Lucky most arrived early, as local pianist Kevin Stanford was already into an early rendition of the classic Casablanca signature song 'As Time Goes By' to warm up the crowd as the rows began to fill up. When he started playing waltzes, there was even an outbreak of impromptu dancing.

Funded with a small grant from Healthy Tasmania and Relationships Australia Tasmania through the State Government, all on entry were handed showbags containing lucky door prizes and a nutritious selection of food and snacks sourced from the town's local cafes and businesses.

The scene was set as neighbour chatted to neighbour while the smell of popcorn filtered through the

air, along with the sound of 'Jaffas' rolling down the aisle. Brendan Berecry took to the stage to thank everyone for their enthusiastic attendance as well as fellow organisers Marietta Hargreaves, her sister

Jacqui and Tanya Greenwood for making it all happen. He announced the film night took its name from St Mary's Pass and Elephant's Pass, in an affectionate nod to the local landscape. The inspiration for the night itself echoed the grand days of cinema screenings in Tasmanian town halls. Meanwhile, long-term locals said the success of the night was a throwback to the halcyon days of Todd's Hall in terms of much-loved St Marys entertainment. All applauded as the final credits rolled, with many keenly enquiring of the many volunteers on hand as the chairs were put away in


no time flat, "What's next?"

NEW POLICE OFFICERS MAKE HISTORY AT FINGAL

Hello everybody.

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself and my team here in the Fingal Valley.

I am Senior Sergeant Darren Pendlebury and I work out of the St Marys police station. I have been a member of Tasmania Police for 38 years, having worked in every geographic police district in the state as well as spending time in the CIB. I have moved from St Helens to take over the Fingal Valley police team after the retirement of Sergeant Jo Riley.

Working with me at St Marys is First Class Constable Michael Harley.

Michael has worked at St Marys for about 18 months and many of you will know him. He moved here from Northern Prosecution Services and has also worked in many areas around the state during his career.

At Fingal we have 2 new members over the past few months. As some of you may be aware, Tasmania Police recently made the decision to double the police presence in Fingal from 1 to 2 members. This included building a second police residence in the vicinity of the station.

Constable Carly Barcham commenced work in the area a few months ago. She was the first female officer to be stationed at Fingal in its history. Carly has brought with her a wealth of experience from both TasPol and her previous position in Victoria Police.

With Constable Cameron Salter moving on to another adventure, we now have the second female officer to be stationed at Fingal. Senior Constable Kelly Donaldson has moved to the valley from George Town. She has worked in the North of the state for much of her policing career and is looking forward to settling into the Fingal Valley.

As a team, we all have the goal to provide professional policing services to all residents of the Fingal Valley and areas we cover. All members of the team are approachable and we aim to catch up with most business owners/managers in the area in coming months. Although we do not have specific office hours at either station, we are contactable on the police non-emergency number 131 444, where you can leave your details and one of us will get back to you.

I will endeavour over coming months to continue contributions to the Valley and East Coast Voice, advising you all of things such as road safety and security, and other items both of educational value and interest.

I leave you all with this friendly reminder that appeared on the Tasmania Police Facebook site last week during National Road Safety Week:

Today's National Road Safety Week theme is 'Slow down and give them space'.

We're reminding Tasmanians it's the law to slow down when approaching emergency or roadside assist vehicles with red, blue, magenta or yellow lights flashing or sirens sounding.

This road rule has been in place for emergency service vehicles, including Tasmania Police, Tasmania Fire Service, Tasmania SES and Ambulance Tasmania since 2019. Last year it was extended to include roadside assistance vehicles, like RACT and tow trucks.

The rule applies differently depending on the speed zones:

On roads with a speed limit up to and including 80km/h, you must always slow down to 40km/h.

On roads with a speed limit over 80km/h, you must slow down to 40km/h if it is safe to do so.

It's an offence to break this road rule, and police are enforcing it because we need to keep our officers, other emergency service personnel, and roadside assist workers as safe as possible when they're carrying out their duties.

