PERMANENT GENERAL PRACTICE TO BE ESTABLISHED IN ST MARYS

The Rockliff Liberal Government is pleased to announce Ochre Health will establish a permanent general practice in St Marys, securing the continuity of health services for the community. Minister for Health, Guy Barnett, said Ochre Health will begin operating a private general practice in St Marys later this month. "This is an excellent outcome for the St Marys community," "While primary healthcare is the responsibility of the Federal Government, the Rockliff Liberal Minister Barnett said. Government has again stepped in to support Tasmanians, ensuring the St Marys community has access to the healthcare services it needs."

This announcement is in addition to an agreement already reached with Ochre Health for them to provide medical services to the state-run St Marys Community Health Centre, an arrangement that commenced earlier this month. "Our Government has worked closely with Ochre Health and the community throughout this process," Minister Barnett said. "Ochre Health's commitment to opening a private general practice in St Marys provides certainty for the community and ensures continuity in the health services provided for the area." Ochre Health Co-Founder and Chairman, Dr Ross Lamplugh, said Ochre Health was pleased to be able to set up a permanent general practice in St Marys, providing continuity of care for the community. "Ochre Health is looking forward to establishing a practice in St Marys to provide this vital service to the local community," he said.

"We recognise the importance of access to primary care services, particularly in rural and regional areas, and we are pleased that we can play such an important role in supporting the health and wellbeing of the people of St Marys and surrounding areas. We will work with Dr Latt to ensure a smooth transition of services to the community."

"I would also like to thank Minister Barnett for his support throughout this process," concluded Dr Lamplugh.

"I would like to thank Dr Cyril Latt for his service to the St Marys community as a general practitioner for the past 16 years," added Minister Barnett.

The Rockliff Liberal Government is doing what matters for Tasmanians.



Perfectly timed to make the most of Mental Health Week, the annual Break O'Day Festival of Wellbeing was held in St Helens at the Bendigo Bank Community Stadium on Saturday 14 October.

This year's event featured over 50 contributors and saw more than 350 people attending throughout the day. There was a bit of everything from local groups celebrating why they love living in Break O'Day to state and national health and mental health services.

The Festival is a free event that brings our community together to inspire positivity, community connection and help everyone find out more about how they can care for their own wellbeing. Event Coordinator Leah Page said she was honoured to bring

so many amazing wellbeing champions together to showcase to community all the different ways we can create and improve our wellbeing. "So many groups, organisations and people generously donate their time and work hard to create fun ways to connect with people about wellbeing. As a result, the Festival showcased so many ways you can foster positive wellbeing in your life," Ms Page said.

This year's event included activities indoors and outside, which was a wonderful way to involve some of our local sporting clubs, such as netball, croquet and little athletics. This also meant there was plenty of room for a fitness workshop, painting activities, and for our emergency services to bring along their trucks, something always popular with the kids. Some highlights from the day were our local 'With One Voice' Choir, helping people find their voice and sharing songs that brought smiles and happy vibes throughout the day. There was also group yoga sessions, breath and movement workshops, art workshops, and many local groups with things for people to try, see and do. A wellness corner shared information and experiences about massage, naturopathy, body movement and more. Visitors to the Festival could also discover the social support groups and health and mental health services available and how to find support when they need it.

A feature of the Festival was the Tree of Gratitude, pictured below right. People were invited to take a blank leaf and write something they are grateful on it and hang the leaf on the tree.

The Say by the "Cage Rattler"



A couple of months ago, one of our truly significant sites was shortlisted potentially for joint naming with both the contemporary and ancient First Peoples names. It sounds like a real possibility. That site is St Patricks Head. It's proposed name in palawa is 'lumera genena wuggelena'. It means 'great molar tooth'.

Like several well-known other significant sites like lutruwita (Tasmania) and Mt Wellington - kunanyi, kanamaluka which is Tamar River, takayna (Tarkine), yingina which is Great Lake, and quite a few others, there are many places being looked at to have two names that undoubtedly require permissions and scrutiny from our indigenous communities and elders. I think this is why St Patricks Head is being a very likely candidate at some time in the future. It is a great way to recognize over 40,000 years of the oldest continuous culture and heritage in the world, as experts now realize.

From what I have gleaned, as time passes, various of our Tasmanian aboriginal nations clan elders will be consulted as this progresses as a priority. I decided to research this, although I have no real indigenous connection other that my uncle marrying my aunt in the 1940's, who was a direct descendant from Cape Barren Island. Such prominent nations and clans were Oyster Bay, Big Rivers and others stretching large areas. St Patrick's Head as we know it was significant as a meeting place and even trading point, as I understand.

