PREMIER'S YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL RECRUITMENT IS NOW OPEN

Applications are now open for young people living in Tasmania to join the Premier's Youth Advisory Council. The Premier's Youth Advisory Council provides an excellent opportunity for young people to advise the Premier and the Tasmanian Government on issues that are important to them. The Council is made up of young people from diverse backgrounds, ages and communities. The Council is looking for 13 new members, with expressions of interest open until 11.59pm on 14 January 2024. You can apply if you are a young person living in Tasmania, aged between 12-24. Successful applicants will be members of the council for 2 years.

Premier Jeremy Rockliff called on young people living in Tasmania who are interested in what the Government is doing to apply to join the Premier's Youth Advisory Council. Applications are submitted on -line, and involves answering a few questions about yourself, and uploading a video or letter about what you think is the most important topic for young Tasmanians over the next two years

ST MARYS PACING CUP MEET RETURNS

New Years Day is a special day for Harness Racing enthusiasts in Tasmania, as Monday 1st January sees large crowds head to the St Marys racecourse for the St Marys Pacing Club's once-a year-meeting.

2024 will see the return to the 1340-meter grass track after the meeting was cancelled because of water damage to the track last year.

The main event on the program, the \$14,000 Eric Bean Memorial Cup is named in honour of Eric Bean, who was a committee member for 55 years from 1958 to 2012. He served as Secretary of the Club for 52 of those years.

Bean was an owner/trainer from 1954 to 2006, and his best pacer was Chamfers Return who scored 12 Tassie wins. Bean was awarded the Edger Tatlow Medal in 2008, and in 2014 was inducted to the Tasmanian Harness Hall of Fame.

The St Marys Racing Club first programmed a trotting race back in 1889, won by a trotter called Fairy. In 1918 the Trotting Club took over the facilities from the Race Club, and the first St Marys Cup was run in 1926, won by Ford. One notable winner over those 97 years is multiple winner Speedy Ben (Express Byrd) who won the cup in 1973 and 1974. Speedy Ben competed in two Inter-Dominion's 1973 and 1974, both won by Hondo Grattan. Speedy Ben won the Consolation Final both years.

Another notable winner of the St Marys Cup was Gorse Bush (Ticket To Heaven) in 2006. Gorse Bush is the dam of one of

Tasmania's and Australia's best pacers, Beautide. In 2015, Gorse Bush was crowned Australian Broodmare of the Year.

In 2024 the club is excited to be back racing after the last few years with weather and COVID disruptions. Long-time Secretary Craig Woods said, "We are looking forward to New Years Day. The club try to make it a family fun day with raffles, Fashions On the Field, a free raffle for the kids and much more."

"This year we have a lucky race-book prize, a two nights' accommodation including breakfast at Country Club Tasmania, valued at \$600," he added.

St Marys has a population of only 738 according to the 2021 Census, but during the holiday season the area gets heaps of tourists and campers and that number swells.

The club has three bookmakers set to field on the day.

- Keep handling to a minimum
- Keep it away from people and domestic animals

You may need to keep the animal for a short time, while the next steps are arranged.



Thank you Keri, for dropping me into the deep end. I did what I do best. I knuckled down and......PANICKED. I was not, and never have been, a WHIZ at computer operation. It had to be done, and I thank Michael Hoskinson for all his help during those very early days. How many times did he come to the rescue when I backed myself into a corner.... I know that it was only a small publication, but it was important to make it attractive to readers, and also to satisfy the faith of the few advertisers. It had to work no matter how small it might seem. Eventually, I grew into the job and started to provide more jokes which, if nothing else did, would give someone a laugh.

I must admit that in the latter years of volunteering at the Online Centre, I was occupied in solving the daily "Mercury" crossword. I didn't do it alone. Keri always came up with solutions with a laugh, sometimes showing me how wrong my line of thought was. Sometimes the whole morning tea time was a loud laugh as we all pitched in with funny ideas. It was occasionally hilarious. Thank you all for those times.

Then the Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House decided to take over "The Valley and East Coast Voice" which was closing. Where to start with this unaccustomed addition? Keri started on the new venture and got it going. She and Elizabeth Death co-operated to establish the paper until Murray, Keri's husband, became very ill. Elizabeth stepped in and the rest, as they say, is history. Elizabeth was now the sole Editor, who was also into somewhat of a deep-end and had to learn on the job. This she has done with some aplomb, and continues to flourish. I have worked with Elizabeth since "The Valley and East Coast Voice" 2019. We work together well as we are able to talk about all sorts of subjects, whether we know anything about them or not. It has been very positive and makes for an easy atmosphere in which to work, at least for me.