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EASTERN VALLEY CHALLENGE CUP DECIDED BY ONE STROKE

The inaugural Champions of the Fabulous Fingal Valley have been found: Nicholas Street of St Helens Golf Club (best Gross Score) and Stan Ellerm of Malahide Golf Club (best Nett Score) took home the *Cornwall Coal* trophies after the second round of play at Malahide Golf Club on Saturday. The weather was perfect for both days after a chilly start at St Marys and a foggy start at Malahide gave way to almost cloudless, still autumn weather.

Over 50 players competed over the two rounds at St Marys (May 6) and Malahide (May 13) in the tournament sponsored by

local bushwalking guided tour company, *Tasmanian Hikes*. Male and female players came from St Marys, Malahide, St Helens, Moorina, Launceston and the Scamander golf clubs. The tournament was jointly organised by the Malahide and St Marys clubs with strong support from local businesses and politicians. Prizes included 4-day guided bush-walks, golf shop vouchers, fine Tasmanian wine, golf balls, caps, drink bottles, chocolates and T shirts. The total prize pool was over \$9000.

The competition for best gross score was very close, with Street winning by 1 stroke from former St Marys resident Andrew Wright. The best Nett tussle was even closer with *Tasmanian Hikes* CEO and Malahide member Stan Ellerm winning on a count back from Malahide Treasurer David Duthie.

The competition incorporated a stableford contest between the Malahide and St Marys clubs for the coveted Eastern Valley Challenge Cup, donated by local businessman John Vincent. The inaugural winner was the Malahide Club.

Despite the incentive of a four-day guided bushwalking holiday with Tasmanian Hikes, no player was able to score a hole in one on the 7th hole at St Marys or the 8th at Malahide.

Planning is already underway for next year, when St Marys will try to wrest the Eastern Valley Challenge Cup from Malahide's hands.

DEFEND YOUR DATA - NEW CYBER-SECURITY AWARENESS CAMPAIGN LAUNCHES

With cyber-crime on the rise, last week the Tasmanian Government launched the Defend your data awareness campaign.

The campaign is aimed at encouraging all Tasmanians to defend their data as cyber threats from criminals become more frequent and more sophisticated. Whether at home or in our workplaces, our reliance on technology is increasing, making us all potential targets for cyber-crime. Recent high profile cyberattacks have shown that even being a client (or former client) of an organisation can put us at risk.

Key to the campaign is raising awareness of how to detect a scam, what you can do to protect yourself online and knowledge of what to do if you are the victim of a scam.

A new website, defendyourdata.tas.gov.au has been established to provide information on how to defend your data. The site contains three videos to explain how you can screen for scams, shield yourself and be ready to react if you need to. Anyone can be vulnerable to a scam, so it is timely that everyone refreshes their knowledge of best practice data protection both at home and at work.

Screen for scams

Be wary of unexpected contact, even from someone you know.

Be cautious of communication that demands you to act quickly or provide personal information.

If you feel unsure about a message, don't send a reply, open attachments, or click on any links.

Shield yourself

- Regularly update the apps and software on your devices.
- Never use the same password more than once. Make them unpredictable, unique, and long.
- Set-up two-factor or multi-factor authentication whenever possible.
- Immediately close any website your browser identifies as unsafe.

Be ready to react

- Block all further contact from the scammer.
- Contact your bank if money is involved and inform them of what happened.
- Report the scam.
- Seek support from family and friends to get yourself back on track.

Look out for the campaign on commercial television, radio, press and on social media. Visit defendyourdata.tas.gov.au to discover more on how to defend your data.

For some reason, we seem to bear the brunt of service cutbacks, slow repair times, slow upgrade times and even missing out altogether. This despite we pay the same taxes and fees as everyone else to governments and big business.

In recent times in our Valley, we've lost banks, not got banks, seen telecommunication crowds treat us with distain quite often and numerous other companies have cleared out or reduced input here. By contrast, nothing new other than an occasional courageous person speculating a new business happens anymore. We've even been largely forgotten when it comes to natural tourist attractions accessibility that really need a few bob spent on them to allow our visitors easy access to enjoy them.

Nup ... just forgotten more often than need be.

Extremely recently though, we have some very serious worries that confront us. The first one is a very enthusiastic and urgent need by our politicians of all persuasions to help alleviate the situation Dr Latt is in. He has given so much to this community, has passionate and loyal patients that respect and trust him, and he has made a major contribution to this community. I plead to all you MHA's, MHR's, Senators, MLC's and anyone else with sway in our health sector, to hunt until a new practitioner can be found to take the load off Dr Latt's shoulders.....please....

