the freshest ingredients we could get. Now people passing through stop at the stall and tell us that our burgers are good, so they tell their friends, and they stop to buy a burger," Joe said. "That's great!"

# THE HERO

### Palm Sunday 1960

On fishing trips, everyone know what my World War 1 veteran father meant when he said, "Today we employ the 'rules of engagement'." It meant he would buy the person who caught the first fish of the day a double-header ice-cream! A double-header with flavours of choice - what a treat! We also knew my big-hearted, equitable father would ensure all received an ice-cream, be it only a single-header....

Today he needed to concoct ten reasons for rewards, for 6 children and 4 adults were going on a fishing trip to Doyle's Farm, Upper Scamander.

Traditionally, every Maundy Thursday, Dad caught a ride on Mr Davis' school bus to go fishing at Scamander. On our isolated farm, Daisy Dale, Lower German Town, we had no car and no electricity. Therefore, he caught only sufficient to meet our immediate need. This year, however, he was making a different, unexpected additional excursion. My widowed Auntie needed all the help she could get to supply herself and children with fish for Easter and beyond. She had invited Mum, Dad and I to join her, her family and a mutual friend to go fishing on Palm Sunday. The thought of catching fish on a Sunday, and not eating them until Friday, was unheard of. But things were different now. Auntie Gwen had purchased a refrigerator. A refrigerator! So great was this wonderous invention that now took pride of place in her humble kitchen, Mum and I walked the long distance to Cornwall to see it with our own eyes. It was a worthwhile trip - my show-off cousins smugly served us icy fruit cordial complete with floating ice cubes (never had I seen or tasted anything so amazing!) and the promise of a rare exciting car trip, too.

Our transport, a Ford ute owned and driven by our friend, arrived at Daisy Dale early Palm Sunday morning. Mum rode in the cab, while Dad and I had the privilege of riding on the tray with my boisterous cousins. The trip down St Marys Pass was exhilarating. We laughed and chattered with carefree abandonment. Then Pam said, "Remember the Tuesday before Easter last year?" "How could we forget it?" Dad, Des and I responded in unison. She was referring to our miraculous rescue from a crazed raging charging bull. I'd taken Pam, Des and my 3 little nieces on a mushroom discovery expedition when our new bull set out to kill us. Dad came and saved us!

Nearly a year later, the memories were still vivid. "Thanks so much, Uncle Syd," Des said, "If you hadn't been there to fire those warning shots to scare Brutus away, I'd still be stuck up that gum tree. You're our hero!" We all cheered and clapped in agreement and appreciation. Dad shook his head. "I'm no hero. I just did what had to be done. Thankfully, this Easter will be less dramatic." "That's for sure," we agreed. "So now please tell us today's 'rules of engagement'." "Well," Dad said, "I thought as well as the great 'first fish' prize, minor prizes would be in order - the best bream, the fattest flathead..." Dad continued on with 7 more ideas, but we didn't hear. We were all dreaming of claiming that 'first fish' prize! Dad and the boys confidently and proudly reached out and patted their fishing rods. No matter that they were old, wooden rods and bought second-hand, they were rods, whereas us females owned only hand-lines. So what! We girls would soon show the boys it was skill, not equipment, that counted.

From Scamander, we travelled on a long, narrow, windy dusty bush track to the abandoned Doyle's Farm. We rarely came to this remote prized fishing spot, so this was an amazing opportunity for good fishing and fierce competition!