How did I get some of this information after seeing a newspaper snippet a couple of months back? Mainly off the computer, of course, but a couple of Saturdays ago I put it up as a topic on a local notice board I was a contributor to. This local site is awesome, and within a very short time that morning I had about 14 totally supportive comments, some of which added information that I didn't know. It was exciting and uplifting to see, and very encouraging from some very obviously happy fellow community members to enter the conversation. Then I had duties at the Sports Centre and couldn't do any more with it right then.

At the end of the day, I arrived home, put on tea, fed the muttleys and decided to see what else, if anything, had been added. To my dismay, I couldn't find it. Initially, I thought it was something dumb I did when I slightly edited a grammar error, but after a while, I remembered it was there after that. Eventually, I posted a query if anybody knew. Checked after and found an Admin reply saying it was considered political. I couldn't believe it! How can that be political? It is a social and cultural topic. At no point at all did I mention politics, imply politics or even think politics with this subject matter....

Far from being political, it was (I thought) a very unifying and not divisive at all topic when discussing adding lumera genera wuggelena into our community names. I would also strongly suggest that no matter which political persuasion you were, it'd be a bi-partisan opinion any way you look at it, and would help explain a culture existing for millennia....

So annoyed by this, I looked for a message method to the Admin persons and sent a request to each of them, asking primarily for clarification on how they deemed it overtly political. I will show any of you quite happily what I sent. They are saved, unlike my site posts that were deleted by them. At time of writing this, no reply has been received....

It matters not anymore. I am done with this site from now on, (rest assured, moderators). It is still a genuinely great tool for the community and one I used extensively and appreciated until this happened. I also appreciated and acknowledged that something I got tangled up in during the referendum that did get political was my fault. I apologized unreservedly for that, as many would know. That I understand; this I absolutely didn't for reasons already mentioned. Thank you to St Marys Notice Board for servicing the community, but the topic range is obviously too limiting, it seems, for me.

Luckily for me, and a great privilege to be a contributor to our excellent Valley Voice that allows me to put taboo subject matter for some venues I think is important. This is, to anyone who reads it, greatly appreciated....

One final comment, if I may. To the moderators on St Marys Notice Board... please at least do this for me. If a contributor requests a good explanation on why you rule against them - do it! You have deeply offended me by not doing that to any degree of satisfaction, which is not good. In one of the messages yet to be responded to, I did tell you I would be writing this article and mentioning this. How about writing a few words for the Valley Voice and explaining your decision... that would give me more respect for what you did, perhaps....

Lastly, when it comes around for our turn to be spoken to about the joint naming rites, please all try and take in this great opportunity that we may see at some point..... I think it would be incredible.



5 MINUTES WITH THE MAYOR



The recent fire emergencies in our area is a grave reminder of what we can expect as we move into summer. It would be helpful to share with you what Local Government and Break O'Day Council do to prepare for fire season, and what you can do to reduce risk to your property.

In times of emergency, particularly in regional areas, community turns to their local Council for help and support. Largely, the role we play in an emergency is ensuring our community have the most up-to-date and relevant information.

We encourage the community to listen to ABC for any fire emergency updates and to check TasFireAlerts and Council's social media pages for any local information. This information will inform you of what is happening and how to access any services, support and information you may need.

Making sure that community feels supported in these times is also a priority, especially our emergency service workers. Most of the people called up in an emergency are volunteers, so it is important we support them in their commitment to support our community. So be kind in stressful events and remember working together helps us recover from an event and can boost our resilience.

To reduce your risk of a fire emergency, you can help by preparing your property for fire season. Complete a five-minute bushfire plan and watch the "prepare your property" videos - available on the TFS Bushfire Ready Neighbourhoods Website. Also, get to know your neighbours, work together by sharing advice, knowledge and experiences, and look out for each other during bushfire season and at other times.

It is important that property owners take responsibility for their own properties and are aware of bushfire risks. Councils have the authority to issue Abatement Notices when a property inspection shows there is an immediate risk to life or property on adjoining land within their council area. If no action is taken by the property owner when issued an Abatement Notice, Council can take action at the owner's expense. If you are concerned about a specific property, have a chat to your neighbour or contact your local council.

Let's all work together so our community is ready for the bushfire season.



RICE BUBBLES MONSTERS

1 tablespoon icing sugar

1 teaspoon water

1/3 cup white chocolate melts (medium)

1/4 cup choc chips

Mix the icing sugar and a little water in a snap lock bag. Add more sugar or water until you have a small amount of thick-ish icing. Seal the bag and cut off the tip of a corner of the bag, ready to use as a piping bag. Use the icing to 'glue' a small choc chip to the centre of the large white chocolate melts to make eyes.