On a similar vein, and no less important, is the potentially threatening new arrangements to small pharmacies across the country. I read with great concern that due to changes set to commence in September, there is great fear that vitally important local pharmacies like our own St Marys Pharmacy will likely find it much more difficult to continue to provide amazing service like they do. I understand the changes could even bring some to close their doors. This would be catastrophic, just as much as losing our hospital and doctor! I am going to ask our Federal Member MHR to try and get some answers as to why these changes have to happen in such a way that great contributors like our much respected Chemist need to feel under so much pressure. I urge as many as possible of fellow locals to do the same.

We might be pariahs, we might feel unloved way too often, but we're stubborn determined buggers, and we will not continue to lose stuff without a bloody big fight, will we, crew?

COMMUNITY SURVEY SEEKS COMMUNITY INPUT AND IDEAS FOR HEALTHY OCEANS

Environment Tasmania has launched a Community Survey asking Tasmanians about how they connect to and enjoy the ocean.



Questions will include what is their favourite marine animal and how often do they visit the coast or marine environment. Others will dive into the issues that they see, and what possible solutions we might seek as a community. The survey will run until September 2023. Environment Tasmania will use the results to inform their marine campaign work for healthy oceans in Tasmania.

"We know that Tasmanians are deeply connected with the ocean and that there is a unique coastal

lifestyle here that we're very lucky to have. Fishing, swimming, snorkelling, diving, surfing and boating are a huge part of the

Tasmanian way of life. We want to find out how important clean and healthy oceans are to Tasmanians, and what are the issues that they are seeing day to day," said Rebecca Howarth, Marine Campaigner for Environment Tasmania.

"There has been a worrying decline in Tassie's marine environment in recent year, and we know that Tasmanians that are out on the water every day are noticing it too. We really value the insights from the wider community, so have decided to launch a survey in order to record these insights. When it comes to ocean health, there is innate wisdom in the Tasmanian community, and we are ready to listen and work collaboratively."

"We want to encourage everyone to do our quick 5-minute community survey for healthy oceans. You can find it on the Environment Tasmania website at www.et.org.au" Rebecca concluded.




MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW

During April, our Book Group read 'Kindred: A Cradle Mountain Love Story' written by journalist Kate Legge and published in 2019. This book is an homage to Gustav and Kate Weindorfer, the founders of the Waldheim Chalet at Cradle Mountain. Two remarkable people, they are well-known to many as visionaries who inspired the declaration of the Cradle Mountain - Lake St Clair National Park in 1922 and were instrumental in bringing the first tourists to the area to share their love of the natural world.

Gustav was an Austrian immigrant whose knowledge and love of the botany of the Australian bush led to his meeting with Kate Cowle. She was delivering a talk at a meeting of the Victorian Field Naturalists Club of which he was an enthusiastic member. Kate, a Tasmanian from a farm in Kindred on Tasmania's North West Coast, was living at the time with her two sisters in Melbourne and enjoying excursions into the high country of Victoria, where a fledgling tourism was developing. They shared a love of bushwalking and botany and, despite the age difference (Gustav was eleven years younger than Kate), they married at Kindred in 1906, fighting a bushfire in the area on the morning of their wedding! Kate's brother sold them some land which they set about farming, making frequent excursions into the mountains to explore and botanise; indeed they spent their honeymoon camping on Mt Roland! They were able to purchase some land near Cradle Mountain and Gustav soon began building his dream, Waldheim (Forest Home), where they would invite



fellow walkers and botanists to share their love of the wilderness. In 1913 they opened the doors to the first visitors.

Now Kate's health faltered and she was often alone on the farm, longing to be with Gustav in the mountains but not well enough to live the hard life he seemed to thrive on. She died in 1916, after only ten years of marriage, leaving him to continue their plans alone. His physical stamina was amazing; he would lead parties on energetic climbs, returning to Waldheim to prepare meals for twenty five for the evening! With great energy, he worked on politicians, local councils and residents of the area to build an access road to Waldheim and he eventually succeeded. Gustav died in 1932 at the age of 58, trying to kick start his Indian Scout motorbike. His grave can still be visited near Waldheim.