The sight of the long grassy bank with its very steep incline to the deep, wide Scamander River caused 6 already hyped-up children to be charged with irrational excitement. "Be careful!" Mum shouted, but we were already over the side of the ute, geared up and running helter-skelter to the river. "I'll catch the first fish!" ten year-old Des boasted as he out-ran us. He already had his rod raised ready to cast! In his enthusiasm and haste, he misjudged the river bank edge. SPLASH! He plunged full-bore from the 2 meter-high bank. His speed propelled him metres out in the dark, frightening depths of the river. Des couldn't swim; not one of us could swim a stroke! The terrifying water immediately swallowed him. We were still frozen with shock when the adults came running. Immediately Aunty Gwen dashed forward. Just as she was poised to leap into the water, Dad forcibly restrained her. Des surfaced, threshing in terror. Our friend grabbed a fishing rod and held it out to Des. Somehow he foundered and managed to grab the rod with one hand Oh joy! Des now had two hands on the rod. SNAP! The old rod broke. He fell backwards and disappeared from sight. "Our old rods will never hold his weight," Dad informed us. "All of you hold Gwen. No-one go near that river," he commanded. He knew full well any heroics would result in drownings. Des resurfaced. Fear-stricken, he implored us to help him.

There is nothing more devastating than being hopeless and helpless - and powerless - watching the agonizing process of an untimely death unfold. What seemed like hours was in reality only minutes, but fear and despair were exhausting Des every second. His pointless threshing was slowing; even his screams were subsiding. Only his dread and agony increased. Numbly, we accepted the inevitable - Des was drowning!

In the hysteria, no-one noticed Dad had run from the scene. We were too busy sobbing out our love and regrets to our precious Des. "Don't give up, Des," we hopelessly urged. Then came a breathless but calm voice. "Help is here, Des!" Dad rushed to the river bank. He held out a long, old wooden plank. Hope revitalized the drowning boy. He managed to grab the life-saving board! We held onto Dad has he dragged Des close to shore. We held his legs as he lay down half suspended over the river. He dragged Des up the steep bank. Totally exhausted, Dad lay down beside his ashen coughing, trembling nephew. We joined them, relishing the safety of solid ground. We sobbed uncontrollably with relief and thanksgiving!

We all knew Des was alive because of my calm, quick-thinking father. He knew an old abandoned farm would still have fences - post-and-rail fences. A rail was the only thing strong and long enough to use in the rescue.

We'd seen God's gracious and miraculous intervening hand at work often in our lives, and today we had witnessed it again. We placed the shivering Des in the cab, ready to snuggle up to his grateful mother. As Mum was climbing into the ute tray to join us, she asked, "How far did you have to run to find that rail?" "Quite a distance," Dad replied, pointing to the remains of the old post and rail fence barely visible in the distance. Gasping is disbelief, Auntie Gwen's shaking voice asked, "However did you manage to get that railing in time?" Dad said simply, "God." That was enough!

In contrast to the jubilant trip down the Pass, going home was one of sober reflection. Back at Cornwall, in Auntie Gwen's humble kitchen, we rejoiced. Des sat by the fire sipping hot Milo. We bid our goodbyes before being driven back to Daisy Dale. Des held out his arms to my father. The two embraced in a happy heart-warning hug. "Thanks so much Uncle Syd. I guess you're just as great at handling a wooden plank as you are with a rifle," he grinned. "There's no doubt you are a hero!" We all cheered and clapped. "Just don't any of you make this getting into danger an annual Easter thing," Dad warned, "Two dramas are more than enough, for I'm far too old to be playing this so-called 'hero' thing."

Back home, I reflected on the goodness and provision of God. At 12 years old, I was already in awe of His unfailing love and care. I was amazed at the incredible timing. It was no coincidence that the happenings and saving of our family members came at Easter time. It was a wonderful, timely reminder of the real and true meaning of Easter - JESUS came to Earth for our healing and restoration. He willingly died on the cross to save us. He rose from the dead - our forerunner so we can enjoy everlasting life and love. On that Palm Sunday night 1960, I knew Jesus was, and always would be, my incredible, loving Heavenly Hero. I know my precious father was, and always would be, my earthly hero.

# **Epilogue**

No-one received an ice-cream reward. No fish filled Auntie Gwen's refrigerator. We had no fish for our Good Friday lunch.