1/4 cup butter

4 cup marshmallows



5 cup Rice Bubbles

1/4 cup sprinkles

2 tsp green food colouring (liquid) 1/4 cup raspberry licorice pieces

Melt the butter in a large saucepan over a low heat. Add the marshmallows and stir until they are melted and well mixed. Cook the mixture for a further minute or two, stirring constantly, then remove from the heat. Add 6-12 drops of food colouring (depending on how green you want your monsters to be) and stir until the entire mixture turns bright green! Add the rice bubbles and mix well until everything is combined.

While the mixture cools off a little, set out some cupcake liners and all your decorations ready to go.

Using two spoons, shape spoonfuls of the rice bubble mixture into rough balls and pop them into the cupcake liners. (You can use your hands if you like but they will get very sticky very quickly!) Decorate your monsters with sprinkles, eyes and a mouth. Pop your monster rice bubble treats into the fridge for a little while until they set, then enjoy a monstrous treat!

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








MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW Written by Pam Bretz

Our book for September was a memoir, *Educated*, by a young American, Tara Westover, and it tells her story of growing up in a

fundamentalist Mormon family in backblocks Idaho. The youngest of seven children, she recounts her journey of struggle to break free of the strong family ties and how she goes on to achieve a university education with a PhD from Cambridge. This was no mainstream Mormon family. Her father saw himself as a prophet and ruled his family with an iron rod, regularly delivering rambling sermons and demanding obedience, and yet constantly putting his children's lives at risk by sheer pigheadedness. The children were mostly home-educated, and although Tara does not recall any formal lessons, she learned to read and write. Their literature was the Bible and long and detailed religious texts written by the early founders of the Mormon faith, apparently giving her an early sophistication of language. Gene, the name she gives her father, owns a junkyard and Tara and some of her brothers work separating out old pieces of machinery for recycling; heavy and dangerous work which often results in horrific accidents and lifealtering injuries.



Tara's mother, Faye, is a self taught midwife, kept busy by the local community, and has a growing business making herbal remedies which she uses to treat the horrific injuries sustained by her family in car accidents and in the junkyard and selling to followers whom she drags in to work for her alongside family members. She abases herself to her husband's rules and does not defend Tara against the violent and manipulative abuse of one of her brothers, Shawn, even though, like her husband, she has been educated and lived a mainstream Mormon life before marriage. Gene will have nothing to do with government institutions like schools and doctors and seemingly miraculously they all survive! Tara must battle to be allowed to attend BYU, a Mormon College in Utah, but by sheer determination and some help from one of her brothers she manages to pass the entrance exam and at seventeen leaves home, physically but not emotionally.

Thanks to Tara's obvious intelligence and focus and to the kindness and support of some of her teachers, she overcomes the years of restricted access to knowledge and is awarded a Gates Scholarship to Cambridge, where again she is mentored to achieve her doctorate, moving on eventually to Harvard. All this success comes while battling her father's attempts to pull her back into the family's claustrophobic clutches as he rants against the "Illuminati", those involved in higher education, and non-believers whom he labels "gentiles". She is not socially prepared for life outside the family and suffers both from extreme poverty and emotional insecurity, but in the process of learning, she becomes educated in the accepted sense as well as coming to some self-understanding.

This is a harrowing account of an admirable journey to self knowledge. A memoir is, by its nature, a subjective version of one person's memories and there is some controversy among the family around how accurate all her memories are. In fact, Tara was forced to eventually split from her family in order to preserve her own mental health and even perhaps her life, given Shawn's power over her. Her father is a fanatical tyrant, her mother a doormat yet a successful business woman, her brother Shawn apparently a psychopath and the other siblings are to some extent still under the thrall of their father, so it is difficult to separate out what could be exaggeration or what is simply the different experience of being the youngest in a very unusual family. In Tara's words, " My family was a tangle of love and radicalism and what I now suspect was mental illness."

We found this memoir disturbing, at times incredible and repetitious, but Tara Westover's journey of enlightenment and freedom is inspiring.



B.O.N.E. - Bird Observers of the North East

Last month's Birding outing was cancelled due to rain, but I can report on something very important that is happening at the Scamander River mouth. About one hundred Fairy Terns have decided to nest on the sandspit on the northern side of the mouth. Parks and Wildlife have erected a fence and signs to remind all users of the beach to avoid this area. It is now a NO DOG zone. The reason for this action is that Fairy Terns are an endangered species (90% decline in the last 40 years) listed in three states and by the Commonwealth. This site is now very significant, as the terns have apparently chosen not to nest at some of their other sometimes-visited sites like the mouth of the Prosser at Orford or at Blanche's Beach and Horseshoe Sands, both on Georges Bay at St Helens, thus it is critical that they succeed here at Scamander.