Kate Legge was inspired to write this account of their lives after bushwalking in the National Park, and she has attempted to honour the legacy left by these two people. The book contains many old black and white photos of the time that help to illustrate the beauty of a landscape that so attracted Gustav and Kate. There Kate is, in her long dresses and wide hats, scaling mountains that would daunt many today. Gustav would be amazed to see the avalanche of visitors who come to see what he wanted to open up for them. In 2017, 280,00 of them came. Like so many National Parks now, they are in danger of being loved to death! It gave us pause for thought.

We found this a fascinating and detailed account of an amazing pair. At times, the author uses rather elevated and grand statements, echoing the florid Edwardian writing of the time. Perhaps this was deliberate, but it grated on the modern ear. She tries to imagine herself into the personal lives of her subjects, and there are lots of "She must have..." statements. Alas we do not know what they thought, said or felt, but we do know that they created a legacy that lives on, and it is good to have another version of the story of the Weindorfers that tells us a little more about Kate and her intrepid life.

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SUNCOAST SPINNERS AND WEAVERS



Our April meeting saw us almost back to our usual numbers with a visitor, Jen Eddington and her grandson, Hunter. Jen is a rare sheep breeder who comes from Selbourne, where she breeds long-wool sheep. She gave us a very interesting talk on her sheep breeds, with fleeces there for us to look at and feel the quality of these long staple wools.

While nowadays in Tasmania the focus is on breeding and shearing merino sheep for fine wool garments worn close to the skin, Jen has maintained the English Leicester breed of sheep. The wool from this breed is long and very curly, durable and has a fine lustre and dyes well to make beautiful outer garments. She showed us examples of her English Leicester Lambswool as well. This wool from the same breed is finer and softer and, like merino, can be made into garments designed to be worn next to the skin.

She has very small numbers of both Lincoln sheep and Coloured Finn. The Lincoln sheep are a large sheep, also an English breed which produce very long wool suitable for spinning, weaving and felting. It also dyes very well and is lustrous. The coloured Finn sheep produce and rear the most lambs. They have up to 5-6 lambs per birth and also milk well. They come in many different colours of fleece and are originally Northern European.

By far the coarsest and longest staple of fleece came from a unique Tasmanian breed, the Elliottdales. These sheep were bred and developed at a government research station, specifically to produce carpet wool for the long-closed carpet factory at Devonport. These sheep have fast growing fleece with very long tufts and need to be shorn twice a year. There are no longer any carpet factories in Australia but Jen at Selbourne is preserving the breed along with people in Sassafras, Victoria. The Elliottdale wool is really strong and hardwearing, and the fleece grows about 30cm (1 foot) a year. You can spin it to knit, or weave it into hard-wearing mats, or felt it.

After the talk, Jen was very happy to answer questions and give advice on preparing and using the fleeces. It was a very informative talk, and we appreciated Jen spending time with us and showing us everything she'd brought from her rare wool breeds. We then continued with our usual meeting catching up on the news, including that one member had had emergency surgery, another an allergic reaction, both enthralling stories, but sadly, no promised singing! Our hands were busy with our craft projects and we finished the day with a productive trip to the Op Shop across the road.

Our next meeting will be held at Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House on Tuesday, 13th June from 10am to 2pm. Bring along your craft project and lunch to join us, as everyone is welcome. Tea, coffee and morning tea are provided and we contribute a gold coin each towards the hire of the room.



On Saturday 18th March, a group of walkers visited the site of the Frome Dam near Moorina. An interesting historical headstone was encountered near the dam wall, dedicated to one Thomas Horsburgh. On further enquiry, Alex found out the history of this unfortunate young man.

FATAL ACCIDENT NEAR KRUSHKA'S BRIDGE

"On Wednesday, the 10th instant, a young man named Thomas Horsburgh, was at work excavating on the Frome River Tin Mine, Moorina, when the bank gave way, and he was covered with a heavy fall of earth. Two men working with him had a very narrow escape from also being buried with him. These gave the alarm to the miners all round, who to the number of about sixty rushed at once to the rescue, speedily cleared the earth, and got the body of the young man out. He was quite dead, his neck having been dislocated by the weight of the fall of earth upon his head. The deceased was a respectable young man, universally liked, and his untimely end is deeply deplored."