The emotional and physical strain of rescuing Des proved very detrimental to Dad's health. He already suffered from a weak heart and war-wound damaged lungs, now he was weary but extremely happy and content that our two families could celebrate a joyful Easter.

He rested at home on that Maundy Thursday. Looking out our kitchen window at the distant coastline, he grinned and said, "My staying at home gives all those fish a chance to grow so much bigger by Easter 1961," he laughed, "perhaps next year we will all go back to Doyle's Farm. I just know a very big fish is waiting for me to claim the prize of first-caught fish - I won't mind one bit buying myself a chocolate double-header!"






### **BOOK REVIEW**

A Man Called Ove, a novel translated from Swedish, was our book for February. Written by Fredrik Backman and published in 2012, it became a New York Times bestseller, a Swedish film and then recently an American version titled A Man Called Otto, starring Tom Hanks, appeared.

The novel tells the story of Ove, a 59 year-old who has been recently made redundant from his job and whose beloved wife, Sonja, died two years before. Now he feels lost and worthless, life seems meaningless and all he wants is to end it all. The trouble is, all his attempts to end his life are constantly interrupted by annoying people! This would seem an unlikely source of comedy but that is the central action of what eventually becomes a 'feel good' story.

Ove is a curmudgeon, a misanthrope, a grump. He has a low opinion of other people. and is obsessed with the rules of the Residents' Association of the housing estate where he lives. Every early morning, he patrols the streets, checking to see that no misdemeanours have occurred overnight. When the irrepressible, cheerful and pregnant Iranian Parvaneh moves in next door with her two small girls and her husband, whom Ove labels The Lanky One, Ove's life



is shaken out of its rut. Suddenly he finds himself teaching her to drive, doing household repairs, driving various people to hospital, actually interacting with people, however ungraciously. He is intolerant, bigoted, judgemental and does not sugarcoat the truth when speaking to people, be it a computer or insurance salesman or a representative from Aged Care, but gradually we discover that he does have (literally) a big heart.

Although comedic, the novel does explore some serious issues. Ove is an outsider, always has been, but in flashback chapters we come to see how his childhood traumas impacted his life. He lost his mother too early and was bullied at school because of his odd behaviour. Parvaneh is also an outsider, an immigrant from Iran, and during the course of the narrative Ove is challenged by other outsiders such as the gay son of a local Muslim restaurant owner and finds himself caught up in other peoples' lives, perhaps for the first time in his! The power of love of one's fellow beings is a lesson he learns along the way. The rules of bureaucracy such as those affecting his one-time friend, Rone, whose wife is being pressured to commit him to an aged care facility, cause him much anger, and at times I am sure readers identified somewhat with his scepticism of the "white shirts" as he calls them.

The style of writing is plain and simple, to the point of banality, and it is possible that this was meant to represent the way Ove thinks, even though the story is told from the third person point of view. He is an honest and energetic man who, thanks largely to the arrival of Parvaneh and her family, becomes more empathetic to those around him (just not the 'white shirts!') Most of the group enjoyed this novel and found it easy reading.







We are also fast approaching the end of the financial year which means we, at Council, are already working on, and thinking

about, what our activities for the next financial year will be.

There are already some big projects in the works for the Valley area, including the Fingal Community Shed and the St Marys Indoor Recreation and Evacuation Centre.

Both of these projects have been through community consultation and now have planning approval so we are now working on the tender documents which we plan to have advertised in April with works planned to start after winter. In order to build the new St Marys Indoor Centre, we will need to demolish the old football Club Rooms which will start in April.

Council staff have also been working on Township Plans for Mathinna, Fingal and Cornwall and these were approved to go out to community for feedback at the March Council Meeting.

The Township Plans are developed with the community and give us at Council an idea of what kind of things the community would like us to focus on as well as their vision for what the community may look like in the future. So we can really make sure these are right and we have heard you correctly, it is important that you have a look at them and provide us with any feedback.