You may be familiar with the Crested Tern which often appear in large flocks in the Scamander Estuary. The Fairy Tern is

about half their size, has an excited twittering call, seems to be constantly fluttering noisily around the nesting area and lays 1-2 eggs in a small scrape on the sand, hence the nests are vulnerable to being walked on by beach users. Any encroachment in their area by people or dogs will disturb these delicate creatures, so to give them the best chance of breeding success, please give this area a wide berth. There's plenty more beach for you to enjoy.

Next month's outing will be on Wednesday 1st November at Blanche Point/Training Wall, where we will see bush and shore birds. It's easy walking on the training wall gravel track and some wet sand walking if appropriate.

Hi all,

Well, its that time of year that the fly-fisher folk start to get excited, as towards the end of October and November is mayfly time. These mayfly insects start to hatch as they have since the insect world has evolved, and the trout will be waiting.

I have had a couple of reconnaissance missions up the river on a couple of our lovely days the past week, but haven't noticed any hatchings as yet, but they will happen; you just need to be patient. Mayfly time is, for me, the pristine time of year, and I even take my holidays, cash in the brownie point balance with the wife and endeavour to keep my calendar free to consign the mayfly hatches, because you can bet that the perfect day of an overcast, calm, muggy day will be a day that you've committed to do something else. The trout fishing from the South Esk River continues to be some of, if not THE best fishing period I've ever witnessed. Normally, the water this time of year is dirty, but due to the lack of rainfall, the river is clear for the trout to easily see and find your offerings.

The salt water has been also rewarding anglers with some lovely sized garfish, salmon and trevally taken from Georges Bay and some nice-sized bream from Scamander River.

Fishing reports

Thursday 21st September, Scamander River. There were a few nice schools of fish on the snags up-river and I caught a few on plastic, mostly sand worms.

Thursday 28th September, South Esk River. Took the dogs for a walk along the river and picked up a couple of nice trout on T Tails.

Saturday 30th September, Scamander. A quick trip to fill in the morning and to try out a couple of new fly designs on the bream. Caught one nice bream rolling around feeding on a submerged log and simply dropped the fly down beside him and let it sink with a little flick, and he swam over, as casual as can be. He engulfed the fly; a couple of other small bream to hand, but further assessment of the new fly design to be decided on.

Thursday 12th October - Show Day, Scamander. Had a day on the river with a mate and caught some nice fish, we went way up river and the fish were schooled up nicely on anything in the water or shading the water. Caught fish on a variety of different plastics.

Friday 13th October, Scamander. Yep, we have been giving the river a flogging, but you don't get fishing so good this often, so got to make the most of it while we can!

Thursday 19th October, Lake Lucy, South Esk River. Decided to have a look at Lake Lucy at evening time after a lovely warm day and no dreaded eastly sea breeze for a change. The water was calm with a few caddis moths hatching and on dark, a nice few trout moving. Lake Lucy is not really a lake, but a hole in a drainage system of an upper South Esk tributary. Lake Lucy is a water that in the past was a water renown for big fish. It is deep and reeded around the edges that are fly-killers, but the rewards are there when conditions suit, and the fly fishing can be memorable.

I have never, nor know of anyone catching a trout out of there on a lure or worm for that matter. Plenty of big eels are taken on worms, but the trout are elusive due to the weedy bottom. Lake Lucy is a water that when frog fishing was legal, many locals would fish a live frog on dark, and the big boys would come out to play, with legendry reports of double-digit pound fish taken. I was fishing one evening after dark with a mate who hooked into this fish on a leech fly, and this thing went berserk and he had trouble controlling it. We thought we had the trout of a lifetime, but were sadly disappointed when dirty old tench revealed itself in the torch light.

Saturday 21st October, Scamander. The East Coast Family Fishing Club held its competition and was supported well despite the forecast of rain, and some lovely bream weighed in. A new product that we have been experimenting with, called a 'Crushcity Creeper' by Rapala in 2.5 inch in Bloodworm colour, are life-like grubs look the real deal, and by fishing them as light as possible on a unweighted jig head flicked in close to structure and letting sink with no movement then lift and drop them if they make the bottom, the bream will pick them up on the drop or smash them along the bottom, but they do work and I think will be the next best thing in plastic fishing; they have won me and can be purchased from BCF.