The Cornwall Chronicle, Launceston, Friday 18 January 1878

Thomas Horsburgh was born in Campbell Town in 1853. He was the second of the three children of William Horsburgh and Ann nee Chiddy.

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5 MINUTES WITH THE MAYOR



Council has a lot going on in the Fingal Valley at the moment, so I thought I would give you all a bit of an update on some of our projects.

As you may know, Council was successful in securing some funding for the Valley through the Federal Government's Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Fund. This funding is for four projects; a Community Shed in Fingal, a Multi-purpose building in St Marys, a small cell communications tower in Mangana and a Youth Park in Fingal.

Construction of the Fingal Community Shed will start in late 2023 and will feature three bays of storage area as well as an area dedicated for woodworking and a community meeting space. Community Consultation and Planning Approval have been completed and we are currently awaiting completion of the engineering assessment so we can go to tender. We expect to complete the building in mid-2024.

Community Consultation and Planning Approval have also been completed for the Multi-purpose shed in St Marys, which will be built at the St Marys Sports Complex on the site where the current football club rooms are. The club rooms will be demolished as part of the new build, and new rooms are included in the new facility. The tender documentation is currently underway for the build. Demolition of the existing clubrooms will be commenced in June 2023 and we will start the new build in late 2023 once we have appointed a building contractor.

The small cell communications tower is well on track for completion, with the formal notification advertised in the Examiner last Saturday. A site has been chosen and Council officers met Mangana residents on site last month to answer any questions and concerns. The tower will provide the Mangana community with consistent telecommunication services, which will ensure they are not cut-off and isolated in an emergency.

The Fingal Youth Park project has been paused as Council Officers try to find an appropriate location, as well as equipment that is in line with what the Fingal community wants. Because of this, we will be coming back out to community to consult on the project.

Also a hot topic in Fingal at the moment is CentaCare Evolve Housing's proposed Housing project. Council would encourage Fingal residents to make sure they have all of the facts about this project, by dropping into the Fingal Neighbourhood House and picking up an information flyer. You can also find some information about the proposed project on Council's website under the News section.





FISHING REPORT By The Happy Hooker



Hi all, well here we are at the start of the winter months and the time for the freshwater fishers to take a break and wash the gear up and relax until the trout season returns in August. There were some reports of nice sized trevally, salmon and whiting being taken in Georges Bay. Traditionally, the football season is the time when garfish arrive in the Bay.

Garfish are relatively easy to catch once you find them, the trick is to have a nice berley trail in the water. It's as simple as a

berley bucket filled with a fish-based oily tin of cat food, some stale bread and a dash of tuna oil, mix it up with a knife and tie it over the side of the boat and wait for the garfish and other species turn up. I normally put a couple of surf sinkers in the bucket to get it to sink down to help the berley to not be as prevalent on top of the water, otherwise you will have a squarking flock of sea gulls and molly hawks driving you nuts while thanking you for their easy lunch. The set up I use for garfish is to use a long shank hook about a meter below a float and use a piece of chicken skin, and drift it down the berley trail, wind in and then do it all again.



Garfish are also known as the sea needle.

If the garfish are playing hard ball, sometimes a small piece of split shot clamped to the line above the hook to get the bait down a bit helps with the catch rate.

Winter months are a good time to do that bit of maintenance to the boat and fishing gear, a good clean up and store in a safe place from the rodents, ready to attack when the weather starts to improve. Life jackets are another piece of equipment to do some checks on and give a good clean.

The Tasmanian inland Fisheries are restocking many lakes and waterways around the state from trout captured in their spawning runs. Lake Leake received 1750 Rainbow trout at an average weight of 45 grams, these fish will grow quickly and should give good sport in the upcoming season. Hopefully we may receive some local rain to allow the trout to begin their spawning run up the local creeks to do their thing.



Rainbow trout young have recently been released into the Great Lakes system by Inland Fisheries.

No fishing reports to report this month as the brownie points with the wife have been used up during the trout season. So I've been being a good hubby and started to build the brownie point bank balance back up so that comes a suitable day or a mate says, "What are you doing this weekend?" or the weather is right, then, "I'm gone!"