# FISHING REPORT By The Happy Hooker



The fishing over the last month has really been going well, and from salt water to the fresh, anglers have been doing well. Tuna have been caught along the north and northwest coast and although the tuna have been slower along the east coast at the moment, the tuna fishermen are expecting their numbers to improve, along with the sport for them. Fresh water continues to be productive, with some lovely sized trout coming from the South Esk River. It is pleasing to see some young local Fingal boys spending their time fishing along the river, catching some nice trout. The trout season ends on the last weekend of April, so there's not much of the season to go to catch a trout. The trout will be feeding as much as they can now to prepare themselves for the upcoming spawning run.

10 February: St Helens was the destination and a trip down was on despite constant rain on the way down. A thought to turn around was on the cards until a weather report came over the UHF that the weather at St Helens was okay. I launched the boat at Akaroa and headed up the channel, casting soft plastics around broken bottom, looking for a King George Whiting to take the six-inch blood red worms, and a few nice ones played their part along with salmon, trevally and flathead and of course, the tackle shop 'mafia' fish, the old leather jackets that make short work when they chop the plastics to pieces really quickly. With plastics at ten dollars a packet, they do make the tackle shop proprietors very happy and rich. I then decided to try for a bream or kingfish, and set up a hard body lure and moved to the edges of the Stockman Flats to prospect if anything was sitting along the drop off, and that's where my day turned for the worst. First I had a battery go flat (my own fault), so I had no electric motor to stop the wind blowing me out of where I needed to be, and I had no power for the sounder to help find any schools of tailor salmon or kingies that may be sitting along the edges. Then it started to thunder a little, then a lot; "No worries, I don't mind getting wet," I thought. Then it started raining a little, then a lot; a real lot, so a flying full throttle trip back to the shelter of the car was on. I had just pulled the boat up onto the beach and ran to the car, then my boat trailer tyre was flat...it rained torrentially for half an hour with water everywhere, so a call was made that I had to get the boat on the trailer, as it was filling with rain water and it would be difficult to load with the boat winch with so much water in it. A quick tyre pump-up, load the boat, pack the gear away all in heavy rain. I was lucky that I never got pulled up by the police on the way home as a bit of a quick talking as to why I was driving home in my dacks and singlet would have been in order.

<u>3 March</u>: Left Fingal with the intention of fishing the Scamander River, but got to the coast and only a slight breeze was blowing, so the decision was to head to St Helens. We had a good morning fishing, catching some nice trevally and whiting up the channel. We were drifting along with the current when I noticed under the boat what I first thought to be a piece of seaweed on the bottom that resembled a squid. I always have a rod rigged up with a squid jig, so I dropped the jig down to the area to be sure, and was surprised to see the seaweed swim over and grab the jig - a lovely squid in the bucket for tea was a bonus. We ended catching a couple more until they went sooky, and never caught any others.

10 March: I went up to Lake Leake on the Friday afternoon with the intention of a fish that evening and fishing morning wind lanes on Saturday. I went out on the lake around 5.00pm, it was a calm mild afternoon and had the expectation of some trout feeding off the top. Unfortunately, there was not a lot of fly-life, and apart from some small trout chasing very small insect life, no decent fish were seen. I stayed out until dark but returned to the ramp without casting a rod. On Saturday morning the wind was blowing, so had a bit of a tidy-up around the camp and returned home.

# 24th and 25th March: St Helens/Ansons Bay/St Helens

"Go fishing," they say, 'it will be fun! Yeah, right!"

Left on the Friday to head to Ansons Bay for the East Coast Family Fishing Club's Bream competition. Driving into St Helens, I thought a squid for tea would be nice and to use the tentacles for bream and whiting bait as a Plan B at Ansons would be the go if the bream fishing was tough on the lures. I called into St Helens and put the boat in and headed up to the spot I've caught squid previously, and I soon had a couple in the boat. On the way back to the ramp, I had a go at some salmon under the seagull flocks that give away their presence, before having to continue on the way to Ansons Bay.