The fate of the 'Fingal Focus' was not really a problem. Obviously two publications could not successfully co-exist, and The Valley and East Coast Voice was an established news voice. The solution was simply to incorporate the 'Fingal Focus' as part of the Valley Voice....phew!! I still had an outlet for my ramblings which Elizabeth has encouraged, and she has added that quite a few people enjoyed my "stuff". So, I thank you all for reading at least some of my writings, even the stuff about my wartime childhood and the fact that I am proud that my antecedents are Irish. However, I must confirm that I am definitely AUSTRALIAN, not only because of my citizenship but also by conviction, so there.

Thank you to all those friends who have shown me many kindnesses while volunteering at the Online Centre and then Fingal Valley Neighbourhood House. It is things like that which make life worth-while.





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MOUNT ELEPHANT AND BEYOND BOOK GROUP BOOK REVIEW Written by Pam Bretz

Our November book was "Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine". This was the debut novel of Gail Honeyman, written in 2017, and it was one of our group's most popular books of the year.

Set in Glasgow in contemporary times, the story is narrated in the first person by Eleanor, a decidedly odd woman of 30 who works in the office of a design firm. She appears to be living in her own bubble, doing her job during the week while keeping fellow workers at bay. Her weekends involve strict self imposed routines, including drinking three bottles of vodka to drown out the thoughts and experiences that haunt her. This might sound grim but Eleanor has a very judgemental attitude to what we would think of as normal behaviour, and her commentary is very funny, leavening the seriousness with which we view this obviously different and damaged character.

Eleanor's life changes when she and Raymond from the IT department come across an elderly man, Sammy, who has fallen in the street. From this moment on, we see Eleanor slowly beginning to enter the world of other people, to confront her traumatic childhood and come to



terms with it or leave it behind. This is not achieved easily, and poor Eleanor endures many humiliating and challenging experiences, including developing a disastrous crush on a wannabe rock musician. What saves Eleanor is the ultimate goodness and kindness of Raymond and her own strength of will and determination and lack of self pity. Her understanding boss, Bob, the acceptance of her quirkiness by Sammy's family and their welcoming of her into family occasions, and a skilful and understanding psychologist, all enable Eleanor to come to a new version of herself, released from the shackles of her horror past. Even her fellow office team become supportive of her after a drinking binge that nearly costs her her life.

Honeyman skilfully develops the 'slow reveal', which doesn't fully happen till very near the end of the story, and then through the clever device of old newspaper articles. Once again, we have read about the effects that childhood trauma can have on an individual, but the gentle and positive ending, not overly romanticised, left us uplifted.

I'd like to wish you all a safe and enjoyable festive season and I hope that reading is one of the pleasures you continue or take up in 2024.

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
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

IN THE KITCHEN WITH KIRSTEN



Here's a recipe for left-overs. Great for Boxing Day is Coronation Turkey, traditionally known as Coronation Chicken, which was created for the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in 1953.

So, for my recipe, you can use chicken or turkey, both work really well and its fabulous in the warmer weather. The beauty about this is that really, you don't need to have the exact amount of ingredients, and you can be a little experimental. By that, I mean don't go too outside the recipe, but if you don't have apricot chutney, then use another one; if you don't have apricots perhaps use mango etc. So, what do you need?

150 grams apricot chutney

3 tablespoons sliced toasted almonds

2 tablespoons chopped fresh coriander

Ingredients

Approximately 500 grams to 1 kilo of cooked turkey or chicken meat, shredded up

- I bunch of fresh spring onions, sliced
- 100 grams crème fraiche or Greek natural yoghurt
- 1/2 cup chopped dried apricots
- salt and pepper to taste

Method

Mix the chutney, mayonnaise, crème fraiche (or yoghurt), spring onions and curry powder together. Gently fold in the chicken, apricots, almonds and coriander, reserving a little of the latter two for garnish. Add salt and pepper to taste.

Let sit for 30 minutes to let the flavours develop and then place in in serving dish and garnish with remaining coriander and almonds.

LITTLE THINGS

The Christmas season is with us again! I'm putting up decorations. I turn on the radio, hoping to hear Christmassy music. Instead I hear "From Little Things, Big Things Grow". I would change stations, but I like that song. It's then that I realize how appropriate it is. Our house is full of little things that make the place uniquely our home - crafts and paintings done by our children years ago, ornaments, inconspicuous pieces of furniture. Lots of little things - some practical, some sentimental, but all adding a little extra joy to our lives.

I start thinking of past Christmases. One little item catches my attention. My memories transport me to anther time and place....

It is December 1958, and I'm visiting my grandparents, Jack and Mary Newman at Frank Street, St Marys. "Grandad, please tell me your special Christmas-time story." "But I tell it to you each year," he protests. "Yes, and I love it. Anyway, this year is special because I'm 10 years old and great-grandmother Mary Ann was 10 in the story." Thus persuaded, he settles down in his armchair by the fire, I sit on my special seat at his feet. "Just one episode," Grandad warns. I nod, that's sufficient England, 1856



Ten-year-old Mary Ann Terry runs indoors and gathers into her arms her greatest confidant and most precious possession, her doll Sally. "I've known for weeks a mystery is afoot. The pig and hens have been sold, some of our furniture sorted and set aside. Today, you and I will solve this bewildering puzzle." Sally's porcelain head wobbles in agreement on her limp rag body.

Cautiously, the pair creep and hide behind a fence where two men stand talking. "Collect the cow tomorrow, for we leave in five days," John Terry says, shaking his neighbour's hand to seal the deal. Hearing these words, the young girl can't contain her dismay. "Oh, no!" She jumps up and runs to find her mother, desperately wanting an explanation. She bursts into the kitchen, and to her surprise, the woman is gently wrapping the 'special occasion only' plates and placing them in a large chest. "Mother, tell me what is going on." Her mother looks up with-tear-filled eyes. "Your father will tell you soon, meanwhile, we must do what must be done. Come and help." The two work in silence. Mary Ann knows no answers will be given until after the evening meal and the family gather around the fire for devotions and reflections. "Mary Ann," her a father addresses her as he sits in his armchair. She sits on her stool at this feet. "I've deliberately waited until everything was finalised before telling you of the big change our family is embarking on." The seriousness of his voice makes her anxious. "I saw you eavesdropping this afternoon, so you already know something. Before I continue, I'll do a reading from Psalm 107." His picks up the big family Bible. "They that go down to the sea in ships, these see the works of the LORD and His wonders of the deep." He closes the Bible and tenderly places his hand on her shoulder. "Dear daughter, we're going on a big adventure. We'll see God's wonders of the sea and the beauty and wonders of a new far away land - Australia, to a place called Tasmania." Stunned by the news, she stammers, "A ship! Tasmania! That little dot on the map of the world?" Chocking back tears, she asks, "Why Father? And when?" "As to the why, here we are, poor tenant farmers. In Tasmania, God willing, we'll own our own land. As to when, we leave on Thursday." Her mother tends the trembling daughter. "You must accept the inevitable. Tomorrow you need to choose one item to take for starting our new life in a new land. I'll pack it in the chest with my special blue and white pattern plates."

Before she drifts into restless sleep, she hugs Sally tightly in a 'I'll never be parted from you' hug. She assures the doll, "Decision already made! I'll be taking you, Sally, that's for sure."

Next morning, she still has a heavy heart. She can't recover from the massive shock of upheaval. She brightens a little at the thought. "Mother, I've no need to pack Sally in the chest, for I'll carry her with me the whole long journey." Mother agrees. "In that case, I suggest you take your other possession and give it to your best friend Susan. That way, you'll be separated but still in a way united." She is pleased with the suggestion. "I'll take my stool to Susan right away." Gathering the little stool, she heads for the door. She looks at the fire-place. Visions of all the nightly family gatherings overwhelm her. What in the world could be more precious that sitting on her stool at her father's feet, surrounded by the love of the family? She knows what

she must do. "Mother, please pack my stool with your prized items." Picking up her beloved doll, she says, "I'm going now to give Sally to Susan."

Retuning empty-handed, her face is stained with tears from a heart-breaking permanent separation. She checks the chest! She'll sit on her stool in her new home. Family love is not governed by change. It remains constant. Mary Ann is at peace. She knows she has courageously made the right decision!



"There's much more to your great-grandmother's story," Grandad says, reaching down and tenderly patting my head. I smile and lovingly pat the stool on the which I'm sitting. "Beverley, today I'm giving you that stool. My mother gave it to me for Christmas when I was 10, and living at Terrydale, near Goshen." A far-away look comes to Grandad's eyes. "Goshen, the Promised Land. In Genesis 45:10, it says, "You shall dwell in the land of Goshen and you shall be near me; you and our children and your children's children, your flocks, your herds and all you have."

Grandad's reminiscence passes. "Our family certainly prospered in that place. Treasure Mary Ann's stool! Keep it in the family as a reminder of the value of family bonds and unity, and of God's unfailing goodness."

I look at Mary Ann's stool and marvel how from little things, big things grow, for six generations of bottoms have sat on this stool - God willing, many more generations will do likewise.

That stool also reminds me of the true meaning of Christmas - Jesus came from Heaven to Earth as a Baby - a little thing. Two thousand and twenty-three years later, big thing continue to grow as people follow His example - Jesus' ways are Love and His message is Peace.

Epilogue

I'm almost finished my Christmas cleaning. At the back of a drawer, I find an ancient maroon covered book. I can't remember it or where it may have come from. Curiously, I look inside the cover. I

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
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

FISHING REPORT

Hi all,

Well it's that time of year that the fly anglers are out chasing the trout on waterways throughout the state, with some highland waters fishing vey well. As I mentioned last month, November/December is mayfly time; these insects start to hatch and the trout have been feeding on them when conditions suit since insects evolved. Highland lakes such as Woods, Arthurs, Penstock and Little Pine all are producing quality fish. Although Woods Lake has algal bloom at the moment it has been tested as non-toxic, and the fishing has still been good and the fish are ok to eat.

The salt water has been also rewarding anglers with some big black-back salmon and trevally taken from Georges Bay and a report of the elusive kingfish in the bay, while nice-sized bream continue to be taken from the Scamander and Swan rivers. **Fishing reports**

27th and 28th November, Lake Leake

27th was a calm warm day and spent the afternoon chasing dun feeders up in the snowy bay. Fish were taken on dun emergers and floating nymphs. Had a good afternoon until the dreaded eastly sea breeze came in and put an end to the day... 28th was the same as the day before. Although the dun hatch was more prolific, not as many fish were seen taking the insects. <u>1st December, Scamander River</u>

Went down early and arrived not long after sunrise and headed up the river. Caught some nice bream although not over-big sizes as the weeks before. Decided to change to a surface lure as the day was overcast and this helped with surface feeders, caught a few bream although not over-large. Surface lures are a great way to catch a bream. You can see the fish come up under the lure and just sit there deciding the fate or push the lure with their nose to see what this thing is, but when they decide, its all about the "BOOF" when they smash the lure. The way to use the surface lures is to cast to shore and wind a few turns of the reel to get the lure to zig zag across the top, then just stop and wait and watch. If you can't polaroid them, wait for that magical "BOOF".

3rd and 4th December, Lake Leake

3rd December, went up to see if any dun-feeders were about, and had a good afternoon.

4th December, I was out early before sunrise on the lake and although calm conditions, only odd fish here and there, so decided to head to the Swan River for a bream. A bad idea, as we never got a bream and got blown off the water. At the boat -ramp, a fellow angler had success right up the river although he said the fishing was tough. I went back to the lake around lunch for the dun hatch, and only one small unfortunate fish to the boat.

7th December, South Esk River

Had a friend come up for a afternoon on the river and Lake Lucy, and caught a couple of nice fish from Lake Lucy on red tag flies, then got the life scared out of me with a close encounter with a local black tiger snake, who wanted the same spot as myself, which I politely gave up at his request. So I went over to the river and walked onto a nice little river trout feeding up under the shade of the willow trees who took an red tag without hesitation, then using the humble old 'Celta' lure that many people love to use resulted in nine fish for the stretch of river we covered before the summer sun said enough, and returned to the car for a cold beverage and to reminisce.

8th December, St Helens

Went down to catch a whiting and a squid for my friend to take home with him for a feed as he hadn't caught a whiting in Tasmania before, I believe; ended up with a feed of whiting but was blown off the bay by 10.00am.

10th, 11th and 12th December, Lake Leake

Had a few good hours and a few hard hours over these days, chasing dun feeders during the afternoons.

16th December, Lake Leake

Went up for the day and the following morning, caught two trout in the calm waters along the edges. It was too hot in the boat for myself and the dog, so got out and sat on a log and caught these two, picked up another two for the afternoon before hurricane whatever come in and blew its guts out and we returned home.

Its interesting to note how seasons and fish change. The bigger brown trout in Lake Leake this year are mainly in poor condition, which is disappointing. The rainbow trout are there, but are not feeding off the top which is uncharacteristic of the species, and of all the fish we caught for the month, only one was a rainbow. If only we knew what was going on under the water....
